CONVENED: Co-chair Horman called the meeting to order at 10:25 A.M.

WELCOME AND

INTRODUCTIONS: Co-chair Horman reported on a workshop meeting with IASA.

STAFF

PRESENTATION: FOLLOW-UP ON INFORMATION FROM JULY 12 MEETING

PRESENTER: Tim Hill, State Department of Education

Mr. Hill reported on data regarding recent supplemental levies and compared

it to comparable ADA data.

STAFF

PRESENTATION: STATUS OF PROPOSED SURVEY

PRESENTER: Blake Youde, Office of the State Board of Education

Mr. Youde gave an update on the subcommittee's work on survey development and implementation. Progress timeline markers include:

- August Draft survey questions developed with Legislative Services Office.
 Also reviewed the approach that Montana's Legislative Services Division used for a recent survey of public school stakeholders.
- August 18 Draft survey questions sent to survey workgroup.
- August 26 Draft survey questions sent to stakeholder groups (IEA, ISBA, IASA, Idaho Charter School Network, and Northwest Professional Educators) for review with responses requested by September 1.
- Target date to launch survey to the public is September 15.

A draft of the survey can be found on pages 3-17 of the committee packet. The committee discussed and gave guidance on the content and rewording of survey questions.

STAFF PRESENTATION:

SCHOOL DISTRICT HEALTH INSURANCE (PART 1) – OPTIONS TO IDENTIFY HEALTH INSURANCE COSTS WITHIN THE PUBLIC SCHOOL APPROPRIATION

PRESENTER:

Paul Headlee, LSO

Mr. Headlee reported on options to create a methodology that will allow the Legislature to more accurately fund annual increases in school district and charter school employer-paid health insurance premiums. He noted several steps in the general approach:

- Estimate the annual school district and charter school employer-paid health insurance costs for those employees paid with state funds through the annual public school appropriation.
- Apply those estimated costs to discretionary funds, currently appropriated at \$382,516,200 for FY 2017. Then, decide whether to leave those costs within the discretionary funds or move to a separate distribution.
- Escalate those costs each year based on chosen indexes or data.

Mr. Headlee presented three potential options:

- Estimate the percentage of funding used for health insurance premiums.
- Calculate the weighted statewide average cost per employee and multiply by staff allowance. (Example included in committee packet.)
- Require direct reporting of actual costs by districts.

The committee discussed the way federal funding is used to cover teacher salaries and benefits, including health insurance. They also compared transportation funding program requirements to potential health insurance funding options.

PRESENTATION: FEDERAL FUNDING IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS BUDGET

PRESENTERS: Paul Headlee, LSO, and Louie Konkol, State Department of Education

Mr. Headlee presented on trends in the 10-year history of the education budget. He noted that federal funds make up about 14 percent of the public school appropriation.

Mr. Konkol presented on the impact of federal funds in the budget. He discussed the impact of the Tydings Amendment on the ability of federal funds and showcased the amount of federal funds Idaho gets and how it is broken down by category.

The committee discussed how funds flow to entities that use the money, and they requested more information on local municipalities filling funding gaps.

UPDATE ON THE EVALUATION OF STATE-FUNDED SERVICES FOR

PRESENTATION: K-12 EDUCATION

PRESENTER:

Bryon Welch, Office of Performance Evaluations

Mr. Welch gave an update on OPE's study of the distributions in the public school budget. He noted that OPE met with Department of Education staff and has been reaching out to agencies. He anticipates release of the report in December.

PRESENTER: Steve Smylie

REPRESENTING: Himself

Mr. Smylie noted that any solution for the distribution formula should not take money from one group and give it to another, but look at proactive solutions. He said he would like individual districts to have more options, including opportunities for state support for construction. He added that he would like to see discussion on dealing with inequality and growth and options for construction levies.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

PRESENTER: Don Keller

REPRESENTING: Himself, as an Idaho educator

Mr. Keller provided insight into the funding processes he's been involved in and into developing a new school. He noted that community aspects come into play, that some don't have the revenue-generating capacity to offer certain things, so schools have to. He explained how special education students affected the budget. He discussed how much it costs to be innovative and added that grants

would help in that regard.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

PRESENTER: Rob Winslow

REPRESENTING: Idaho Association of School Administrators

Mr. Winslow recalled involvement in the Governor's Task Force and noted the top priority that came out of it was fiscal stability. He said that it is still the top priority for superintendents because districts continue to struggle. He stated that they support a funding formula that is designed for actual costs in school districts, and added that the career ladder is a good start. He said that some things they would like to see addressed in the survey include: classified and super classified salaries, mastery learning, completion, weighted students, special education, English language learners, funding for students that choose overloaded schedules, and increased financial support for administrative staff.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

PRESENTER: Karen Echeverria

REPRESENTING: Idaho School Board Association

Ms. Echeverria said that the ISBA requests the committee provide as much flexibility as possible, to get rid of line items and let school districts and charter schools determine how to spend funds. She noted that the career ladder continues to help bring teachers' salaries to competitive levels, but added that the classified staff salaries need to be addressed in the funding formula. She concluded that facilities funding needs to be discussed, that some buildings are at a critical state, and that bond passage rate is high.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

PRESENTER: Tom LeClaire

REPRESENTING: Coalition of Idaho Charter School Families

Mr. LeClaire expressed that CICSF is in support of strong funding for charter schools and funding students as they move. They would like the provisions of HB 603 to be made permanent rather than sunset. They support the concept of a foundation amount for each child to allow funding to follow the student.
