His Excellency, the Governor of the State of Idaho, Dirk Kempthorne, was introduced by the Speaker and the following State of the State Message and Budget Address was delivered by Governor Kempthorne.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, distinguished members of the Legislature, Mr. Chief Justice and distinguished members of the Judiciary, fellow Constitutional Officers, my fellow Idahoans;

It is an honor to be here once again, to speak to you about the state of our state. In this historic building we once again come to do the people's work. When we walk into these hallowed halls, we leave our personal matters behind to work for the greater good. It is part of the miracle of our American democracy.

We build upon the work of the generations who came before us, but we also lay the foundations for future generations of Idahoans. Our work is guided by the values our citizens cherish; strong and healthy families, safe and vibrant communities, and responsible stewardship of Idaho's rugged and pristine outdoors. There is no place in the world like Idaho.

Now for the task before us. Part of our work is to continue to govern, to debate public policy, to balance the budget, and to maintain the services on which our people depend. But we also have many opportunities to do extraordinary things for our citizens, to invest in Idaho's future, to do things that may only happen once in a generation, but which will benefit many generations.

This year, we will add another chapter to the story of Idaho. We did not pen the first page, nor will we write the last, but our contributions will be lasting. Over the past few years, we have led in times of surplus and in times of sacrifice, in times of peace and in times of war.

When I took office seven years ago, no one could have predicted what would happen over the course of a few short years. But I said then that Idaho would be a leader among the fifty states. When state economies plunged into the worst recession since World War II, with the rest of the nation, we went from record surpluses to historic shortfalls. But again, I said that Idaho would lead the way out of the recession and we have

When the rains from the economic storm came down, we built our budget upon the rock of fiscal conservatism, with an eye for the future. Together, we carried out a plan to get us through the tough times. Because of our choices, I'm proud to say that the State of our State is stronger than ever:

- 1. 25,000 new businesses filed with the Secretary of State
- 2. 23,000 new jobs
- 3. Business and job growth ahead of 46 other states
- Unemployment at an unprecedented 3.4% the first time in Idaho history

No matter how you measure it, Idaho is thriving.

Some pundits and even some economists may be stunned by our remarkable recovery, but I'm not surprised. This is no accident. We made the right decisions over the past several years and as a result, our budget is balanced, our economy is full steam ahead, and the structural imbalance plaguing us is no more.

Tonight, I submit to you a budget that is responsible, sensible, and doable. For Fiscal Year 2007, I am proposing a \$2.309 billion general fund budget. It meets the critical needs of education, health care, and public safety and it keeps general fund expenditures to a mere 5.9% growth.

We began this fiscal year with a starting balance of \$214 million and revenues remain above target. Despite the growth in state revenues, we will continue to control the growth of state government. We must not overextend the taxpayer's money.

Even though the economy has been very strong, home budgets are as tight as ever because of rising energy costs. Here's what one of our newspapers said: "HIGH COST OF HEAT LEAVES VALLEY RESIDENTS COLD." If the headline isn't compelling enough, then listen to what citizens across the state have told me. My office received a call from a mother who spent one-fourth of her monthly budget on utility bills. I received an email from a family of eight, who had their power turned off right before Christmas. A single mother wrote about having to dress her three-year old in two sweaters and wrap her eight month-old in extra blankets just to fend off the cold.

My budget includes more than \$63 million in one-time energy assistance to help Idahoans with their rising energy costs. Every Idaho resident who filed a 2004 Individual Tax Return or the grocery tax credit will receive a check, \$50 for each man, woman, and child who qualifies. That family of eight will receive \$400.

We are all feeling the impacts. For many families this is an emergency, and so I'm asking you to make this measure effective immediately. As soon as you approve the legislation, I'll sign it and within 14 days the first checks will be on their way.

In addition to this one-time energy assistance, I am proposing that we transfer \$67 million to the Budget Stabilization Account. This is a prudent course of action for our state budget and it gives us a healthy reserve of over \$105 million, the largest in Idaho history.

One of the reasons that we did not have to make drastic cuts to vital programs in the recent recession was because of the dedicated work of our state employees. There are countless examples of state employees taking on more responsibilities and doing more with less to serve their fellow citizens. Because we often leave to the last the question of salary increases for state employees, I think it's time to demonstrate their value to us by making it the first item we address. Therefore, I'm recommending a 3% salary increase and rather than wait until July 1st, I'd like to make it effective at the end of this month.

There are also special needs among correctional officers, parole officers, and the Idaho State Police. Many of these men and women work in environments that put them at great personal risk. I'm asking for additional money for these classifications. Send me this legislation so our employees can see the increase in their checks by the end of February.

Also at the top of my agenda is the major Medicaid reform that I first announced in November. Medicaid is among the fastest growing parts of the state budget. To cure the systemic problems and to reign in the escalating costs, we must do more to modernize the system. Unless we do something, we'll be forcing the care of our grandparents to be in direct conflict with the education of their grandchildren.

We must be proactive in our approach, focusing on results instead of rules, outcomes instead of regulations. My common sense plan will simplify the system, reduce costs, and turn our attention to prevention, wellness, and personal responsibility. We'll begin by redesigning Medicaid into three distinct programs, one for low-income children, another for individuals with disabilities or special health needs, and a third for the elderly. Each program will be tailored to meet the needs of each population. I believe that by working together with a little common sense, innovation, and Idaho ingenuity, we'll be the model for national Medicaid reform.

Through all of the budget cuts of the past years, we have kept education off the chopping block. Now, we're in a position to make additional investments in our public schools. For fiscal year 2007, my budget recognizes the importance of our public schools with a first-ever appropriation of over \$1 billion - \$1.035 billion to be exact. This historic investment represents a 4.89% increase over last year's appropriation.

Improving education is not merely a factor of funding. We have already improved our public schools by focusing on reading, math, and science. Now, I'm proposing another common sense reform. High school curriculum must reflect what business is demanding, even more math and science. Two years of instruction in these core areas is not enough to prepare our young people for the workforce.

The State Board of Education has recommended requiring four years of math and three years of science for graduation from Idaho high schools. This will keep our students competitive with those in other states and other countries, and it will bring our minimum high school standards in line with our own state college entrance requirements. My budget includes the funds requested to implement high school reform. We live in a 21st century economy. We need a 21st century education.

Another area of our school curriculum that is in need of reform is physical education. In a world where fast food and a sedentary lifestyle are becoming the norm, it's imperative that we give our children opportunities to develop lifelong habits of physical fitness. Unfortunately, video games have replaced sports as the normal after school activity for our youth. Why would a 12 year-old want to play catch with his neighbor when he can throw a touchdown pass to an NFL all-star to win the Super Bowl, all without leaving the comfort of his couch? Some studies point to the tragic reality that if this trend continues, today's generation of children will have a shorter life expectancy than we do. We must not allow this trend to continue. It's time to revitalize and strengthen physical education around the state. You'll find a healthy investment in my budget to do just that.

We can raise the standards, but there is no replacement for a good teacher. From physical science to physical education and music to math, our teachers are on the front lines of preparing our children for the future. Idaho has some of the best, most dedicated teachers in the country. Every day, they enter the classroom to teach, inspire, and encourage our children. To all of our hard working teachers, we say thank you.

My budget includes a \$27 million increase for teacher salaries. As a part of this investment, I want to increase the starting wage for this noble profession. Two years ago we raised the starting teacher salary to \$27,500. This year, my budget includes ongoing money to increase it once again to \$30,000. When you approve this measure, we can all be proud that in the last few years, we will have raised starting teacher salaries by 20%

Just a few weeks ago, the Idaho Supreme Court ruled on the constitutionality of our historical mechanism for funding local school construction and maintenance. In their view, reliance on the traditional school bond election process has not produced the guarantees required by our constitution.

We have already taken some important steps to encourage school districts to pass school bonds and build new schools. We implemented a plan to pay a portion of the interest on new school bonds. We have already partnered with 24 local school districts to build or improve schools across the state. My budget includes \$4.5 million to continue this commitment, which is projected to grow to more than \$22 million annually by the year 2025. Many of the districts with the greatest facility needs now have new schools thanks to this partnership with the state. Many more will benefit and we're committed to the process.

Despite our progress, the Court expects more. Fortunately, they have recognized that this is a problem best solved by the political process. One of the options the Court gave us to consider is what I proposed seven years ago: lowering the

supermajority for school bond elections. I support lowering the supermajority to 60% if school districts hold their bond elections concurrent with the primary or general election. This is a constitutional matter and it will require a constitutional amendment. So it's time to put this question before the citizens of the state of Idaho by placing it on the ballot.

In higher education, we have also made investments that will benefit generations of future students. My budget for colleges and universities provides a 4.8% increase over the current fiscal year, and includes full funding for salaries, inflation, and increased enrollment. Just as with other state employees, the salary increases for faculty and staff will be effective at the end of this month.

Our faculty and staff are part of the reason that our colleges and universities are among the best in the country. But the stark reality is that Idaho ranks low compared to the rest of the nation in the percentage of high school graduates who go directly to college. Why? Part of that may be accessibility, part may be afford ability.

For too long we have asked our universities to be all things to all people, but the simple truth is that a university is a university. It is not a community college. It is not a professional-technical school.

I'm presenting a plan that will make community college classes accessible and affordable to more Idahoans. I propose investing \$5 million to begin the process of creating a new statewide community college network. My proposal does not call for any new investments in brick and mortar. The community college of the 21st century, with all of our technological assets and existing infrastructure, does not require a brick and mortar approach. Instead, this initiative utilizes existing facilities and resources around the state, including public schools, private businesses, and government buildings to meet community needs. Under my plan, instead of having to travel to a college campus miles away, students might expect to attend classes at the local high school, a corporate conference room, a room in city hall, or a county courthouse.

We have some great models to follow in North Idaho College and the College of Southern Idaho. These community colleges have already begun to expand their services to rural communities in the Mini-Cassia area and the Silver Valley, among many others. These true community college programs will grow as enrollment grows. In this way, these programs will be self-sustaining and life sustaining for individuals who want better jobs, a better education, and a better quality of life.

I have spoken with our college and university presidents, school superintendents, and business leaders who recognize the urgent need and have pledged their support for my "Idaho College" initiative. Let's take the next step to make college classrooms available in every part of the state.

Investing in education is the best way we can give our citizens the hope of a bright future. Unfortunately, too many of our young people are getting their education on the streets and end up in prison. Last year, I created the Criminal Justice Commission, including members of all three branches of government, law enforcement, and other community partners. They have undertaken an extensive review of the most significant criminal problems facing Idaho. They have worked tirelessly and I've taken their recommendations to heart.

On the top of that list, we're going to make our already tough sex offender laws even tougher. First, I propose doubling the maximum sentences for the most severe sex crimes. Let's give judges greater authority to keep these predators off the streets and behind bars.

For those sex offenders who serve their time, we currently require that they register once a year with the state. That's not good enough, especially for violent sexual predators. That gives them a one-year head start if they ever decide to move or re-offend. I propose increasing the frequency of registration for violent sex offenders from once a year to quarterly. I also propose requiring these violent predators to verify their address with the State Police every month. When a sex offender moves to Idaho intending to stay here, they'll have 48 hours to notify the authorities of their presence. For those who hide from the law or fail to register, we're also going to double the maximum sentence. I have a message for sex offenders, you can live by our rules or you'll live behind bars.

Another serious problem is gang activity. As the population grows, gangs will only get worse, unless we act. Idaho currently has no laws against gangs, but we must eradicate this social epidemic before it infects every community.

When I talk about gangs, I want to dispel the image of the unsophisticated street thug. This is organized crime. They run like a business, but their business is no good.

Gang members can be as young as 10 or well into their 50's. In some cases gang membership is a family tradition with third generation gang members. But this is one family tradition that we won't pass on in Idaho.

This session, I will send you legislation to criminalize gang activity. We will make gang recruitment illegal. We will enhance the penalties for gang members who commit crimes. We will make it a felony to supply firearms to a criminal gang. With this anti-gang legislation, we're sending a clear message: Gangs are not welcome in Idaho.

This year, we will also take another step in our continuing fight against methamphetamine. Thanks to our anti-meth initiative, we have shut down more than 760 labs in seven years; on average, we've taken out two labs every week since I took office. We've been tough on meth and the word is out. We must make it harder than ever to peddle this poison in Idaho.

It's time to require that pseudoephedrine, the key ingredient in meth, be kept behind the counter. We are one of the only states that doesn't safeguard it. Some Idaho counties and cities already impose requirements on vendors. Some vendors safeguard pseudoephedrine voluntarily. But we need uniformity and predictability across the state. It's time we make this simple fix

Being tough on crime is good for our communities and it's good for our state. One of the reasons that Idaho is the third fastest growing state is because of our low crime rate. Idaho is a safe place to raise a family, because we don't tolerate those who prey on others, we put them in prison. But this means our prison population will continue to grow.

In spite of our best efforts to control the growth of our prison population, we have reached a point where we need more room in order to keep our communities safe. I'm recommending \$16 million for the addition of 300 beds at the privately run prison. With county jails full and some Idaho inmates already housed out-of-state, the choices are slim, start releasing inmates or make room for more. In Idaho, if you do the crime, you do the time.

But while we lock people up, we don't always throw away the key. In our prisons, a tragic 85% of offenders have a substance abuse problem. However, addicts can recover with proper treatment. Last year I announced that Idaho received a \$22.8 million grant to create a system to help more addicts get access to treatment. Since we obtained the grant, we have helped over 5,000 people receive recovery support services and treatment.

In our prisons, because many of our inmates can and will be released after serving their time, we must continue to focus on rehabilitation. We have seen the success of drug treatment programs in our prison system. This year we'll take our efforts a step further. We will rehabilitate offenders and assist them with their re-entry back into society. My budget includes funding for a 400 bed, community-based treatment center. That's 300 prison beds and 400 treatment beds. That's a net gain of 700 beds that will not only help relieve the pressure in our prisons, but change lives for the better.

One of the best ways to keep from having to build prisons is to ensure that our children are loved and cared for so they don't get into trouble in the first place. From the very start of my administration, I have focused on families and children, declaring this the "Generation of the Child."

We have worked to make sure that our children get the immunizations they need to live healthy lives. In fact, we have been recognized by the Centers for Disease Control for having the largest increase in the country in our childhood immunization rate. We have also improved access to health care for many children. Nearly 70,000 children have health care today who were not covered seven years ago.

One of our greatest achievements has been to create a Culture of Caring. We have started an ongoing dialogue between parents and teachers, lawmakers and community leaders, all in an effort to increase awareness, understanding, and cooperation on the issues that most affect our children and families. One of the great advocates has been our First Lady. Patricia has been tireless in working for Idaho families and Idaho is fortunate to have her.

Our efforts have matured over the course of seven years. We have accomplished much, but there is more to do. To continue our emphasis on families and children, I propose creating the Office for Families and Children within the Executive Office of the Governor. This effort will formalize Idaho's commitment to promoting healthy and well-educated children, and strengthening families.

With a small investment, the Office for Families and Children will facilitate the exchange of information and ideas to help strengthen our communities and protect our young people. It will also help streamline government services designed to reinforce the family unit. This is a positive step forward. Idaho families and children deserve our continued support.

In the area of economic development, we have been aggressive at expanding opportunities for Idaho businesses. We have a great success story in our continued efforts to sell Idaho goods and services around the world. Our trade missions to Asia and Mexico have opened doors for Idaho exports and built relationships that are already producing results. We estimate that our international exports from 2005 will exceed \$3 billion. This is big business for Idaho companies and agriculture.

Central to our ongoing success are the Idaho trade offices located in key international markets. This year, we can further enhance Idaho trade by expanding our presence in Asia. First, I propose re-establishing our part-time trade office in Japan. With increasing opportunities in China, I propose making our Shanghai trade office full-time. Idaho is open for business, here and around the world.

Science and technology continues to be one of the driving forces behind the strength of Idaho's economy. I am recommending the full request of the Science and Technology Advisory Council. This includes funding for our TechConnect offices throughout the state; grant money for Idaho companies competing for federal research dollars, and increased funding for our universities for research and technology transfer.

This year, we must also continue to invest in rural Idaho through my Rural Initiative. Many of the new jobs in our smaller communities are the direct result of this initiative. I am proposing an additional \$700,000 investment. With your support, we'll bring funding for the Rural Initiative to \$3.5 million, of which \$500,000 is earmarked for science and technology projects. The rural initiative has benefited more than 60 communities by building infrastructure and creating jobs.

This is part of the reason that we're leading the nation in economic recovery. Let's continue this tremendous story of success.

Another great success story is what's happening in the area of species conservation. Our salmon and steelhead are returning to Idaho rivers. The wolf management plan you approved three years ago is now in place. Last week I signed an agreement with the Secretary of Interior that gives Idaho the authority for the day-to-day management of wolves. This is the first such agreement between the Secretary and any governor, and it gives the state management of a re-introduced species before delisting. Although it was an historic agreement, we won't stop until we make history by delisting wolves in Idaho.

By the end of the year, I also expect that the Yellowstone Grizzly Bear will be removed from protection under the Endangered Species Act in portions of Idaho. Grizzly bears may be here to stay, but thanks to the state plan that you helped develop, federal management of this species is on its way out.

There has been a lot of discussion about local property taxes. I recognize the problem, nobody likes property taxes. But the state does NOT assess, collect, or spend a single penny of property taxes.

As a former Mayor, I understand the primary role that local governments play in public health, fire protection, law enforcement, road construction, and economic development. My budget continues the state's historical support of local government.

My budget includes nearly \$142 million from sales tax for cities and counties. We're also giving almost \$29 million from the liquor tax to cities and counties. Consider the \$9.6 million from the cigarette tax that goes to cities and counties, the \$18.2 million for Catastrophic Healthcare that goes to the counties, and the \$9.7 million that goes to fund the Health Districts serving all 44 counties. My budget also includes more than \$112 million in other direct property tax relief to local government. In all we send over \$325 million a year to local governments to help fund local services, which otherwise would come from property taxes. The state is already a strong partner in its support of local government.

If citizens believe they are paying too much in property taxes, that debate belongs in the county courthouses and the city halls.

Having said that, I recognize that property taxes are an increasing burden. I have a genuine concern in those areas of the state with rising property values, that seniors, those on fixed incomes, and the disabled might be priced out of their homes. It should never be the case that growing property taxes force a citizen from their home. That's why we implemented the Property Tax Circuit Breaker, to help those eligible pay their property taxes. Twenty-six thousand households currently benefit. I propose helping an additional 10,000 households, that's households, not individuals, by increasing the circuit

breaker from \$15.4 million to \$22.7 million. With this increase we will help 36,000 families pay their property taxes and stay in their homes.

Expanding the circuit breaker will help, but we're also going to put in place a safety net to break the fall for those who have no other options. I'm proposing that we give seniors and the disabled, who meet the criteria of the Circuit Breaker, the added ability to defer their property taxes. The state will pay the deferred taxes as long as it's needed to keep them in their home. As the state is repaid, the money will go into a revolving fund, helping seniors and the disabled in perpetuity.

Now while we're talking about property, I want to comment on another problem that could affect property owners and local governments. Last year the United States Supreme Court ruled that governments can take private property from one person and give it to another for private economic activity. This decision erodes private property rights. This is unacceptable. The Court's opinion forces us to ask the question, "Will we allow government to take your home or property and give it to private developers?" I have a bill that says, not in Idaho, not now, and not ever.

We value private property. We also have some public property in Idaho that is absolutely incredible. Idaho's 30 state parks have been called the jewels of the gem state. These parks are important to tourism, Idaho's third largest and fastest growing industry. Tourism provides 47,000 jobs and has a \$2.1 billion impact to our economy. Part of that comes from the 2.5 million annual visitors to Idaho state parks.

Any investment in our state parks is an investment that will pay big dividends. It's not just money we're talking about, it's memories - memories that will last for generations. So, I am proposing that we make a once-in-a-generation investment in our state park system.

If I say names like Yellowstone or Yosemite, it evokes great images. So do names like Heyburn and Harriman. These are special places, but parks like these don't just happen. It takes vision and commitment.

We've identified six parks across the state that are in need of updating and repair. In many instances, if we don't act, we will not only lose historic buildings, but we'll miss an opportunity to save these parks for the next generation.

In the north, on the shores of beautiful Lake Couer d'Alene, Heyburn State Park, our first state park, is in danger of becoming merely a memory. It's time to renovate and reopen the lodge and other facilities so that Heyburn State Park is around for another 100 years.

Much like Heyburn, Harriman State Park, located along the Henry's Fork of the Snake River in Fremont County, also needs serious repair. I propose building a visitor center and renovating the ranch-style structures to make this park a destination once again.

In Valley County, Ponderosa State Park sits on some of the most beautiful land in Idaho. We will build a rustic lodge and family cabins, and reopen public access to the beach near the old Lakeview Village.

Eagle Island State Park along the Boise River, with our rapid population growth, will become as valuable to the Treasure Valley as Central Park is to New York City. But unless we make the investment, Eagle Island's potential will not be realized. My proposal adds needed improvements, campgrounds, equestrian trails, and more greenbelt along the Boise River.

In the Hagerman Valley, at the Billingsley Creek Unit of Thousand Springs State Park, we intend to remodel the popular Garden Center, build a small outdoor concert amphitheater, and expand the equestrian arena.

Near the Idaho-Utah border, Castle Rocks State Park is quickly becoming one of our nation's rock climbing meccas. However, the facilities are inadequate. We need more campgrounds, and there's need to remodel the traditional Ranch House that welcomes visitors.

Finally, and perhaps most significantly, we will build a new State Park in Eastern Idaho. This corner of our state is experiencing explosive population growth and the fact is that there is significant demand for citizens to have a place to spend time with their families and enjoy the beauty of the State of Idaho.

I spend a lot of time in our state parks. I love sitting around a campfire and I enjoy seeing so many families with their children doing the very same thing. When we take our children there, they make memories that last a lifetime. What's unfortunate is that we probably won't see these same children and their families around the Statehouse because they're not organized and they don't know how to lobby. But let me assure you, on their behalf, that these repairs and improvements are important.

With this one-time money, let's make a once-in-a-generation investment in a world class park system. This is our responsibility, just as the leaders of previous generations had the vision to create the State Park System. They didn't put it off for someone else to do and neither should we.

It was this kind of once-in-a-generation investment that brought us this wonderful State Capitol. The year 2005 marked the centennial of the beginning of the construction on this magnificent structure. The Statehouse is steeped in history and tradition. But we only have this building because our forefathers had the vision 100 years ago to build a house that was equal to the majesty of our people.

With each passing year, the Statehouse falls further into disrepair. Five years ago, we committed to restoring the Capitol. We delayed the project because of the recession. One year ago, I recommended that we begin the restoration of our century-old State Capitol.

Well, here we are twelve months later. The building is still unprotected from fires. We lack emergency exits, and the out-of-date elevators are still unable to accommodate a gurney in the event of a medical emergency. Nothing has changed regarding the need for this restoration project, nothing except this building is one year older and construction inflation costs have gone up \$5 million.

To your credit, we have identified a revenue source to now pay for this restoration. With that revenue stream in place, no more delay. It is my intention, that on September 1st of this year, we will vacate the building and begin the renovation.

Delay can also mean increased costs with highway construction. That's why last year we approved bonding for 30 years of new highway projects all across Idaho. This is one of the reasons that people called last year's session one of the most progressive and significant sessions in the state's history. We are taking advantage of today's dollars to build a generation of highways, but it's not getting any cheaper. We have already issued the contract to underwrite the bonds, and soon, we will have the contract in place to manage the projects. Today, I ask you to approve the funding necessary to begin construction.

If anyone questions the need or the support for this, just go ask the citizens. We're going to save lives and increase commerce. We're ready to go; let's get rolling.

As we commence this second session of the 58th Idaho Legislature, I want to share a part of what I experienced over the past few years. We live in freedom and practice our form of democracy because men and women serve our country in the armed forces. Many Idahoans are currently serving in Afghanistan, Iraq, and other places around the world.

Our troops are in the middle of history, fighting a war against terrorism and bringing freedom to a people who have suffered the worst kind of oppression. Members of the 116th Cavalry Brigade, the 183rd Aviation Battalion, the 124th Wing, the 189<sup>th</sup> Air Lift Squadron, the 266th Range Squadron, the Gunfighters of Mountain Home AFB, US Marine Reservists from Charlie Company, and many other active duty and reserve soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines are part of helping to lay the foundation of freedom in the Middle East. As democracy in the Middle East takes form, Idahoans are playing a vital role and we can be proud of their service and sacrifice.

Through all of this, Idaho has deployed a greater percentage of our National Guard Forces than any other state in the union. In the height of our deployments, Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast. In the midst of the largest deployment in Idaho National Guard history, I sent more than 400 soldiers and airmen to Louisiana to help in the relief effort. Some time later, I spoke with the chairman of the US Senate Armed Services Committee, Senator John Warner. He asked how Idaho was able to still send troops to Louisiana with our record deployment. My answer to him was that when fellow Americans call for help, Idahoans will always answer the call.

As Governor, I feel responsible for the well-being of our citizens. As Commander-in-Chief of the Idaho National Guard, I feel a special responsibility for all of our service members and for their families. With each deployment, I have been there when they leave. I've been there when they return. I've been there when they haven't returned. I have never been so proud to be from Idaho. I have also never been so profoundly affected. We must never forget those who have given their lives in the service of our country. We are grateful for those who serve and safely return.

One of my honors and duties as Commander-in-Chief is to present the Purple Heart to those Idahoans who have been wounded in battle. It is an honor with deep meaning and great tradition that dates to the Revolutionary War. It's as sacred a medal as this nation has.

I've presented the Purple Heart in a variety of settings; several at Walter Reed Army Hospital, in a city park, and in my office. There are currently four Purple Hearts that have not yet been presented. We were scheduled to present these awards across the state. But I feel that this is the place this is the time before all three branches of government and before the citizens of Idaho.

These four men represent all of our soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines who have so gallantly served. I now call upon our Adjutant General, Major General Lafrenz, and Command Sergeant-Major Lewis to assist me in the presentation of the Purple Heart to: Staff Sergeant Thomas Butler, Specialist Jason Brasse, Specialist Jesse Ingram, and Specialist Kenneth Parham. Gentlemen, would you please come forward.

Staff Sergeant Butler is assigned to Company A, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion 116<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Brigade, in Emmett. On June 26<sup>th</sup>, 2005, while conducting combat operations near Kirkuk, Iraq, Sergeant Butler was seriously wounded by an Improvised Explosive Device. He took shrapnel and recieved serious injuries to his left arm and leg, and abdomen. Sergeant Butler came home to his wife, Kimberly and their three children Amanda, Jacob, and Jared.

Specialist Jason Braase is also assigned to Company A, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion 116<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Brigade, in Emmett. He was a part of the same combat operation near Kirkuk, Iraq. When the IED exploded, he was also seriously wounded, taking shrapnel in his right leg. I saw Jason and his wife Autumn at Walter Reed Army Hospital on more than one occasion.

Specialist Jesse Ingram is assigned to Detachment 2, Company B, 116<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion, in Grangeville. On the 14<sup>th</sup> of February, 2005, while conducting a patrol near Hawij, Iraq, his patrol took enemy fire. He received multiple shrapnel wounds to his face, neck, chest and right hand, for which he has already received one Purple Heart. After he was wounded, he returned to duty. On the 28th of April, 2005, while he was conducting another patrol in Iraq, his vehicle was destroyed by an Improvised Explosive Device. He was again seriously wounded, taking shrapnel in both arms and both legs. He's here today to receive a second purple heart.

Specialist Kenneth Parham is assigned to Detachment 1, Company B, 116<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion, in Orofino. On the 21<sup>st</sup> of April, 2005, his armored Humvee took a direct hit from an IED. He sustained multiple serious injuries including fractured ribs, a collapsed lung, and shrapnel wounds to his hip and shin from the explosion. This was his third incident. He came home to his wife Cheryl and their four children, Michael, Kasia, Stacey, and Kenneth.

Command-Sergeant Major, post the orders.

After all that has been said tonight about the state of our state, I hope these soldiers leave no doubt, Idaho is in good hands. While we debate public policy and budgets, figuratively fighting for the values of our constituents, let us never forget that our fellow citizens are literally fighting for the values of freedom and democracy around the world.

We have the privilege of practicing democracy. Let us cherish that privilege and work together. We also have some extraordinary opportunities. I expect that you will fully consider and debate my proposals. I welcome an open and thorough discussion.

I look forward to working with you to make our hopes for Idaho a reality. God bless you in your work. God bless Idaho. God bless America.

WHEREAS, Idaho's Suicide Prevention Plan was developed to address the problem of suicide in Idaho;

WHEREAS, Idaho's Suicide Prevention Plan provides a guide for agencies, organizations and individuals in developing specific plans of action in preventing suicide at the state, regional and local levels;

WHEREAS, Idaho's Suicide Prevention Plan focuses on current Idaho activities and needs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the state of Idaho acknowledges the seriousness of the suicide crisis facing the state and the importance of suicide prevention by endorsing Idaho's Suicide Prevention Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, support Idaho's Suicide Prevention Plan's comprehensive approach towards reducing the risk of both suicide attempts and completions for all Idahoans through the efforts and coordination of all concerned agencies, organizations, advocacy groups and individuals.

WHEREAS, it is important that we acknowledge the serious issues and the negative effects of bullying, including the long-term damage which may be caused for our youth and the risks of teenage suicide; and

WHEREAS, playground observations identify that at least one incident of bullying occurs every seven minutes; and

WHEREAS, bullying may consist of physical incidents of hitting, kicking, or choking, verbal threats, teasing and taunting, or systematic exclusion from activities; and

WHEREAS, providing a safe physical and emotional environment is a significant goal and a personal responsibility of each individual: and

WHEREAS, in remembrance of the Columbine shootings, and as a symbol of our year-round struggle against bullying, it is appropriate that we designate a week to emphasize the importance of our endeavors.

TO THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, TO THE GOVERNOR OF MONTANA, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF MONTANA IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF IDAHO AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reintroduced the gray wolf into central Idaho with the goal of reestablishing a viable, self-sustaining population; and

WHEREAS, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service determined that the existence of 30 breeding pairs of wolves spread out over the states of Idaho, Montana and Wyoming for three consecutive years would constitute a recovered population; and

WHEREAS, the gray wolf populations of Idaho and Montana alone far exceed the aforementioned recovered population standard; and

WHEREAS, the states of Idaho and Montana have produced wolf conservation and management plans deemed adequate by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service; and

WHEREAS, the Wyoming state wolf management plan was rejected by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service; and

WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming and the federal government are litigating the U. S. Department of the Interior's decision to reject Wyoming's wolf management plan; and

WHEREAS, it could take years for this litigation to work its way through the courts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature urges the Secretary of the Interior Gale Norton to meet with representatives from Idaho and Montana to consider and agree upon alternative strategies to immediately delist the gray wolf within Idaho and Montana as requested in the October 7, 2005, letter from Montana Governor Schweitzer and Idaho Governor Kempthorne to Secretary Norton.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the Secretary of the Interior Gale Norton, the Governor of Montana Brian Schweitzer, the congressional delegation representing the State of Montana in the Congress of the United States, the Governor of Idaho Dirk Kempthorne and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 11 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, it is essential for the state of Idaho to monitor gray wolves and fulfill its obligations under the Wolf Recovery Plan approved by the Idaho Legislature in 2002, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service 10j rule of 2005, as well as maintain minimum counts as required by the Endangered Species Act, which also requires, prior to de-listing wolves, that the state have adequate regulatory mechanisms in place and recovery goals achieved; and

WHEREAS, because the state formally took over wolf management responsibilities on January 5, 2006, and due to the fact that the wolf population is now estimated in excess of 500 in 36 breeding pairs distributed across the state, it is critical for the state to gain a better understanding of pack activity and their use of the wilderness; and

WHEREAS, over the last decade, backpacking, horse packing, and using steel foothold traps in monitoring efforts have

proven largely unsuccessful in collaring wolves in the wilderness and the Department of Fish and Game wants to employ other techniques for obtaining information about wolves; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that there are a minimum of eight packs of gray wolves currently using the wilderness areas that do not have radio monitoring collars, and radio telemetry is important to determine pack size, breeding success, rendezvous and denning sites as well as pack territory; and

WHEREAS, in early 2005, the state of Idaho requested permission from the U.S. Forest Service to allow the Department of Fish and Game to land helicopters in federally protected wilderness areas during the winter months when wilderness use is minimal, snow typically protects any underlying vegetation from damage during landings, and concentration of wolves is optimal for the purpose of monitoring in those areas; and

WHEREAS, if granted permission to land helicopters, the state of Idaho proposed collaring up to 16 gray wolves and this research activity would support Idaho's wolf recovery plan by providing information on wolf demographics and behavior, movement patterns, and activity sites within the wilderness; and

WHEREAS, use of aircraft, including helicopters, in wilderness areas is permitted only at established airstrips, or as minimally necessary for the administration of the area as a wilderness and this determination must be made by the U.S. Forest Service Regional Forester for the area through issuance of a special use permit; and

WHEREAS, the state worked with the U.S. Forest Service in completing a minimum requirements analysis that indicated that the use of a helicopter would be the minimum tool to accomplish the project objectives in comparison with the use of trappers traveling into the wilderness using established landing strips, by foot or by horseback during the summer months and locating, luring and trapping wolves via leg hold traps, a method that is less successful, requires significantly more time, and has a greater potential for damage to captured wolves; and

WHEREAS, on December 4, 2005, the Regional Forester published a Scoping Notice, consisting of a two-page summary of the proposal and the minimum requirements analysis, seeking public comment and, although expected to make a decision on January 10, 2006, the U.S. Forest Service Regional Forester has now delayed decision pending further analysis of public comments and issues related to the request; and

WHEREAS, this delay significantly hinders Idaho's efforts at monitoring during a time of year when wolves are easier to find, potentially forcing the state to deploy field efforts during the summer months when there is higher human use of the wilderness areas and catching wolves will be more intrusive.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, urging that the U.S. Forest Service enter a decision as soon as possible granting a special use permit allowing the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to land helicopters in wilderness areas as requested for the purpose of monitoring gray wolves in those areas which is essential for the state of Idaho to fulfill its obligations under the Idaho Wolf Recovery Plan of 2002, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service 10j rule of 2005, as well as requirements imposed by the Endangered Species Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE RELATING TO CIVIC AND HISTORICAL EDUCATION AND URGING THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO CONVENE A SUMMIT FOR CIVIC AND HISTORICAL LEARNING, PROVIDING COMPOSITION OF THE COMMITTEE AND REQUIRING A REPORT.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, civic and historical learning encourages young people to be thoughtful and productive members of their communities and future leaders of the state; and

WHEREAS, it is crucial to the future health of our republic form of government that all young people be knowledgeable about democratic principles and practices of a republic form of government and the rule of law, be engaged in their communities and in politics, and be committed to individual freedom which will ensure the public good; and

WHEREAS, on the National Assessment of Educational Progress in 1998, only twenty-five percent of students at the upper elementary and secondary levels were proficient in civics and government; and

WHEREAS, nationally, under twenty percent of eligible 18 to 25 year-olds voted in the 2004 presidential election; and

WHEREAS, according to "The Civic and Political Health of the Nation: A Generational Portrait" nearly one-half of 15 to 25 year-olds indicate that civic education increases their interest and participation in civic affairs; and

WHEREAS, individuals who have a clear understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizenship in a republic form of government under the rule of law are more likely to exercise those rights and responsibilities to be competent and responsible citizens; and

WHEREAS, the need for civic and historical learning in our state is crucial to the long-term social and political health of the state and is a part of the thoroughness in education provided in section 33-1612. Idaho Code: and

WHEREAS, the eight principles of thoroughness are: a safe environment conducive to learning is provided; educators are empowered to maintain classroom discipline; the basic values of honesty, self-discipline, unselfishness, respect for authority and the central importance of work are emphasized; the skills necessary to communicate effectively are taught; a basic curriculum necessary to enable students to enter academic or professional-technical postsecondary educational programs is provided; the skills necessary for students to enter the work force are taught; the students are introduced to current technology; and the importance of students acquiring the skills to enable them to be responsible citizens of their homes, schools and communities is emphasized.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Secretary of State, with the assistance of the Department of Education, is urged to establish a committee to convene a Summit for Civic and Historical Learning at Boise State University with a goal of determining a strategy for enhancing long-term civic engagement and learning within the state, and recommending a plan for improving civic engagement and learning to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee should be composed of a diverse range of student, teacher and administrator representatives from grades K through 12 and postsecondary education, media, civic organizations, and elected officials, and shall be facilitated by the Department of Education's Office of Civics, Service, Character and International Education.

WHEREAS, when man began to colonize, the strength of each and every colony was directly related to his ability to provide a safe and reliable source of food, fiber, and fuel for his people; and

WHEREAS, when nations began to form, only nations with such ability rose to the top and since then many have fallen because they lost such ability; and

WHEREAS, agriculture is and will continue to be a fundamental and vital industry in Idaho, our nation, and the entire world; and

WHEREAS, a strong and viable agricultural industry is a very important part of our national security and overall well-being; and

WHEREAS, the primary source of funding for building schools, roadways, fire stations, and providing police protection in our rural communities comes from the taxes generated by agriculture and other natural resource industries; and

WHEREAS, American farmers, ranchers, and food processors are held by federal, state, and local laws to meet the highest standards in the world when it comes to environmental protection, worker safety, wage rates, and food safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, the family farm unit is the foundation of agriculture and one of the basic strengths of this nation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge that American farmers, ranchers, and food processors be enabled to compete freely and trade fairly in foreign markets on a strictly level playing field.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that because of the importance of the standards to which American producers and food processors are held, primarily standards concerning food safety, we urge that foreign countries wishing to participate in markets that lie within the boundaries of the United States be held to the same standards.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, when determining the economic values of international trade agreements, we urge that these standards be quantified and considered in such determinations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage the education of the general public as to the importance of the role agriculture plays in the development of a society, recognizing that such public education is critical in the preservation and

strengthening of the family farm unit and the overall preservation and strengthening of the agricultural industry itself.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE CONCERNING THE IMPACTS OF COLON CANCER ON THE CITIZENS OF IDAHO AND DECLARING THE MONTH OF MARCH AS "COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH."

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, colorectal cancer in the United States is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in men and women combined; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that in 2006, over 147,000 new cases of colorectal cancer will be diagnosed in the United States; and

WHEREAS, in 2006, the disease is expected to kill nearly 57,000 individuals in this country; and

WHEREAS, in 2005, there were approximately 540 new colorectal cancer cases diagnosed in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, screening for colorectal cancer is underutilized, and less than 50% of the individuals over the age of 50 years receive annual screenings for colorectal cancer; and

WHEREAS, regular screenings can save lives by detecting polyps that lead to colorectal cancer; and

WHEREAS, the benefits of early detection of colorectal cancer are dramatic, with a 5-year survival rate of 90% when it is found at an early stage and 66% when it has spread only to nearby organs or lymph nodes; and

WHEREAS, currently, only 38% of colon cancers are found at the earliest and most treatable stages and the 5-year survival rate is less than 10% when found at later stages; and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society is taking a leadership role in educating the public on the methods of prevention and symptoms for early detection; and

WHEREAS, the state and federal governments have a leadership role to play in fighting colon cancer through public education and improved awareness of early detection through screening.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we join in the designation of March 2006, as "Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" and urge all citizens to recognize the importance of colon cancer screening and early detection in fighting this deadly disease.

#### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 35 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

PROVIDING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND REQUESTING THE ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THE STATE OF IDAHO TO APPOINT SPECIAL COUNSEL TO BRING AN ACTION IN A COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER SECTIONS 67-429B AND 67-429C, IDAHO CODE, VIOLATE SECTION 20,

ARTICLE III, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO OR ANY OTHER SECTIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Sections 67-429B and 67-429C, Idaho Code, approved by the Indian Gaming Initiative (Proposition One of 2002), propose to authorize the use of video gaming machines; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Supreme Court, subsequent to the enactment of Proposition One in 2002, has determined that the type of video gaming machines authorized by Sections 67-429B and 67-429C, Idaho Code, are slot machines, and as such would violate Section 20, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho: and

WHEREAS, Section 20, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho states that all gambling is contrary to public policy and is strictly prohibited except for (a) a state lottery authorized by state law; (b) pari-mutuel betting authorized by state law; and (c) bingo raffle games operated by qualified, charitable organizations authorized by state law, and that even those three gambling exceptions are prohibited from employing "any form of casino gambling including, but not limited to, blackjack, craps, roulette, poker, baccarat, keno and slot machines, or employ any electronic or electromechanical imitation or simulation of any form of casino gambling"; and

WHEREAS, the Indian gaming authorized in Sections 67-429B and 67-429C, Idaho Code, by their express terms, appear to explicitly authorize the Indian tribes to engage in an electronic or electromechanical imitation or simulation of a form of casino gaming contrary to Section 20, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho and other sections of the Constitution of the State of Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Attorney General of the State of Idaho is requested to appoint special counsel to bring an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to determine whether Sections 67-429B and 67-429C, Idaho Code, violate Section 20, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE IDAHO BIRDING TRAIL, RECOGNIZING THE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES AND BENEFITS THE TRAIL WILL AFFORD TO COMMUNITIES IN THE STATE OF IDAHO, AND ACKNOWLEDGING THE IMPORTANCE OF OUR NATIVE BIRDS AND THEIR HABITATS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, eco-tourism, or nature-tourism, has become a big business for many communities, with birds often being a central attraction; and

WHEREAS, within the last decade there has been an emerging interest in the development of "birding trails," which consist of self-guided driving routes and trail systems along the nation's interstates and byways that highlight the best spots for birding, linking premier birding habitats in convenient loops and spurs; and

WHEREAS, more than a dozen birding and wildlife-watching trails now have been developed and mapped, crisscrossing the country on federal and state land, and more are on drawing boards in various stages of development; and

WHEREAS, a partnership of groups and individuals, including state agencies, visitors' bureaus, educators, wildlife agencies, recreationists, and chapters of the Audubon Society, have worked together for the development of such sites; and

WHEREAS, the growth of birding trails, combined with America's love of the automobile, has helped build interest and spread birder tourism dollars and communities with trail sites have learned that birders are a boon to their economies, providing a means of diversification, especially for rural areas, with trail maps often providing information on lodging, restaurants and other places of interest; and

WHEREAS, birding trails are often located along the major North American flyways, including the "Pacific Flyway" that, in part, traverses the panhandle and Snake River valley of Idaho, and these flyways provide suitable habitat for native birds; and

WHEREAS, watching wildlife is the fastest growing outdoor activity in the United States, and approximately sixty percent of Idahoans regularly engage in wildlife watching, about half a million of whom participate specifically in watching birds on an annual basis; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game has developed a birding trail, and associated trail guide, for a trail to be known as the "Idaho Birding Trail" and hopes to introduce the state trail in time for International Migratory Bird Day in May of 2006; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Birding Trail will consist of a series of four loops, estimated at approximately 2,000 miles, consisting of the Northern Loop extending from the Canadian border south to

Riggins, the Southwestern Loop, covering Riggins south to the Owyhee Mountains and the Oregon border east to Twin Falls, the Southeastern Loop encompassing the Twin Falls area east to the Wyoming border and Bear Lake north to Island Park, and the East-Central Loop consisting of the Sun Valley/Stanley area northeast to Salmon; and

WHEREAS, the four loops will guide visitors to two hundred sites, including such sites as the Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area, Ponderosa State Park, Market Lake Wildlife Management Area, Camas National Wildlife Refuge, Coeur d'Alene River Wildlife Management Area, and Kootenai National Wildlife Refuge; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Birding Trail will offer the public educational and recreational experiences as well as benefit nearby communities and offer such communities economic opportunities associated with the resulting increase in tourism to these areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we express our support for the development of the Idaho Birding Trail, recognize the economic opportunities and benefits the trail will afford to communities in the state of Idaho, declare it to be the official Idaho birding trail, and encourage the Idaho Department of Commerce and Labor to include the Idaho Birding Trail in its promotional literature.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 14 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SECRETARY OF THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, TO THE MAJORITY AND MINORITY LEADERSHIP OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act, H.R. 3283, 108th United States Congress, was introduced in the United States House of Representatives and would have authorized the United States Forest Service, the United States Bureau of Land Management, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Park Service, and the United States Bureau of Reclamation to charge visitor fees for recreation on publicly owned lands; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 3283 was not voted on separately in the United States House of Representatives and was not introduced in, did not have hearings in, and was not approved by the United States Senate, but instead was attached to the omnibus spending bill, H.R. 4818, by the 108th United States Congress, as an appropriation rider; and

WHEREAS, the 108th United States Congress enacted H.R. 4818, and the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act is now codified as 16 U.S.C. sections 6801 through 6814; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act includes criminal penalties and is substantive legislation that fundamentally changes the way public land in the state is funded and managed; and

WHEREAS, the concept of paying fees to use public land is contrary to the idea that public land belongs to the people of the state and is land where every person is granted access and is welcome, a concept that has been and should remain in place; and

WHEREAS, recreational fees constitute double taxation and bear no relationship to the actual costs associated with recreational use such as hiking, picnicking, observing wildlife, or scenic driving on state roads and public rights-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the fees imposed by the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act are a regressive tax that places an undue burden on the people living in rural areas adjacent to or surrounded by large areas of federal land and discriminates against lower-income and working Idahoans by placing financial obstacles in the way of their enjoyment of public land; and

WHEREAS, the public land access fees in the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act are controversial and are opposed by hundreds of organizations, several state legislatures and millions of rural Americans; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act establishes an interagency pass that may be used to cover entrance fees and recreational amenity fees for federal public land and water, disregarding the substantially different ways in which national parks and other federal public land are managed and funded; and

WHEREAS, the limited means of expressing opposition to and the lack of public debate in the implementation of the fee program raises the concern that some citizens may be deterred from visiting and enjoying public land in the state and throughout the United States: and

WHEREAS, tourism is an important industry to the state, and the imposition of recreational use fees will have a negative effect on state and local economies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho demands that the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act, which was enacted on December 8, 2004, be repealed and that no recreational fees authorized under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act be imposed to use federal public land in the state.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to be sent to the Honorable George W. WHEREAS, physician orders for life-sustaining treatment are written instructions stating the patient's intent on how the patient's medical decisions are to be made if the patient is unable to make that decision; and

WHEREAS, physicians, nurses, emergency medical personnel and health care facilities strive to honor and carry out patient intent on life-sustaining treatment; and

WHEREAS, Idaho does not have a statewide, universal form for physician orders for life-sustaining treatment; and

WHEREAS, some physician orders for life-sustaining treatment are recognized in some care settings but not in others and may not be recognized by emergency medical personnel or other health care providers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Department of Health and Welfare and the Office of the Attorney General are requested to develop a statewide, universal system or form for physician orders for life-sustaining treatment. The Department of Health and Welfare and the Office of the Attorney General are requested to work with representatives of emergency medical services, hospitals, physicians, health care facilities and other interested parties to develop the specific system or form for physician orders for life-sustaining treatment, including the statewide and universal application and implementation guidelines. These parties are requested to bring a report to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature outlining their proposals. Legislation, if necessary, may be drafted by the Office of the Attorney General to implement these suggestions.

WHEREAS, the implementation of a "health.idaho.gov" website portal administered by the Idaho Department of Administration with the collaboration of the Department of Insurance and the Division of Health, Department of Health and Welfare, would assist Idahoans by disseminating health care information on a wider and more accessible basis; and

WHEREAS, the "health idaho gov" website portal would be designed to increase the health knowledge of all Idahoans and enable them to make informed choices; and

WHEREAS, the "health idaho gov" website portal could provide information including costs for health procedures and prescription drug programs, healthy lifestyle choices and preventive health information, as well as links to health care services and providers in Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Idaho Legislature encourages the development and implementation of a "health.idaho.gov" website portal to assist Idahoans in becoming more informed about healthy lifestyles and available health care options in Idaho.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 15 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, there are an estimated 148,000 adults in Idaho without health care coverage; and

WHEREAS, 286,000 Idaho adults live in households with incomes of less than or equal to 185 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG); and

WHEREAS, 78,000 or nearly 30 percent of the households at or below 180 percent of the FPG are without health insurance; and

WHEREAS, many of these individuals qualify for patient assistance programs available through pharmaceutical companies; and

WHEREAS, health care providers throughout Idaho, including hospitals, community health centers, residency programs, free clinics, physicians' offices, county governments and other community agencies, have shown a commitment to assisting patients in accessing these programs because the application process is burdensome and time-consuming; and

WHEREAS, depending upon the medication needed, there are approximately 191 programs and forms from the various pharmaceutical companies that must be completed in order to access these medications; and

WHEREAS, each patient averages between three to five medications and some have as many as nine medications; and

WHEREAS, the average savings in prescription costs to these patients is estimated to be approximately \$2,400 annually; and

WHEREAS, these prescriptions represent preventive medications, the availability of which reduces additional costs in the health care safety net and are lifesaving in certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, the most common types of medications requested are hypertension medications and antidepressants; and

WHEREAS, the estimated time to complete each application for each patient by hand is thirty minutes to one hour; and

WHEREAS, there would be considerable time saved for health care providers in Idaho and increased access to necessary prescriptions for low-income Idahoans if the process were streamlined; and

WHEREAS, it is generally estimated that a standardized application for these prescriptions would reduce the time necessary to complete applications for any individual by half, based upon experience using electronic software that completes the process at a cost.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge Congress to mandate a standardized application for use by pharmaceutical companies in determining eligibility for free medications from the pharmaceutical companies.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS, RESTATING THE LEGISLATURE'S SUPPORT FOR THE RESTORATION, PRESERVATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, REQUESTING AND AUTHORIZING THE IDAHO CAPITOL COMMISSION TO MODIFY ITS MASTER PLAN FOR THE RESTORATION OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING TO PROVIDE FOR CERTAIN LISTED MODIFICATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS, AUTHORIZING APPROVING THE DEPARTMENT AND ADMINISTRATION TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT OR AGREEMENTS WITH THE IDAHO STATE BUILDING AUTHORITY, UNDER SUCH TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS MAY BE REASONABLE AND NECESSARY, TO PROVIDE FINANCING AND TO RESTORE AND REFURBISH THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING AND CONSTITUTING PRIOR LEGISLATIVE APPROVAL IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 67-6410, IDAHO CODE, AND SUPPORTING AND RECOMMENDING A DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE THAT WILL ALLOW THE RESTORATION OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING TO BEGIN FOLLOWING THE 2007 LEGISLATIVE

SESSION, AND TO BE COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE BEGINNING OF THE 2010 LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the State Capitol Building is the most vital and preeminent public building in Idaho and a symbol of Idaho's sovereignty; and

WHEREAS, the restoration, preservation and maintenance of the State Capitol Building represents a vital public interest; and

WHEREAS, to ensure the State Capitol Building's long history and legacy, the Idaho Capitol Commission was created by the 1998 Legislature with a vision of restoring the State Capitol Building to its original splendor; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Capitol Commission, pursuant to Section 67-1608, Idaho Code, has developed a comprehensive, multiyear Master Plan for the restoration of the State Capitol Building that would address modifications, improvements and preservation; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature in 2001 adopted House Concurrent Resolution No. 21 supporting the Master Plan approved by the Capitol Commission for the comprehensive restoration and refurbishment of the State Capitol Building; and

WHEREAS, in the intervening years the need for an expansion of the State Capitol Building to accommodate larger public hearing rooms has coincided with the Legislature's desire to maintain the State Capitol Building as a working Capitol; and

WHEREAS, a task force appointed by and consisting of majority and minority legislative leadership has met throughout the interim in 2005 to examine numerous alternatives for providing additional public hearing rooms and related office space to meet current and future needs, and to obtain information relating to building designs, projected costs, architectural integrity, site geotechnical analysis, phased development of the Capitol Mall, adjacent office space, and relocation options during the State Capitol restoration; and

WHEREAS, the task force has recommended an approach to restoration and expansion of the State Capitol Building that will accommodate the needs for public hearing rooms and maintain Idaho's Capitol Building as a working Capitol Building into the future without compromising the Capitol's architectural integrity and uniqueness; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature and the Governor intend that the Capitol restoration move forward without delay.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature restates its support for the restoration, preservation and maintenance of the State Capitol Building.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests and authorizes the Idaho Capitol Commission to modify its Master Plan for the restoration of the State Capitol Building to provide for the following modifications and improvements:

(1) The construction of one-story garden level atrium additions at the east and west ends of the State Capitol Building of approximately thirty-three thousand (33,000) square feet each, designed to accommodate large public hearing rooms, adjacent

committee and staff office space and corridors for Legislator access and egress in each atrium addition.

- (2) The construction of a one-story underground addition on the south side of the State Capitol Building, under the grand stairway, of approximately thirty thousand (30,000) square feet, designed to accommodate additional public hearing rooms and legislative office space.
- (3) Provisions to allow future connectivity between the State Capitol Building and its garden level atrium wings with other adjoining state buildings on the Capitol Mall.
- (4) New high-speed elevators at the east and west ends of the existing State Capitol Building sufficient to connect legislative chambers and offices with the new atrium additions and also to provide emergency access and egress from the upper floors of the State Capitol Building.
- (5) A reassessment and reconfiguration of the Master Plan's assignment of space throughout the Capitol Building and any other necessary design changes, to accommodate the addition of atrium additions and high-speed elevators, offices within the building for legislative staff, and the relocation of legislative hearing rooms and offices.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature authorizes and approves the Department of Administration to enter into an agreement or agreements with the Idaho State Building Authority, under such terms and conditions as may be reasonable and necessary, to provide financing and to restore and refurbish the State Capitol Building, and that this resolution shall constitute prior legislative approval in accordance with Section 67-6410, Idaho Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature supports and recommends that the Idaho Capitol Commission, the Department of Administration and the Idaho State Building Authority pursue a design and construction schedule that will allow the restoration of the State Capitol Building to begin following the 2007 legislative session, and to be completed prior to the beginning of the 2010 legislative session.

WHEREAS, the Endangered Species Act as structured has not created meaningful incentives to engage private landowners in conservation and has failed to achieve its ultimate aim in the recovery of endangered species; and

WHEREAS, United States Senator Mike Crapo has introduced Senate Bill 2110, Collaboration for the Recovery of Endangered Species Act (CRESA); and

WHEREAS, CRESA will focus on species recovery, prioritize recovery efforts, expand the role of states for managing listed species, and compensate landowners for their efforts in species protection.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we support the efforts of Senator Mike Crapo to reform and improve the Endangered Species Act through the enactment of CRESA, and promote species conservation and preservation within the state of Idaho and the United States of America.

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho is committed to the safety and well-being of all its citizens, both children and adults.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

PROCLAIMING APRIL 19 AS PATRIOT'S DAY IN COMMEMORATION OF THE EVENTS OF APRIL 19, 1775.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, April 19, 1775, marks the date when the Massachusetts towns of Lexington and Concord were marched upon by British regulars in an effort to confiscate the munitions stored there for the local militia; and

WHEREAS, near the hour of 5 a.m., British troops numbering between six hundred and eight hundred men, encountered seventy-five patriots, under the command of Captain Parker, at Lexington Green, where Captain Parker ordered, "Stand your ground! Don't fire unless fired upon; but if they mean to have a war, let it begin here."; and

WHEREAS, the result was the "shot heard 'round the world" and by the day's end, the British troops had retreated from the field: and

WHEREAS, the events of this day were the spark that ignited the passions of the colonial patriots resulting in the American Revolutionary War and the founding of a great nation; and WHEREAS, the states of Arkansas, Florida, Massachusetts, Missouri, Tennessee and Wisconsin celebrate April 19 as Patriot's Day each year, and in Maine and New Jersey, Patriot's Day is the third Monday in April; and

WHEREAS, Patriot's Day is an opportunity to focus on the historic nature of our revolution and the sacrifices endured over the course of a great eight-year struggle leading to our independence celebrated on the Fourth of July.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we proclaim April 19 of every year as Patriot's Day in the state of Idaho in commemoration of the opening events of the American Revolutionary War and the struggle through which the nation passed in its early days to be established as the great land of freedom in which we live today.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 47 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS, RESTATING THE LEGISLATURE'S SUPPORT FOR THE RESTORATION, PRESERVATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, REQUESTING AND AUTHORIZING THE IDAHO CAPITOL COMMISSION TO MODIFY ITS MASTER PLAN FOR THE RESTORATION OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING TO PROVIDE FOR CERTAIN LISTED MODIFICATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS, AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT OR AGREEMENTS WITH THE IDAHO STATE BUILDING AUTHORITY, UNDER SUCH TERMS AND CONDITIONS

AS MAY BE REASONABLE AND NECESSARY, TO PROVIDE FINANCING AND TO RESTORE AND REFURBISH THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING AND CONSTITUTING PRIOR LEGISLATIVE APPROVAL IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 67-6410, IDAHO CODE, AND SUPPORTING AND RECOMMENDING A DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE THAT WILL ALLOW THE RESTORATION OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING TO BEGIN FOLLOWING THE 2007 LEGISLATIVE SESSION, AND TO BE COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE BEGINNING OF THE 2010 LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the State Capitol Building is the most vital and preeminent public building in Idaho and a symbol of Idaho's sovereignty; and

WHEREAS, the restoration, preservation and maintenance of the State Capitol Building represents a vital public interest; and

WHEREAS, to ensure the State Capitol Building's long history and legacy, the Idaho Capitol Commission was created by the 1998 Legislature with a vision of restoring the State Capitol Building to its original splendor; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Capitol Commission, pursuant to Section 67-1608, Idaho Code, has developed a comprehensive, multiyear Master Plan for the restoration of the State Capitol Building that would address modifications, improvements and preservation; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature in 2001 adopted House Concurrent Resolution No. 21 supporting the Master Plan approved by the Capitol Commission for the comprehensive restoration and refurbishment of the State Capitol Building; and

WHEREAS, in the intervening years the need for an expansion of the State Capitol Building to accommodate larger public hearing rooms has coincided with the Legislature's desire to maintain the State Capitol Building as a working Capitol; and

WHEREAS, a task force appointed by and consisting of majority and minority legislative leadership has met throughout the interim in 2005 to examine numerous alternatives for providing additional public hearing rooms and related office space to meet current and future needs, and to obtain information relating to building designs, projected costs, architectural integrity, site geotechnical analysis, phased development of the Capitol Mall, adjacent office space, and relocation options during the State Capitol restoration; and

WHEREAS, the task force has recommended an approach to restoration and expansion of the State Capitol Building that will accommodate the needs for public hearing rooms and maintain Idaho's Capitol Building as a working Capitol Building into the future without compromising the Capitol's architectural integrity and uniqueness; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature and the Governor intend that the Capitol restoration move forward without delay.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature restates its support for the restoration, preservation and maintenance of the State Capitol Building.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests and authorizes the Idaho Capitol Commission to modify its Master Plan for the restoration of the State Capitol Building to provide for the following modifications and improvements:

- (1) The construction of two-story garden level atrium additions at the east and west ends of the State Capitol Building of approximately fifty thousand (50,000) square feet each, designed to accommodate large, state-of-the-art public hearing rooms, adjacent committee and staff office space and corridors for Legislator access and egress in each atrium addition.
- (2) Provisions to allow future connectivity between the State Capitol Building and its garden level atrium wings with other adjoining state buildings on the Capitol Mall.
- (3) New high-speed elevators at the east and west ends of the existing State Capitol Building sufficient to connect legislative chambers and offices with the new atrium additions and also to provide emergency access and egress from the upper floors of the State Capitol Building.
- (4) A reassessment and reconfiguration of the Master Plan's assignment of space throughout the Capitol Building and any other necessary design changes to accommodate the atrium additions and high-speed elevators, offices within the building for legislative staff, and the relocation of legislative hearing rooms and attendant offices.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature authorizes and approves the Department of Administration to enter into an agreement or agreements with the Idaho State Building Authority, under such terms and conditions as may be reasonable and necessary, to provide financing and to restore and refurbish the State Capitol Building, and that this resolution shall constitute prior legislative approval in accordance with Section 67-6410, Idaho Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature supports and recommends that the Idaho Capitol Commission, the Department of Administration and the Idaho State Building Authority pursue a design and construction schedule that will allow the restoration of the State Capitol Building to begin following the 2007 legislative session, and to be completed prior to the beginning of the 2010 legislative session.

INFLUENCING THE CONSIDERATION, AMENDMENT, ADOPTION OR REJECTION OF ANY RULE OR RULEMAKING, OR ANY RATEMAKING DECISION, PROCUREMENT, CONTRACT, BID OR BID PROCESS, FINANCIAL SERVICES AGREEMENT OR BOND ISSUE AND TO PROVIDE THAT NEITHER "LOBBY" NOR "LOBBYING" INCLUDES COMMUNICATING WITH AN EXECUTIVE OFFICIAL FOR THE PURPOSE OF CARRYING OUT ONGOING NEGOTIATIONS FOLLOWING THE AWARD OF A BID OR A CONTRACT, COMMUNICATIONS INVOLVING ONGOING LEGAL WORK AND NEGOTIATIONS CONDUCTED BY AND WITH ATTORNEYS FOR EXECUTIVE AGENCIES, INTERACTIONS BETWEEN PARTIES IN LITIGATION OR OTHER CONTESTED MATTERS, OR COMMUNICATIONS AMONG AND BETWEEN MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND EXECUTIVE OFFICIALS AND THEIR EMPLOYEES OR BY STATE EMPLOYEES WHILE ACTING IN THEIR OFFICIAL CAPACITY OR WITHIN THE COURSE AND SCOPE OF THEIR EMPLOYMENT; AMENDING SECTION 67-6618, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE THAT APPEARANCES OR PARTICIPATION IN PUBLIC MEETINGS, PUBLIC HEARINGS OR PUBLIC PROCEEDINGS HELD OR INITIATED BY EXECUTIVE OFFICIALS OR THEIR EMPLOYEES SHALL BE EXEMPT FROM REGISTRATION AND REPORTING AND TO MAKE TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS; AMENDING SECTION 67-6619, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE THAT LOBBYISTS COVERED UNDER THIS ACT WHOSE LOBBYING ACTIVITIES ARE CONFINED ONLY TO EXECUTIVE OFFICIALS SHALL BE REQUIRED TO FILE INTERIM PERIODIC REPORTS SEMIANNUALLY, TO INCLUDE EXECUTIVE OFFICIALS IN THE EXPENDITURE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS AND TO REQUIRE THAT SEMIANNUAL PERIODIC REPORTS CONTAIN THE SUBJECT MATTER OF ANY RULE, RATEMAKING DECISION, PROCUREMENT, CONTRACT, BID OR BID PROCESS, FINANCIAL SERVICES AGREEMENT OR BOND ISSUE WHICH THE LOBBYIST HAS BEEN ENGAGED IN SUPPORTING OR OPPOSING DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD AND TO MAKE A TECHNICAL CORRECTION.

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND ENCOURAGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE TO ELIMINATE PARTIAL CARE SERVICES FOR LOW-INCOME CHILDREN AND ADULTS WITHOUT SERIOUS MENTAL HEALTH DISORDERS AND TO LIMIT MEDICAID MENTAL HEALTH BENEFITS FOR LOW-INCOME CHILDREN WITHOUT SERIOUS EMOTIONAL DISTURBANCE AND WORKING-AGE ADULTS WITHOUT SEVERE AND PERSISTENT MENTAL ILLNESS, ENCOURAGING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A HEALTH RISK ASSESSMENT FOR CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS, ENCOURAGING CONTINUING THE PROVISION OF INTENSIVE MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT BENEFITS FOR CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS. ENCOURAGING THE EXPLORATION OF MODIFICATIONS OF MENTAL HEALTH BENEFITS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES OR SPECIAL HEALTH NEEDS AND REQUESTING A REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Medicaid Program in the state of Idaho is unsustainable in its current form and should be reformed so that eligibility, benefits and delivery systems match client health needs; and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has indicated its support for additional flexibility in state management of Medicaid Programs as evidenced by the Medicaid-related provisions in the Deficit Reduction Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 2005; and

WHEREAS, the First Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature directed the Department of Health and Welfare to develop appropriate levels of mental health services to meet client needs, which may include limiting hours of service; and

WHEREAS, Idaho has existing systems of care for children with serious emotional disturbances and adults with severe and persistent mental illness that should be supported by Medicaid through design of appropriate benefits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho encourages the Department of Health and Welfare to eliminate partial care services for low-income children and adults without serious mental health disorders, and to limit the Medicaid mental health benefits for low-income children without serious emotional disturbance and working-age adults without severe and persistent mental illness to twenty-six hours per year of outpatient mental health therapy services and to ten days per year of inpatient mental health care.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages the Department of Health and Welfare to establish a health risk assessment that provides meaningful diagnostic information about whether Medicaid-eligible children have serious emotional disturbances and whether Medicaid-eligible adults have severe and persistent mental illness.

WHEREAS, the Medicaid Program in the state of Idaho is unsustainable in its current form and should be reformed so that eligibility, benefits and delivery systems match client health needs; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Medicaid Program is required by federal law to cover certain services for low-income seniors and adults who are dually eligible for Medicaid and Medicare: and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Medicaid Program will continue to provide coverage for prescription drugs excluded from coverage under Medicare Part D prescription drug benefits; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of Medicare Part D prescription drug benefits under the federal Medicare Modernization Act has highlighted the need for improved coordination between the Medicaid and Medicare Programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Department of Health and Welfare is encouraged to proceed with the development of integrated programs for financing Medicare excluded prescription drugs covered under Idaho Medicaid.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Medicaid Program in the state of Idaho is unsustainable in its current form and should be reformed so that eligibility, benefits and delivery systems match client health needs; and

WHEREAS, individual contributions to the cost of coverage through premium payments may help encourage more individual responsibility over health care choices and dissuade "crowding out" of private coverage; and

WHEREAS, health insurance premium payments are a standard beneficiary cost-sharing mechanism employed by the private health financing sector; and

WHEREAS, limited Medicaid premiums may help to increase Medicaid participants' ability to understand and take advantage of future opportunities for private health insurance coverage; and

WHEREAS, graduated premium amounts according to participant poverty level ensure equity of program design.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho encourages the Department of Health and Welfare to implement limited premiums for Medicaid participants in the proposed state plan for low-income children and working-age adults.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages the Department of Health and Welfare to establish Medicaid cost-sharing premiums so that premiums for Medicaid participants who have family incomes above one hundred thirty-three percent and equal to or less than one hundred fifty percent of the federal poverty guideline should consist of not more than ten dollars per person per month and premiums for participants with family incomes above one hundred fifty percent and equal to or less than one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty guideline should consist of not more than ten dollars per person per month for medical benefits and an additional five dollars per person per month for dental benefits.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages the Department of Health and Welfare to permit Medicaid participants to pay part or all of their premiums with funds in personal health accounts assigned to the participants and held by the Department of Health and Welfare.

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the judicial branch is one of three separate branches of government and with respect to the judiciary at the federal level, its powers arise from the Constitution of the United States and the consent of the governed; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court and lower federal courts, and most notoriously, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, have repeatedly ruled inconsistently with the intent of the authors of the U.S. Constitution and in derogation of the founding traditions and principles of America; and

WHEREAS, federal judges and members of Congress swear an oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Congress has a constitutional duty to require that these oaths be honored by federal judges.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urgently request the congressional delegation representing the state of Idaho in the Congress of the United States to end the era of judicial activism and to reestablish judicial accountability by supporting the passage of and becoming

cosponsors on Senate Bill 520, to curb the jurisdictions of federal courts which have shown contempt for the Constitution of the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 18 BY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the success of all of America's students attending our nation's public schools is of great concern to the citizens of the United States; and

WHEREAS, many of these students arrive at our public school classrooms from myriad cultures and with no or extremely limited exposure to the English language; and

WHEREAS, it is self-evident that a student new to the English language is not proficient in reading or comprehending academic English; and

WHEREAS, the No Child Left Behind Act currently requires school districts to include in determinations of adequate yearly progress (AYP) the participation of all limited English proficient students, including those who have not been enrolled in school on a full-time basis for a sufficient period of time to develop skills that will assure the required tests are providing reliable information regarding these students' educational levels; and

WHEREAS, the No Child Left Behind Act also currently requires states to include all students in their annual academic assessments, including those with limited English proficiency, regardless of the length of time they have been attending public school; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's statewide assessment used to meet the provisions of the No Child Left Behind Act, the Idaho Standard Achievement Test, is administered in English; and

WHEREAS, it is demoralizing and frustrating for a student to be forced to take a test she or he cannot understand; and

WHEREAS, grade-level tests administered in English to beginning English language learners do not help teachers or school administrators understand the instructional needs of these students and do not provide an accurate portrayal of the performance of the school in which these students are enrolled.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge your support for and adoption of amendments proposed to the No Child Left Behind Act contained in H.R. 1177 which would:

- (1) Allow states to exclude from AYP determinations the performance of any limited English proficient student who has not been enrolled in the state for three (3) full school years and whose parents and educators agree that such an exclusion is educationally appropriate for the student; and
- (2) Allow states to exclude from the required annual academic assessment of student performance in mathematics, reading or language arts and science any limited English proficient student who has not been enrolled in the state for three (3) full school years and whose parents and educators agree that such an exclusion is educationally appropriate for the student.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE RELATING TO THE BIOSCIENCES IN IDAHO, REQUESTING THE CREATION OF A TASK FORCE ON POTENTIAL TAX AND INVESTMENT INCENTIVES FOR THE BIOSCIENCES IN IDAHO AND PROVIDING FOR A REPORT.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, technology and the biosciences have become an increasingly important part of the Idaho economy and more than seventy percent of state export revenues come from technology products; and

WHEREAS, the biosciences have been identified as one of Idaho's core competency areas in technology; and

WHEREAS, all of the state's public universities have recognized and adopted the biosciences as a core area of emphasis and all of the state's colleges and universities have a collaborative grant program that supports biomedical research and cooperation among all entities; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho National Laboratory has expertise in the bioscience area that will provide support; and

WHEREAS, Idaho led the nation from 2001 through 2004 in the percentage increase in new National Institutes of Health grant support; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is on the development threshold of several bioscience technologies including biofuels which are important to the national economy;

WHEREAS, the state has a unique environment that provides opportunities in the biotechnology area in connection with our natural resource industries, and agriculture biotechnology could add value to crops and result in higher paying job opportunities for Idahoans; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho State Department of Agriculture has recognized the importance of and opportunities in the biosciences by launching a biotechnology task force; and

WHEREAS, biomedical research adds great public value to the future of healthcare in Idaho, and the state is well positioned to receive significant future grants; and

WHEREAS, there are myriad opportunities in the growing biosciences field worldwide with new companies creating high-salary jobs; and

WHEREAS, as other countries and states in the United States offer more tax and investment incentives for this expanding field and Idaho needs to remain competitive: and

WHEREAS, there are opportunities for our rural communities to increase jobs and expand economically through bioscience fields; and

WHEREAS, a Legislative Biotechnology Task Force met in 2005 and determined that a number of infrastructure deficiencies exist and need to be addressed to better enable and foster the state's biosciences sector; and

WHEREAS, it is critical that the state of Idaho create a supportive business climate so that the biosciences can thrive in Idaho by taking advantage of opportunities for tax and investment incentives in the biosciences to Idaho companies so they can create economic and employment opportunities for Idaho citizens and that such incentives should be conditioned on the creation of jobs in Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we respectfully request that a task force be convened by the Office of Science and Technology in the Idaho Department of Commerce and Labor to study specific tax and investment incentive proposals for the biosciences and report its findings to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature by December 1, 2006.

WHEREAS, the Legislature acknowledges the important role of community colleges in providing academic and professional-technical education as well as work force training; and

WHEREAS, we acknowledge the outstanding efforts of our current community colleges, North Idaho College and the College of Southern Idaho in providing these services; and

WHEREAS, we also acknowledge the many efforts of other higher education institutions in providing community college services; and

WHEREAS, we acknowledge the importance of a well trained and well educated work force as essential to Idaho's economy and the well-being of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, we acknowledge the relatively low percentage of Idaho high school graduates seeking higher education; and

WHEREAS, we acknowledge the need for expanded access to an affordable higher education or affordable work force training; and WHEREAS, we also acknowledge the growing need for an expanded statewide community college system that is efficient, affordable and accessible; and

WHEREAS, there are significant issues of local control and of funding that are still unresolved and that need resolution; and

WHEREAS, at present there is no general consensus about how to best provide community college services and there are many important policy questions to be addressed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a thorough assessment of the role and mission of community colleges in Idaho including their benefits and needs.

The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature.

# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 58 BY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND URGING THE ESTABLISHMENT AND PROMOTION OF PROGRAMS TO IMPROVE THE TRAINING OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TEACHERS IN THE DISCIPLINES OF MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, before there can be children with solid education credentials in mathematics and science, there must be teachers in the elementary schools who can impart the needed knowledge; and

WHEREAS, before there can be elementary school teachers with the required skill and training in mathematics and science to teach the children, there must be programs at the college and university level that will produce such teachers; and

WHEREAS, before there can be such mathematics and science educator programs, there must be the commitment to establish and promote such programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that Idaho's colleges and universities are urged to commit themselves to the establishment and promotion of programs to improve the training of elementary school teachers in the disciplines of mathematics and science so that Idaho's children may so benefit.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 19 BY REVENUE AND TAXATION COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, in April 2005 the United States Department of Agriculture released a Draft Strategic Plan and Draft Program Standards for implementing a mandatory National Animal Identification System, commonly referred to as NAIS; and

WHEREAS, the NAIS is a national program intended to register premises where livestock are raised or held and to identify all agricultural animals and track them as they come into contact with, or are intermixed with, animals other than herdmates from their premises of origin; and

WHEREAS, the USDA has set July 2006 as the target date for issuance of a proposed rule setting forth the requirements for NAIS premises registration, animal identification and animal tracking and, pursuant to the plan timetable, premises identification and individual animal identification will be mandatory as of January 1, 2008, provided however, the USDA could advance or delay this timetable; and

WHEREAS, there are numerous concerns regarding the NAIS program, including concerns relating to costs, confidentiality of information and liability; and

WHEREAS, although significant costs associated with the program are anticipated, costs have not been quantified and there are ongoing uncertainties regarding how the costs will be shared; and

WHEREAS, concerns relating to confidentiality exist in terms of which entities and agencies will have access to registration and identification data, how the data will be used, and whether the general public will have access to the data; and

WHEREAS, many in the agriculture industry have expressed concerns regarding the use of information by individuals for food safety issues and that the traceability of food products would increase participants' risk of liability and financial loss from food safety issues for which they are not responsible; and

WHEREAS, given the uncertainties and risks associated with the NAIS program, residents of the state of Idaho oppose the program and oppose mandatory premises identification, individual animal identification and animal tracking.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge the United States Department of Agriculture to forgo implementation of the NAIS program, or alternatively, to delay the issuance of the proposed rule which will set forth NAIS requirements now targeted for July 2006 to afford the public additional information relating to the proposed mandatory program and additional time for public comment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

WHEREAS, the Idaho Interfaith Roundtable Against Hunger, representing Idahoans of all faiths, issued a Call to Action on February 23, 2006, seeking support for an Idaho Summit on Hunger and Food Security to be held in the fall of 2006; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Summit on Hunger and Food Security will bring together concerned Idahoans to examine the problems of hunger and food insecurity in Idaho and to seek solutions to those problems; and

WHEREAS, the Governor's Coordinating Council on Families and Children has called for support for the Idaho Summit on Hunger and Food Security; and

WHEREAS, the food banking and interfaith communities are committed to raising the funds necessary to support the Idaho Summit on Hunger and Food Security to ensure that the Summit will have no budgetary impact for the state.

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 20 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act, H.R. 3283, 108th United States Congress, was introduced in the United States House of Representatives and would have authorized the United States Forest Service, the United States Bureau of Land Management, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Park Service, and the United States Bureau of Reclamation to charge visitor fees for recreation on publicly owned lands; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 3283 was not voted on separately in the United States House of Representatives and was not introduced in, did not have hearings in, and was not approved by the United States Senate, but instead was attached to the omnibus spending bill, H.R. 4818, by the 108th United States Congress, as an appropriation rider; and

WHEREAS, the sponsors of the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act and others have an unrealistic expectation that recreation fees will pay for much of the cost of management of public lands even though users cannot control costs associated with such management, including costs relating to federal mandates and costs associated with subsequent legal actions; and

WHEREAS, the establishment of state or regional recreational resource advisory committees as required under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act has not occurred; and

WHEREAS, most of the state's 400-plus licensed outfitters and guides require special use permits from federal land management agencies in order to operate legally on Idaho's public lands and waters and the Federal Lands Recreation and Enhancement Act permits the return of the special use permit fee that outfitters pay for the privilege of operating on public lands and waters to the source from which it is generated rather than being deposited into the Federal Treasury; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho outfitter and guide industry is a major component of the outdoor recreation sector of the Idaho tourism industry and the Idaho Legislature recognizes the benefit that the Idaho outfitter and guide industry provides to the public and the economy of the state of Idaho, particularly to the rural economy of the state of Idaho, recognizing that approximately 200,000 visitors use Idaho outfitter and guide services annually and contribute an estimated \$50,000,000 to the Idaho economy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho declares that should the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act be repealed, then the authority for permitting outfitters and guides on public lands should be replaced immediately to allow for outfitter and guide operations to continue uninterrupted.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that should the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act be repealed that the outfitter special use fee that is currently assessed shall be reauthorized under a new authority and returned to the managing agency for outfitter permit administration rather than being designated for other uses.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

#### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 61 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND REQUESTING THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO CONTINUE TO GATHER INPUT AND CONDUCT RESEARCH ON HIGH SCHOOL REDESIGN AND CONSIDER CHANGES TO A NEW RULE REGARDING THE SUBJECT IF NECESSARY.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, we the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature agree that continuously improving the education experiences and opportunities of Idaho's K-12 students is important; and

WHEREAS, we believe that the State Board of Education's 2005-2006 research and subcommittee efforts have created a

strong beginning for discussing improvements for Idaho's High School offerings and provided further that we believe that the research for this Rule has encouraged needed dialogue about how to improve K-12 education and graduation success in Idaho and student preparation for the future; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the State Board of Education's 2006 Pending Rule Docket No. 08-0203-0506 (hereinafter referred to as "Rule") has been presented to both the House of Representatives and the Senate Education Committees; and

WHEREAS, the March 1, 2006, Summary Report from the House Education Committee's Ad Hoc Subcommittee on High School Redesign outlines the questions remaining about the Rule and its implementation in the areas of funding and budgeting concerns; general concerns outlined in five categories, curriculum concerns and eleven additional areas of research; and implementation recommendations that need to include budgets, district communication strategies, and address fifty-two areas of implementation planning concerns; and

WHEREAS, we agree with the State Board of Education that there is a need for redesign based on the requirements of this century's jobs for education beyond high school; the needs for having a skilled and educated workforce in Idaho; Idaho's high school to college entry rates; and on students deserving a well-rounded, relevant and rigorous education.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Office of the State Board of Education is requested, in collaboration with the State Department of Education, to gather input from all 115 Idaho school districts and to research and provide reports and recommendations in response to concerns raised. The requested reports and recommendations are detailed in the fifteen page March 1, 2006, Summary Report from the House of Representatives Education Committee's Ad Hoc Subcommittee on High School Redesign compiled from the input from Idaho's school districts and from House of Representatives and Senate Education Committee testimony.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature welcomes a presentation of responses to the feedback and concerns and upon gathering the necessary data and information, if it is determined that changes need to be made to the new rule, that the State Board of Education is requested to bring those changes forward in the next legislative session.

## HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 21 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the United States Forest Service administers the management of 39% of the land base in the state of Idaho, and an additional 22% is administered by the United States Bureau of Land Management; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 16 U.S.C. Section 471, an 1891 law authorizing the President to establish national forests, the purpose for establishing and administering national forests was to set aside public lands reserved as national forests to be controlled and administered, to the extent practical, in accordance with the Act which provided that "no national forest may be established except to improve and protect the forest, or to secure favorable conditions of water flows, and to furnish a continuous supply of timber for the use and necessities of citizens"; and

WHEREAS, it has long been the intent and policy of the federal government to hold rural communities harmless from the creation of federal lands and in 1906 the Committee on Public Lands recognized that the presence of federal lands could create a hardship for many counties, as they provided little revenue or commerce at that time; and

WHEREAS, in 1908, Congress created the Twenty-five Percent Fund Act to pay states and counties 25% of receipts collected from national forests and mandated that payments were to be spent on schools and roads, recognizing that viable communities adjacent to the public lands, with adequate roads and schools, were essential for the development and preservation of the national forests; and

WHEREAS, the federal policy of holding counties harmless from the creation of public lands within counties was reiterated in 1916 with the creation of the Oregon and California Grant Lands under the Chamberlain-Ferris Act, and again in 1937 with passage of the Oregon and California Grant Lands Act; and

WHEREAS, the forest resources were intended to be managed in such an environmentally responsible manner that they would produce long-term sustainable revenue to share with schools and counties as well as products for the nation; and

WHEREAS, in 2000, Congress passed the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act, commonly known as public law 106-393, which restored historical payment levels previously made to states and counties from the federal government for road and school purposes due to declining levels of actual forest receipts; and

WHEREAS, the reauthorization of public law 106-393 is pending before the United States Congress and Idaho counties are on record as being strongly supportive of a fully-funded approval of this Act; and

WHEREAS, recently, federal land managers have been faced with an ever-present funding shortage and rural counties will be faced with higher property taxes or a reduction in services if the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act is not reauthorized and appropriated; and

WHEREAS, there is continued concern that if the Act is reauthorized and appropriated it may be the last time it occurs and a long-term solution to these issues is necessary; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho is dependent upon healthy national forest system lands for economic benefit, recreation and scenic beauty and it is time to demonstrate a new initiative and commitment to the intent and policy of the federal government to

hold counties and schools harmless from the creation of federal lands and construct a path leading to economic stability for rural communities and schools; and

WHEREAS, transfer of the management of the national forest system lands that are not designated as wilderness, proposed or recommended wilderness, wild and scenic river, or national recreation area, or designated roadless area in Idaho, to the state of Idaho would promote better stewardship of the public lands, provide financial returns to the counties, secure public access, meet Congress's intent to hold rural communities harmless from the creation of federal lands, and fund schools, road and bridge infrastructure which would offset significant tax increases in rural counties in the event the Secure Rural Schools payments are not reauthorized or are allowed to expire following the 2006 reauthorization; and

WHEREAS, precedent for state administration of federally-owned lands exists in the state of Idaho at the City of Rocks area in southern Idaho and campground-related facilities and land at Lake Cascade; and

WHEREAS, a transfer of management to the state of Idaho would demonstrate a new initiative and commitment to the intent and policy of the federal government to hold rural counties and schools harmless from the consequences of the reservation of federal lands and construct a process leading to economic stability for rural communities and schools; and

WHEREAS, lands for which management responsibility is transferred to the state of Idaho could be administered by the Idaho Department of Lands in cooperation with county officials and with cooperative oversight by the United States Forest Service and state and local government could establish, or use existing natural resource advisory committees composed of a diverse cross-section of the public, with all decisions and actions relating to the lands being required to comply with every federal and state environmental law; and

WHEREAS, the management of these lands would have to meet the mandates of the Healthy Forest Initiative, the National Fire Plan, and state and county fire mitigation plans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge the Congress to support federal legislation transferring management of national forest system lands within Idaho to the state of Idaho to be managed for the benefit of the rural counties and schools with the state of Idaho being held harmless from the costs of administration.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress is urged to provide that any transfer of management authority would not affect any rights or authority of the state with respect to fish and wildlife, or repeal or modify any provision of law that permits the state or political subdivisions of the state to share in the revenues from federal lands, or any provision of law that provides that fees or charges collected at particular federal areas be used for or credited to specific purposes or special funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress is urged to provide that fees or revenues collected under state management be allocated 75%, or other appropriate percentage, for the benefit of the counties and schools in which the national forest system lands are located and 25%, or other appropriate percentage, for the benefit of the national forest in which the lands administered

by the state of Idaho are located to be paid at the end of the year to the Secretary of the Treasury, and that amounts allocated to the counties should not be taken into account for purposes of the Twenty-five Percent Fund pursuant to 16 U.S.C. Section 500.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress is urged to seek a long-term solution to the significant issues that will face rural counties in the event the Secure Rural Schools payments are not reauthorized or are allowed to expire following the 2006 reauthorization.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

The petition shall be filed with the county clerk of the county in which the signers of the petition are resident. The petition shall designate the proposed boundaries of the aquifer protection district.

- (2) Upon the filing of the petition, the county clerk shall promptly examine the petition and certify whether the required number of qualified petitioners have signed the petition. If the number of petition signers is sufficient, the county clerk shall transmit the certified petition to the board of county commissioners.
- (3) Upon receipt of a duly certified petition the board of county commissioners shall give notice of an election to be held, which election shall be held at the same time as the primary or general election, in such proposed district for the purpose of determining whether or not the proposed district shall be established or whether or not the county shall participate in a district. Such notice shall include the date and hours of the election, the polling places, the general purposes of the proposed

district, a description of lands to be included in the proposed district, and a statement that a map of the proposed district is available in the office of the board of county commissioners. The notice shall be published once each week for three (3) consecutive weeks prior to such election in a newspaper of general circulation within the county.

- (4) The election shall be held and conducted consistent with the provisions of chapter 14, title 34, Idaho Code. The board of county commissioners shall appoint three (3) judges of election, one (1) of whom shall act as clerk for the election. At such election the electors shall vote for or against the establishment of, or participation in, the district.
- (5) The judges of election shall certify the returns of the election to the board of county commissioners. If a majority of the votes cast at said election are in favor of the establishment of, or participation in, the district, the board of county commissioners shall declare the district established and give it a name by which, in all proceedings, it shall thereafter be known.
- (6) Procedures for boundary modification or dissolution of a district created pursuant to this section shall be in substantial compliance with the provisions for petition and election provided in this section.
- (7) In the event a board of county commissioners declares a district established pursuant to the procedures prescribed by this section, the district shall be recognized as a legally established political subdivision of the state of Idaho. Unless otherwise limited by law, districts are authorized to work with and across the boundaries of all political subdivisions of the state of Idaho that are wholly or partially located within the external boundaries of the established aquifer protection district. Providing protection of a state-designated sensitive resource aquifer is a governmental function."

- 42-1756. LOANS FROM ACCOUNT -- APPLICATION -- INVESTIGATION -- APPROVAL -- REPAYMENT -- STATEMENT -- FILING -- DEFAULT. (a) Any irrigation district, canal or irrigation company, water users' association, municipal corporation, municipality, private corporation, aquifer protection district, or, in special cases approved by the board, an individual may file an application with the board for a loan from the revolving account for the purpose of financing project costs. Such application shall be filed in such manner, and shall be in such form and be accompanied by such information as may be prescribed by the board; provided, however, that any such application filed with the board under the provisions of this act, shall:
  - (1) Describe the nature and purpose(s) of the proposed project.
  - (2) Set forth or be accompanied by a plan for development of the proposed project, together with such engineering and economic feasibility data and estimated costs of construction as may be required by the board.
  - (3) State whether money other than that for which application is made to the board will be used for project costs, and whether such money is available or has been sought for this purpose.
  - (4) Show that the applicant holds or can acquire title to all lands or has the necessary easements and rights-of-way for the project and related lands, and has or can acquire all water rights necessary for the construction, operation and maintenance of the proposed project, or that there exists sufficient water available for appropriation by proof of a permit issued by the director of the department of water resources.
- (b) Upon receipt of an application, the board shall evaluate and, if it deems it to be necessary, investigate all aspects of the proposed project and the proposed construction thereof. As a part of such investigation, the board shall determine whether the plan for development of the project is satisfactory. If the board determines that the plan is unsatisfactory, it shall return the application to the applicant and may make such recommendations to the applicant as are considered necessary to make the plan satisfactory.
- (c) The board may approve a loan for project costs if after investigation (if this is deemed necessary,) and evaluation it finds that:
  - (1) The plan does not conflict with any extant Idaho state water plan;
  - (2) The proposed project is feasible from an engineering standpoint and economically justified, with studies showing a favorable benefit to cost ratio;
  - (3) The plan for development of the proposed project is satisfactory;
  - (4) The applicant is qualified and responsible;
  - (5) There is reasonable assurance that the borrower can repay the loan;
  - (6) That money in the revolving account is available for the loan; and
  - (7) That the loan does not exceed five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) unless legislative approval has been obtained.

- (d) If the board approves a loan, the board and the applicant or applicants shall enter into an agreement for repayment to the revolving account of money loaned therefrom, together with interest thereon at reasonable rates as determined by the board. The agreement shall further provide that repayment of the loan. together with interest thereon, shall commence no later than one (1) full year after construction of the project is completed, and that repayment shall be completed within the time period specified by the board; provided that repayment to reserve accounts or guarantee funds shall be made as provided by order of the board. The repayment period shall not exceed sixty (60) years, except that the board may extend the time for making repayment in the event of emergency or hardship. Such agreement shall also provide for such assurances of, and security for, repayment of the loan as are considered necessary by the board.
- (e) The state shall have a lien upon a project constructed with money from the revolving account for the amount of the loan, together with the interest thereon. This lien shall attach to all project facilities, equipment, easements, real property and property of any kind or nature associated with the project and all water rights associated in any way with the project. The board shall file a statement of the loan, its amount, terms and a description of the project with the county recorder of each county in which the project or any part thereof is located. The county recorder shall record the lien in a book kept for the recording of liens and it shall be indexed as other liens are required by law to be indexed. The lien shall be valid until paid in full or otherwise discharged. The lien shall be foreclosed in accordance with applicable state law governing foreclosure of mortgages and liens as set forth in chapter 1 of title 6, Idaho Code, chapter 13 of title 45, Idaho Code, and related provisions of the statutes of this state.
- (f) If an applicant fails to comply with the repayment contract, its interest in the project may be conveyed to a successor upon approval by the board, which may contract with the qualified successor in interest of the original obligor for repayment of the loan, together with the interest thereon, and for succession to its rights and obligations in any contract with the board.
- (g) The state shall have a lien on any or all projects which the board improves or renovates with money from the revolving account, and such lien shall be valid and continue in effect until such funds, together with interest thereon, have been paid in full and the lien discharged. The board shall file a statement of the lien, and the lien shall be foreclosed upon all project property and rights as provided in subsection (e) above."

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, in 2005, the Legislature adopted House Concurrent Resolution No. 16 which authorized the Legislative Council to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of energy, environment and technology related issues from both the statewide perspective and the national perspective and to submit a final report to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho needs to have an integrated state energy plan that provides for the state's power generation needs and protects the health and safety of the citizens of Idaho, and the products produced in this state; and

WHEREAS, the Interim Committee on Energy, Environment and Technology may be requested to meet before the end of the 2006 regular legislative session to begin to develop recommendations relating to an integrated energy plan; and

We, your COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE, report that we have had under consideration H 474, S 1300, as amended, H 760, H 663, and S 1363 and report them back without recommendation, amended as follows:

# **HOUSE AMENDMENT TO H 474**

#### AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 5 of the printed bill, following line 2, insert:

"SECTION 3. That Section 63-405, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 63-405. Assessment of operating property. (1) The state tax commission must assess all operating property at a meeting of the commission convening on the second Monday of August in each year, and must complete the assessment of such property on the fourth Monday in August.
- (2) The state tax commission shall determine the system value and calculate the allocation and apportionment of the system value for all operating property and specifically determine:
  - (a) The number of miles and the value per mile of each railroad in the state and for each taxing district in which such railroad may exist.
  - (b) The number of miles and the value per mile of each telephone corporation in the state and for each taxing district in which such telephone corporation may exist.
  - (c) The number of miles and the value per mile of each pipeline in the state and for each taxing district in which such pipeline may exist.
  - (d) The number of miles and the value per mile of each water company under the jurisdiction of the public utilities commission in the state, and for each taxing district in which

- such water company may exist. The value per mile of any line included in this subsection, except railroads, shall be determined by dividing the total value of such line within the state by the number of miles of such line within the state. The value per mile of railroad line shall be determined by apportionment of the total value of line within the state. The apportionment shall be based twenty percent (20%) on the ratio of line miles in the state to line miles in the county; forty percent (40%) on the ratio of net ton miles in the state to net ton miles in the county; and forty percent (40%) on the ratio of station revenues in the state to station revenues in the county. All operating property of railroads shall be apportioned to the counties as part of the railroad line in the county. The apportionment for taxing districts shall be the same as the apportionment among counties.
- (e) The system value, the number of miles and the value per mile of each electric current transmission line and each electric current distribution line in each county separately, and for each taxing district within said county in which such transmission and distribution lines may exist. The value per mile of any line included in this subsection shall be determined by dividing the apportioned value of such line within each county by the number of miles of such line within said county.
- (f) The system value of private railcar fleets entering or standing in Idaho in the year preceding the constituted lien as provided in section 63-411(3), Idaho Code.
- (g) The system value and calculate the allocation and apportionment of the system value for all other operating property.
- (3) On and after January 1, 2004, any newly installed or constructed equipment located within a city corporate limit or within five (5) miles of a city corporate limit and used for and in conjunction with the thermal generation of electricity shall be apportioned based on physical location. For purposes of this subsection newly installed or constructed equipment used for and in conjunction with the thermal generation of electricity shall not include the remodeling, retrofitting, rehabilitation, refurbishing or modification of an existing electrical generation facility, or integration or transformation facilities such as substations or transmission lines. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 63-301A, Idaho Code, property apportioned based on physical location pursuant to this subsection shall be placed on the new construction roll.
- (4) If the value of property of any company assessable under this section is of such a nature that it cannot reasonably be apportioned on the basis of rail, wire, pipeline mileage, such as microwave and radio relay stations, the tax commission may adopt such other method or basis of apportionment to the county and taxing districts in which the property is situate as may be feasible and proper.";

# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 63 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF THE CURRENT MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT DELIVERY SYSTEMS IN IDAHO AND TO REVIEW ALTERNATIVE WAYS TO PROVIDE THESE SERVICES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Department of Health and Welfare has grown too large as an agency to effectively manage substance abuse treatment and mental health services for children and adults; and

WHEREAS, the district and magistrate courts, the Department of Correction and the Department of Juvenile Corrections and counties are being adversely affected by our inability to address the needs of those with mental health or substance abuse issues and those who are dual-diagnosed; and

WHEREAS, the staggering cost of mental health and substance abuse treatment systems without accountability measures in either should not be sustained; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature has struggled to find methods to provide guidance for substance abuse and mental health treatment design, delivery and accountability;

WHEREAS, mental health services funded through Medicaid have been subject to some scrutiny through the pilot credentialing authorized by the Legislature in 2005 in the Department of Health and Welfare's appropriation; and

WHEREAS, there is a policy question as to whether substance abuse services and adult and children's mental health services ought to be removed from the Department of Health and Welfare and be combined into a new stand alone agency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of the current mental health and substance abuse treatment delivery systems in Idaho and to review alternative ways to provide these services and make recommendations for any changes the committee would see as appropriate, with specific attention paid to a system that meets the needs of, and provides accountability to, Idahoans. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Idaho Legislature.

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 23 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY, TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, capital resources of the Idaho and United States taxpayer, as well as capital resources of international financial institutions, are scarce and limited; and

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States appropriates funds to international financial institutions through capital replenishment; and

WHEREAS, lending practices by international financial institutions are formulated without vital public scrutiny and

debate and there are few checks and balances to ensure that international financial institutions are acting in the best interests of the countries to whom they lend; and

WHEREAS, the United States executive directors of these international financial institutions should vote for and approve loans to countries whose policies are consistent with the economic, environmental and national security interests of the United States; and

WHEREAS, international financial institutions have isolated developing countries from free market reforms by imposing severe economic austerity measures; and

WHEREAS, severe economic austerity measures are the cause and source of much social, political and economic instability in the world.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we request that Congress and the United States Secretary of the Treasury oppose the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund and other international financial institutions' loans or aid by use of its voice and vote until such time as the United States Secretary of the Treasury shall determine that the several international financial institutions' executive directors and the borrowing countries have formulated an economic program that determines how funds of the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund and other international financial institutions' assistance programs shall provide the basis for correcting the borrowers' out-of-balance payment deficits, reduce the severe constraints on the borrowing countries' labor forces and capital mobility in order to advance market-oriented domestic interests, minimize negative environmental impact upon borrowing countries and the global community and establish social, political, economic, anti-human trafficking and antiterrorist reforms for humankind.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress and Idaho's congressional delegation shall be requested to further discourage such wrongful investment by international financial institutions by reducing any future recapitalization by an amount equal to the proportionate share of those loans that are not in keeping with the economic, environmental, and national security interests of the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Secretary of the Treasury is encouraged to annually review the budgets and accounts and activities of the international financial institutions and to annually report his or her findings to the general public and Congress.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the United States Secretary of the Treasury, to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

- (a) Commercial property insurance policies;
- (b) Commercial liability insurance policies other than aviation and employer's liability insurance policies;
- (c) Commercial multiperil insurance policies.

The provisions of this section do not apply to: block cancellations or block nonrenewals as provided in section 41-1841, Idaho Code, reinsurance, excess and surplus lines insurance, residual market risks, worker's compensation insurance, multistate location risks, policies subject to retrospective rating plans, excess or umbrella policies and such other policies that are exempted by the director of the department of insurance.

- (2) Definitions. For the purposes of this section:
- (a) "Cancellation" means termination of a policy at a date other than its expiration date.
- (b) "Expiration date" means the date upon which coverage under a policy ends. It also means, for a policy written for a term longer than one (1) year or with no fixed expiration date, each annual anniversary date of such policy.
- (c) "Nonpayment of premium" means the failure or inability of the named insured to discharge any obligation in connection with the payment of premiums on a policy of insurance subject to this section, whether such payments are payable directly to the insurer or its agent or indirectly payable under a premium finance plan or extension of credit.
- (d) "Nonrenewal" or "not to renew" means termination of a policy at its expiration date.
- (e) "Renewal" or "to renew" means the issuance, or the offer so to issue, by an insurer of a policy succeeding a policy previously issued and delivered by the same insurer or an insurer within the same group of insurers, or the issuance of a certificate or notice extending the term of an existing policy for a specified period beyond its expiration date.
- (3) Notice of cancellation.
- (a) Permissible cancellations. If coverage under a policy has not been in effect for sixty (60) days and the policy is not a renewal, cancellation of such policy shall be effected by mailing or delivering a written notice to the first-named insured at the last known mailing address shown on the policy

at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of the cancellation, provided however, if such cancellation is for the reason stated in subsection (3)(a)(i) of this section, the time such cancellation may be effective following notice shall be as provided in subsection (3)(b)(i) of this section. A cancellation requested by the insured shall be effective on the later of the date requested by the insured or the date it is received by the insurer. After coverage has been in effect for more than sixty (60) days or after the effective date of a renewal policy, whichever is earlier, no insurer shall cancel a policy unless the cancellation is based on at least one (1) of the following reasons:

- (i) Nonpayment of premium.
- (ii) Fraud or material misrepresentation made by or with the knowledge of the named insured in obtaining the policy, continuing the policy, or in presenting a claim under the policy.
- (iii) Activities or omissions on the part of the named insured which increase any hazard insured against, including a failure to comply with loss control recommendations.
- (iv) Change in the risk which materially increases the risk of loss after insurance coverage has been issued or renewed including, but not limited to, an increase in exposure to regulation, legislation or court decision.
- (v) Loss or decrease of the insurer's reinsurance covering all or part of the risk or exposure by the policy.
- (vi) Determination by the director that the continuation of the policy would jeopardize an insurer's solvency or would place the insurer in violation of the insurance laws of this state or any other state.
- (vii) Violation or breach by the insured of any policy terms or conditions other than nonpayment of premium.
- (b) Notification of cancellation.
  - (i) A notice of cancellation of insurance coverage by an insurer shall be in writing and shall be mailed or delivered to the first-named insured at the last known mailing address as shown on the policy. Notices of cancellation based on subsections (3)(a)(ii) through (a)(vii) of this section shall be mailed or delivered at least thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of the cancellation. Notices of cancellation for the reason stated in subsection (3)(a)(i) of this section without regard to when such cancellation shall be effected shall be mailed or delivered at least ten (10) days prior to the effective date of cancellation. If delivered via United States mail, the ten (10) day notification period shall begin to run five (5) days following the date of postmark. The notice shall state the effective date of the cancellation.
  - (ii) The insurer shall provide the first-named insured with a written statement setting forth the reason(s) for the cancellation if: (1) the insured requests such a statement in writing; and (2) the named insured agrees in writing to hold the insurer harmless from liability for any communication giving notice of or specifying the reasons for a cancellation or for any statement made in connection with an attempt to discover or verify the existence of conditions which would be a reason for a cancellation under this section.

- (4) Notice of nonrenewal.
- (a) An insurer may decline to renew a policy if the insurer delivers or mails to the first-named insured, at the last known mailing address, written notice that the insurer will not renew the policy. Such notice shall be mailed or delivered at least forty-five (45) days before the expiration date. If the notice is mailed less than forty-five (45) days before expiration, coverage shall remain in effect until forty-five (45) days after notice is mailed or delivered. Earned premium for any period of coverage that extends beyond the expiration date shall be considered pro rata based upon the previous year's rate. For purposes of this section, the transfer of a policyholder between companies within the same insurance group is not a nonrenewal or a refusal to renew. In addition, changes in deductibles, changes in premium, and changes in the amount of insurance or reductions in policy limits or coverage shall not be deemed to be nonrenewals or refusals to renew. Notice of nonrenewal is not required if:
  - (i) The insurer or a company within the same insurance group has offered to issue a renewal policy; or
  - (ii) Where the named insured has obtained replacement coverage or has agreed in writing to obtain replacement coverage.
- (b) If an insurer provides the notice described in subsection (4) of this section and thereafter the insurer extends the policy for ninety (90) days or less, an additional notice of nonrenewal is not required with respect to the extension.
- (5) Notice of premium or coverage changes. An insurer shall mail or deliver to the named insured, at the last known mailing address, written notice of a total premium increase greater than ten percent (10%) which is the result of a comparable increase in premium rates, changes in deductibles, reductions in limits, or reductions in coverages at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the policy. If the insurer fails to provide such thirty (30) day notice, the coverage provided to the named insured shall remain in effect until thirty (30) days after such notice is given or until the effective date of replacement coverage obtained by the named insured, whichever first occurs. For the purposes of this section, notice is considered given thirty (30) days following date of mailing or delivery of the notice to the named insured. If the insured elects not to renew, any earned premium for the period of extension of the terminated policy shall be calculated pro rata at the lower of the current or previous year's rate. If the insured accepts the renewal, the premium increase, if any, and other changes shall be effective on and after the first day of the renewal term.
- (6) Proof of notice. Proof of mailing of notice of cancellation, or of nonrenewal or of premium or coverage changes, to the named insured at the last known mailing address showing on the policy, shall be sufficient proof of notice.
- (7) Application, effective date and termination. The provisions of this section shall apply only to policies with coverage effective dates after the effective date of this section.
- (8) Regulations Rules. The director may promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this section. Every rule and regulation promulgated within the authority conferred by this act shall be of temporary effect and shall become permanent only by enactment by statute at the regular session of the legislature first following adoption of the rule. or regulation.

Rules and regulations not approved in the above manner shall be rejected, null, void and of no force and effect on July 1, following submission of the rules and regulations to the legislature."

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 24 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Constitutions of the United States of America and the State of Idaho guarantee the right of all persons to believe in God, to worship and to speak freely; and

WHEREAS, our country was founded upon the premise that all men are created equal, and that they are endowed with certain unalienable rights by their Creator; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that as the judiciary of a sovereign nation, our federal courts apply the Constitution of the United States based upon domestic legal authority; and

WHEREAS, bills have been introduced in the United States Senate and the United States Congress S. 520 and H.R. 1070; and

WHEREAS, these two pieces of federal legislation would substantially do the following:

- (1) Amend the federal judicial code to prohibit the United States Supreme Court and the federal district courts from exercising jurisdiction over any matter in which relief is sought against an entity of federal, state or local government or an officer or agency of such government concerning that entity's, officer's or agent's acknowledgment of God as the sovereign source of law, liberty or government.
- (2) Prohibit a court of the United States from relying upon any law, policy or other action of a foreign state or international organization in interpreting and applying the United States Constitution, other than English constitutional and common law up to the time of adoption of the U.S. Constitution.
- (3) Provide that any federal court decision relating to an issue removed from federal jurisdiction by these acts is not binding precedent on state courts.
- (4) Provide that any Supreme Court justice or federal court judge who exceeds the jurisdictional limitations of these acts would be deemed to have committed an offense for which the justice or judge may be removed, and to have violated the standard of good behavior required by Article III for judges in the U.S. Constitution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we request Congress to pass, our Congressional delegation to support, and the President sign, legislation similar to S. 520 and H.R. 1070.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 64 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

# A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND ENCOURAGING THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY TO EVALUATE, ADOPT AND IMPLEMENT CERTAIN STANDARDS AND RULES RELATING TO WATER QUALITY.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Department of Environmental Quality has been designated by the Legislature as the primary agency to meet the goals and requirements of the Clean Water Act and to coordinate and administer Idaho's ground water quality protection programs; and

WHEREAS, surface water quality standards under the Clean Water Act include designated uses for navigable waters and criteria for such designated uses, and revisions of those uses and criteria must be submitted to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for approval; and

WHEREAS, surface water quality standards under the Clean Water Act may also include provisions regarding mixing zones, variances and low flows and the decision to include such provisions in the water quality standards is reserved to the state under the Clean Water Act; and

WHEREAS, decisions concerning ground water are within the sole jurisdiction of the state, and state ground water quality standards do not require the approval of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency; and

WHEREAS, any changes in Idaho's water quality standards proposed by the Department of Environmental Quality must comply with the provisions of the Idaho Environmental Protection and Health Act and will be subjected to legislative review and approval; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Environmental Protection and Health Act states the Legislature's intent that environmental quality programs be promulgated and managed so that the benefits of pollution control measures have a reasonable relationship to the public health costs, private property rights and the environmental and economic impacts of such measures; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Water Quality Act states the Legislature's intent that the state of Idaho fully meet the goals and requirements of the Clean Water Act and that the rules promulgated to implement the Clean Water Act not impose requirements beyond those of the Clean Water Act; and

WHEREAS, it is the Legislature's intent that Idaho's surface water quality standards not apply to manmade waterways and private waters within the state unless otherwise required by the Clean Water Act; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that the federal Safe Drinking Water Act regulates public water systems and that drinking water standards may not be appropriate for use as water quality standards when natural conditions make such standards unattainable, such as in the case of arsenic; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that the water quality standards and the ground water quality rules both contain provisions that allow the use of natural background as a standard when natural conditions exceed numeric standards.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature encourages the Department of Environmental Quality to evaluate, adopt and implement water quality standards, rules and other provisions that fully consider natural conditions that exist in Idaho for all criteria and that the Department adopt uses for water bodies that are

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages the Department of Environmental Quality to propose changes to its rules regarding mixing zones, variances and low flows only when there is broad agreement among affected parties concerning those changes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages the Department of Environmental Quality to take full advantage of the flexibility available under the Clean Water Act, the Idaho Ground Water Quality Plan and Idaho laws and rules in defining, adopting and implementing mixing zones, variances, site-specific conditions, criteria and water quality standards.

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND URGING THE IDAHO STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO PROPOSE CHANGES TO THE IDAHO NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND COMPLIANCE AGREEMENT PLAN THAT WOULD PLACE A TEMPORARY SUSPENSION ON THE IMPOSITION OF SANCTIONS FOR NON-TITLE I SCHOOLS UNTIL TWELVE MONTHS AFTER STATE FUNDING IS MADE AVAILABLE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the 2001 Reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, commonly referred to as the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), raises the accountability of the state and local education agencies to increase the academic achievement of students at all levels of public education; and

WHEREAS, NCLB requires that all students achieve at proficiency or above in reading, mathematics and science within twelve (12) years of enactment; and

WHEREAS, schools and district and charter local education agencies and the state are challenged to implement programs and procedures that will help students who are not reaching proficiency improve academic achievement to the proficient level or above within this time frame; and

WHEREAS, under NCLB, federal funding is provided under Title I to schools with student populations composed of more than forty percent of students who participate in the free and reduced lunch program; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho State Board of Education places specific sanctions on the schools and district and charter local education agencies that do not meet Adequate Yearly Progress; and

WHEREAS, under NCLB, the Title I schools receive an allocation of federal funds each year for supplemental services to remediate and provide the instruction and programs needed in the schools and classrooms to facilitate students who are not meeting the proficiency standards on the Idaho Standards Achievement Test (ISAT). Federal funding for supplemental services in Title I schools includes certified remedial teachers and paraprofessionals who help children meet the proficiency standards in reading, math and, beginning in 2007, science; and

WHEREAS, under the NCLB Compliance Agreement Plan submitted by the Idaho State Board of Education to the United States Department of Education, the sanctions of NCLB apply to both Title I and non-Title I schools in the state of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, under NCLB, no federal funding is provided for remediation at non-Title I schools; and

WHEREAS, non-Title I schools educate thousands of children who qualify for the free and reduced lunch program, with many of these schools comprised of twenty percent or more of the student population participating in the free and reduced lunch program; and

WHEREAS, parents and teachers in non-Title I schools are making heroic efforts to raise funds for reading and math programs and to provide parent volunteers and additional teaching time to raise these students to proficient levels in reading and math; however, parent volunteers and teachers in non-Title I schools cannot provide adequate resources in comparison to Title I schools; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho provides no additional remediation funding to non-Title I schools to address the Adequate Yearly Progress deficiencies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Idaho State Board of Education is urged to propose changes to the NCLB Compliance Agreement Plan implementing NCLB in the state of Idaho that would place a temporary suspension on the imposition of sanctions on the non-Title I schools until twelve months after state funding is made available.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 25 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, AND TO THE UNITED STATES SECRETARIES OF THE INTERIOR AND OF ENERGY.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, policies of the federal government have placed much of the Outer Continental Shelf off-limits to oil and natural gas production; and

WHEREAS, development of oil and natural gas resources, where allowed off our shore, has coexisted for decades with recreational and commercial activities while benefitting the entire nation; and

WHEREAS, America's increased dependence on foreign energy supplies and global competition for oil and natural gas will create a threat to our national security; and

WHEREAS, since 2000, natural gas and oil prices have more than doubled: and

WHEREAS, rising energy costs are taking a toll on poor families throughout the nation and, in a recent annual survey by the National Energy Assistance Directors' Association, 32% of families had to sacrifice medical care, 24% failed to make their

rent or mortgage payment, 20% were without food for at least a day, and 44% skipped paying or paid less than their home energy bill in the past year; and

WHEREAS, the nation's farming and ranching sectors depend on a reliable and affordable supply of energy to run equipment, fertilize crops, and transport products to market; and

WHEREAS, the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture estimates that farmers' fuel expenses for 2005 exceeded their 2004 fuel expenses by 37%, and higher energy prices mean increased costs to farmers and ranchers, who already face tremendous economic challenges; and

WHEREAS, in spite of significant progress in energy efficiency, the United States will still need 32% more energy to support economic growth by 2025; and

WHEREAS, inland states throughout the west are doing more to increase domestic energy production, and the public lands that lie off our nation's coasts also hold enormous potential for energy production, which could significantly help to meet the energy needs of all Americans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we encourage the President of the United States of America, the Honorable George W. Bush, to revoke administrative withdrawals on offshore energy development on the nation's Outer Continental Shelf and direct the Minerals Management Service to contract for test wells to be drilled in order to provide needed energy resources to the United States in an environmentally responsible manner.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage the Congress of the United States of America to make the nation's Outer Continental Shelf available for energy development in an environmentally responsible manner.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States of America, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, and the United States Secretaries of the Interior and of Energy.

#### HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO H 761

### AMENDMENTS TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, in line 24, delete "54-1003" and insert: "54-1006"; delete lines 26 through 43, and on page 2 delete lines 1 through 21 and insert:

- "54-1006. IDAHO ELECTRICAL BOARD. (1) The Idaho electrical board, hereinafter known as the board, is hereby created and made a part of the division of building safety. It shall be the responsibility and duty of the administrator of the division of building safety to administer and enforce the provisions of this act chapter, and to serve as secretary to the Idaho electrical board.
- (2) The board shall consist of nine (9) members to be appointed by the governor with power of removal for cause. Two (2) members shall be licensed journeymen or master electricians; two (2) members shall be employees or officers of licensed electrical contractors; one (1) member shall be a licensed specialty journeyman or contractor; one (1) member shall be an employee or officer of an electrical power provider; one (1) member shall be an employee or officer of a manufacturing plant or other large power user; one (1) member shall be an employee or director of a manufacturer or distributor of electrical supplies or materials; and one (1) member shall be from the public at large not directly associated with the electrical industry. Board members shall be appointed for a term of four (4) years. Members of the board shall hold office until expiration of the term to which the member was appointed and until his successor has been duly appointed and qualified. Whenever a vacancy occurs, the governor shall appoint a qualified person to fill the vacancy for the unexpired portion of the term.
- (3) All members of the board shall be citizens of the United States, residents of this state for not less than two (2) years and shall be qualified by experience, knowledge and integrity in formulating rules for examinations, in passing on the fitness and qualifications of applicants for electrical contractor and journeyman electrician licenses and in establishing standards for electrical products to be used in electrical installations coming under the provisions of this aet chapter.
- (4) The members of the board shall, at their first regular meeting following the effective date of this act and every two (2) years thereafter, elect by majority vote of the members of the board, a chairman who shall preside at meetings of the board. In the event the chairman is not present at any board meeting, the board may by majority vote of the members present appoint a temporary chairman. A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum.

- (5) The board is authorized and directed to prescribe and amend rules consistent with this act chapter for the administration of this chapter and to effectuate the purpose thereof, and for the examination and licensing of electrical contractors, journeyman electricians, master electricians, specialty electricians, specialty electrical contractors, specialty electrical trainees and apprentice electricians. The board shall also establish the classifications for specialty electrician and specialty electrical contractor licensing and the fees to be charged for permits and inspections of electrical systems. The board shall establish by administrative rule the fines to be paid for citations issued and shall hear appeals regarding the imposition of civil penalties for violations of this chapter and the rules of the Idaho electrical board. The board is authorized to affirm, reject, decrease or increase the penalty imposed by the administrator. However, in no case shall the penalty exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each offense.
- (6) Each member of the board not otherwise compensated by public moneys shall be compensated as provided by section 59-509(h), Idaho Code.
- (7) The board shall require applicants for issuance or renewal of an electrical or specialty electrical contractor license to file with the board a bond with one (1) or more corporate surety companies authorized to do business in this state as follows:
  - (a) The bond shall be conditioned that an electrical or specialty electrical contractor faithfully comply with applicable rules of the board and the terms of any contract that may be included within the scope of such bond as may be determined by the board. The board shall adopt rules to implement the provisions of this paragraph (a);
  - (b) The bond shall be in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), executed by a surety company with the applicant as principal and the state of Idaho as obligee, for its benefit and that of consumers dealing with the applicant; provided however, the board may reduce the amount of the bond required by this paragraph (b) to five thousand dollars (\$5,000) upon a showing that the applicant does not perform work exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) in gross annual volume and does not enter into contracts with consumers that exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000);
  - (c) A surety company shall pay all amounts due to a consumer pursuant to a bond, provided that the board has determined that:
    - (i) An electrical or specialty electrical contractor has failed to comply with any applicable rule adopted by the board; or
    - (ii) An electrical or specialty electrical contractor has breached a contract with a consumer, including negligent or improper work in the conduct of the contracting business or failure to fully perform a contract, provided that such contract is within the scope of the bond;
  - (d) In order for a claim to be payable by the surety company, it must be established that the claim is within the scope of the bond provided in this subsection (7); provided however, it is not necessary for a consumer to reduce a claim to judgment through a court of competent jurisdiction before submitting a claim to a surety company;
  - (e) A bond shall be continuous unless canceled as provided

- for in this subsection (7), and the aggregate liability of a surety company, regardless of the number of claims made against the bond or the number of years the bond remains in force, shall in no event exceed the amount of the bond; and (f) The bond may be terminated at any time by the contractor. A surety company may terminate the bond on the anniversary date of the bond upon providing thirty (30) days' written notice to the board and to an electrical or specialty electrical contractor on whose behalf a bond has been issued.
- (8) License applications for electrical contractors and specialty electrical contractors shall be accompanied by proof of liability insurance in the amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) and proof of worker's compensation insurance, if applicable."

#### AMENDMENTS TO SECTION 2

On page 2, delete lines 51 through 53; and on page 3, delete line 1 and insert: "men, and specialty apprentices, including the furnishing of a compliance bond in an amount not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the specialty contractor classification or evidence of coverage by a corporate industry group bond acceptable to the board."; also on page 3, delete lines 10 through 29 and insert:

- "(f) Require applicants for issuance or renewal of a plumbing contractor license to file with the board a bond with one (1) or more corporate surety companies authorized to do business in this state as follows:
  - (i) The bond shall be conditioned that a plumbing contractor faithfully comply with applicable rules of the board and the terms of any contract that may be included within the scope of such bond as may be determined by the board. The board shall adopt rules to implement the provisions of this paragraph (f)(i);
  - (ii) The bond shall be in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), executed by a surety company with the applicant as principal and the state of Idaho as obligee, for its benefit and that of consumers dealing with the applicant; provided however, the board may reduce the amount of the bond required by this paragraph (ii) to five thousand dollars (\$5,000) upon a showing that the applicant does not perform work exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) in gross annual volume and does not enter into contracts with consumers that exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000);

- (f) The bond may be terminated at any time by the contractor. A surety company may terminate the bond on the anniversary date of the bond upon providing thirty (30) days' written notice to the board and to a heating, ventilation and air conditioning contractor or specialty contractor on whose behalf a bond has been issued.";

### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 26 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, THE PRESIDENT OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE BASQUE AUTONOMOUS REGION OF SPAIN, THE PRIME MINISTER OF SPAIN, AND THE PRIME MINISTER OF FRANCE.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, during the early part of the twentieth century, a wave of Basque immigrants left the Basque region of northern Spain and southern France to come to Idaho and other states of the American West; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho has long been known as the North American center of the Basque population and many citizens of this state have kept close ties to the homeland of their forefathers in the Basque region of Spain and France; and

WHEREAS, from the time of the government of Francisco Franco of Spain until the present, the Basque Homeland has experienced decades of terror and violence in large part due to a group organized under the name of Euskadi ta Askatasuna (ETA); and

WHEREAS, in the year 1972, the Second Regular Session of the Forty-first Idaho Legislature adopted Senate Joint Memorial No. 115, condemning the government of Francisco Franco of Spain and urging peace and democracy in the Basque Homeland of Spain; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2002, the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-sixth Idaho Legislature adopted Senate Joint Memorial No. 114, which condemned ETA and all other terrorist organizations operating in the world and expressed strong support for an immediate end to violence in the Basque Homeland and for the establishment of peace through all lawful means; and

WHEREAS, Senate Joint Memorial No. 114, 2002, condemned all acts of terrorism and violence committed by any and all organizations and individuals within the Basque Homeland and throughout the world, such as ETA; and

WHEREAS, on March 22, 2006, ETA announced that it is permanently ending its campaign of violence and laying down its arms; and

WHEREAS, the governments of the Basque Autonomous Region and Spain have vigorously and endlessly opposed violence in the Basque Homeland and have engaged in an active effort to end the violence and establish a lasting peace.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the state of Idaho recognizes ETA's decision to lay down its arms and commends and congratulates the governments of the Basque Autonomous Region and of Spain and all other parties in Spain and France for their actions to promote the cessation of violence and to achieve a lasting peace in the Basque Homeland and all of Europe.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the state of Idaho extends its encouragement and support to these governments in their ongoing efforts to establish a process to bring a lasting peace in accordance with the democratic voting process, as well as enhance an appropriate degree of governmental autonomy for the Basque Homeland of Spain.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, the President of the Government of the Basque Autonomous Region of Spain, the Prime Minister of Spain, and the Prime Minister of France.

#### HOUSE AMENDMENT TO S 1404

#### AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 2 of the printed bill, delete lines 6 through 8 and insert:

"SECTION 2. That Section 33-802, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 33-802. School levies. Any tax levied for school purposes shall be a lien on the property against which the tax is levied. The board of trustees shall determine the levies upon each dollar of taxable property in the district for the ensuing fiscal year as follows:
- 1. Bond, Interest and Judgment Obligation Levies. Such levies as shall be required to satisfy all maturing bond, bond interest, and judgment obligations.
- Maximum School Maintenance and Operation Levies. Such levies for maintaining and operating the schools of the district and for the payment of tuition and transportation, that do not exceed an amount equal to four-tenths of one percent (.4%) during tax year 1994, and do not exceed an amount equal to three-tenths fifteen-hundredths of one percent (.315%) during tax year 1995 2006 and thereafter, applied to the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes of the district as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year, but allowances necessary as a credit for prepaid taxes, as provided in section 63-1607, Idaho Code, shall not be included in such maximum levies. Provided however, that in the event property within a district's boundaries is contained in a revenue allocation area established under chapter 29, title 50, Idaho Code, and such revenue allocation area has given notice of termination thereunder, then, only for the purpose of determining the levy described in this subsection, the district may add the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, to the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes of the district as such value existed on December 31 of the previous year. For tax year 2007 and thereafter, the levy rate limitation of this subsection 2. shall be modified as follows:
  - (a) Multiply the amount of money raised statewide in the prior year pursuant to this section by one and three-hundredths (1.03);
  - (b) Subtract the value of any increase in statewide market value for assessment purposes resulting from new construction or change of land use classification as evidenced by the value shown on the new construction roll compiled pursuant to section 63-301A, Idaho Code, from the actual or adjusted statewide market value as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year;
  - (c) Divide the amount in subsection 2.(a) of this section by the amount in subsection 2.(b) of this section;

- (d) Reduce the rate resulting from the calculation in subsection 2.(c) of this section by an amount equal to the moneys appropriated pursuant to section 33-1002D, Idaho Code.
- 3. Authorized School Maintenance and Operation Levies. Such levies for maintaining and operating the schools of the district and for the payment of tuition and transportation that do not exceed one hundred eleven percent (111%) of the local district's contribution authorized in subsection 2. of section 33-1002, Idaho Code. Implementation of the provisions of this subsection shall be authorized only after approval by a majority of the district's electors voting on the question. Levies otherwise authorized by law shall not require an election.
- 4. Supplemental Maintenance and Operation Levies. No levy in excess of the levy permitted by subsection 2. or 3. of this section shall be made by a noncharter school district unless such a supplemental levy in a specified amount and for a specified time not to exceed two (2) years be first authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, and approved by a majority of the district electors voting in such election. A levy approved pursuant to this subsection may be reduced by a majority vote of the board of trustees in the second year.
- 5. Charter District Supplemental Maintenance and Operation. Levies pursuant to the respective charter of any such charter district shall be first authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, and approved by a majority of the district electors voting in such election.
- 6. The Local District Contribution. The local school district contribution levy is the amount utilized for calculating local district participation in the educational foundation program, which is applied to the adjusted market value for assessment purposes, as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in subsection 2. of this section, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area.
- 7. The board of trustees of any school district that has, for at least seven (7) consecutive years, been authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, to certify a supplemental levy that has annually been equal to or greater than twenty percent (20%) of the total general maintenance and operation fund, may submit the question of an indefinite term supplemental levy to the electors of the school district. Such question shall clearly state the dollar amount that will be certified annually and that the levy will be for an indefinite number of years. The question must be approved by a majority of the district electors voting on the question in an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code. The levy approved pursuant to this subsection may be reduced by a majority vote of the board of trustees during any fiscal year.
- 8. School districts not receiving state equalization funds in fiscal year 2006 may authorize a budget stabilization levy for fiscal years 2007 through 2011. Such levies shall not exceed the following amount:
- (a) The amount of money the school district received from its maintenance and operation levy and state property tax replacments fund in fiscal year 2006; minus

- (b) The amount of money the school district will receive from its maintenance and operation levy and state property tax replacement funds in fiscal year 2007, and the amount of equalized state funds that the state department of education estimates the school district will receive in fiscal year 2007.
- SECTION 3. That Section 33-1002, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 33-1002. Educational support program. The educational support program is calculated as follows:
- 1. State Educational Support Funds. Add the state appropriation, including the moneys available in the public school income fund, together with all miscellaneous revenues to determine the total state funds.
- 2. From the total state funds subtract the following amounts needed for state support of special programs provided by a school district:
  - a. Pupil tuition-equivalency allowances as provided in section 33-1002B, Idaho Code;
  - Transportation support program as provided in section 33-1006. Idaho Code:
  - Feasibility studies allowance as provided in section 33-1007A, Idaho Code;
  - d. The approved costs for border district allowance, provided in section 33-1403, Idaho Code, as determined by the state superintendent of public instruction;
  - e. The approved costs for exceptional child approved contract allowance, provided in subsection 2. of section 33-2004, Idaho Code, as determined by the state superintendent of public instruction;
  - f. Certain expectant and delivered mothers allowance as provided in section 33-2006, Idaho Code;
  - g. Salary-based apportionment calculated as provided in sections 33-1004 through 33-1004F, Idaho Code;
  - h. Unemployment insurance benefit payments according to the provisions of section 72-1349A, Idaho Code;
  - i. For expenditure as provided by the public school technology program;
  - j. For the support of provisions that provide a safe environment conducive to student learning and maintain classroom discipline, an allocation of \$300 per support unit; and
  - k. Any additional amounts as required by statute to effect administrative adjustments or as specifically required by the provisions of any bill of appropriation;
- to secure the state educational support funds.
- 3. Local Districts' Contribution Calculation. Without including any allowance as a credit for prepaid taxes as provided by section 63-1607, Idaho Code, the local districts' contribution shall be the amount appropriated pursuant to section 33-1002D, Idaho Code, plus three-tenths percent (.3%) during fiscal year 2003-04 and each year thereafter, a percentage of the total state adjusted market value for assessment purposes for the previous year with such percentage being determined pursuant to section 33-802, Idaho Code, and with such value being determined by the provisions of section 63-315, Idaho Code, with such value being multiplied by the percentage calculated in section 33-802 2.(a), (b), (c) and (d), Idaho Code, and four-tenths percent (.4%)

- during fiscal year 1994-95 and each year thereafter, of the cooperative electrical associations' property values that have been derived from the taxes paid in lieu of ad valorem property taxes for the previous year as provided in section 63-3502, Idaho Code. In order to receive state funds, pursuant to this section, a charter district shall utilize a school maintenance and operation property tax levy, for the purposes of calculating the moneys to be raised, that is no greater than that which it levied in tax year 1994, less the difference between the maximum levy rate permitted by section 33-802, Idaho Code, and four-tenths of one percent (.4%).
- 4. Educational Support Program Distribution Funds. Add the local districts' contribution, subsection 3. of this section, and the state educational support program funds, subsection 1. of this section, together to secure the total educational support program distribution funds.
- 5. Average Daily Attendance. The total state average daily attendance shall be the sum of the average daily attendance of all of the school districts of the state. The state board of education shall establish rules setting forth the procedure to determine average daily attendance and the time for, and method of, submission of such report. Average daily attendance calculation shall be carried out to the nearest hundredth. Computation of average daily attendance shall also be governed by the provisions of section 33-1003A, Idaho Code.
- 6. Support Units. The total state support units shall be determined by using the tables set out hereafter called computation of kindergarten support units, computation of elementary support units, computation of secondary support units, computation of exceptional education support units, and computation of alternative school secondary support units. The sum of all of the total support units of all school districts of the state shall be the total state support units.

# COMPUTATION OF ALTERNATIVE SCHOOL SECONDARY SUPPORT UNITS

In applying these tables to any given separate attendance unit, no school district shall receive less total money than it would receive if it had a lesser average daily attendance in such separate attendance unit. In applying the kindergarten table to a kindergarten program of less days than a full school year, the support unit allowance shall be in ratio to the number of days of a full school year. The tables for exceptional education and alternative school secondary support units shall be applicable only for programs approved by the state department of education following rules established by the state board of education. Moneys generated from computation of support units for alternative schools shall be utilized for alternative school programs. School district administrative and facility costs may be included as part of the alternative school expenditures.

- 7. State Distribution Factor per Support Unit. Divide educational support program distribution funds, after subtracting the amounts necessary to pay the obligations specified in subsection 2. of this section, by the total state support units to secure the state distribution factor per support unit.
- 8. District Share of State Funds for Educational Support Program. Ascertain a district's share of state funds for the educational support program as follows:
- a. District Contribution Calculation. Without including any allowance as a credit for prepaid taxes, as provided in section

- 63-1607, Idaho Code, the district contribution calculation shall be the rate determined under subsection 3. of this section.
- b. District Support Units. The number of support units for each school district in the state shall be determined as follows:
  - (1) Divide the actual average daily attendance, excluding students approved for inclusion in the exceptional child educational program, for the administrative schools and each of the separate schools and attendance units by the appropriate divisor from the tables of support units in this section, then add the quotients to obtain the district's support units allowance for regular students, kindergarten through grade 12 including alternative school secondary students. Calculations in application of this subsection shall be carried out to the nearest tenth.
  - (2) Divide the combined totals of the average daily attendance of all preschool, handicapped, kindergarten, elementary, secondary and juvenile detention center students approved for inclusion in the exceptional child program of the district by the appropriate divisor from the table for computation of exceptional education support units to obtain the number of support units allowed for the district's approved exceptional child program. Calculations for this subsection shall be carried out to the nearest tenth when more than one (1) unit is allowed.
  - (3) The total number of support units of the district shall be the sum of the total support units for regular students, subsection 8.b.(1) of this section, and the support units allowance for the approved exceptional child program, subsection 8.b.(2) of this section.
  - c. Total District Allowance Educational Program. Multiply the district's total number of support units, carried out to the nearest tenth, by the state distribution factor per support unit and to this product add the approved amount of programs of the district provided in subsection 2. of this section to secure the district's total allowance for the educational support program.
  - d. District Share. To secure the district's share of state apportionment, subtract the amount of the local district contribution calculation, subsection 3. of this section, from the amount of the total district allowance, subsection 8.c. of this section.
  - e. Adjustment of District Share. The contract salary of every noncertificated teacher shall be subtracted from the district's share as calculated from the provisions of subsection 8.d. of this section.

SECTION 4. That Section 33-1002D, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

33-1002D. Property tax replacement relief. The purpose of this section is to provide ongoing property tax relief. All moneys transferred to the public school income fund, pursuant to section 67-6804, Idaho Code, shall be annually appropriated by the legislature to the educational support program/division of operations as state discretionary funds. replace a portion of the authorized school maintenance and operation property tax levy with state sales tax receipts. As used in this section, the term

"property tax computation ratio" shall mean a ratio determined by dividing the district's certified property tax maintenance and operation budget by the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such values existed on December 31 of the previous calendar year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in section 33-802 2., Idaho Code, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area.

- (1) (a) In the case of a school district that had a property tax computation ratio of not less than four-tenths of one percent (.4%) in tax year 1994, that school district shall receive from the appropriations made for that purpose, an amount equal to the greater of the district's actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous calendar year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in section 33-802 2., Idaho Code, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area, multiplied by one-tenth of one percent (.1%).
- (b) In the case of a school district that had a property tax computation ratio of less than four-tenths of one percent (.4%) in tax year 1994, the greater of the 1992, 1993 or 1994 property tax computation ratio less three-tenths of one percent (.3%) shall be designated the district's base multiplier. In no case shall the base multiplier be less than zero (0). Fourtenths of one percent (.4%) less the greater of the district's 1992, 1993 or 1994 property tax computation ratio shall be designated the district's adjustment factor. In no case shall the adjustment factor be greater than one-tenth of one percent (.1%) or less than zero (0). Each school district's actual multiplier shall be the base multiplier plus one-fifth (1/5) of the adjustment factor in tax year 1995, the base multiplier plus two-fifths (2/5) of the adjustment factor in tax year 1996, the base multiplier plus three-fifths (3/5) of the adjustment factor in tax year 1997, the base multiplier plus four-fifths (4/5) of the adjustment factor in tax year 1998, and the base multiplier plus the adjustment factor in tax year 1999 and beyond. Each school district shall receive, from the appropriations made for that purpose, an amount equal to the district's actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous calendar year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in section 33-802 2., Idaho Code, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area, multiplied by the district's actual multiplier.
- (c) The preceding provisions of this subsection notwithstanding, appropriations from the state for the value of one-tenth of one percent (.1%) of the greater of the district's actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous calendar year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in section 33-802 2., Idaho Code, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area, shall not exceed seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000) in any fiscal year. If the amount school districts would otherwise be entitled to receive pursuant to the preceding provisions of this subsection exceeds seventy-five million dollars

- (\$75,000,000), then each school district shall receive its share of seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000) based on the formulas contained in this section.
- (2) (a) Participation in this property tax reduction program is voluntary for a charter district. If a charter district participates, in addition to the provisions of subsection (1) of this section it shall not have a property tax computation ratio that is above three-tenths of one percent (.3%) or the district's property tax computation ratio in tax year 1994, less one-tenth of one percent (.1%), whichever is greater.
- (b) If in any year the charter district's property tax computation ratio used to calculate its maintenance and operation budget is increased above the limit specified in this subsection the district shall not be eligible for the distribution pursuant to subsection (1) of this section for that year.
- (3) Limitations imposed upon a school district's property tax computation ratio under the provisions of this section do not apply to any levy approved by electors of the school district as provided by law.
- (4) Distributions calculated as provided in this section shall be made to school districts of this state in two (2) equal installments on the due dates as specified in section 63-903(1), Idaho Code, for the property taxes being replaced.
- (5) For purposes of section 33-1002, Idaho Code, moneys distributed pursuant to this section shall not be included in determining total state funds.
- SECTION 5. That Chapter 68, Title 67, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a <u>NEW SECTION</u>, to be known and designated as Section 67-6804, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:
- 67-6804. TRANSFER OF EXCESS REVENUES. (1) The legislature finds that it is in the best interest of the taxpayers of the state of Idaho to establish a state budget system that captures surplus revenues for the purposes described herein.
- (2) If the state controller certifies that the receipts to the general fund for the fiscal year just ending have exceeded the receipts of the previous fiscal year by more than eight percent (8%), then the state controller shall transfer all general fund collections in excess of said eight percent (8%) increase to the public school income fund.
- (3) Once a transfer has been made, pursuant to this section, the state controller shall transfer the same dollar amount to the public school income fund in each subsequent fiscal year. If the provisions of subsection (2) of this section cause further transfers to be made, then the annual transfer made by the state controller shall be increased by a like amount.
- (4) All transfers to the public school income fund authorized by this section shall be expended pursuant to the provisions of section 33-1002D, Idaho Code.
- SECTION 6. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, Section 2 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after passage and approval,

and retroactively to January 1, 2006. Section 1 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after passage and approval. Sections 3, 4 and 5 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2006."

# HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 3 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A HOUSE RESOLUTION

PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT OF RULE 57 OF THE RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives deems it necessary and desirable to amend Rule 57 of the Rules of the House of Representatives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the House of Representatives, assembled in the Second

Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, that Rule 57 of the Rules of the House of Representatives shall be amended to read as follows:

#### RULE 57

Committee Meetings, Attendance to be Open, Executive Sessions Limited, Disruption of Meetings. --(1) All regular meetings of any standing, special or select committee of the House of Representatives shall be open to the public at all times. Any person may attend any meeting of any standing or select or special committee, but may participate in said committee only with the approval of the committee itself. Such committee may resolve itself into executive session upon the vote of two-thirds of the membership of the committee, at which time persons who are not members of the legislature may be excluded, provided however, that during such executive session, no votes or official action may be taken.

(2) Executive sessions of a standing, special or select committee of the House of Representatives shall be limited and undertaken only when necessitated by extraordinary circumstances as provided in this rule. Except in an emergency involving security or threats against state citizens, resources or facilities, an executive session may be considered by a committee only after the committee has given public notice at least twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting that the committee will have before it a request to meet in executive session, has listed the person(s) or agency that has requested the executive session, and has described the reason(s) for which an executive session has been requested. Only after the committee chairman has identified the reason(s) for holding the executive session and only upon a two-thirds vote recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the committee, shall a committee be allowed to hold an executive session during any meeting, at which time persons who are not members of the legislature may be excluded. Executive sessions shall be held only when and to the extent necessary to: discuss records that are exempt from public disclosure by statute, court decision or court rule; consider pending litigation, mediation or arbitration; consider personnel decisions involving a legislative employee; conduct a preliminary investigation of an ethics complaint against a member under House Rule 76; consider charges brought against or the discipline or dismissal of a member when public disclosure would harm an innocent third party; discuss the security of or threats against state citizens, resources or facilities; or discuss acquiring an interest in real property which is not owned by a public agency. Under no circumstances, however, shall an executive session be authorized or held for the purpose of taking any final action or making any final decision, and during such executive session, no votes or official action may be taken.

(3) Nothing in this rule shall prohibit the removal of any person who willfully disrupts a meeting to the extent that orderly conduct is seriously compromised.

# HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 4 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A HOUSE RESOLUTION

PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT OF RULE 76 OF THE RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives deems it necessary and desirable to amend Rule 76 of the Rules of the House of Representatives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the House of Representatives, assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Fifty-eighth Idaho Legislature, that Rule 76 of the Rules of the House of Representatives shall be amended to read as follows:

#### RULE 76

Committee on Ethics.--(1) The Speaker shall receive written, signed complaints from any person concerning misconduct involving legislative duties by a member of the House including, but not limited to, the alleged violation of the Rules of the House of Representatives and the provisions of applicable law. Whenever such a complaint is received, the Speaker shall appoint a committee on ethics of seven members, consisting of four majority party members, and three minority party members. The majority party members of the committee shall be selected from among the chairmen of committees of reference of the House. The minority party members of the committee shall be selected, after considering recommendations made by the minority leader, from among the members of the House who are senior in service and experience. The Speaker shall designate the chairman and vice chairman of the committee from among its members.

- (2) The committee shall notify the person against whom the complaint was brought and shall provide such person with a copy of the complaint. The person complained against may submit a written answer to the committee. The committee shall make a preliminary investigation of the complaint. If, after investigation, the committee determines no violation has occurred, the complaint shall be dismissed. If, after investigation, the committee determines probable cause exists that a violation may have occurred, the committee shall so notify the person complained against. Such person may request a hearing before the committee, before which he shall be entitled to appear, present evidence, cross-examine witnesses, and be represented by counsel. The committee shall have the power to take testimony under oath and to issue subpoenas and subpoenas duces tecum in the manner provided in Section 67-407, Idaho Code.
- (3) All proceedings of the committee shall be governed by the provisions of Section 67-2345, Idaho Code.
- (4) The committee may make appropriate recommendations to the House of Representatives based upon the investigations conducted and hearings held pursuant to this rule. In the case of a member of the House, the committee may recommend dismissal of the charges, reprimand, censure, or expulsion. Expulsion of a House member shall require the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members elected to the House, as provided by Section 11 of Article III of the Constitution. Reprimand or censure of a member shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House. Action of the House pursuant to this rule is final and not subject to court review.
- (54) The committee may retain such counsel and may hire such investigators as it deems necessary for the performance of its duties under this rule. All expenditures incurred pursuant to

this subsection (54) shall be approved by the Speaker and paid by vouchers and warrants drawn as provided by law from appropriations made to the Legislative Account.

- (65) The committee may adopt rules of procedure for the orderly conduct of committee meetings, investigations and hearings, which rules shall be consistent with this rule and other applicable rules and statutes.
- (76) If the written signed complaint concerns misconduct of the Speaker, then the duties of the Speaker in this rule shall be the duties of the majority floor leader.

**HR 3** and **HR 4** were introduced, read the first time by title, and referred to the Judiciary, Rules, and Administration Committee for printing.

### Report of the Committee of the Whole House

April 11, 2006

Mr. Speaker:

We, your COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE, report that we have had under consideration S 1501 and report it back without recommendation, amended as follows:

#### HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO S 1501

#### AMENDMENTS TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 9 and 10 and insert: "SECTION 1. The Legislature finds that the issue of property taxes is of impor-"; delete lines 15 through 19 and insert: "to reducing property taxes and replacing the funds with an increase in the state sales tax."; delete lines 25 through 29 and insert:

""Shall property taxes be reduced and the funds be replaced by an increase in the state sales tax?".".

#### AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 1, following line 32 insert:

"SECTION 2. That Section 33-802, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 33-802. SCHOOL LEVIES. Any tax levied for school purposes shall be a lien on the property against which the tax is levied. The board of trustees shall determine the levies upon each dollar of taxable property in the district for the ensuing fiscal year as follows:
- 1. Bond, Interest and Judgment Obligation Levies. Such levies as shall be required to satisfy all maturing bond, bond interest, and judgment obligations.
- 2. Maximum School Maintenance and Operation Levies. Such levies for maintaining and operating the schools of the district and for the payment of tuition and transportation, that do not exceed an amount equal to four-tenths of one percent (.4%) during tax year 1994, and do not exceed an amount equal to three-tenths of one percent (.3%) during tax year 1995 and thereafter through tax year 2005, applied to the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes of the district as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year, but allowances necessary as a credit for prepaid taxes, as provided in section 63-1607, Idaho Code, shall not be included in such maximum levies. Provided however, that in the event property within a district's boundaries is contained in a revenue allocation area established under chapter 29, title 50, Idaho Code, and such revenue allocation area has given notice of termination thereunder, then, only for the purpose of determining the levy described in this subsection, the district may add the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, to the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes of the district as such value existed on December 31 of the previous year. For tax year 2006, and each year thereafter, the maximum levy of this subsection 2. shall not exceed an amount equal to the following percentage as applied pursuant to this section:

- (a) Multiply the amount of money raised statewide in the prior year, pursuant to this section, by 1.03;
- (b) Subtract the value of any increase in statewide market value for assessment purposes resulting from new construction or change of land use classification as evidenced by the value shown on the prior year's new construction roll compiled pursuant to section 63-301A, Idaho Code, from the actual or adjusted statewide market value as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year;
- (c) Divide the amount in subsection 2.(a) of this section by the amount in subsection 2.(b) of this section.
- 3. Authorized School Maintenance and Operation Levies. Such levies for maintaining and operating the schools of the district and for the payment of tuition and transportation that do not exceed one hundred eleven percent (111%) of the local district's contribution authorized in subsection 2. of section 33-1002, Idaho Code. Implementation of the provisions of this subsection shall be authorized only after approval by a majority of the district's electors voting on the question. Levies otherwise authorized by law shall not require an election.
- 4. Supplemental Maintenance and Operation Levies. No levy in excess of the levy permitted by subsection 2. or 3. of this section shall be made by a noncharter school district unless such a supplemental levy in a specified amount and for a specified time not to exceed two (2) years be first authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, and approved by a majority of the district electors voting in such election. A levy approved pursuant to this subsection may be reduced by a majority vote of the board of trustees in the second year.
- 5. Charter District Supplemental Maintenance and Operation. Levies pursuant to the respective charter of any such charter district shall be first authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, and approved by a majority of the district electors voting in such election.
- 6. The Local District Contribution. The local school district contribution levy is the amount utilized for calculating local district participation in the educational foundation program, which is applied to the adjusted market value for assessment purposes, as such valuation existed on December 31 of the previous year, together with the increment value, as defined in section 50-2903, Idaho Code, if applicable under the circumstance described in subsection 2. of this section, relating to termination of a revenue allocation area.
- 7. The board of trustees of any school district that has, for at least seven (7) consecutive years, been authorized through an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code, to certify a supplemental levy that has annually been equal to or greater than twenty percent (20%) of the total general maintenance and operation fund, may submit the question of an indefinite term supplemental levy to the electors of the school district. Such question shall clearly state the dollar amount that will be certified annually and that the levy will be for an indefinite number of years. The question must be approved by a majority of the district electors voting on the question in an election held pursuant to chapter 4, title 33, Idaho Code. The levy approved pursuant to this subsection may be reduced by a majority vote of the board of trustees during any fiscal year.

SECTION 3. That Section 33-1002, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 33-1002. Educational support program. The educational support program is calculated as follows:
- 1. State Educational Support Funds. Add the state appropriation, including the moneys available in the public school income fund, together with all miscellaneous revenues to determine the total state funds.
- 2. From the total state funds subtract the following amounts needed for state support of special programs provided by a school district:
  - a. Pupil tuition-equivalency allowances as provided in section 33-1002B, Idaho Code;
  - b. Transportation support program as provided in section 33-1006, Idaho Code;
  - c. Feasibility studies allowance as provided in section 33-1007A, Idaho Code;
  - d. The approved costs for border district allowance, provided in section 33-1403, Idaho Code, as determined by the state superintendent of public instruction;
  - e. The approved costs for exceptional child approved contract allowance, provided in subsection 2. of section 33-2004, Idaho Code, as determined by the state superintendent of public instruction;
  - f. Certain expectant and delivered mothers allowance as provided in section 33-2006, Idaho Code;
  - g. Salary-based apportionment calculated as provided in sections 33-1004 through 33-1004F, Idaho Code;
  - h. Unemployment insurance benefit payments according to the provisions of section 72-1349A, Idaho Code;
  - i. For expenditure as provided by the public school technology program;
  - j. For the support of provisions that provide a safe environment conducive to student learning and maintain classroom discipline, an allocation of \$300 per support unit;
  - k. Any additional amounts as required by statute to effect administrative adjustments or as specifically required by the provisions of any bill of appropriation;

to secure the state educational support funds.

- 3. Local Districts' Contribution Calculation. Without including any allowance as a credit for prepaid taxes as provided by section 63-1607, Idaho Code, the local districts' contribution shall be the amount appropriated pursuant to section 33-1002D, Idaho Code, plus three tenths percent (.3%) during fiscal year 2003-04 and each year thereafter, a percentage of the total state adjusted market value for assessment purposes for the previous year, with such percentage being determined pursuant to section 33-802, Idaho Code, and with such value being determined by the provisions of section 63-315, Idaho Code, and four-tenths percent (.4%) during fiscal year 1994-95 and each year thereafter, of the cooperative electrical associations' property values that have been derived from the taxes paid in lieu of ad valorem taxes for the previous year as provided in section 63-3502, Idaho Code.
- 4. Educational Support Program Distribution Funds. Add the local districts' contribution, subsection 3. of this section, and the state educational support program funds, subsection 1. of this

section, together to secure the total educational support program distribution funds.

- 5. Average Daily Attendance. The total state average daily attendance shall be the sum of the average daily attendance of all of the school districts of the state. The state board of education shall establish rules setting forth the procedure to determine average daily attendance and the time for, and method of, submission of such report. Average daily attendance calculation shall be carried out to the nearest hundredth. Computation of average daily attendance shall also be governed by the provisions of section 33-1003A, Idaho Code.
- 6. Support Units. The total state support units shall be determined by using the tables set out hereafter called computation of kindergarten support units, computation of elementary support units, computation of secondary support units, computation of exceptional education support units, and computation of alternative school secondary support units. The sum of all of the total support units of all school districts of the state shall be the total state support units.

In applying these tables to any given separate attendance unit, no school district shall receive less total money than it would receive if it had a lesser average daily attendance in such separate attendance unit. In applying the kindergarten table to a kindergarten program of less days than a full school year, the support unit allowance shall be in ratio to the number of days of a full school year. The tables for exceptional education and alternative school secondary support units shall be applicable only for programs approved by the state department of education following rules established by the state board of education. Moneys generated from computation of support units for alternative schools shall be utilized for alternative school programs. School district administrative and facility costs may be included as part of the alternative school expenditures.

- 7. State Distribution Factor per Support Unit. Divide educational support program distribution funds, after subtracting the amounts necessary to pay the obligations specified in subsection 2. of this section, by the total state support units to secure the state distribution factor per support unit.
- 8. District Share of State Funds for Educational Support Program. Ascertain a district's share of state funds for the educational support program as follows:
  - a. District Contribution Calculation. Without including any allowance as a credit for prepaid taxes, as provided in section 63-1607, Idaho Code, the district contribution calculation shall be the rate determined under subsection 3. of this section.
  - b. District Support Units. The number of support units for each school district in the state shall be determined as follows:
    - (1) Divide the actual average daily attendance, excluding students approved for inclusion in the exceptional child educational program, for the administrative schools and each of the separate schools and attendance units by the appropriate divisor from the tables of support units in this section, then add the quotients to obtain the district's support units allowance for regular students, kindergarten through grade 12 including alternative school secondary

- students. Calculations in application of this subsection shall be carried out to the nearest tenth.
- (2) Divide the combined totals of the average daily attendance of all preschool, handicapped, kindergarten, elementary, secondary and juvenile detention center students approved for inclusion in the exceptional child program of the district by the appropriate divisor from the table for computation of exceptional education support units to obtain the number of support units allowed for the district's approved exceptional child program. Calculations for this subsection shall be carried out to the nearest tenth when more than one (1) unit is allowed.
- (3) The total number of support units of the district shall be the sum of the total support units for regular students, subsection 8.b.(1) of this section, and the support units allowance for the approved exceptional child program, subsection 8.b.(2) of this section.
- c. Total District Allowance Educational Program. Multiply the district's total number of support units, carried out to the nearest tenth, by the state distribution factor per support unit and to this product add the approved amount of programs of the district provided in subsection 2. of this section to secure the district's total allowance for the educational support program.
- d. District Share. To secure the district's share of state apportionment, subtract the amount of the local district contribution calculation, subsection 3. of this section, from the amount of the total district allowance, subsection 8.c. of this section.
- e. Adjustment of District Share. The contract salary of every noncertificated teacher shall be subtracted from the district's share as calculated from the provisions of subsection 8.d. of this section.
- 9. Property Tax Computation Ratio. In order to receive state funds pursuant to this section a charter district shall utilize a school maintenance and operation property tax computation ratio for the purpose of calculating its maintenance and operation levy, that is no greater than that which it utilized in tax year 1994, less the difference between the maximum levy rate permitted by section 33-802 2., Idaho Code, and four-tenths of one percent (.4%). As used herein, the term "property tax computation ratio" shall mean a ratio determined by dividing the district's certified property tax maintenance and operation budget by the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such values existed on December 31, 1993. Such maintenance and operation levy shall be based on the property tax computation ratio multiplied by the actual or adjusted market value for assessment purposes as such values existed on December 31 of the prior calendar year.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this act are hereby declared to be severable and if any provision of this act or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance is declared invalid for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this act.

SECTION 5. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full

force and effect on and after its passage and approval, and retroactively to January 1, 2006.".

### STATEMENT OF INTENT

Presented by Representative Stevenson

Since the defeat of House Bill 800, it was confirmed that Idaho Power Company voluntarily subordinated its hydropower water rights to Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 as part of the Swan Falls Water Right Agreement, dated October 25, 1984. Water Right Permit No. 01-7054 is for diversion of water from the Snake River above Milner in the amount of 1,200 c.f.s. and has a priority date of August 25, 1980. Water Right Permit No. 37-7842 is for diversion of 800 c.f.s. of water from the Big Wood and Little Wood Rivers and carries a priority date of August 25, 1980.

Today, the State of Idaho and Idaho Power Company entered into a Stipulation in which the Company expressly acknowledges that its hydropower water rights are subordinated to Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 and agrees to not oppose the exercise of these water rights on the basis of priority, the Swan Falls Agreement, or Idaho Code Sections 42-234, 42-4201 and 42-4201A. This Stipulation was filed today with the Idaho Department of Water Resources and will be memorialized in all of the affected water rights.

It is important to note that this Stipulation only resolves a portion of the dispute regarding the effect of the Swan Falls Agreement on recharge. The parties continue to disagree on whether Idaho Power Company voluntarily subordinated its hydropower water rights to aquifer recharge in excess of Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 as part of the Swan Falls Agreement and also on the effect of the 1994 Amendments to Idaho Code Sections 42-234 and 42-4201A. This Stipulation preserves the parties respective positions on these disputes, and

the parties have agreed through this Stipulation that such issues will be resolved through litigation, if necessary. This Stipulation expressly provides that neither this Stipulation nor Idaho Code Sections 42-234, 42-4201 or 42-4201A shall bar the litigation of any issues regarding the interpretation of the Swan Falls Agreement.

This Stipulation is a first step in unraveling the recharge dispute that exists between Idaho Power Company and the State. As responsible parties should, we have resolved those issues upon which we could agree and have agreed to submit to a court, if necessary, those issues upon which we could not agree.

### **STIPULATION**

April 11, 2006

The Idaho Power Company and the State of Idaho ("State") hereby stipulate and agree, by and through their respective undersigned counsel, as follows:

- Stipulation Regarding Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842: Recognizing that Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 are subject to the Swan Falls Settlement –
  - a) The Company agrees that its water rights are subordinated to water rights nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 pursuant to the terms of the Swan Falls Agreement and will neither contest nor otherwise oppose the exercise of those water rights on the basis of priority, the Swan Falls Agreement, or I.C. §§ 42-234, 42-4201 and 42-4201A. The Company further agrees that those water rights may be exercised in a manner consistent with state law.
  - b) The parties agree that all provisions of the Swan Falls Agreement and the implementing legislation shall continue to apply to Water Right Permit Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842, including I.C. §§ 61-539 and 61-540 for the benefit of Idaho Power Company.
  - c) The parties further agree that in the event that the Idaho Water Resource Board (IWRB) seeks to have said permits licensed or decreed, that the Company will not file a protest or objection in such proceedings, but that the State, in recognition of its obligations under the Swan Falls Agreement and state law, through the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR), will appropriately investigate such permits to ensure that they meet applicable requirements and that the licensed or decreed water rights fully comply with state law.
- 2) Further Proceedings Relating to the Swan Falls Agreement. The parties agree that in the event that there are disagreements or disputes between the parties as to the interpretation or application of the Swan Falls Agreement that they will endeavor to resolve those disagreements through informal discussions and negotiation. In the event that the parties are unable to resolve any such disagreements to their mutual satisfaction, either party, after notice to the other, may file a petition for declaratory relief with a court of appropriate jurisdiction to have the disagreement resolved and the Swan Falls Agreement interpreted and neither this Stipulation nor I.C. §§ 42-234, 42-4201, or 42-4201A shall act as a bar to the filing of such action.
- Request for Recognition of the Stipulation. The parties agree to submit this Stipulation in all administrative and judicial proceedings involving the recognition of Water Right Permit

- Nos. 01-7054 and 37-7842 and to jointly present affidavits and such other evidence as may be required for the recognition of the Stipulation.
- 4) <u>Defense of Stipulation.</u> The parties agree to jointly support and defend the terms of the Stipulation against any and all objections or other challenges that may arise against the terms of the Stipulation in any administrative or judicial proceeding.
- 5) <u>Stipulation Does Not Affect Statutory or Regulatory Authority.</u> The parties agree that nothing in this Stipulation shall be construed or interpreted to affect the authority of the State as provided by constitution, statute or regulation. Nor shall this Stipulation be construed or interpreted to affect the rights of any person not a party to the Stipulation.
- 6) Stipulation Not to be Used Against Parties. Except as provided herein, neither party by entry into this Stipulation waives any legal position or arguments it may have regarding any legal disputes that may exist between the parties. Nothing in this Stipulation shall be construed as an admission against interest or tendered or used as evidence to support or oppose any party's claims or objections in any administrative or judicial proceeding, other than those seeking approval of the Stipulation, for interpretation, enforcement or administration of this Stipulation or for a purpose contemplated by Idaho Rule of Evidence 408.
- Stipulation is Binding. The terms of this Stipulation shall bind and inure to the benefit of the respective successors of the parties.
- 8) <u>Mutual Covenants of Authority.</u> The parties represent and acknowledge that each of the undersigned is authorized to execute this Stipulation on behalf of the party they represent.
- 9) Non-Severability. The provisions of this Stipulation are not severable.

10) <u>Triplicate Originals.</u> This Stipulation is executed in triplicate.

Each of the three Stipulations with an original signature of each party shall be an original.

The parties have executed this Stipulation on the date following their respective signatures.
