

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Honorable Justices and Judges, my fellow constitutional officers, distinguished legislators and members of my Cabinet, honored guests, friends, my family and our First Lady my fellow Idahoans.

Allow me first to comment briefly on two men who were with us here throughout the first eight years of my tenure in this office - Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna and Secretary of State Ben Ysursa.

During my time in government I have seldom been privileged to work so closely with two individuals more devoted to the public interest or more motivated by the better angels of public service than Tom and Ben.

Please join me now in an appreciation of their work, their legacy, and their friendship.

To our newly elected legislators and constitutional officers, congratulations and welcome. I applaud your willingness to serve. I respect and appreciate your civic virtue. And I encourage your attention, patience and commitment to the processes and purposes of our State government.

Like you, I am beginning a new term in office. It is an honor and a privilege to have once again garnered the support and confidence of the citizens of Idaho.

Like you, I take that responsibility very seriously. And I know that public confidence must be earned anew every day. So let us begin our work together unfettered by cynicism or mistrust, and with a sure understanding of our limitations as well as our potential.

With you, I look forward to advancing the interests of the people we serve.

With you, I am committed to continuing our efforts to make Idaho what America was meant to be.

Ladies and gentlemen, we are blessed to live in interesting times. There is unrest and uncertainty all around us. But that's nothing new to the human experience.

There has never been a shortage of issues upon which well-intentioned people could earnestly and actively disagree in any free and dynamic society.

We also are blessed to live in a nation and a state where there is an orderly, responsible, citizen-driven process for sorting out and addressing those issues. Our process is not designed to satisfy everyone. Nothing ever can. But it is designed to do more than stimulate public discussion and debate.

Ultimately, it must inspire resolution and progress - however imperfect or incomplete.

That is the lodestar on which we must find our way forward in the days ahead.

Unfortunately, that has not been a hallmark of our national government in recent years.

From immigration to energy and from environmental protection to budgeting, there is neither rhyme nor reason to how the federal government does - or does not - do its job.

I ran for Governor in 2006 because my six years in Congress taught me that the states are where our Republic must meet today's challenges and prepare for those that lay ahead.

That is just as true today, and even more apparent. So I am more determined than ever for Idaho to embrace that opportunity.

It will mean setting an example of both fiscal responsibility and policy vision, especially on those issues that are fundamental to our future prosperity, consistent with the proper role of government and aligned with our Idaho values. That will require all of us working together rather than at cross-purposes.

We must not allow ourselves to emulate the federal government's politics of division, procrastination and misdirection for which we all are paying the price.

In some cases and on some issues, we already have put off making some tough decisions for too long. That cannot and must not continue. Today, I will outline some issues on which I believe we must act - not in careless haste but with all appropriate dispatch.

Perhaps the most important message I want to leave with you today is simply this: Idaho Learns.

We learned the value of being more frugal and accountable with taxpayer resources during the Great Recession. We learned the value of preparation and consensus building during our discussions concerning transportation funding. We learned the value of process and inclusion during our efforts to improve education.

And we have learned that even the best intentions and plans must be carried out with equal attention to detail and public perceptions from our contract experience with the Idaho Education Network.

Idaho Learns.

And those lessons run deep.

As a result of our experiences we move forward more confident in our abilities, more certain in our goals, and better prepared for the challenges before us. Future generations will benefit from our efforts to apply these lessons today.

I am not here to offer panaceas or to insist that your deliberations proceed in a particular direction - we are after all separate but equal branches of State government.

Instead, I am here to offer my view of what our state priorities should be and where our resources can be most effectively used in the public interest.

That list begins with education.

Last year in this chamber I laid out a five-year plan for sustainably and responsibly investing in our public schools.

I greatly appreciate your support for achieving those goals and I encourage your continuing help in seeing this process through as we welcome new Superintendent of Public Instruction Sherri Ybarra.

In Idaho, public schools are the most fundamentally proper role of government. They are essential to the health of our families, our communities and our economy. In addition to the choices that parents are afforded with home schooling, charter schools and private schools, world-class public schools can set the bar for higher individual achievement. They are the key to our prosperity and Idaho's competitiveness in the global marketplace.

As you know, our school improvement plan is based on the recommendations of my broad-based, bipartisan Education Task Force, which was led and facilitated by the State Board of Education. The goal of its recommendations is to build a public school system that is focused on student outcomes, responsive to local needs, respectful of the role of classroom teachers, and more accountable to parents, patrons and taxpayers.

The Fiscal Year 2016 Executive Budget recommendation I am submitting to you today provides more funding for teacher training and professional development, and a significant infusion of money for teacher compensation under the new tiered licensure and career ladder proposed by the State Board of Education.

To support continuous improvement, my recommendation provides additional funding to help local school districts conduct planning on how best to improve the education of our children every year.

In addition, I'm calling for another \$20 million in discretionary operating funds for local schools in fiscal 2016.

My recommendation also includes funding to provide more career and college counseling for students. As we implement our K-through-Career goals I want students and parents to have the best information available in making important decisions about courses, programs and post-secondary opportunities that will give them a leg up toward success in the workforce.

My total General Fund budget request for the coming year represents a 5.2-percent increase.

But my proposal for public schools calls for 7.4 percent more funding. That's almost \$60 million more than we allocated for schools before the Great Recession began in fiscal year 2009.

Beyond the numbers, I'm also calling on the State Board of Education and our education partners to work together to develop a comprehensive plan for improving literacy and reading proficiency. Reading at grade level by the end of third grade is a major foundation for a student's education. It enables their success in every other subject area. We absolutely must prepare our students by doing more to achieve this critical benchmark. Anything less is simply unacceptable.

My hope while you consider this request is that we work together to continue assessing the impact of the current year's investments and seek to advance those policies and processes that work best for Idaho students.

We know that one of our initiatives to improve the quality and equity of the public school experience for our students is the Idaho Education Network.

It enables students in Salmon and Montpelier to get the same kind of advanced instruction as those in Sandpoint and Meridian. It enables Idaho to overcome our geographic and socioeconomic barriers. It allows us to realize the kind of opportunities for enlightenment and progress that not long ago were available only in our largest and most connected communities.

The kind and quality of courses and the level of instruction provided by the IEN truly is staggering. I believe its value is beyond question. The IEN is an asset that must be maintained. The challenges in continuing this world-class educational tool can and should be overcome.

I am committed to fulfilling the vision and promise of the IEN, which will start with rebidding the contracts involved, but also includes a strong recommendation for full funding of IEN operations in fiscal 2016 to ensure the service is continued for Idaho students.

One of the benefits of the Idaho Education Network continues to be the ability to bring college-level courses into high school classrooms throughout Idaho. That in turn helps ensure that more of our students are adequately prepared for the academic rigors of college life.

Our colleges and universities have been spending too much time, money and energy on remedial programs to bring Idaho high school graduates up to a post-secondary level of competence on such critical subjects as science, math and reading comprehension.

Many of our employers also are having trouble finding workers with the skills they need in an increasingly complex economy to enable those businesses to remain competitive.

And I'm not just talking about computer science, engineering and healthcare fields; we have businesses struggling to find enough well-trained and qualified welders, technicians and other trades positions. In fact, at current levels of economic growth we are going to be tens of thousands of employees short of industry demand for the skills and level of post-secondary training and education they need in the coming years.

That's why our efforts to better prepare students to be contributing members of society now extend beyond the old K-12 focus to a K-through-Career emphasis.

Education must not be allowed to end with high school.

We have a responsibility to use our tax dollars more strategically and effectively - and to build and strengthen partnerships with employers - if we are to meet our goal of at least 60 percent of Idaho citizens between the ages of 25 and 34 having a post-secondary degree or professional certification by 2020.

Folks, that's just five years down the road. We have a lot of work to do to achieve this worthy goal.

Already the Board of Education and our higher education institutions are working more closely than ever with the Department of Labor, the Department of Commerce, Professional-Technical Education, Health and Welfare and local organizations to develop commonsense plans for meeting our workforce development needs.

That includes more pronounced, targeted and sustainable investments in such programs as the computer science initiative at Boise State University, an employee readiness initiative at the University of Idaho, career path internships at Idaho State University, and the Complete College Idaho program throughout our higher education system.

Those are amongst the top priorities at each of our schools, and I'm asking for your continuing support to help them succeed - to help US succeed in building a comprehensive system of education and workforce training opportunities so that Idaho Learns applies to all the citizens of our state. I'm also pleased to report some good news from the efforts of our Leadership in Nuclear Energy Commission or LINE Commission and the Center for Advanced Energy Studies—CAES As you will recall that group did an outstanding

Studies–CAES. As you will recall, that group did an outstanding job highlighting the strengths and capabilities of our National Lab - and one of their key recommendations focused on "regionalizing CAES" by including other state partners.

This past fall my good friend Governor Mead and the University of Wyoming agreed to join as equal partners in the CAES consortium of our state universities.

This is but the first step in a continuing effort to fulfill the promise of the INL and CAES.

Let me talk for just a moment now about something that you won't find in my budget recommendation. But I believe it has the potential to improve the lives and enhance the opportunities of many Idaho citizens. I believe that because we've already seen it happen right here in this valley.

In 2007, my first year as Governor, the Treasure Valley was one of the last metropolitan areas in America without a community college. That year the Legislature enacted my request to provide a State incentive of startup funding for any local jurisdictions where voters opt to establish a community college district. Ada and Canyon counties soon stepped up to the challenge and voted to establish the College of Western Idaho.

And what a tremendous success it's been. It's forever changed the way education is delivered here in Idaho's most populated area. It's hard to even imagine this valley now without CWI playing a significant role in our future.

Thanks to the incredible efforts of President Bert Glandon, the visionary leadership of the College of Western Idaho Board and collaboration with Boise State University and others, CWI joins as a full partner with the College of Southern Idaho and North Idaho College in fulfilling the promise of true "community" colleges.

They are providing affordable, accessible and responsive resources for both students and employers to meet their education and career-training goals.

Through them, Idaho Learns is taking on a broader definition.

Providing that opportunity for our citizens during the economic downturn was critically important to our recovery.

Now that we are rebounding, we find ourselves faced with growing demand and intensifying need for the services that community colleges are uniquely able to provide.

So today I challenge again the underserved communities of Idaho where no broad-based community college programs now exist to canvass their citizens and businesses on the value that can be added to their economic development and public enrichment efforts by establishing a community college district of the size and focus that will meet their local needs.

Those needs and my challenge for local leaders to address them will be part of the discussion in each town I visit to conduct Capital for a Day. We did it with CWI and we can do it again.

Preparing Idahoans for the workplace is the primary focus of the Idaho Department of Labor. It's not just about sending out unemployment checks.

And the experts at Labor and our other State agencies now have a clearer picture than ever of where our people will be working in the years ahead - if they are educated and trained to do the kinds of careers being created.

We now expect to outpace the national employment growth rate with 15,000 job opportunities a year being created for Idaho workers through 2022 - many of them in the healthcare and construction fields.

That's why Director Ken Edmunds and his team at Labor have developed a plan for retaining, recruiting and returning employees to Idaho to help meet the demand for skilled workers.

The idea behind the "Choose Idaho" initiative is to bridge the coming labor shortage by keeping Idaho's best and brightest right here at home, encouraging former Idahoans to come home, and welcoming people with new skills to our communities.

To help build on that effort, my budget recommendation for fiscal 2016 includes a transfer of \$5 million for Industry Sector Grants.

That will help build partnerships between industry and our education system to more effectively address a growing shortage of skilled and trained employees - a key element of our K-through-Career goals.

At the same time, I'm pleased that the Department of Labor was able to announce last month that Idaho's economic recovery and job growth will allow the unemployment insurance tax rate paid by Idaho businesses to fall for the third consecutive year this time by another 16.8 percent. That means tens of millions of dollars in savings that can help capitalize additional Idaho growth.

I appreciate your support over the years for reducing the tax burden on Idaho citizens. From increasing the grocery tax credit to lowering income tax rates and providing personal property tax relief, we are keeping almost \$157 million in the hands of Idaho taxpayers during 2015. And that will grow to more than \$169 million during the year that begins July 1 as our economy keeps expanding.

Director Jeff Sayer and his team at the Department of Commerce are working hand-in-glove with Education, Labor, Transportation, Agriculture, Health and Welfare and other State agencies to leverage market-driven economic growth into improving how employers see Idaho. Their goal is nothing less than to make Idaho a global leader in growth and prosperity.

And we have some great resources to help Accelerate Idaho, including the Tax Reimbursement Incentive or TRI that you approved last year. This performance-based tool is attracting great interest from businesses ready to create thousands of jobs and invest billions of dollars in Idaho's future.

Thank you for recognizing that Idaho Learns extends to the lessons from other states where government is mortgaging its future to up the ante on attracting new businesses.

By contrast, the TRI requires employers to prove up their commitment to Idaho with jobs and capital investments before a dime of their tax payments are reimbursed. And most importantly, the TRI is getting just as much attention from our homegrown Idaho businesses looking to expand as it is from employers outside Idaho looking for a better place to achieve their goals.

One of the most crucial parts of making Idaho a better place to do business and create jobs is improving our infrastructure. My budget recommendation includes an additional \$3 million infusion for the Idaho Opportunity Fund at the Department of

A great example of the return on investment from our Opportunity Fund is Cives Steel. When one of the nation's largest steel fabricators was looking to expand west of the Mississippi River it found a home in Ucon, just north of Idaho Falls.

It landed there for a number of reasons, but one factor in particular helped seal the deal: Ucon was able to secure a \$400,000 Idaho Opportunity Fund grant to support infrastructure needed for the Cives operation. So far the employee-owned company has invested about \$10 million in facilities and equipment in Idaho. That figures to grow to about \$32 million as Cives creates more than 150 career opportunities in Bonneville County.

You know as well as I do that every Idaho community that's been passed over by a new or growing employer understands the value of those grants. But they only help address a small fraction of our statewide infrastructure needs.

The biggest of the big-ticket items in our infrastructure inventory is our long-term, multibillion-dollar investment in Idaho's roads and bridges.

And if Idaho Learns means anything at all, it's time for us to address that elephant in the room.

Our own circumstances and the realities of our national government require us to seize the opportunity to become more self-reliant, to be the architects of our own destiny rather than the afterthoughts of a federal funding system that could be skewed to our disadvantage. There's a real possibility that Congress will try to pass a transportation funding bill in the coming year maybe as early as the spring.

A cold, hard assessment of the politics involved indicates that we run the risk of getting left in the lurch if that federal legislation changes the Highway Trust Fund formula so that we wind up paying in more than we're allotted for our needs in Idaho.

A survey last winter showed that most Idahoans believe our aging highways and bridges will need attention within ten years.

That's one benchmark to consider.

But the maintenance backlog we already have makes it even more important to figure out now how to pay for the hundreds of millions of dollars in improvements needed to protect Idaho lives and corridors of commerce.

Ladies and gentlemen, we know that after education, investing in infrastructure is among the smartest, most cost-effective and frankly essential uses of taxpayer dollars to promote the public's general welfare and sustain economic growth.

And that truth is being embraced by voters. It's interesting to note that roughly half of the survey respondents said transportation funding should be among the Legislature's top three priorities - even though most are satisfied with the condition of our roads and bridges right now.

They get it. Building and maintaining infrastructure is not an overnight proposition - whether it's highways, broadband connectivity, electric transmission lines or water treatment facilities. It takes planning and a commitment to sustainable long-term investment. We already have 785 state and local bridges in Idaho that are over 50 years old and considered structurally "deficient."

That number will grow to almost 900 bridges by 2019 even after completing work on the 68 for which we already have funding.

This isn't a matter of Hennie Penny telling us that the sky is falling. It's a real problem, but we know how to fix it if we have the resources. Major Idaho highway improvement projects since 2009 - mostly funded by GARVEE bonds and federal stimulus money - have reduced the accident rate on those routes by 35 percent and the death rate by 25 percent.

Under Director Brian Ness and Board Chairman Jerry Whitehead, the Idaho Transportation Department is making significant strides in efficiency and more effectively using limited highway resources. ITD has eliminated more than 100 full-time positions since 2013 alone by reducing layers of management. It now is recognized among the best-run transportation agencies in America.

I fully understand the misgivings of some about higher transportation costs.

But there is something to be said for the old adage about being "penny wise and pound foolish." In fact, every dollar we invest now in our roads and bridges will save motorists and taxpayers \$6 to \$14 later.

Chairmen Brackett and Palmer, legislative leaders, I am not going to stand here and tell you how to swallow this elephant. That would be contrary to all we have learned about each other and the people we serve in recent years. But we all know it must be done. I welcome financially responsible legislation that addresses steady, ongoing and sustainable transportation infrastructure in Idaho; however, I will NOT entertain proposals aimed at competing for General Fund tax dollars with education and our other required public programs or services.

That raises the question of taxation.

So allow me to reflect for just a moment on our Idaho tax system and its conformance with the basic tenets of equity, certainty and simplicity. By that I mean taxation must be fair in its policy and administration across taxpayer classifications; it must be predictable so that taxpayers can plan and prepare as they conduct their business and personal affairs; and it must be understandable so that taxpayers have a fighting chance of making sense of the tax code and its impact on them.

As it stands today, Idaho unfortunately has become a confusing hodgepodge of taxing authorities. That undermines public confidence that those who collect the tax are accountable to citizens for how the revenue is used. With that and the benchmarks of equity, certainty and simplicity in mind, I'm asking for your help today in ensuring that over the coming four years we can make Idaho's tax system one of the best in the nation.

I believe that work should start now by enacting the recommendations from the task force I assembled last year to consider improvements to how the Idaho State Tax Commission operates. Those recommendations are aimed at improving the efficiency, accountability and transparency of our revenue operations. That includes refining the role of the Commission itself with the addition of a director over day-to-day agency business.

By now most of you know that I would like to see us further reduce the marginal rates for Idaho's individual and corporate income tax below 7 percent from their current 7.4 percent, as well as the complete elimination of the personal property tax. To that end, my budget recommendation sets aside the first year of a five year approach to reduce our income tax brackets from 7.4 percent to 6.9 percent.

This effort will provide relief to 44 percent of taxpayers this year and up to 51 percent of taxpayers by 2018.

I also believe the time has come for Idaho to prepare for a potential change in federal law to address the issue of tax equity. It's called the Marketplace Fairness Act.

As many of you know, that legislation now before Congress would clarify the legal authority of states like Idaho to impose and enforce a sales tax on interstate purchases of goods online.

Not only is this a fundamental matter of fairness for those brick-and-mortar businesses in our communities. It also is a matter of securing our own long-term prosperity.

Simply put, every dollar of sales tax from online purchases that goes uncollected is the better part of a dollar that is NOT going to support the necessary and proper roles of our State government - especially meeting the education and infrastructure needs of our growing economy.

Congress has yet to act. But the legislation has support from within our own Idaho delegation.

On the topic of Congress, I believe the chances now have improved - if only marginally - to repeal or more likely make incremental changes to Obamacare that would have a real impact here in Idaho.

I have studied the recommendations of my Medicaid Redesign Workgroup and agree with its findings - up to a point. I especially appreciate the Workgroup's strong focus on personal accountability, requiring co-payments, and managed care.

But more broadly, Idaho Learns should also apply to these findings and their experience. The Workgroup did its homework and deserves an opportunity to share what they have learned. I am asking you to hold hearings this session, listen to their findings, ask questions and educate yourselves on all the work they have done.

We worked together collaboratively and with great success on creating Your Health Idaho. After some initial trials, Idaho now is successfully running its own insurance exchange cheaper, more efficiently, with less staff and with better service than the national system that overpromised and profoundly under-delivered. That's because Your Health Idaho is locally run and utilizes insurance agents and brokers working in the free market.

In fact, the marketplace is the key to how Idaho is advancing our goal of making health care more affordable and accessible for all Idahoans.

Many people in this state have quietly gone about the business of putting Idaho at the forefront of the changing healthcare landscape.

By building public-private partnerships, Health and Welfare Director Dick Armstrong and the men and women who are working on the State Healthcare Innovation Plan are changing the way we pay for and deliver healthcare services - including Medicaid. Those who are working diligently in both the public and private sectors to improve healthcare outcomes in Idaho deserve our sincere thanks.

My thanks also go to the Legislature and those advocates who are enabling us to more aggressively address the local challenges of behavioral health. Less than a month ago I was in Idaho Falls to cut the ribbon on Idaho's first Behavioral Health Crisis Center, where people with mental health or substance abuse problems can get short-term help without going to a hospital emergency room or a jail cell.

It's an important part of the broader improvements needed in our community-based services. We know that best practices across the country show that such local facilities reduce law enforcement and hospital-related costs while providing more sustainable support and better access for vulnerable citizens. That's why I once again am requesting funds for an additional Behavioral Health Crisis Center in the coming year.

Another decision for which I'm proud of the Legislature, our courts and our Executive agencies is their unprecedented collaboration in enacting and now implementing the Justice Reinvestment Initiative or JRI.

This is an effort started two years ago by the good chairmen of our House and Senate Judiciary committees.

Last year's overwhelming legislative support for Senate Bill 1357 and hard work during the past year by our courts, Department of Correction and Commission of Pardons and Parole has resulted in an outstanding set of administrative rules for you to consider during this session.

They spell out in detail how we can improve public safety, reduce recidivism and lower the costs associated with locking up offenders by prioritizing and refining our post-release supervision efforts with swift, certain and graduated sanctions.

I appreciate your continuing support as our Justice Reinvestment efforts move from careful planning to effective on-the-ground implementation.

I hope you will consider it equally important to continue our work toward addressing the very real challenge we face in our public defense system.

The courts have made it clear that our current method of providing legal counsel for indigent criminal defendants does not pass constitutional muster.

This is a priority for our counties so it also must be a priority for us. If we value the ideals embodied in the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Eighth amendments to the U.S. Constitution, then it is undeniably our responsibility to take the phrase "due process of law" as seriously as the Framers intended.

Which brings me to another constitutional issue - the defense of traditional marriage.

Last year we found ourselves in the position of defending an amendment to the Idaho Constitution approved by voters in 2006 and - I believe - truly representing both the intentions and the values of our citizens. It defines marriage between a man and a woman as the only "domestic legal union" valid in Idaho.

It is incumbent upon those of us sworn to uphold and defend our Constitution and to do so based on its content now - not on changing societal views since it was enacted or how any of us would write it today. I am hopeful that our recent request for the U.S. Supreme Court to review the issue will be accepted and that we can look forward to an outcome that affirms our Constitution.

It's unfortunate that so many of our differences with the national government wind up in court. But in the absence of any federal consensus on a multitude of issues, too often the courts become the last refuge both for public policy disputes and safeguarding our freedoms.

That may well be where such questions as protection of sage-grouse and siting of electricity transmission corridors end up. I hope not, and we are working hard with Idaho landowners, sportsmen, federal land managers and other stakeholders to find common ground through our administrative processes on those issues and others.

During the past year we completed the historic Snake River Basin Adjudication process. The largest single-stream adjudication in U.S. history took 27 years and covered water rights on about 87 percent of Idaho's land area. We advanced our efforts to similarly adjudicate all northern Idaho water claims. And we made great progress on our efforts to preserve, recharge and more sustainably manage our water throughout the state.

In addition and with gratitude for your help and support, I'm proud to announce that there now are five Rangeland Fire Protection Associations throughout Idaho. They are organized and prepared to launch initial attacks when wildfire threatens any of more than 3.5 million acres of state, private and BLM rangeland in our state.

Ladies and gentlemen, look high above you. Within this magnificent chamber so beautifully renovated just a few years ago, you see an Idaho sky through a vaulted dome of glass. This chamber, this building, this body has all the room that anyone could need to accommodate the biggest, loftiest and most meaningful ideas and actions.

In fact I would measure that the entire church used in the summer of 1787 to create this great Republic would but fill this chamber.

So as you begin your deliberations today, don't limit yourselves.

Think big. Be bold. Act decisively. Reflect the Idaho values you were sent here to represent.

And as you consider the magnitude of the work ahead and how it will benefit the citizens we serve, keep looking up toward higher aspirations.

Keep looking up and apply what Idaho Learns so that our fondest hopes and best intentions will lead to a better tomorrow for future generations.

Join me in putting Idaho and our people first and foremost in your minds.

Good luck, Godspeed, and may God continue to bless America and the Great State of Idaho.

WHEREAS, an amendment to the United States Constitution does not require the President's approval and cannot be waived by a future Congress and President.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 2 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Caldera area of the Island Park region in eastern Idaho has been suggested as a potential national monument that could be established under the provisions of the 1906 Antiquities Act; and

WHEREAS, the current multiple use and private land protections policies governing the management of this area generally have served the interests of local residents; and

WHEREAS, cattle ranching and agriculture, the main economic drivers in this area, will be substantially impacted by any land management decisions regarding this landscape. Agriculture is the single biggest economic contributor to the State of Idaho. Idaho's farms and ranches represent 11.7 million acres in rural Idaho and the sales of farm and ranch projects contribute nearly \$7.6 billion to Idaho's economy. Ranching and farming play a substantial role in the state's heritage and identity and should be preserved; and

WHEREAS, a national monument designation affects land use by imposing restrictions on development, resource extraction and land swaps with resulting local impacts such as diminished economic possibilities and restrictions on access; and

WHEREAS, the designation suggestion was made without the use of any local collaborative process; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Roadless Rule, is Idaho's 2006 plan that provides a framework for use and protection for more than nine million acres of federal public backcountry. The rule is held to be a nationwide model of collaboration among groups and individuals with divergent interests and concerns. The Roadless Rule specifically prescribes protective management under the "Wildland/Recreation" theme. It is feared that utilization of the Antiquities Act would overturn the agreement reached in the formulation of the Idaho Roadless Rule with no effort to reach consensus through collaboration; and

WHEREAS, national monument designation would impact local wildlife managers as well as impact the right to hunt and fish in the area, a place where Idaho residents, families and visitors can enjoy these Idaho traditions; and

WHEREAS, in the November 2014 election, an advisory vote relating to the suggested national monument designation was taken in Fremont County, which contains the area of suggested designation. The results were that about 93 percent of the 3,798 voting opposed any such designation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we oppose any national monument designation in the Caldera area of the Island Park region in eastern Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED any efforts to reach decisions regarding lands of Idaho administered by federal agencies be made by local collaboration, rather than by unilateral administrative processes that exclude the residents of Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Interior, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

WHEREAS, in 1865 Matt Taylor, a Montana Trail freighter, built a toll bridge across a narrow black basaltic gorge of the Snake River that succeeded a ferry seven miles upstream by a few years; and

WHEREAS, Taylor's bridge served the new tide of westward migration and travel in the region for settlers moving north and west and for miners, freighters and others seeking riches in the gold fields of Idaho and Montana, especially the boom towns of Bannack and Virginia City in western Montana; and

WHEREAS, mail service postmarks indicate by 1866 the emerging town had become known as Eagle Rock, which was derived from an isolated basalt island in the Snake River, seven miles upstream in the Snake River that was the nesting site for eagles; and

WHEREAS, previous to Taylor's bridge, in 1864, Harry Rickets built and operated a ferry at this location and so this area of crossing at the Snake River was already known as Eagle Rock to those who did business or traveled on the Montana Trail. A private bank (the fourth in Idaho), a small hotel, a livery stable, and an eating house also sprang up near the bridge in 1865, along with the post office and stage station; and

WHEREAS, large-scale settlement ensued and in the next twenty-five years there appeared roads, bridges, dams and irrigation canals that brought much of the Upper Snake River Valley under cultivation and in 1887, following construction of the Oregon Short Line, most of the railroad facilities were removed to Pocatello where the new line branched off, but Eagle Rock was fast becoming the commercial center of an agricultural empire; and

WHEREAS, in 1891 the town voted to change its name to Idaho Falls in reference to rapids below the bridge. Some years later, construction of a retaining wall for a hydroelectric power plant enhanced the rapids into falls. In 1895 the largest irrigation canal in the world, the Great Feeder, began diverting water from the Snake River and aided in converting tens of thousands of acres of desert into green farmland in the vicinity of Idaho Falls; and

WHEREAS, the area grew sugar beets, potatoes, peas, grains, and alfalfa and became one of the most productive regions of the United States; and

WHEREAS, in 1949, the Atomic Energy Commission opened the National Reactor Testing Station in the desert west of the city. On December 20, 1951, a nuclear reactor produced useful electricity for the first time in history and there have been

more than fifty unique nuclear reactors built at the facility for testing, though all but three are shut down now; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho National Laboratory (INL), as it is now known, remains a major economic engine for the city of Idaho Falls, employing more than 8,000 people and functioning as an internationally renowned research center. INL operates and manages the world-famous Advanced Test Reactor (ATR); and

WHEREAS, Idaho Falls serves as a regional hub for health care, retail business, culture, tourism and recreation in eastern Idaho; and

WHEREAS, Idaho Falls was named by *Business Week* as one of the 2010 "Best Places to Raise Kids." In addition, Forbes.com selected Idaho Falls as one of the "2010 Best Small Places for Business & Careers" and Money.CNN.com included Idaho Falls as one of its "Top 100 Cities in 2010."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we honor and recognize the one hundred fiftieth anniversary of the building of the Eagle Rock bridge in 1865, the first bridge ever to span the Snake River and which started the settlement that would become the modern city of Idaho Falls.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Rebecca Casper, Mayor of the City of Idaho Falls.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3 BY EDUCATION COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF THE STATE'S ELEMENTARY, SECONDARY AND POSTSECONDARY LONGITUDINAL DATA SYSTEMS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-second Idaho Legislature passed the Student Data Accessibility, Transparency and Accountability Act of 2014 to ensure that student information is protected and expectations of privacy are honored; and

WHEREAS, in passing the Act, the Legislature acknowledged that student information is a vital resource for teachers and school staff in planning responsive education programs and services, scheduling students into appropriate classes and completing reports for educational agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature also affirmed that while student information is important for educational purposes, it is also critically important to ensure that student information is protected, safeguarded and kept private and used only by appropriate educational authorities and then, only to serve the best interests of the student; and WHEREAS, Idaho citizens have expressed concerns about the Act and whether implementation of its provisions do serve the best interests of the students; and

WHEREAS, the concerns expressed include the privacy and security policies and procedures required to be developed under the Act; the efficacy of the technology used to collect and report student data, and to interface with private and public entities; the costs associated with the data system; and the federal government's mandated student data collection and reporting requirements, which intrude upon Idaho's state sovereignty and student privacy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of the state's elementary, secondary and postsecondary longitudinal data systems including, but not necessarily limited to, determining: (1) which data points are necessary for tracking student academic progress; (2) which data points must be collected and reported at the aggregate level; (3) which data points should be personally identifiable and why; (4) the extent to which federal funding is contingent upon the collection and reporting of student data to the federal government and the cost to the state of declining such funding; and (5) recommendations on: (a) simplifying and minimizing the collection of student data without compromising essential evaluation of educational efficacy; (b) protecting student privacy by limiting the collection of personally identifiable data; and (c) the cost/benefit of declining federal funds to save local funds, protect privacy and maintain local control of education as they relate to data collection. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 5 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND RECOGNIZING AMERICAN DIABETES MONTH IN NOVEMBER AND SUPPORTING THE GOALS AND IDEALS OF AMERICAN DIABETES MONTH.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, an estimated 100,000 Idaho adults or 8.4% of the adult population live with diabetes; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 84,000 Idaho adults or 7.5% of the adult population live with prediabetes; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 1,500 mothers in Idaho, or 8% of mothers annually, live with gestational diabetes during pregnancy; and

WHEREAS, diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, about one-third of Idaho adults living with diabetes do not know they have the disease; and

WHEREAS, the direct medical cost of diagnosed cases of diabetes in Idaho is estimated at more than \$172 million annually; and

WHEREAS, improperly managed diabetes often leads to costly diabetes-related complications; and

WHEREAS, once identified, these diabetes-related complications have a tremendous impact and exact a substantial toll on Idaho's Medicaid program and on Idaho health insurers; and

WHEREAS, with affordable access to appropriate medications, supplies and services, patients' lives are improved by a reduced risk of diabetes-related complications, including a decreased risk of heart disease, lower-extremity amputation rates, fewer cases of blindness, reduced need for additional costly medical interventions, and fewer emergency room visits and hospitalizations; and

WHEREAS, most diabetes can be prevented or delayed if a range of risk factors is eliminated, particularly physical inactivity, unhealthy diets, tobacco use and alcohol misuse; and

WHEREAS, numerous studies demonstrate that diabetes treatments and therapies improve diabetes control and reduce the incidence of complications due to diabetes, while significantly reducing the costs to public and private health insurance programs; and

WHEREAS, with affordable access to evidence-based, community-based diabetes prevention programs, several large randomized controlled clinical trials have proven conclusively that many people with prediabetes can prevent or significantly delay the onset of type 2 diabetes; and

WHEREAS, with proper management and treatment, individuals with diabetes live healthy, productive lives; and

WHEREAS, collaboration between diabetes educators in accredited and recognized programs and the patients continues to demonstrate positive clinical quality outcomes and cost savings; and

WHEREAS, repeated Diabetes Self-Management Education encounters over time result in a dose-response effect on positive outcomes; and WHEREAS, the Idaho Diabetes Prevention and Control Program works with the Diabetes Alliance of Idaho and partners across health care and public health to raise awareness of prediabetes, help improve the quality of care for people with diabetes, and promote diabetes prevention and self-management education; and

WHEREAS, individuals in the United States celebrate American Diabetes Month in November.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we support the goals and ideals of American Diabetes Month, including encouraging individuals in the United States to fight diabetes through public awareness of prevention and treatment options; and enhancing diabetes education; and we recognize the importance of early detection, awareness of the symptoms, and understanding the risk factors of diabetes, including being over the age of forty-five; having a specific racial and ethnic background; being overweight; having a low level of physical activity; having high blood pressure; and having a family history of diabetes or a history of diabetes during pregnancy; and we support decreasing the prevalence of type 1, type 2, and gestational diabetes in Idaho and the United States through increased research, treatment and prevention.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that people with diabetes, their families and friends and health care professionals in Idaho be urged to utilize the month of November to increase awareness and understanding of diabetes so that in the future, people with diabetes will be better able to care for their own needs and others will be better prepared to serve the needs of people with diabetes.

WHEREAS, an Idaho interim legislative committee recommends state officials work cooperatively and collaboratively with federal land managers to resolve public land conflicts; and

WHEREAS, that committee is not recommending litigation concerning the transfer of public lands at this time; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho values its public lands and the outdoor recreation opportunities those lands provide to all Americans; and

WHEREAS, Outdoor Retailer's present contract ends in 2016; and

WHEREAS, Outdoor Retailer would bring \$40 million to Idaho's economy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature invites Outdoor Retailer to host its biannual shows in Idaho.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the First Regular Session of the Sixty-second Idaho Legislature adopted House Concurrent Resolution No. 31, which authorized the appointment of a committee to undertake and complete a two-year study of natural resource issues, including issues relating to water, throughout the State of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the committee's official term expired on November 30, 2014, and numerous natural resource-related issues continue to pose concerns for the future of Idaho and the quality of life our citizens enjoy; and

WHEREAS, issues of continued concern include, but are not limited to, stabilization of the water distribution system, the status of aquifers throughout the state and wildlife.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a two-year committee to undertake and complete a study of natural resource issues of importance to the State of Idaho. The committee shall consist of ten legislators, with five from the Senate and five from the House of Representatives. The Legislative Council shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Council is authorized to also appoint ad hoc legislative members to serve on the committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cochairmen of the committee are authorized to appoint advisors with technical expertise in the water supply arena and are expected to receive input from stakeholders in the water rights system of Idaho to attempt to stabilize the water delivery system in this state.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any advisors to the committee who are not legislative members shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations and proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall make a progress report to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature and shall make a report detailing its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 3 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE UNITED STATES AMBASSADOR TO THE REPUBLIC OF TURKEY, THE AMBASSADOR OF THE REPUBLIC OF TURKEY TO THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, The Orthodox Christian Church, in existence for nearly 2,000 years, numbers approximately 300 million members worldwide with more than two million members in the United States; and

WHEREAS, since 1453, the continuing presence of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in Turkey has been a living testament to the religious coexistence of Christians and Muslims; and

WHEREAS, this religious coexistence is in doubt because the Ecumenical Patriarchate is considered a minority religion by the Turkish government; and

WHEREAS, there were millions of Orthodox Christians living in Turkey at the turn of the 20th century and there remain fewer than 3,000 of the Ecumenical Patriarch's flock in Turkey today; and

WHEREAS, Orthodox Christians in Idaho and throughout the United States stand to lose their spiritual leader; and

WHEREAS, where there have been difficulties in the past with the relationship of the Orthodox Christian Church and the Turkish government, certain recent actions by the Turkish government suggest an interest in improving its relationship with and treatment of the Orthodox Christian Church, which actions are acknowledged and welcomed; and

WHEREAS, the people of Idaho desire to encourage the continued dialogue and communication of the leadership of the Turkish government and the Orthodox Christian Church, as demonstrated by recent high-level meetings between Turkish officials and the Ecumenical Patriarchate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge the government of Turkey to: uphold and safeguard religious and human rights of all its citizens without compromise; grant the Ecumenical Patriarch appropriate international recognition, ecclesiastical succession, and the right to train clergy of all nationalities; and respect the property rights and human rights of the Ecumenical Patriarchate and all religious and faith traditions.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 4 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the opening words to the Constitution of the United States, "We the People," are by deliberate design and with intent to define the governing authority of our United States and the states within our republic and the authority that resides with the people; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Idaho on November 7, 2006, cast their votes on a proposal referred by the Idaho Legislature to amend the Constitution of the State of Idaho to define marriage, and the amendment passed with a wide majority; and

WHEREAS, in 1888, the Supreme Court of the United States stated that marriage is "an institution, in the maintenance of which in its purity the public is deeply interested, for it is the foundation of the family and of society, without which there would be neither civilization nor progress"; and

WHEREAS, in 1942, the Supreme Court of the United States stated that marriage is "fundamental to the very existence and survival of the race"; and

WHEREAS, Luther Martin, framer of the Constitution of the United States and Attorney General of Maryland, stated, "A knowledge of Mankind, and of Legislative affairs cannot be presumed to belong in a higher degree to the Judges than to the Legislature"; and

WHEREAS, the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit recognizes that the Constitution of the United States does not demand that a redefinition of marriage be forced upon the states, stating, "What we are left with is this: By creating a status (marriage) and by subsidizing it (e.g., with tax-filing privileges and deductions), the States created an incentive for two people who procreate together to stay together for purposes of rearing offspring. That does not convict the States of irrationality, only of awareness of the biological reality that couples of the same sex do not have children in the same way as couples of opposite sexes and that couples of the same sex do not run the risk of unintended offspring. That explanation, still relevant today, suffices to allow the States to retain authority over an issue they have regulated from the beginning."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we call upon the United States Congress to bring clarity to the principle that the role of the United States judiciary is to interpret as close to original intent as possible and rule on compliance with the original intent of the Constitution by the executive and legislative branches and the principle that judges of the United States judiciary should keep their oath of office to uphold the law and not make or change the law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a judge of the United States judiciary who disregards his oath of office to uphold the Constitution should be impeached by Congress.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 5 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Boulder-White Clouds area of Central Idaho has been suggested as a potential national monument that could be established under the provisions of the Antiquities Act of 1906; and

WHEREAS, the current multiple use and private land protection policies governing the management of this area generally have served the interests of local residents; and

WHEREAS, cattle ranching and agriculture, the main economic drivers in Central Idaho, will be substantially impacted by any land management decisions regarding this landscape. Agriculture is the single biggest economic contributor to the state. Idaho's farms and ranches represent 11.7 million acres in rural Idaho and the sales of farm and ranch products contribute nearly \$7.6 billion to Idaho's economy. Ranching and farming play a substantial role in the state's heritage and identity and should be preserved; and

WHEREAS, the 2006 Idaho Roadless Rule has proven to be a model for coordination among groups and individuals to resolve issues surrounding the management of 9.3 million acres of undeveloped national forestlands, providing protection for unique and sensitive areas, while simultaneously allowing for limited road construction, vegetation management and minerals development; and

WHEREAS, there has been no local collaborative process coordinated by the administration in association with the designation; and

WHEREAS, Custer County is the place most impacted by the creation of the Boulder-White Clouds National Monument and the people of Custer County were given the opportunity to vote for or against the creation of the national monument. Sixty-five percent of registered voters came to the polls in the 2014 midterm election, and of those ninety-five percent voted against the creation of a national monument solely by exercising the authority of the Antiquities Act of 1906, in part, because it precludes the collaborative process, and there has been no assurance from the administration that a collaborative process would be exercised; and WHEREAS, a national monument designation would impact local wildlife management as well as hunting, fishing and other recreational opportunities in Central Idaho, a place where Idaho residents, families and visitors can enjoy these Idaho traditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that it is understood that the President of the United States has full authority under the Antiquities Act of 1906 to designate the Boulder-White Clouds as a national monument. However, there should be a collaborative effort to secure local and state support prior to the exercise of that presidential authority. Any effort to reach a decision regarding lands of Idaho administered by federal agencies should be made with local collaboration rather than by unilateral administrative processes that exclude the citizens of Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

WHEREAS, the Legislature is vested with authority to reject executive agency rules under the provisions of Section 67-5291, Idaho Code, in the event that the Legislature finds that the rules are not consistent with legislative intent; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the Legislature that a certain rule docket of the Office of the Governor relating to the Idaho Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired is not consistent with legislative intent and should be rejected.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that IDAPA 15.02.02, Office of the Governor, Rules Governing the Idaho Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, adopted as a pending rule under Docket Number 15-0202-1401, the entire rulemaking docket, be, and the same is hereby rejected and declared null, void and of no force and effect.

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF ENDOWMENT ASSET ISSUES OF IMPORTANCE TO THE STATE OF IDAHO AND TO MONITOR IMPLEMENTATION OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CALLAN REPORT.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, an Endowment Asset Issues Interim Committee was appointed during the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-second Idaho Legislature to study issues related to action by the Idaho Board of Land Commissioners, the Idaho Department of Lands and the Endowment Fund Investment Board affecting the State of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, issues related to endowment assets continue to arise and pose challenges, opportunities and concerns for the future of Idaho and its citizens' quality of life; and

WHEREAS, Callan Associates was retained by the Land Board in May of 2014 to review the findings and

recommendations of the Land Board's subcommittee on endowment governance, to identify any governance shortcomings and make recommendations for improvements, to look at policies and procedures and to conduct an asset allocation study that combined land assets with financial assets; and

WHEREAS, on November 14, 2014, representatives of Callan Associates appeared before the Endowment Asset Issues Interim Committee and reported their findings and recommendations as reflected in its report dated November 7, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the interim committee voted to endorse the Callan Report, findings and recommendations; and

WHEREAS, full implementation of the recommendations in the Callan Report will require action by the Land Board, the Endowment Fund Investment Board, the Idaho Department of Lands and the Legislature over an extended period of years; and

WHEREAS, the interim committee also voted unanimously to request that the Legislative Council appoint another Endowment Asset Issues Interim Committee to continue the work of the interim committee and to monitor implementation of the recommendations of the Callan Report.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a two-year interim committee to continue to undertake and complete a study of endowment asset issues of importance to the State of Idaho and to monitor implementation of the recommendations of the Callan Report of November 7, 2014. The committee will consist of ten legislators, with five from the House of Representatives and five from the Senate, with no less than one legislator from each of the House and Senate minority caucuses. The Legislative Council shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Council is authorized to also appoint ad hoc legislative members to serve on the committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cochairmen of the committee are authorized to appoint advisors with technical expertise in the governance, management, operation, disposal, preservation and financial performance of endowment assets.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any advisors to the committee who are not legislative members shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 6 BY AGRICULTURAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, for purposes of this House Joint Memorial, the term "genetically engineered" (GE) is used; although the terms biogenetic organism (BIO), genetically modified organism (GMO) and genetically engineered (GE) are often used interchangeably; and

WHEREAS, foods produced with GE ingredients are as safe to eat and grow as foods produced without GE ingredients as found by many of the most influential regulatory agencies and organizations in the world that study the safety of food products, including the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, the American Medical Association, the World Health Organization, Health Canada, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the National Academy of Sciences, United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization and the European Food Safety Authority; and

WHEREAS, GE technology adds desirable traits from nature, establishing the potential for nutritional, health, agronomic and environmental benefits; and

WHEREAS, genetic modification of crops has existed since man began cultivating crops for food and GE technology has been safely used to produce food products for the past 25 years; and

WHEREAS, roughly 70% to 80% of the foods consumed in the United States, both at home and away from home, contain GE ingredients or are genetically engineered as a whole product; and

WHEREAS, GE crops are produced on a sustainable basis, using less water, providing more yield per acre, reducing carbon footprints and adapting rapidly to disease pressures for long-term sustainable production of an adequate, wholesome and economical food supply; and

WHEREAS, a patchwork of local and state mandatory labeling laws and regulations will force costly changes to manufacturing, labeling, warehousing, inventory and distribution channels. Manufacturers and retailers will have to make immediate and consequential changes to their businesses to comply with new labeling requirements. Testing to determine if products are exempt, relabeling or reformulating products with specially handled, higher-priced ingredients, and having separate production runs, state-specific tracking units (SKUs), segregated warehousing, trucking and other logistical complexities would all result in higher food prices; and

WHEREAS, a national solution is needed that will protect consumers by eliminating confusion and advancing food safety and that will allow for the free trade of commerce among the states; and

WHEREAS, a national solution will eliminate the confusion and uncertainty of a 50-state patchwork of GE safety and labeling laws and affirm the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) as the nation's authority for the use and labeling of genetically modified food ingredients; and

WHEREAS, a national solution will require the FDA to conduct a safety review of all new GE traits before they are introduced into commerce. The FDA will be empowered to mandate the labeling of GE food ingredients if the agency determines there is a health, safety or nutrition issue with GE technology; and

WHEREAS, a national solution will inform consumers by the FDA establishing federal standards for companies that want to voluntarily label their product for the absence or presence of GE food ingredients so that consumers clearly understand their choices in the marketplace; and

WHEREAS, a national solution will provide consistency in that the FDA will define the term "natural" for its use on food and beverage products so that food and beverage companies and consumers have a consistent legal framework that will guide food labels and inform consumer choice.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Congress of the United States enact bipartisan legislation that reaffirms the FDA as the primary authority in uniform food labeling related to genetic engineering, based on scientific standards regarding health, safety and nutrition.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that existing FDA labeling rules and guidance, as well as the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Organic Program, provide sufficient standards to address consumer interest in food production practices through the use of truthful and non-misleading voluntary labeling. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Commissioner of the FDA adopt policies, regulations and rules setting standards to address consumer interest in food production practices through voluntary labeling.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States and to the Commissioner of the FDA.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 7 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES AND TO THE SECRETARY OF ENERGY OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, at the direction of the United States government, since 1949 the Idaho National Laboratory (INL) has been a research and technology leader and has made key contributions in energy research, development, demonstration and deployment; and

WHEREAS, INL's strategic location within today's Western Inland Energy Corridor enables its researchers to most effectively and efficiently identify, assess and integrate the region's unmatched wind, biomass, hydropower, geothermal, conventional and unconventional fossil and uranium resources; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Idaho and the United States to increase energy self-sufficiency and supply

diversity, while moderating the environmental impacts of energy exploration, production, distribution and end use; and

WHEREAS, conventional geothermal power plants, such as Raft River in Cassia County, are located in favorable geothermal regions where high-temperature groundwater is accessible in the relatively shallow subsurface and coincides with naturally occurring high-permeability pathways; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's high-temperature gradients, abundant groundwater and favorable seismic conditions in the Eastern Snake River Plain make it an ideal location to develop enhanced geothermal system technologies and techniques to access resources in the high heat zones of deeper, low-permeability geologic formations; potentially creating a breakthrough for geothermal in the region and the nation; and

WHEREAS, a dedicated and nationally recognized, multi-institutional scientific team, known as the Snake River Geothermal Consortium, has been assembled to lead this effort; and

WHEREAS, successful research and development of enhanced geothermal systems will lead to commercialization of this technology to provide baseload electricity production, jobs and significant investment in the region.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature supports Idaho's hosting of an enhanced geothermal system test site and encourages the Department of Energy, the Administration and Congress to join Idaho in exploring the favorable geologic conditions of the Geothermal Resource Research Area on the western edge of INL.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature respectfully requests that the Department of Energy, the Administration and Congress join Idaho in recognizing Idaho National Laboratory's research and technology development leadership and recommending establishment of a field laboratory at Idaho National Laboratory to develop enhanced geothermal system production.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 8 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF CONGRESS, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho is examining methods of providing more efficient and productive means of freight transport; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho State Legislature created a 10-year pilot project in 2003 to allow vehicle combinations weighing up to 129,000 pounds on designated routes within the state highway system to test the impacts of such vehicles on bridges, roadways and highway safety; and

WHEREAS, in its 2013 final report on the results of the pilot project to the Idaho State Legislature, the Idaho Transportation Department concluded that there were no negative impacts to highway safety, pavement or bridges as a result of 129,000-pound vehicles using the state highway system; and

WHEREAS, to date, as a result of this pilot project and subsequent designation of additional routes allowing 129,000-pound vehicles to use the state highway system, Idaho has realized additional substantial economic benefits resulting from the utilization of these routes; and

WHEREAS, current federal law precludes the State of Idaho from designating any portion of the federal Interstate highway system in Idaho to allow vehicle combinations weighing up to 129,000 pounds; and

WHEREAS, interconnecting the designated routes on the state highway system with the federal Interstate highway system in Idaho will provide substantial additional economic benefits; and

WHEREAS, due to its configuration, the federal Interstate highway system in Idaho allows vehicles to operate more safely than on the state highway system, thus further enhancing highway safety; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's neighboring states of Montana, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming have higher load limits on their federal highways due to grandfathered rights, thus putting Idaho at a distinct competitive disadvantage and slowing the free flow of freight between neighboring states; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho congressional delegation has introduced legislation in the present Congress providing legal authority to the State of Idaho to determine whether to allow vehicles weighing up to 129,000 pounds on the federal Interstate highway system in Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge and petition the Congress of the United States to enact the pending legislation introduced by the Idaho congressional delegation providing legal authority to the State of Idaho to determine whether to allow 129,000-pound vehicles on the federal Interstate highway system in Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 15 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND CELEBRATING THE ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF STATEHOOD FOR THE STATE OF IDAHO. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, political maneuverings finally resulted in the creation of the Territory of Idaho on March 4, 1863, with its western border along Oregon and Washington unchanged today; however, it encompassed all of Montana and most of Wyoming in an area larger than the state of Texas. The three mining regions of this enormous territory were hundreds of miles from each other and separated by great mountain ranges. As a result, Montana territory was stripped off with its present boundaries in 1864 and, when the Territory of Wyoming was created in 1868, Idaho's present boundaries were permanently fixed; and

WHEREAS, on July 3, 1890, Idaho became the nation's 43rd state when President Benjamin Harrison signed the Idaho Admission Act; and

WHEREAS, Idaho convened a Constitutional Convention on July 4, 1889, to adopt a State Constitution later ratified by the people of our great Gem State; and

WHEREAS, on July 3, 2015, Idaho will celebrate its one hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of statehood; and

WHEREAS, the people of Idaho share an abiding pride in the state's pioneer heritage, and the one hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of Idaho's admission to the Union offers all Idahoans an opportunity to renew that spirit of independence and self-reliance as we look to the future; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's 82,413 square miles vary geographically from high desert in the south to beautiful forests and rugged mountains in the north; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's state seal was designed by a woman, Emma Edwards Green, and adopted in 1907; Idaho is the No. 1 national producer of potatoes, trout, Austrian winter peas and lentils; Idaho's Hells Canyon is the deepest river gorge in North America, deeper than the Grand Canyon; Sun Valley was created in 1936 as America's first destination ski resort; and Idaho's Morley Nelson Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area is home to the world's most dense population of nesting eagles, hawks and falcons; and

WHEREAS, with over one million acres of wilderness area, Idaho has more wilderness than any other state in the lower 48 states, with many national forests that are great for fishing, hiking and hunting, and its backcountry is filled with mountain trails for backpacking and exploring wildlife; and

WHEREAS, the Salmon River, internationally known, bisects the rugged Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness and provides some of the best whitewater kayaking and rafting in the world; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is one of only two places in the world where star garnets can be found in any significant quantity, the other being India; and

WHEREAS, the network of dams and locks on the Columbia River and Snake River makes the city of Lewiston the farthest inland seaport on the Pacific Coast of the contiguous United States; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is home to the Idaho National Laboratory, which is a technological milestone that has forever thrust Idaho into a place of global prominence, that milestone being the world's first production of usable amounts of electricity from nuclear power at the Experimental Breeder Reactor I (EBR - I); and scientific infrastructure renewal efforts began to accelerate anew in 2005, resulting in the construction or modification and occupation of six new facilities in Idaho Falls and five labs and offices on the Idaho National Laboratory Site between that time and the end of 2010; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is home to two persons who have won Gold Medals in recent Olympics - Kristin Armstrong and Picabo Street. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we commend and celebrate Idaho and its people on the state's one hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of statehood.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Historical Society, cities and county historical societies are authorized and encouraged to perform appropriate ceremonies and celebrations on July 3, 2015.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 16 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND RECOGNIZING AND CONGRATULATING BENEWAH COUNTY AND ITS RESIDENTS FOR THE COUNTY'S CENTENNIAL ANNIVERSARY ON JANUARY 23, 2015.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, by act of the Idaho Legislature, on January 23, 1915, Benewah County was created, named after Coeur d'Alene Chief Benewah and its county seat was placed at St. Maries; and

WHEREAS, from 1915 to 1924 Benewah County conducted operations in a school until the community passed a bond for a courthouse in January 1924. Construction began immediately at a cost of \$87,990, and since November 1924, the courthouse in St. Maries has been in continuous use for county and court functions. With its post-World War I neoclassical styling, the Benewah County Courthouse was listed on the National Register of Historical Places in 1987; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County has three incorporated cities. The largest, St. Maries, is home to 2,400 residents and is named for the largest tributary of the St. Joe River, which converges at the city. Plummer, the largest city within the Coeur d'Alene Reservation, is home to more than 1,000 residents. Tensed, population 80, is DeSmet spelled backwards, which the post office incorrectly transcribed; and

WHEREAS, several areas of Benewah County, though unincorporated, have rich histories and vibrant communities including Chatcolet, DeSmet, Emida, Fernwood, Parkline, Renfrew and Santa; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County is part of the historic homeland of the Coeur d'Alene Indians, who in their own language call themselves Schitsu'umsh, or "those who were found here" or "the discovered people." French trappers and traders were the first Europeans to encounter the Coeur d'Alene people and found them to be great traders, hence the name which means "heart of the awl." The Coeur d'Alene Tribe ranged over lands in northern Idaho, eastern Washington and western Montana. A portion of the present-day Coeur d'Alene Reservation is within Benewah County; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County is served by the Plummer-Worley School District and the St. Maries School District, with Lakeside High School in Plummer, home of the Knights, and St. Maries High School in St. Maries, home of the Lumberjacks. The St. Maries School District was ranked in the top ten schools in Idaho by U.S. News and World Report's education rankings; and

WHEREAS, timber and mining remain an important cornerstone of the regional and state economies. Each dollar of wood and paper products sold generates an additional 60 cents of sales by other industries within the state. Mills with facilities in Benewah County include the Potlatch Corporation and Stimson Lumber Company, and additional markets offered by Bennett Lumber and the Idaho Forest Group. Jack Buell Trucking and many owner-operated logging and trucking companies keep the industry thriving and contributing to the state's economy; and

WHEREAS, the St. Joe Ranger District of the Idaho Panhandle National Forest was formerly the St. Joe National Forest, with the ranger district office in St. Maries. With world-famous cutthroat trout streams, nationally recognized elk herds, wild and scenic rivers, and roadless and primitive areas, the St. Joe Ranger District has miles of trails for hikers, backcountry horse riders, mountain bikers and ATV riders. The Emerald Creek Garnet Area is one of only two places in the world where star garnets can be found; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County is home to the oldest state park in the Pacific Northwest, Heyburn State Park, founded in 1908 and named in honor of U. S. Senator Weldon B. Heyburn. Close by is the Mary McCroskey State Park, named after an early pioneer and dedicated to all pioneering women, it is known for its unique position between the Palouse Prairie and the Rocky Mountains and the breathtaking "Skyline Drive" that winds through cedar forest, ponderosa pine and prairie; and

WHEREAS, a corner of the rich Palouse Prairie occupies Benewah County, ensuring that farming and ranching remain traditional livelihoods. In addition to cattle, crops such as bluegrass, native grasses, wheat, barley and hay are raised; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County is naturally beautiful and bountiful: lakes and streams with trout and salmon; tree-filled forests with elk, moose, bear and deer; mountains and meadows with huckleberries and camas roots; wetlands with waterfowl and water potatoes; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County produced one governor, Charles Armington "C.A." Robins, of St. Maries, the only physician to serve as Idaho governor and the first governor elected to a four-year term, serving from 1947 to 1951. Prior to his service as governor, Governor Robins served as president pro tempore of the Idaho Senate for the Twenty-seventh Idaho Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Benewah County is home to the longest-serving county commissioner in Idaho, Jack Buell, businessman and Idaho Hall of Fame inductee of St. Maries. First elected in 1974, for more than 40 years he has worked tirelessly as a commissioner, community member and volunteer, sharing his resources and lending a helping hand.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we hereby recognize and congratulate Benewah County and its residents for the county's Centennial Anniversary in 2015.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, in the past seven years, including this year, there have been many bills introduced in the Idaho Legislature regarding the subject of urban renewal and urban renewal agencies; and

WHEREAS, the subject of urban renewal agencies and the Local Economic Development Act has been a source of great public controversy and misunderstanding; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature desires that an interim committee be appointed to study and address the issue and subject of urban renewal to modernize the process and to provide local units of government with economic development tools.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of the statutes and laws regarding urban renewal agencies, revenue allocation areas and the Economic Development Act contained in Chapters 20 and 29, Title 50, Idaho Code, and make recommendations for necessary changes to those and other related statutes, and if necessary to state statutes and the state constitution. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Article V of the Constitution of the United States mandates that upon the "Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States" Congress shall "call a Convention for proposing Amendments"; and

WHEREAS, the legislature deems an amendment to the United States requiring a balanced federal budget is necessary for the good of the American people.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho hereby applies to Congress, under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States, for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States requiring that in the absence of a national emergency the total of all Federal appropriations made by the Congress for any fiscal year may not exceed the total of all estimated Federal revenues for that fiscal year, together with any related and appropriate fiscal restraints.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Secretary of State of the State of Idaho is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and Secretary of the Senate and to the Speaker and Clerk of the House of Representatives of the Congress, and copies to the members of the said Senate and House of Representatives from this State; also to transmit copies hereof to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several States, requesting their cooperation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this application is to be considered as covering the balanced budget amendment language of the presently outstanding balanced budget applications from other states, including but not limited to previously-adopted applications from Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Texas; and this application shall be aggregated with same for the purpose of attaining the two-thirds of states necessary to require the calling of a convention for proposing a balanced budget amendment, but shall not be aggregated with any applications on any other subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject. It supersedes all previous applications by this legislature on the same subject.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 9 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho is committed to the conservation of greater sage-grouse (Centrocercus urophasianus) and its present habitat located within the state; and

WHEREAS, the state has produced a statewide sage-grouse conservation plan in support of this commitment; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's Department of Fish and Game and Office of Species Conservation possess significant expertise in the management of greater sage-grouse and its habitat and whose experts have been working extensively in full cooperation with the federal agencies managing federal lands within the borders of the state; and

WHEREAS, the Endangered Species Act requires the Secretary of the Interior to take into account the State of Idaho's efforts to protect greater sage-grouse prior to the Secretary's determination that the species is endangered or threatened; and

WHEREAS, implementation of the state's conservation plan will produce scientific data related to disease or predation of the species, the adequacy of existing regulatory mechanisms, and other natural or manmade factors affecting the species' existence, all of which must be considered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in making a determination whether to list greater sage-grouse as threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act; and

WHEREAS, categorical exclusions from the National Environmental Policy Act are necessary to allow the federal land management agencies to remove Pinyon-Juniper trees that are harmful to greater sage-grouse habitat; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho wishes to continue its collaboration with other states possessing current habitat for greater sage-grouse; and

WHEREAS, the Congress and the President are to be commended for recognizing the unprecedented collaboration among the various states regarding greater sage-grouse conservation and the need to continue on-the-ground conservation and monitoring activities as recognized through the enactment of Section 122 of the Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act of 2015; and

WHEREAS, time is needed to continue to implement the state conservation plan over a period of multiple, consecutive sage-grouse life cycles to determine the efficacy of the plan and the need for modification, if any.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, urging that Congress should continue to make no funds available for use by the Secretary of the Interior to consider, prepare, write, or issue pursuant to Section 4 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. Section 1533) a petition finding or proposed regulation for greater sage-grouse for a period of 10 years through and including fiscal year 2025.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that during this period, the State of Idaho will continue to implement its sage-grouse conservation plan, thereby establishing and enhancing its efficacy over time.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress should by legislation recognize and encourage state primacy in the long-term management of sage-grouse and its habitat to ensure an effective and balanced approach that seeks to recover and protect sage-grouse populations while protecting state economic interests, educational funding from state lands, and valid existing rights including private property rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 19 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND DIRECTING THE BUREAU OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AND PREPAREDNESS TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO PREPARE LEGISLATION ON EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES IN IDAHO.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Legislature has recognized the importance of emergency medical services (EMS) since the passage of the original EMS Act in the early 1970s; and

WHEREAS, emergency medical services in Idaho are currently provided by a patchwork of organizations bound loosely together by a set of outdated statutes that no longer adequately serve Idaho's needs; and

WHEREAS, during the 2010 legislative session, Senate Bill 1391 was introduced, which was intended to align Idaho's EMS-specific statutes and address the need for a systematic approach to the provision of EMS in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1391 was held in committee due to a number of stakeholder concerns; and

WHEREAS, following the failure of Senate Bill 1391, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee directed the Office of Performance Evaluations (OPE) to study the governance of EMS in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, in a November 2010 report, "Governance of EMS Agencies in Idaho," OPE made seven recommendations intended to enable the Department of Health and Welfare's Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness and local stakeholders to begin incorporating the design attributes of a well-functioning EMS system; and

WHEREAS, in June 2013, OPE issued a follow-up report, which noted numerous examples of local EMS stakeholders coming together to develop EMS systems, but which also noted that no significant statewide action had been taken to address OPE's recommendations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness convene a working group to draft EMS system legislation for consideration by the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, in preparing the legislation, the working group should address the findings and recommendations from the 2010 OPE report, "Governance of EMS Agencies in Idaho," and other pertinent materials.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the bureau include a broad stakeholder base in the membership of the working group to assure that the resulting legislation best addresses the needs of all Idahoans.

TO THE DIRECTOR OF THE UNITED STATES FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE, THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF CONGRESS, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the purpose of a comprehensive conservation plan for a national wildlife refuge is to specify a management direction for the refuge that takes many considerations, including recreational opportunities, into account; and

WHEREAS, the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge, including Lake Lowell, has been an important source of outdoor recreational opportunities for the people of Idaho since the refuge's creation more than 100 years ago; and

WHEREAS, the comprehensive conservation plan proposed for the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service imposes certain restrictions on recreational activities that are of great concern to the people of Idaho: and

WHEREAS, such restrictions will have a profoundly negative impact on boating, hiking and hunting opportunities in the refuge; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the importance of conservation and preservation of habitat and wildlife and supports the United States Fish and Wildlife Service in its conservation and preservation efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that the goals of conservation and preservation can still be met while considering and respecting the importance of outdoor recreational opportunities held sacred by the people of Idaho.

I support exempting eyeglasses, eyeglass components and contact lenses from Idaho's 6-percent sales tax. These are the last medical devices subject to the State sales tax, and there is no justification for that to continue.

However, my concerns and my decision to allow House Bill 75 to become law without my signature stem from the potential cost in General Fund tax dollars as stated in the legislation's fiscal impact statement. Both \$1.4 million in foregone revenue during fiscal 2016 and \$2.8 million in each subsequent year is a substantial bite from an apple on which more and more public interests rely for sustenance.

The Senate seemed to reflect that concern in its 18-17 vote for legislation that was approved so handily in the House. I encourage the Tax Commission, the Division of Financial Management, JFAC and all legislators to closely monitor the actual fiscal impacts with an eye toward a continuous practice of prioritization and judicious use of General Fund dollars whether expended or foregone.

WHEREAS, the State Healthcare Innovation Plan is focused on redesigning Idaho's health care delivery system to evolve from a fee-for-service, volume-based system to a value-based system of care based on improved health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, uncompensated family caregivers in Idaho are an essential part of the medical neighborhood, the medical neighborhood being the array of services that are available to patients beyond the scope of a patient-centered medical home; and

WHEREAS, the State Healthcare Innovation Plan envisions better connection of the patient-centered medical home to the rest of the medical neighborhood in order to improve care coordination and care quality and reduce costs and duplication of services; and

WHEREAS, half of Idaho's 44 counties are frontier, with fewer than seven persons per square mile, resulting in areas that lack access to many levels of health care, including access to caregiving resources; and

WHEREAS, the population of the state that is 65 years and older is projected to reach 370,000 in 2032, a significant increase from 2012, and this demographic represents the fastest growing population in the state; and

WHEREAS, Idaho has 137,099 veterans, with an estimated 19,041 who suffer disabilities, including 1,645 who are completely disabled; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 53,280 Idaho children have a special health care need, and an estimated 18,820 have a serious emotional disorder; and

WHEREAS, providing services and support to Idahoans in their homes and communities is generally less expensive than institutional care; and

WHEREAS, individuals who receive care at home are less likely to need public assistance; and

WHEREAS, at any time during the year an estimated 307,000 adults in Idaho provide care to adult relatives or friends, which equates to an estimated value of \$2 billion per year; and

WHEREAS, approximately two-thirds of Idaho's unpaid caregivers are employed or looking for work, and their caregiving responsibilities therefore have an economic impact on families and employers in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, more than half of care recipients are under the age of 75, and almost one-third are under the age of 50, thus indicating that caregiving is a multigenerational issue in family life that also impacts a broad spectrum of individuals with chronic illnesses that necessitate family caregiving throughout the lifespan; and

WHEREAS, approximately 22,000 Idahoans are living with Alzheimer's Disease or a related disorder, and an estimated 77,000 individuals, many of whom are unpaid, provide caregiving responsibilities for people with Alzheimer's Disease or a related disorder; and

WHEREAS, to successfully address the surging population of older adults and people with disabilities who have significant needs for long-term services and support, the state must develop methods that both encourage and support individuals who assist family members and must also develop ways to recruit and retain a qualified, responsive in-home care workforce.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we endorse the efforts of the Idaho Caregiver Alliance and encourage their plans to create a task force to explore innovative means to support uncompensated family caregivers in Idaho and to provide information to those who may serve as a caregiver in the future.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the task force to explore policies, resources and programs available for family caregivers and make this information available to the State Healthcare Innovation Plan leaders as a potential resource for the medical neighborhood model.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the task force to compile an inventory of the resources available to family caregivers in Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the task force to report its findings to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature.

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 11 through 41; delete page 2 and on page 3, delete lines 1 through 8, and insert:

"22-2402. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter:

(1) "Agency" means:

(a) In the case of the federal government, any authority which exercises administrative control over defined areas of federal lands within the state of Idaho;

(b) In the case of the state of Idaho, any department, board, commission, or institution;

(c) In the case of local government, cities, counties and any legal subdivisions thereof, drainage districts, irrigation districts, canal companies, highway districts, or any special taxing district.

(2) "Applicable fund or account" means:

(a) In the case of the state of Idaho, the noxious weed account, which is hereby created and established in the dedicated fund and which shall be used exclusively for the purposes prescribed by this chapter;

(b) In each county, the noxious weed fund, which is hereby created and established and shall be maintained in each county and which shall be used exclusively for the purposes prescribed by this chapter.

(3) "Aquatic plant" means any plant growing in, or closely associated with, the aquatic environment and includes, but is not limited to, riparian plants.

(4) <u>"Article" means a particular kind of object, and</u> includes any type of conveyance, mode of transport or associated materials such as water.

(5) "Classical biological control" means the introduction of control agents into a region, that is not part of their natural range, to suppress permanently the populations of selected target weeds usually also introduced into that region. "Augmentative biological control" means the supplemental release of control agents into a region, that is part of their natural range, to suppress permanently the populations of selected target weeds.

(6) "Containment" means halting the spread of a weed infestation beyond specified boundaries.

(57) "Control" means any or all of the following: prevention, rehabilitation, eradication or modified treatments.

 $(\underline{68})$ "Control authority" means:

(a) On the state level, the director of the department of agriculture;

(b) On the county level, the board of county commissioners.

(79) "Cooperative weed management area (CWMA)" means a distinguishable hydrologic, vegetative or geographic zone based upon geography, weed infestations, climate or human-use patterns. Cooperative weed management areas may be composed of a portion of a county, a county, portions of several counties, or portions of one (1) or more states.

(810) "Department" means the Idaho state department of agriculture.

(911) "Director" means the director of the department of agriculture or the director's designated agent.

(102) "Eradication" means the elimination of a noxious weed based on absence as determined by a visual inspection by the control authority during the current growing season.

(143) "Integrated weed management plan (IWMP)" means a plan developed to manage, control or eradicate a noxious weed(s) from a cooperative weed management area or other weed management area. Integrated weed management strategies may include, but are not limited to, prevention, cultural, mechanical, chemical and biological methods.

(124) "Land" means all soil or water or other growing medium.

(135) "Landowner" means:

(a) The person who holds legal title to the land, except that portion for which another person has the right to exclude others from possession of the parcel; or

(b) A person with an interest in a parcel of land such that the person has the right to exclude others from possession of the parcel.

 $(14\underline{\acute{o}})$ "Modified treatment" means treatment specified in an integrated weed management plan.

(157) "Noxious weed" means any plant having the potential to cause injury to public health, crops, livestock, land or other property; and which is designated as noxious by the director.

(168) "Person" means any individual, partnership, firm, agency, corporation, company, society or association.

(179) "Prevention" means:

(a) Any action that reduces the potential for the introduction or establishment of a plant species in areas not currently infested with that species; or

(b) Any action that deters the spread of noxious weeds.

(1820) "Quarantine" means the regulation of the production, movement, or existence of plants, plant products, animals, animal products, or any other article or material, or the normal activity of persons, to prevent or limit introduction or spread of noxious weeds.

(4921) "Rehabilitation" means the process of reconditioning formerly weed infested land to a productive or desirable condition.

(202) "Riparian" means the green, vegetated areas along the edge of water bodies like rivers, creeks, canals, lakes, springs, sloughs, potholes and wetlands. They are the transition zone between upland and aquatic ecosystems. Underlying saturated soil is a key feature in riparian areas.

(24<u>3</u>) "State noxious weed advisory committee" means an advisory committee appointed by the director to advise and to assist in development, modification and direction of a statewide noxious weed management strategy.

(24) "Viable" means a plant or plant part capable of surviving or living successfully, especially under particular environmental conditions.

(225) "Waters" means all the accumulations of water, surface and underground, natural and artificial, public and private, or parts thereof which are wholly or partially within, which flow through, or which border upon the state.

(236) "Weed control advisory committee" means a committee established by weed control agencies or authorities, at the county level, or a steering committee of a cooperative weed management area, to develop and to recommend implementation of integrated weed management plans and strategies.

(27) "Hybrid" means the offspring of two (2) plants of different breeds, varieties, species or genera.

(28) "Releasing" means releasing, placing, planting, or causing to be released, a species in a water body, facility, water supply system, field, garden, planted area, ecosystem or otherwise into the environment within the state of Idaho.

(29) "Researcher" means someone who has the generally accepted education, experience and position within the biological control research community.

(30) "Research facility" means any laboratory, institution, college or university, at which scientific tests, experiments or peer-reviewed investigations involving the use of any living plants is carried out, conducted or attempted and that receives funds under a grant, award or contract from a department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States for the purpose of carrying out research, tests or experiments and that uses generally accepted protocols at an equivalent or higher level than a U.S. center for disease control and prevention biosafety level 1 facility."

(a) Investigate the subject of noxious weeds; and

(c) To cooperate with agencies and persons in carrying out the director's duties under this chapter, and to conduct matters

outside this state in the interest of state noxious weed control; and

(d) Advise and confer as to the extent of noxious weed infestations and the methods of control; and

(e) Assist counties in the training of county weed superintendents; and

(f) Call and attend meetings and conferences dealing with the subject of noxious weeds; and

(g) Disseminate information and conduct educational campaigns independently or in cooperation with others; and (h) Appoint a state noxious weed advisory committee, as provided by section 22-103, Idaho Code, to aid in the development and implementation of a statewide noxious weed management strategy, aid in evaluation of cost share projects and research proposals, and advise the director on matters pertaining to the state noxious weed program; and

(i) Procure materials and equipment; and

(j) Inspect and certify Idaho crops and imports and exports to verify freedom from noxious weeds, and authorize others to conduct such inspections and certification; and

(k) Enter on any public or private land at reasonable times for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this chapter; and

(1) Apply to any court of competent jurisdiction for a search warrant authorizing access to any land where access was denied and sought for the purposes set forth in this chapter. The court may, upon such application, issue the search warrant for the purposes requested; and

(m) Perform such other acts as may be necessary or appropriate to the administration of the provisions of this chapter; and

(n) Cooperate with the federal government or any established agency thereof in any program of noxious weed control which shall be deemed advisable for the welfare of the people of the state of Idaho, accept any advisable program and make any necessary rules which are not in contradiction to the purposes of this chapter; and

(o) Accept any gift, grant, contract or other funds, or grants-in-aid from the federal government or other entities for noxious weed control purposes and account for such moneys as prescribed by the state controller, and all such funds are hereby appropriated to the purpose for which they are received; and

(p) Initiate agreements with federal agencies in accordance with applicable federal laws; and

(q) Control noxious weeds on federal land within the state, with or without reimbursement, and with the consent of the federal agency involved; and

(r) Take any appropriate action necessary to control or quarantine noxious weed infestations whenever an actual or potential emergency situation exists concerning noxious weed infestations anywhere in the state; and

(s) Initiate cooperative agreements with other agencies and states for the establishment and support of cooperative weed management areas; and

(t) Aid other weed control agencies or authorities in developing and implementing integrated weed management plans for control of noxious weeds; and

(u) Temporarily designate a weed as noxious for up to fifteen (15) months, after publication in a newspaper of general circulation serving the area of infestation; and

(v) Authorize the issuance of deficiency warrants for the purposes of defraying excess costs for the control of noxious weeds for emergency situations, in the event the actual cost for the control of noxious weeds in any one (1) year exceeds the appropriations made for that purpose. When so

authorized the state controller shall draw deficiency warrants against the general account; and

(w) Allow the collection, removal and movement of noxious weeds by a researcher from an infested area in Idaho to a facility within Idaho when available within the state of Idaho for purposes of biological control research, so long as the following conditions are satisfied and certified by the researcher and the director in legally binding and notarized documents:

The director is notified in writing by the researcher 1. the precise details of the proposed research project at least thirty (30) days prior to any contemplated collection, removal or movement of noxious weeds. The director and specialist staff shall conduct a review of the proposed research project and complete a written project approval plan that includes details of all appropriate actions that will be taken to ensure implementation and protection of the authority of the director as outlined in section 22-2403, Idaho Code, the state powers as outlined in section 22-2404, Idaho Code, the county duties as outlined in section 22-2405, Idaho Code, the county powers as outlined in section 22-2406, Idaho Code, the landowner duties as outlined in section 22-2407, Idaho Code, and the landowner and citizen powers as outlined in section 22-2408, Idaho Code. The researcher shall take no action prior to written approval from all control authorities. The written approval process shall also contain a notification to all other appropriate entities as outlined in this chapter;

2. The collection, removal and movement activities are certified in writing that they will be conducted using methods and protocols prescribed and generally accepted in the biological control research community that prevent the dissemination of noxious weeds;

3. The biological control agent that is the subject of the research is not a plant pest within the meaning of the plant pest act of 2002, an invasive species within the meaning of the invasive species act of 2008 or a viable noxious weed within the meaning of this chapter;

4. Viable noxious weeds, as determined by the department, are not reintroduced into the environment as a component or result of the biological control research; 5. Any articles, including but not limited to plant parts, that are collected for transport as part of biological control research must be destroyed or treated at the research facility in such a way as to destroy the viability of any plant pests, invasive species, hybrids and noxious weeds; and

6. The project is conducted in accordance with such other conditions as may be set in the written approval document by the director to ensure containment during collection, removal and movement of the noxious weed.

Penalties for intentional transportation or release of a biological control agent shall not exceed those established in the plant protection act (Title 7, USC 7734).

Should it be necessary to transport a biological control agent into or out of the state of Idaho all appropriate biological control protocols shall be followed as delineated by the appropriate federal agencies such as the USDA animal plant health inspection service plant protection quarantine (USDA APHIS PPQ).

None of the actions authorized in this paragraph shall be carried out until the director both outlines the actions and certifies to the board of examiners that the specific funding and personnel necessary for all actions is available within the current operational budget of the Idaho state department of agriculture.

(2) If at any time the director determines that the county commissioners have failed to cooperate or carry out their duties and responsibilities as a control authority, the director shall notify them of the deficiency, and suggest corrective action. If the situation is not satisfactorily corrected within seven (7) days after the time outlined in the director's corrective action plan, the director shall initiate appropriate action and charge to the county all expenses including the hiring of necessary labor and equipment. Quarantine of specific crops or potential noxious weed propagating activities may be a part of the control program."

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 11 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION

REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the Columbia-Snake River System as part of the United States Marine Highway network; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the Columbia-Snake River System and its tributaries, collectively and in its entirety, as a multiuse system providing navigation, transportation, fish and wildlife habitat, recreation, hydropower generation, flood control and irrigation to the citizens and industry of the Pacific Northwest; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the vital contribution the Columbia-Snake River System and its tributaries, functioning collectively and in its entirety, make to the state's economic well-being and to the quality of life of our citizens; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho asserts sovereign control over all water resources within the state; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes that the anadromous fish decline is due to many factors, including increased predation, unfavorable ocean conditions and harvest; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the efforts by Northwest families, farmers, ranchers, organizations and businesses investing billions in fish passage and habitat improvements resulting in 97.5 percent average survival for juvenile Chinook and 99.5 percent for juvenile steelhead migrating downstream through the Lower Snake River dams; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the legal priority that agriculture irrigation and industrial applications of water have within the state; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the Port of Lewiston, Idaho's only seaport, is part of the collective Columbia-Snake River System and is an asset of the State of Idaho and to the Inland Northwest region, providing global competitiveness and connectivity for regional products, economic development investment and multimodal transportation; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the Columbia-Snake River System as the top wheat export gateway in the United States, with approximately 16 percent of all U.S. wheat exports barged through at least one of the Snake River dams; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes barging as the most fuel efficient mode of transportation; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes hydropower as the most efficient, environmentally favorable form of electrical generation, combatting global warming by offsetting at least 3 million metric tons of CO2 emissions per year through use of the Lower Snake River dams while producing 1,000 megawatts of carbon-free, renewable energy annually, and 3,000 megawatts for peak power emergencies; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho believes that any actions to degrade the functionality, in whole or in part, to remove or breach dams on the Columbia-Snake River System or its tributaries, or take water from the state for anadromous fish enhancement efforts, would inflict on the citizenry of the state a loss in economic and trade opportunities, a loss of recharge waters for the state's aquifers, a loss of navigation and transportation, an increased risk for floods, an increase in electrical rates, a shortfall in power generation, a loss of recreational opportunities and a threatened quality of life for Idaho citizens. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that Idaho opposes the removal or breaching of the dams on the Columbia-Snake River System and its tributaries, has sovereignty of its water resources, prohibits contributions of water from Idaho's reservoirs for flow augmentation except those expressly authorized by state law, that efforts for further recovery of anadromous fish must be undertaken in a manner based on sound science, and supports maintenance and multiple use benefits of the Columbia-Snake River System. Additionally, the Idaho Legislature recognizes and supports the international competitiveness, multimodal transportation and economic development benefits provided by the Port of Lewiston.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Orthodox Christian Church, in existence for nearly 2,000 years, numbers approximately 300 million members worldwide with more than two million members in the United States: and

WHEREAS, since 1453, the continuing presence of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in Turkey has been a living testament to the religious coexistence of Christians and Muslims; and

WHEREAS, this religious coexistence is important because the Orthodox Christian Church is a recognized religion by the Turkish Government; and

WHEREAS, fewer than 3,000 of the Ecumenical Patriarch's flock live in Turkey today; and

WHEREAS, Orthodox Christians in Idaho and throughout the United States support their spiritual leader; and

WHEREAS, where there have been difficulties in the past with the relationship of the Orthodox Christian Church and the Turkish Government, recent actions by the Turkish Government demonstrate an interest in improving its relationship with and treatment of the Orthodox Christian Church, which actions are acknowledged and welcomed: and

WHEREAS, the people of Idaho desire to encourage the continued dialogue and communication of the leadership of the Turkish Government and the Orthodox Christian Church, as demonstrated by recent high-level meetings between Turkish officials and the Ecumenical Patriarchate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge the government of Turkey to: uphold and safeguard religious and human rights of all its citizens without compromise; grant the Ecumenical Patriarch appropriate ecclesiastical succession and the right to train clergy of all nationalities; and respect the property rights and human rights of the Ecumenical Patriarchate and all religious and faith traditions.

within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 10:15 a.m. on March 24, 2015.

I sign this bill into law with significant misgivings about the process by which it came to me. It represents an instance of the Idaho Department of Labor and the Idaho Trucking Association talking past one another rather than pursuing a solution aimed at fostering future collaboration.

On its face, the issue seems simple enough. Following on the heels of Idaho Supreme Court rulings involving similar cases, the bill exempts truck drivers from the federal Employment Security Law when they lease vehicles from motor carriers, thus classifying them as independent contractors. The Idaho Department of Labor argues that the change eliminates those drivers' responsibility for paying for workers' compensation insurance, the employer contribution to Social Security and Medicare, liability insurance and even maintenance on the leased vehicle. The truckers - backed by the American Trucking Associations disagree on those and other points of policy and law. So enacting this bill may or may not put the State of Idaho out of conformity with U.S. Department of Labor rules. Failing to enact it may put Idaho at odds with court determinations on the legal definitions involved in those relationships. The consequences for Idaho businesses and individuals could be inconsequential or as serious as eligibility for worker's compensation insurance and the cost of unemployment insurance.

While I believe the issue is important enough that the bill should be signed in order to advance the discussion, it is clear to me that the discussion must continue, in earnest, and with an eye toward returning to the 2016 session of the Legislature with a consensus bill that eliminates the confusion and chaos evident in the conflicting responses to this legislation.

This letter is intended in no uncertain terms to call upon Idaho's trucking industry and the Idaho Department of Labor to come together in a spirit of amity and collegiality to craft legislation that eliminates the confusion and provides consensus responses to the questions at hand. Our goal should be nothing less than achieving the desired ends for Idaho businesses while ensuring the desired fairness, stability and predictability in the State of Idaho's regulation of this essential industry.

In addition, I am concerned about the potential impact of even a marginal decline in the use of CNG or LNG vehicles in fast-growing Ada and Canyon counties, where more emissions from other vehicle fuels may aggravate air quality concerns and perhaps lead to a nonattainment determination by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The first rule for getting out of a hole is to stop digging. Unfortunately, despite its good intentions House Bill 126 keeps digging an estimated \$1.7 million financial hole while attempting to fill another.

This legislation seeks to address the issue of how best to enable State funding to "follow the students" who move from one school to another at various points in the academic year. But the result of the measure actually will be double funding of some students while other funding priorities remain unmet.

My Task Force for Improving Education has a committee working to find a broader solution for this issue and other challenges with the public school funding formula. One of the committee's goals is to improve fiscal stability and reduce data reporting burdens wherever possible - for all our schools; not just a few.

The committee will have a recommendation for the next legislative session. We should allow this process to move forward toward a better, broader, more equitable solution. I hope such an effort can win not only legislative backing but also the support of such groups as the Idaho Association of School Administrators and the Idaho School Boards Association, both of which opposed House Bill 126.

I believe entrepreneurs like the founders of the ride service "Uber" are operating in the best traditions of the free market identifying a niche, developing a response to consumer demand, and making that service work at a profit within the confines of an often confusing patchwork of local regulatory limitations.

I also understand completely the concerns expressed by local government authorities and some members of the Legislature about the impact of imposing statewide regulations on Uber's Idaho operations. I share fears about such regulations essentially trumping local restrictions, safeguards and - for lack of a better term on baseball's opening day- ground rules for doing business in each of our communities. I am wary of the State unwittingly creating a competitive advantage for Uber over small local taxi services or other competitors.

The House and Senate votes show that relatively few members of the Legislature share those concerns enough to reject the company's legislation, which indeed has been adopted by other states as well. But other states are not Idaho, and I encourage us all to watch carefully to ensure we remember that here, government closest to the people governs best.

Agreed to create a Strategic Initiative Program in the Idaho Transportation Department that provides for a program for transportation projects that are proposed by the Department's six districts and rated competitively on their return on investment in safety, mobility, economic opportunity, repair and maintenance of bridges, and the purchase of right-of-way. The legislation also creates the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund. It will receive a distribution from the General Fund at the end of each fiscal year after it is determined that the General Fund balance is sufficient to provide for amounts necessary to be carried over into the next fiscal year as determined by the Legislature, to cover encumbrances, and to cover any reappropriation authorized by the Legislature. The amount distributed will be fifty percent of the excess at the end of the fiscal year as determined by the State Controller. A two-year sunset clause is placed upon the section of law authorizing the transfer from the General Fund to the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund in the surplus eliminator.

6. Include additional provisions to amend the statutes governing the Budget Stabilization Fund to move the transfer from the General Fund to the Budget Stabilization Fund in the current fiscal year rather than the following fiscal year, and provide an additional distribution to the Budget Stabilization Fund from the General Fund at the end of each fiscal year, after it is determined that the cash balance is sufficient to provide for amounts necessary to be carried over into the next fiscal year as determined by the Legislature, to cover encumbrances, and to cover any reappropriation authorized by the Legislature. The amount distributed will be fifty percent of the excess at the end of the fiscal year as determined by the State Controller. A two-year sunset clause is placed upon the section of law authorizing the transfer from the General Fund to the Budget Stabilization Fund in the surplus eliminator.

7. Agreed to remove the cap of 10% of the total General Fund receipts for the fiscal year just ending, on the Budget Stabilization Fund.

8. All additional funds collected under the provisions of this act, remitted to the Idaho Transportation Department or entities subject to the distribution provisions of Section 40-709, Idaho Code, shall be used exclusively for road and bridge maintenance and replacement projects both at the state and local level.

9. It is the intent of the Legislature that on or before January 1, 2019, there shall be imposed on all commercial vehicles, irrespective of body type, and on all farm vehicles having a maximum weight in excess of sixty thousand (60,000) pounds, an operating fee by weight class based on total miles the owner operated such vehicles on roads and highways.

House Bill 312 is the product of a House-Senate conference committee convened after the House declined to agree with Senate amendments substantially expanding the scope and impact of the original bill. It represents compromise, concession, and a realization that - in the face of apparent intransigence - something indeed is better than nothing.

In fact, H 312 is a respectable start on a multi-year effort to provide for the long-term needs of our transportation infrastructure, including hundreds of bridges throughout Idaho that every day are reaching the end of their safe lifespans.

But from my perspective, H 312 also represented a sea change in the Legislature's perception of the issue from 2009, our last serious effort to responsibly and sustainably address funding needs for our highways and bridges. That time the debate was about whether there actually was a need, and about whether the Idaho Transportation Department could be trusted to efficiently and cost-effectively put additional highway funding to use on the roadways.

This time the debate was neither about the need nor ITD's ability to do its job professionally. Those questions have been resolved with the work of the Transportation Board and Director Ness, continuing public education and a more open, transparent and streamlined ITD. No, this time the debate was all about how best and most equitably to apportion the costs associated with maintaining and improving our corridors of commerce.

Obviously there remains significant disagreement over how to meet those needs, beyond a foundation of registration fees and fuel taxes. That's especially true of the context of some legislators' sincere belief that transportation should get at least a share of its sustenance from the same General Fund source as public schools, higher education, Medicaid and our prisons.

As you know, I drew a line in the sand on that question in this year's State of the State address when I said, "I will NOT entertain proposals aimed at competing for General Fund tax dollars with education and our other required public programs or services." Some would prefer that I veto this bill because it includes a "surplus eliminator" provision that will apportion half of any General Fund surplus at the end of each of the next two fiscal years to transportation.

I get it, but I disagree. H 312 avoids the competition problem by only using General Fund revenue <u>after</u> the Legislature has made its appropriation decisions regarding the regular General Fund recipients and a surplus remains at the end of the budget year. There is also a rational argument to be made that tax receipts beyond those anticipated during budgeting are not automatically part of the General Fund, thus technically meeting the terms of my proscription.

No, I am not excited about the surplus eliminator idea. It has the feeling of a slippery slope despite the two-year sunset. But effective governance requires flexibility and willingness to constructively lead. As the many ideas and combinations of highway funding schemes were raised, discussed and dismissed, what I saw was a growing commitment by lawmakers to find a way past simply "no."

That commitment should be rewarded, as should the broadly accepted understanding - stated by legislators, stakeholders and newspaper editorial pages - that H 312 is not the end of the rainbow for transportation revenue.

There is no pot of gold hidden at the end of this legislation. But H 312 does provide tangible evidence that the Legislature now appreciates the importance of safe and reliable highways and bridges for our economy and the wellbeing of our citizens. Lawmakers passed a bill that covers about a third of the identified maintenance backlog. It was neither the first nor the second or even the third choice of anyone involved, but there seemed to be consensus that while the bill was far less than a stand-alone solution, it also was more than a placeholder.

So while I praise the Legislature for sticking with it and sending me a funding bill, I reiterate my State of the State reminder that every dollar we invest now in our roads and bridges will save motorists and taxpayers \$6 to \$14. Those are bills our children and grandchildren will be paying.

At least now they won't be able to look back and see that we did nothing - just not enough, yet.

WHEREAS, there is a need for Idaho to operate in full compliance with the reciprocal interstate process as provided by the Uniform Interstate Family Support Act; and

WHEREAS, an extraordinary occasion concerning child support services requiring emergency attention has arisen in the State of Idaho, which makes it appropriate and desirable to convene the 63rd Idaho Legislature in Extraordinary Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, C.L. "BUTCH" OTTER, Governor of the State of Idaho, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this state, do by this Proclamation convene the 63rd Idaho Legislature in Extraordinary Session in the legislative chambers at the Capitol in Boise City, Ada County, Idaho, at the hour of 8:00 A.M. on the 18th day of May, 2015 for the following enumerated purpose and no other:

To consider the passage and enactment of legislation amending and adding to Idaho Code, relating to the Uniform Interstate Family Support Act and other laws, in order to maintain a compliant state program of child-support services in Idaho uniform with all other states in the establishment and enforcement of interstate and international support orders and to ensure our state's policies for recognizing foreign judgments are preserved.

The Extraordinary Session of the Legislature convened by this Proclamation shall have no power to legislate on any subjects other than those specified herein.

I HEREBY DIRECT AND REQUIRE that a copy of this Proclamation be delivered to the Lieutenant Governor, to each of the members of the 63rd Idaho Legislature and to the Constitutional Officers of Idaho at the earliest practicable time.
