HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 1

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, since the beginning of time, the ability of man to provide food, fiber and fuel for himself and others has determined his independence, freedom and security; and

WHEREAS, the strength of a nation is based upon its ability to sufficiently provide safe and reliable food, fiber and fuel for its people; and

WHEREAS, America's national security has been and is directly related to the safety and reliability of the source of food, fiber and fuel; and

WHEREAS, Idaho agriculture and related agricultural businesses represent our state's largest industry, Idaho being the fourth largest agricultural state economy in the nation and the third largest in net farm income; and

WHEREAS, federal, state and local laws and regulations require American farmers, ranchers and food processors to meet the highest standards in the world when it comes to environmental protection, worker safety, wage rates and food safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, American farmers, ranchers and food processors fund record audits and USDA product inspections to confirm their products meet the criteria for U.S. standards; and

WHEREAS, the importation of fruits and vegetables has increased dramatically in the past fifteen years, while the exportation of fruits and vegetables has remained stagnant in this same time period; and

WHEREAS, imports are not held to the same strict standards as domestic products, and American producers face an unfair and unequal market; and

WHEREAS, the Country of Origin Labeling law was repealed in 2015 because of the World Trade Organization ruling derived from complaints from Canada and Mexico, and now U.S. citizens have no way of knowing where food products are coming from; and

WHEREAS, the actual number of producers in the United States is now less than one percent of the nation's population, and declining.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that because of the importance of the standards to which American farmers, ranchers and food processors are held, primarily standards concerning food safety, we urge that foreign companies wishing to participate in markets that lie within the boundaries of the United States be held to the exact same standards.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any audits or inspections that may be required to confirm that the necessary criteria are met to conform to these standards are paid in full by the foreign companies themselves, so there is no burden to U.S. taxpayers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the education of the general public regarding the importance of the role that agriculture plays in the development of a society, recognizing that such public education, especially at the middle school and secondary levels, is critical in the preservation and strengthening of the agricultural industry, the State of Idaho, and our nation as a whole.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge that American farmers, ranchers and food processors be enabled to compete freely and trade fairly in domestic and foreign markets on a strictly level playing field.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.
