# FIRST LEGISLATIVE DAY MONDAY, JANUARY 7, 2019

Senate Chamber

At the hour of 12 noon on Monday, January 7, 2019, the time established for the convening of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the members of the Senate convened in the Senate Chamber of the Capitol in the City of Boise, President Janice McGeachin presiding.

Roll call showed all members present except Senator Bayer, absent and formally excused by the Chair.

Prayer was offered by Chaplain Montie Ralstin.

On request by Senator Winder, granted by unanimous consent, the Sergeant-at-Arms, Sarah Jane McDonald, escorted the Idaho State Police Honor Guard into the Senate chambers to present and post the colors for the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Sergeant-at-Arms, Sarah Jane McDonald.

President Pro Tempore Hill provided a brief history of the Idaho State flag flown over the domes of the House and Senate Chambers during each session of the Legislature. He explained that the flags represent the spirit of our citizens and serve as a symbol of Idaho's sovereignty. They further serve notice to the State that the Legislature, the elected representatives of all the citizens of Idaho, is in session. The flags are raised when the Legislature convenes and will be retired when the Legislature adjourns *sine die*. President McGeachin presented the Idaho State flag to the Honor Guard to be raised above the Senate Chamber to fly during the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature and the Honor Guard exited the Chamber.

On request by Representative Moyle, granted by unanimous consent, the Speaker appointed three committees to wait upon the Supreme Court Justices and Appellate Court Judges, the elected officials, and the Governor and escort them to the House Chamber

The Speaker appointed Senators Lakey and Burgoyne, and Representatives Dayley and McCrostie as the committee to wait upon and escort the Supreme Court Justices and Appellate Court Judges to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The Speaker appointed Senators Vick and Buckner-Webb, and Representatives Gibbs and Wintrow as the committee to wait upon and escort the elected officials to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The Speaker appointed Senators Winder and Stennett, and Representatives Moyle and Erpelding as the committee to wait upon and escort the Governor to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The committees appointed by the Speaker returned and escorted the Supreme Court Justices, Appellate Court Judges, the elected officials, and the Governor into the House Chamber where they were presented to the Joint Session by the Speaker.

The Speaker introduced His Excellency, the Governor of the State of Idaho, Brad Little, and the following **State of the State and Budget Address** was delivered by the Governor:

Mr. Speaker, Mr. Pro Tem, Madam President, honored legislators, my fellow constitutional officers, Mr. Chief Justice and members of the judiciary, my family, friends, and my fellow Idahoans.

Before I begin, let me acknowledge our new First Lady, Teresa, and our family – Adam and Angela, and David and Kelsey. A friend of mine refers to his wife as gravity, for her ability to keep him grounded. Teresa serves that purpose for me as well as the whole state of Idaho.

It is humbling to address you as Idaho's 33rd Governor. I'm used to a slightly different vantage point during this speech. I was here more than 42 years ago as a legislative intern. Legislators – I look forward to working with you to achieve our shared vision of making Idaho the best possible place to live for this generation and future generations of Idahoans.

I stand on the shoulders of great men and women who have mentored me along my way. Many are in this room today. Thank you for guidance and support.

As Idaho's new commander-in-chief, I want to thank the men and women serving in the Idaho National Guard. Last summer, our Idaho Army Guard deployed three Blackhawk MEDEVAC helicopters and their crews to Afghanistan. Godspeed, and I look forward to welcoming them home this spring.

Please join me in thanking Adjutant General Mike Garshak, all members of the Guard, and Idaho's veterans – past and present – for their service to our nation.

Let me say something about my predecessor and partner these past 10 years. Governor Butch Otter led Idaho during a

challenging time in our history, facing down the worst recession in 70 years. Now, Idaho is the fastest growing state in the country. Let us honor his legacy by keeping our budget balanced while investing in the future. Thank you for your service, Governor Ofter

I stand here today not to reminisce about Idaho's past, but to look to our future.

As Governor, I will seek to reflect our shared Idaho values and aspirations.

This means making decisions through one lens: the lens of ensuring the best possible opportunities for us, our children and grandchildren to remain in Idaho and enjoy our unparalleled quality of life.

Making decisions with a long-term perspective means staying focused on creating a regulatory and tax environment where Idahoans can get good-paying jobs.

It means having world-class schools.

It means delivering accessible and affordable healthcare.

It means giving citizens a reason to be confident in state government, by making government responsive, transparent, and accountable.

My team of agency directors and administrators is mostly in place. A requirement for each of them is a commitment to implementing our shared vision of creating the best possible opportunities for Idahoans to prosper. I'm humbled by their willingness to serve Idaho. I'd like them to stand and be recognized.

From Boundary to Bear Lake counties, and Letha to Leadore, I can tell you with confidence—the state of our state is strong.

Idahoans' incomes are the fastest growing in America. We have the highest number of people employed in our state's history.

Due to the good work of the folks in this room, Idaho remains a model for fiscal responsibility.

There is no shortage of success stories that reflect the strength of our state's economy.

Woodgrain Millworks, a Fruitland-based family-owned company operates sawmills and manufactures doors and windows. Under Kelly Dame, the company recently expanded in Nampa. They acquired and modernized the old sawmill in Emmett, assisting in our efforts for forest health.

The Dame sons— Brooks, Taylor, and Tanner— created Proof Eyewear. They took a small company they started in their garage and now sell wooden sunglasses in more than 20 countries. The family typifies the entrepreneurial spirit that thrives in Idaho. In Idaho Falls, Brad LaPray founded BiologiQ to create a useful plastic from the excess starch produced during potato processing. BiologiQ has grown from a simple concept into an industry-leading, sustainable bioplastics provider. It is another example of an innovative Idaho company using waste and turning it into a thriving business.

In Coeur d'Alene, Cody Peterson and Andy Huska founded Rohinni, a homegrown micro-LED manufacturer that's become a leading technology company. They design robots that install lots of tiny LED lights on everyday electronic gear. Their business is diversifying Idaho's economy, adding to our growing tech sector, and providing high-wage careers. In Arco, Dragon Fly Tarps manufactures custom tarps for the outdoor industry. The company just moved from the local business incubation center and continues to grow.

These companies and many others across Idaho ultimately offer our kids more opportunities to stay home or come back to Idaho.

Our state is on an incredible trajectory. With your help, I intend to lead us to the next level.

Making decisions with a long-term perspective means state government is fiscally sound and invests taxpayer dollars wisely.

Last year, we delivered one of the largest tax cuts in state history. As a result, state income and business tax rates are the lowest since 1934. Idahoans are enjoying bigger paychecks.

Even though sales tax and corporate tax revenues have been robust, our personal income tax receipts are falling short. The federal tax code changed recently, but few Idahoans know they need to update their tax withholdings. I am ordering the Tax Commission to do all they can to better inform taxpayers of what they need to do to avoid a surprise income tax bill.

My team is following this issue closely, confident revenues will eventually match the rapid pace of economic growth. Though we are confident, in true Idaho fashion, we will not spend money until it's in the bank.

My budget recommendation will balance our books and fulfill important promises.

I propose working together with you to set the stage next year – using our budget surplus – to eliminate the grocery tax once and for all

Additionally, any new tax exemption should be tied to a proportional reduction in state spending or real income generation.

As a conservative, I will utilize all other mechanisms to ensure our state remains fiscally sound over the long-term.

It is prudent to live by the advice of Speaker Bedke's grandfather: It won't be the bad years that put you out of business; it's what you did in the good years that sets you up for failure or success.

As we review our state budget—we must ask key questions:

Is there too much spending on autopilot? Are we putting off maintenance that will cost our children more tomorrow? Do we have adequate rainy-day funds? How do we structure the surplus eliminator?

These measures and my proposed budget ensure we avoid the short-term fiscal mistakes that other states and the federal government continue to make.

Let's talk about my number-one priority for our state budget: education. Education policy requires long-term planning and commitment.

These past four years, with the hard work of stakeholders and many legislators in this room, Idaho has a successful record of responsible investment in education. We have increased the budget for our schools by 32 percent. This past year, Idaho teachers received one of the nation's largest year-to-year pay increases.

As Governor, I will continue our momentum and be an unrelenting advocate for educational excellence in our state.

To amplify the voices of those on the front lines of education, I will create a Children's Cabinet to advise me throughout my term on a variety of education issues. My Children's Cabinet will consist of traditional education stakeholders, parents, and groups across our state dedicated to advocating for children.

Our Task Force on Public Education and its five-year plan has been the envy of other states. It has been the force behind an unprecedented, sustained effort to improve Idaho education.

My budget recommendation implements the fifth year of the task force recommendations. This investment puts in place the next phase of increased teacher salaries. I'm also recommending an increase to the popular Advanced Opportunity program, which saves Idaho families in tuition costs and provides stepping stones for students wanting to go-on to post-secondary opportunities that best suit them.

Now that we've agreed on a new Idaho Reading Indicator, I want to boost our efforts for literacy.

My budget recommendation proposes that we double literacy program funding to \$26 million.

The school districts will decide the best ways to use the funds to raise reading scores among their students. They will choose from a variety of proven intervention methods such as full-day kindergarten, reading coaches, and summer reading programs. The variety of methods recognizes no one kid is the same and that Boise may not have the solution for what works in Bonners Ferry or Blackfoot.

Our goal must be to ensure all kids begin at the same starting line in life. By the third grade, our students must learn to read so they can read to learn.

Our state still has many challenges when it comes to recruiting teachers.

In addition to supporting the next phase of teacher salary increases, my budget recommendation fulfills my promise to raise starting teacher pay to \$40,000 a year.

As we reward our educators we expect school districts to continue working with us on reporting measurements that Idahoans need to validate increased education investments.

We are proud of these efforts but there is still more to do.

Drawing on the successful model we've been using, I invite you to join me in creating an initiative I'm calling Our Kids, Idaho's Future. The charge of this broad-based task force will be to look at our education system holistically and prioritize where we should invest the next available dollar.

This initiative will provide Idaho's next five-year blueprint for education investment and reform.

I will continue to focus on increasing Idaho's go-on rates and accomplishing our goal of having 60-percent of our 25- to 34-year olds with a completed degree or a professional certificate. To do that, we must expand career technical opportunities.

Further, my budget recommendation increases funding for Opportunity Scholarship applicants, providing a market-based approach to higher education funding, with money following the students and allowing them to choose the institution and degree that best fits their needs.

In my work on economic development, I know there's a strong correlation between our education system and the attractiveness of our state to entrepreneurs and businesses.

Most importantly, a strong education system helps ensure we keep our best and brightest here in Idaho.

From the roads you drive to take your children to school to the hunting licenses you purchase, like it or not, the state has a monopoly on many services citizens cannot provide themselves. With this role, comes responsibility and accountability to Idahoans.

As your Governor, I pledge to champion citizen confidence in state government.

I've been frustrated with the major shortcomings in customer service at the Division of Motor Vehicles. The issues stem from contracting procedures. I have asked my new director at the Department of Administration to identify critical lessons from the DMV situation and provide a thorough review of our state purchasing and contract administration processes. Idahoans deserve an action plan for better results from government.

State government has a duty to protect the data citizens entrust to us. I chaired the Cybersecurity Task Force three years ago and we have made progress on this important issue.

Following these efforts, my budget recommendation lays out a plan for IT and cybersecurity modernization. This effort will significantly reduce our cyber vulnerability and provide long-term savings with the ultimate goals of protecting citizens' data and building public confidence.

There are other areas where we must maintain the trust of Idahoans.

On election day over 60% of voters approved Medicaid expansion. For months I made it clear I would honor the will of the people. I intend to work with you to implement Medicaid expansion using an Idaho approach.

We need spring in our safety net so that there are multiple pathways for the gap population to move off Medicaid and onto private coverage.

While making health care available to low-income individuals we should also do what we can to make affordable, accessible, quality health care available to all Idahoans.

An unintended outcome of the Affordable Care Act is that too many people are priced out of health insurance coverage. In the past two years, the number of uninsured Idahoans increased by 125,000 – almost double the gap population. As Idaho continues to enjoy the fastest-growing economy in the nation, the number of insured Idahoans should be increasing not decreasing.

We must pursue strategies that contain health care costs.

That's why I joined with Governor Otter last year in issuing an executive order on state-based individual market health plans. As Governor I will continue these efforts. These health care plans are comprehensive and provide our citizens more affordable choices

The fact is we have a proven track record of delivering Idaho solutions on health care. When Idaho opted for a state-run health insurance exchange, we created an Idaho solution instead of adopting a federal one-size-fits-all mandate.

Your Health Idaho has since been recognized as one of the best exchanges in the country.

I intend to continue developing Idaho solutions that bring health care costs down for all Idahoans. I have met with federal partners to pursue alternatives for affordable health care plans.

I will fight for state flexibility and state control to develop Idaho solutions for Idaho families.

Public safety is one of the pillars of state government. Idahoans enjoy a high quality of life in part because we live in one of the safest states in the nation.

We must hold those who violate our laws accountable, but we also must invest in changing their behavior, so our communities will be safer once offenders pay their debt to society.

My budget recommendation takes on this challenge in a way that provides not only an increase in our prison capacity but also the resources needed to reduce the flow of inmates to our prisons. This will be done by expanding the St. Anthony Work Camp in eastern Idaho and opening a community reentry center in northern Idaho.

In addition to providing timely relief to Idaho's overcrowded prisons, these combined 220 beds focus specifically on helping those in custody acquire critical skills to successfully transition back into society after release.

Former offenders cannot be successful after reentry and on parole if we don't have the necessary bed space and programs – such as drug courts – to halt the revolving door.

Help for substance abuse is often only available once a person becomes an offender. There is a clear nexus between mental health and substance abuse. We must intervene in these areas prior to individuals entering our criminal justice system.

Communities across Idaho face the scourge of opioid addiction and other substance abuse problems. Fortunately, there is a solid foundation of work on this issue. Two years ago, the Idaho Office of Drug Policy and the Department of Health and Welfare convened a stakeholder group that put together a strategic five-year action plan on tackling the issue of opioid addiction in Idaho.

We know the challenge is larger than just opioid addiction. Many problems that begin with opioids evolve into heroin and fentanyl.

Looking ahead, I will issue an executive order on substance abuse – formalizing this existing opioid plan, broadening these efforts, directing future resources, and creating non-offender programs for substance abuse.

This makes the most sense because treating addicts and those with mental health problems in prison is expensive and often too late.

As we seek ways to reduce health care costs and protect the public, we also must make sure state government is reducing all unnecessary barriers to prosperity.

One barrier is the daunting financial reality facing first-time homebuyers, particularly young people just starting their careers and families.

One specific proposal I will champion to help more Idahoans achieve the American Dream is the First-Time Home Buyer

Savings Account. This account will encourage young families to set aside part of their pre-tax income to make a down payment on their first home.

Idaho is seeing unprecedented economic growth in many parts of the state. However, that growth has not been matched in all our communities. In my travels, I constantly hear how the absence of adequate broadband infrastructure is a deterrent to growth and economic development. The Idaho Department of Commerce spent the past year analyzing the statewide challenge of inadequate broadband.

To ensure Idaho can adapt to the rapidly evolving digital world, we must actively work to improve Idaho's broadband access, pursuing all options to increase broadband connectivity. I will work with the Legislature to ensure both rural and urban Idaho are connected and well-positioned to attract and create maximum success.

I am also committed to knocking down other barriers to independence and prosperity. In May 2017, I issued the Licensing Freedom Act executive order.

Late last year, I finalized a report that outlined the scope of occupational licensing in Idaho and provided key recommendations. Working closely with the Legislature I intend to fulfill all recommendations from the Licensing Freedom Act – reducing regulatory burdens and improving customer service while protecting the public.

My first executive order as Governor will put in place two of those recommendations: sunrise and sunset processes for future occupational licensing laws.

To reduce overall regulatory burdens on our citizens and businesses, I will issue another executive order requiring state agencies to revoke two regulations for every new regulation they want to implement. This commitment to cutting red tape will ensure we are governing with the lightest possible hand.

Looking long-term, we must address transportation deficiencies. I ask you to join me in looking at these long-term needs – specifically, the safety of our roads and bridges and the necessary improvements to preserve our citizens' most precious commodity: their time. It is critical that we provide the needed road capacity to get our people and products to their destinations in the most efficient manner.

All these efforts will help Idaho remain a beacon for prosperity and opportunity in America.

Agriculture remains the backbone of Idaho's rural economy. As is often the case, agriculture is coping with the effects of significant challenges, from commodity prices to transportation and trade

As they have for generations, progressive farmers and ranchers meet these challenges by increasing their production and efficiency. Idaho's wheat yield was up 15 percent and set a record this year. The barley yield is up 10 percent from last year, and alfalfa is up 19 percent. Idaho jumped Oregon to become the number two hop producing state in the nation. In the past 16 years, Idaho's dairy production has doubled.

Idaho remains a heavily trade-dependent state, with around \$2 billion in agricultural exports. When markets are open, agriculture makes the most of those opportunities. When markets are disrupted, we feel it.

The profitability of Idaho agriculture and its ability to compete nationally and internationally is dependent upon the time and cost of getting our products to consumers.

I look forward to working with you to increase rail access, address truck shortages, and reduce the burdens of federal regulations.

You all know water is Idaho's lifeblood, and we've made great strides in protecting it.

Under the leadership of the Water Resource Board, we have doubled our goal of refilling and replenishing our critically important Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer, adding more water this year than was removed. While this is an impressive accomplishment, this must be an ongoing effort.

Regardless of the water year, we must focus on expanding the water infrastructure across our state.

If water is Idaho's lifeblood, our public lands are surely one of our state's greatest assets. Idaho-based collaboration is key to addressing the many issues facing public lands. Together, we must responsibly manage and protect the special places that make Idaho unique. As Governor, I will work to expand access and tackle threats to our public lands.

This work will protect important industries for our economy. From motorized recreation, rafting, skiing, and hunting, to hiking, fishing, and camping, Idaho's outdoor recreation industry generates billions in consumer spending each year and supports 78,000 jobs across the state. Iconic companies like Smith Optics, Buck Knives, CLIF Bar, Vista Outdoor, and numerous guides and outfitters call our state home.

Idaho's lands and waterways provide unparalleled outdoor recreation opportunities, enhancing the quality of life for Idahoans and attracting visitors, which in turn power urban and rural economies across our state.

There are threats to our public lands that must be confronted.

Wildfire is a part of living in the West.

Several factors contribute to the increasing frequency of catastrophic wildfires. These fires threaten public safety and pump millions of tons of pollutants into the air, harming the health of our citizens. They damage wildlife habitat and contaminate our pristine waters. They disrupt our economy and cost taxpayers millions of dollars every year.

One of those threats is the buildup of fuels on our public lands closest to where we live, work, and play.

A few weeks ago, I signed a first-of-its-kind agreement between Idaho and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This collaborative agreement will reduce wildfire risk, improve forest health and enhance wildlife habitat, by actively managing more acres of federal forests.

The new "shared stewardship" approach unifies land management activities that are now disjointed across federal, state, and privately-owned tracts. We'll use all the tools available to us to reduce fuels around communities, including timber harvest, prescribed burns, and other activities.

We're already seeing a return on our investment in the Good Neighbor Authority, a program that utilizes state employees and contracting processes for restoration work on federal lands.

Idaho is leading the country in our fresh, collaborative approach to land management. Other states have already reached

out to Idaho for the Shared Stewardship blueprint we created with the Feds.

In addition, there are now over 300 ranchers and farmers who are members of nine rangeland fire protection associations across southern Idaho. The initial attack and intel they provide on more than 9 million acres of Idaho's rangeland have given Idaho significantly improved chances against the devastation of large wildfires.

The Idaho National Laboratory (INL) is one of our state's largest employers. It is a national asset dedicated to our energy and security interests.

I have been impressed to see collaboration between the lab and our state's universities. Those enhanced ties will result in a more secure nation, a thriving laboratory, and strengthened university programs. Most importantly, it presents opportunities for our state's best and brightest students to work and raise their families right here in Idaho.

With that in mind, I am pleased to announce that I am authorizing the continuation of the Leadership in Nuclear Energy (LINE) Commission. The LINE Commission will remain dedicated to advising us so we can promote the advancement of nuclear energy and ensure the vitality of the INL.

There is an incredible opportunity for Idaho, its businesses, and its institutions of higher learning to lead our nation, and the globe in pushing the new frontiers of safe, clean nuclear energy development.

In addition to world class research, Idaho has one of the most affordable and sustainable energy supplies in America. It's clean, with a mix of hydroelectric, wind, and solar. This energy mix and low cost make Idaho competitive in attracting new industries.

I am intent on seizing this moment. Through the free market and the innovations at the INL, Idaho will continue to expand opportunities for clean and affordable energy for our citizens and the world.

Idaho is ready to lead.

My friends, if we create an environment that brings about economic prosperity, if we continue to invest and modernize education, if we do what we can to make healthcare accessible and affordable, if we invest in our infrastructure, if we protect our natural resources, and if we assure citizen confidence in government, we will keep our best and brightest here in Idaho.

It is an honor to offer this State of the State to the interns, pages, young viewers, and our children and grandchildren. When they eventually occupy these seats here, in the People's House – if we do the job before us now – I am confident they will thank us in the decades to come.

Thank you and God bless Idaho.

Burdick into the Senate Chamber where he delivered the following **State of the Judiciary Address**:

Again, thank you for the honor of appearing in front of you to discuss Idaho's judiciary, a group made up of not only judges and state administrative staff, but also hundreds of dedicated county clerks, probation officers and other county employees without which we could never do our jobs as judges. We can never forget the debt of gratitude judges owe to county commissioners and elected county clerks.

I'd like to now welcome the new members of Idaho's legislative and executive branch officers. A hardy welcome to twenty-five new legislators as well as a dozen or so new department directors. A special welcome to our new lieutenant governor, Janice McGeachin who will grow to love these State of Judiciary speeches as much as I have!

Because of so many new faces I thought I would like to highlight a few of our past accomplishments and then quickly touch on future issues affecting the "State of the Judiciary."

A national survey conducted by the Conference of Chief Justices has found that confidence in state court systems is at the highest level since polling was started in 2012. Idaho does share in that good news as a result of your support for new ideas to solve old or new problems as well as the hard work of our judges and county partners.

In 2014 I had reported that since 2000, 43 district judges had been appointed. Now since 2014 another 7 appellate judges and justices, 16 district judges and 22 magistrate judges have retired. This has resulted in a whole new generation of judges and justices. As you can see the legislature and executive branches are not alone in change.

As I did last year, I must acknowledge and congratulate the members of Idaho Judicial Council and their executive director for a frantic schedule of judicial applicant interviews as well as their usual review of disciplinary complaints against judges. Not only have they worked hard in preparing for these interviews, they have always acted in good faith without outside influences.

We continue to monitor what is needed to recruit and retain judicial applicants by preparing and disseminating a new survey of the Idaho State Bar about barriers to judicial careers. This is an improved survey which mirrors our original groundbreaking survey of and the resulting report published in June of 2010. I think that survey directly led to greater participation of women in our judiciary. Women members of the Idaho judiciary have grown to 23% which largely reflects the 28% of women members in the Idaho Bar. We are again seeing recruiting challenges for district judges. Just last week only five applications were received for a district judge position in Canyon County. For the most recent magistrate judge vacancy in that same county, we had 17 applicants.

Our continued hope is that you believe with us, that the attraction of our best and brightest lawyers to the judiciary is vital to the continued rule of law for all in Idaho.

Also in the 2014 State of the Judiciary, I introduced you to our new request for the largest cultural change in the Idaho judiciary's history - Odyssey. Your support as well as initial financing and an ongoing fee structure has supported a herculean effort of technology change from the old ISTARS system to Odyssey.

This roll out was completed in three phases or "waves". We started with our pilot program in Twin Falls County and then the 1st wave of the 5th District and 4th District counties; the 2nd Wave of central Idaho's 14 counties, and finally southeastern Idaho's 10 counties. Our staff, with the help of county clerks, transferred old records, pre-tested and installed new software, squashed countless bugs in the system, and supported all of that in the extensive training for all clerks in every county, and we continue to support and educate every day.

Now that the base product has been installed we will be working on a great many large and small hacks, projects, or fixes to make sure this basic implementation continues to meet the needs of our citizens, lawyers, justice partners, counties, and judges. There is also a need for the usual hardware upkeep and replacement that we furnish to our counties and judges. As you can see, we have more work to accomplish. Many more features are to come

As part of our new attorney management program we are working with prosecutors and public defenders in two counties for a truly integrated case management system. Additionally a new statewide jury system will help counties who opt-in handle jury management. For your constituents as a part of the jury management module, a citizen would be updated and notified of their schedule to appear for jury duty by up-to-date text messaging.

Lastly, Odyssey has now converted all court filings in the trial and appellate courts to e-filing. We have heard positive feedback on this change and we will continue to upgrade as time goes on.

This entire time slot could be taken with the past work, present impact and future work to be done with Odyssey but I need to move on. Again I thank the legislature for your continued commitment to Odyssey.

I previously mentioned the generational change of the judiciary, but this demographic reality exists throughout Idaho. In 2014 I referred to it this way

By 2030 Idaho's total population is projected to increase by 52 percent while the number of individuals over the age of 65 will grow by 147 percent. There were over 1200 new guardianship or conservatorships filed [in 2013]. Once a guardian has been appointed the monitoring will often continue for years.

A 2010 study found 47% of dementia patients were mistreated in some way and developmentally disabled individuals are 4 to 10 times more likely to be abused. Again with your support and working with our counties, I can report significant improvements in modernizing our procedures and safeguards for this growing and sometimes, vulnerable group of citizens.

These strides have been accomplished with the leadership of our Guardian/Conservator Committee composed of representatives, not only from the courts, but also practicing lawyers, state agencies and many other interest groups that have driven this systemic change.

The Committee has put processes in place to monitor the well-being of the protected person and the financial health of the estate, practices to ensure the protection ordered in a case is specific to the needs of the protected person, and created training to ensure all parties are aware of guardian and conservator responsibilities and duties.

You appropriated monies so we could fulfill our statutory duties to monitor guardianships and conservatorships with monitoring coordinators in all seven judicial districts. These persons have allowed a much more robust handling of these cases and have been a marvelous help, not only to our busy magistrate judges, but also, and most importantly, the protected persons.

In the future, the courts face a daunting task of finding future guardians or conservators for increasing numbers of individuals left with no one else to step in to help. These are challenges we will undoubtedly seek your counsel in the future.

Again in 2014, I congratulated the legislature for "wisely" identifying two of the chronic problems that impact Idahoans and the judicial system - public defense and justice reinvestment.

We, as a judicial system, have and continue to have a constitutional duty to assure due process and a legal duty to help protect society.

In 1923, our Supreme Court said in State v. Montroy:

It is the public policy of this state, disclosed by constitutional guarantees as well as by numerous provisions of the statutes, to accord to every person accused of a crime, not only a fair and impartial trial, but every reasonable opportunity to prepare his defense and to vindicate his innocence upon a trial. In a case of indigent persons accused of crime, the court must assign counsel to the defense at public expense.

This was a full 40 years before it became a federal requirement for public defense.

With your guidance and help, the Public Defense Commission continues to strengthen the counties' ability to meet this expensive but necessary obligation. In reviewing the accomplishments of the Idaho State Public Defense Commission, I applaud the progress they have made.

The Commission has recommended and instituted procedural improvements, as well as started data collection of workload and other deficiencies for future analysis. They have instituted a vital training schedule, helped counties with grants to fund public defenders and also helped with extraordinary litigation costs to certain counties. These improvements are as a result of 175 meetings with county commissioners and clerks to define needs, explain best practices, and monitor improvements. The Idaho judiciary supports this start, but more work is needed.

Your Justice Reinvestment Initiative was again mentioned in 2014, as the courts, the Department of Corrections, and the legislature examined ways to approach criminal sentencing and corrections more efficiently. This significant change has had mixed results, but we in the courts realize there are better ways to handle criminality than building bigger jails and prisons. During this time of change and analysis the Idaho Prosecutors Association and Department of Corrections both agree our district judges are appropriately sentencing criminals and now the question remains what is the best method to protect society while rehabilitating those in the system. We must all remember 90% or more of these individuals will return to our neighborhoods. Our judges have always felt more support is needed in terms of probation officers, rehabilitation services, and halfway houses so that defendants have a better chance at normalization before they are released by the courts or the Department of Corrections. We continue to support efforts for more local placement and resources. Our successful problem-solving courts are just one of many approaches. They are seen as an innovative body to balance risk and rehabilitation.

We applaud your bold initiative to reinvest in local support and options to incarceration. At the same time we continue to be acutely aware of our number one priority – to protect the public.

Another vital program which you have found valuable and which we believe stretches state dollars and adds vital judicial manpower is the Senior Judge program. Our first senior judge program started in 2000.

The Senior judge program pays retired judges at reduced rates to support personnel needs for sitting judges. Senior judges are only paid for the days they work. These judges are the ones who fill in when vacancies appear due to disability, sickness, or other excused absences. They are also a vital resource to cover when there is a gap or delay in replacing a retired judge. They handle overflows of cases or in areas where the caseload is too heavy, but there isn't enough need for a new judicial position to be filled. For instance in 2018 Senior judges worked 1,110 days in the courtroom, an equivalent of 11.3 additional judges. Senior judges also worked with iCourt training mentoring or in other leadership roles. Without these Senior judges there would be significant backlogs and or stoppages in case flow, which would be a disaster.

In trying to keep a cutting edge judicial system for Idaho I'd like to quickly review changes in administration over the last few years. First, I'd like to introduce our new Court of Appeal Judge and Supreme Court Justices appointed in 2018.

First, the new Court of Appeals Judge; the Honorable Amanda K. Brailsford sworn in on January 2, 2019. Next our two new Supreme Court Justices; the Honorable John Stegner sworn in on June 29, 2018 and finally the Honorable Greg Moeller sworn in January 3, 2019. I'd like all three to stand and be recognized. Thank you.

In 2014 the court completely revamped its accounting system. This came as a result of one of Cathy Holland Smith's "gentle urgings" that we needed to get better immediately. Since then we have completely reorganized and modernized our budgeting procedures and financial reports. The budgeting improvements help us to gain better insight into the real needs of your local courts. Additionally we've received comments from budget analysists and others about the increased transparency and professional presentation our improvements have produced.

In order to educate as well as help judges receive real feedback on their performance, you saw fit in 2017 to start implementing a new and vastly improved Judicial Performance program. This program includes surveys taken by clerks, lawyers and others concerning a local judge's performance. These surveys were created and vetted by national experts from the National Center for State Courts. These are shared with the individual judge and mentor judges may be assigned to help with any improvements. To date 98 judges have gone through this examination and new mentor judges are being trained by our education staff. Again this shows your support for an excellent judiciary and our commitment to continued improvement.

I have covered the most significant projects which have shaped the State of Idaho's judiciary in the near past. I'd like to project a few ideas for Idaho's judicial future.

Has anyone noticed the traffic in our hometowns or on our highways? Idaho has been discovered and we must stay vigilant to meet the needs of our new Idahoans. They bring new vitality, ideas, and expectations to Idaho. Just the sheer numbers will increase more judicial services which by constitution and statute must be met. The Courts must meet this need with new efficiencies and technology. As a result, our technology platform base is in place and we are working to make the changes or improvements to perfect it. We must look to new technologies to protect individual's private information, while making sure our court processes are transparent.

The courts are a main hub of information and data for a myriad of city, county, state, and commercial interests. One of our main customers for data is the legislature - your need for strong, fair policy must be supported by data from the courts. We take this challenge seriously. We are piloting new technology called Socrata to help take the millions of data points in the court and streamline and collate them. Then we can give you the most up-to-date comprehensive reports available.

We are experiencing exaggerated growth patterns in our major urban areas. In these areas we will be watching closely as to when new magistrate or district judge positions are needed. The judiciary has a solid history of making sure all alternatives - Senior judges and traveling judges - are used fully before we request new judgeships. This conservative approach takes into consideration the financial impact on our county partners as well as the State's financial and safety concerns. Our fastest growing

area is Ada County and we will be requesting new judges to meet this remarkable demand.

Our growth contains all age groups but a significant group will be retirees. As a result our emphasis on guardianships and conservatorships will have to continue and expand.

Some of our newest Idahoans are not welcome but they are a fact of life - criminals. Anecdotally, I hear from law enforcement and prosecutors of the increased violence and drug activities of their criminal caseload. This adds the necessity for high functioning trial judges as well as evidence based practices for pre-trial release or sentencing, as well as increased community services to meet safety and rehabilitation needs.

Another avenue to produce efficiencies is the work of the Civil Justice Reform Task Force started under Chief Justice Jim Jones and spearheaded by its chair - Court of Appeals Judge Molly Huskey. The report is due this month and includes recommendations for significant rule changes concerning discovery, fast tracking of cases as well as others. This report will be reviewed by the Supreme Court and portions or all of it will be adopted.

We as a court system will continue to struggle with access to justice issues. Translation costs continue to rise and cost of litigation may price all of us out of courts not just our working poor. Again we support the legislature's financial support of Idaho Legal Aid to help with some of these issues. We stand ready to work with the Legislature and Idaho Legal aid to craft a path going forward.

I hope I have acquainted you with our recent past and projected some issues for our near future.

I sum up with this observation. These items I've mentioned have been accomplished with just 1.3% of the general fund. The national average hovers around 3%. In closing I'd like to share a quote from the State of the Judiciary 2018:

In summary, the State of the judiciary is in large part a function of the cooperation of the Legislative and Executive branches, as well as our county partners. Although an independent co-equal branch of government, we rise or fall based upon cooperation.

The same holds true for this past year and I hope this cooperation continues so I can report a robust judiciary in 2020.

The President thanked Chief Justice Burdick for his remarks and Senator Lakey, Chairman, and Senators Cheatham and Ward-Engelking escorted Chief Justice Burdick from the Chamber, and the Committee was discharged.

### SCR 101 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND HONORING THE AMERICAN LEGION IN ITS CENTENNIAL YEAR.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the American Legion, a patriotic veterans service organization, was founded on March 15, 1919, by American servicemen in France and was chartered by Congress on September 16 of that year; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion Department of Idaho was granted its temporary charter in 1919 and its permanent charter on August 1, 1920; and

WHEREAS, since its establishment, the American Legion has been dedicated to serving the interests of veterans and the nation; and

WHEREAS, the United States Veterans Bureau, which later became the Veterans Administration and the Department of Veterans Affairs, was created on August 9, 1921, as a result of efforts led by the American Legion; and WHEREAS, in 1942, Congress adopted the Flag Code, originally drafted at an American Legion conference, regarding the proper care and display of the United States flag; and

WHEREAS, in 1944, after being promoted by the American Legion, the Servicemen's Readjustment Act, more commonly known as the G.I. Bill, was signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, enabling millions of veterans to attain higher education; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion donated \$1 million to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund for construction of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C., the American Legion being responsible for the largest single contribution to the project; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion's efforts to serve veterans included sponsoring an independent study on the effects of exposure to Agent Orange. The study results were presented to Congress in 1989; and

WHEREAS, in 2010, the American Legion's Operation Comfort Warriors, a program to assist wounded, injured, or ill service personnel by providing items not usually furnished by the government, including leisure wear, books, games, and other entertainment, earned first place and a \$250,000 grant in the Pepsi Refresh Project; and

WHEREAS, today, the American Legion is the largest wartime veterans service organization, with nearly 2 million members, including about 10,000 members in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion has more than 12,000 posts in communities throughout the United States, including 99 posts in Idaho, with additional posts in France, Mexico, and the Philippines; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion is also dedicated to serving our country's youth through such programs as: American Legion Baseball, which fields more than 5,600 amateur baseball teams throughout the United States and Canada, and which has been supported by the American Legion Department of Idaho since 1926; Boys State, a leadership development program serving approximately 20,000 young men annually; and the American Legion National High School Oratorical Program, a speech contest intended to teach leadership skills, American history, and an understanding of the rights, privileges, and obligations of American citizenship; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion Department of Idaho purchased its department headquarters in 1988 and has maintained consistently high membership numbers over many years; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion is celebrating the hundredth anniversary of its creation this year.

# SCR 102 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND PROVIDING APPROVAL FOR NORTH IDAHO COLLEGE TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH THE IDAHO STATE BUILDING AUTHORITY TO ASSIST WITH DEVELOPMENT OF SPECIFIED FACILITIES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the First Regular Session of the Fifty-seventh Idaho Legislature passed House Concurrent Resolution 30, authorizing eight state bodies and community college districts, including North Idaho College located in Coeur d'Alene, to enter into agreements with the Idaho State Building Authority to develop or renovate specified facilities located throughout Idaho; and

WHEREAS, North Idaho College wishes to help the north Idaho communities it serves and ensure modern and appropriate facilities exist for students pursuing careers in health and natural sciences, as well as appropriate athletic facilities for all students; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the significant immediate economic stimulus that would be provided by proceeding with these projects; and

WHEREAS, such projects will be of public use and provide a benefit to the public at large; and

WHEREAS, the college has demonstrated sufficient funding to cover the costs associated with bonding for a new facility; however, the college does not have sufficient funding to cover the estimated design and construction costs of up to \$25,000,000 associated with this project up front; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the state and North Idaho College for this authorization to be provided for the development of new and expanded facilities for use by North Idaho College.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislature hereby authorizes and provides approval for North Idaho College to enter into an agreement with the Idaho State Building Authority, under such terms and conditions as may be reasonable and necessary, to use the authority and power of the Idaho State Building Authority to assist North Idaho College with the development of an expansion to the Meyer Health and Science Building and an athletic complex to be located in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution constitutes authorization to enter into an agreement for purposes of Section 67-6410, Idaho Code.

### SJM 101 BY RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF CONGRESS, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, AND TO THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, approximately 63% of land in the State of Idaho is public land controlled by the United States, primarily by the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service, which makes the right to cross federal land for delivery of water rights to Idaho water users extremely important; and

WHEREAS, the law of the United States, since the 1866 Mining Act, has recognized that a water user in the arid West has the right to divert water from the rivers and streams across federal land for use on private property for, among other purposes, mining and agriculture. When the water user has a water right appropriated under state law, the law provides that a water user needs no approval from the federal government for the diversion and beneficial use of the water on the user's private property; and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress passed the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA), as amended, in 1976, which explicitly recognizes and protects easements and rights existing on federal lands and recognizes under previous laws, such as the 1866 Mining Act, to deliver water appropriated under state law across federal land to private property; and

WHEREAS, Congress passed an amendment to FLPMA in 1986 known as the Colorado Ditch Bill Act, which explicitly directs the Secretary of Agriculture to issue a permanent easement for a water system involving reservoirs, canals, ditches, flumes, laterals, pipes, pipelines, tunnels, and other facilities and systems, for the impoundment, storage, transportation, and distribution of water traversing federal lands within the National Forest System when: (1) the water system is used for agricultural irrigation or livestock purposes; (2) the system that existed in 1976 has remained in operation; (3) any enlargement of the system after 1976 requires separate authorization; (4) the user has a valid state water right; and (5) the use involves some private land. The water users were to supply the Forest Service with evidence of the location of easements; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho has had a comprehensive method for recognizing the appropriation of waters of the state for beneficial use under the priority doctrine since before statehood; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho recognized in 1984 the need to adjudicate the water rights of this state and the Legislature directed the Department of Water Resources to initiate the Snake River Basin Adjudication (SRBA), as provided by Idaho law, to facilitate the effective management of the waters of the Snake River Basin and to engage in a comprehensive adjudication of all surface and ground water use in the basin; and

WHEREAS, the United States was a party to the SRBA, is bound by the decrees of the SRBA court, and must recognize the water rights of the Idaho water users as decreed by the SRBA court; and

WHEREAS, the SRBA issued more than 167,000 water rights and issued its final unified decree in 2014, in which the SRBA court decreed water rights with priority rights dating back, in some instances, to the 1860s; and

WHEREAS, Congress further directed that applications under the Colorado Ditch Bill Act by easement holders be submitted by the end of 1996 to assist the Secretary of Agriculture in issuing permanent easements; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of Agriculture has not issued or recognized many of these permanent easements, even though the water rights have been decreed by the SRBA court and the applications have been submitted as required by Congress more than 20 years ago; and

WHEREAS, certain interest groups are arguing that the secretary must take actions harmful to the pre-FLPMA easement holders because the secretary has not issued the mandated easements; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of Agriculture could not have harmed such potential easement holders' rights had the secretary lawfully complied with the law passed by Congress in 1986 and issued the permanent easements as mandated by Congress; and

WHEREAS, the vast majority of surface water rights in this state were decreed with priority dates that preceded the enactment of FLPMA in 1976, and those water uses are entitled to the right to cross federal lands to deliver their state water rights; and

WHEREAS, there are many Idaho water users, such as the members of the Salmon Headwaters Conservation Association, that properly complied with the easement requirements specified by the Colorado Ditch Bill Act to have their permanent easement recognized by the United States, but are now required to further expend resources on legal and administrative processes to defend and protect their valid existing Idaho water rights and associated rights-of-way across federal land.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature,

the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we urge the President of the United States and Congress to take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture to recognize valid easements existing pursuant to the 1866 Mining Act on lands under their respective administrations without requiring citizens of the United States to sue the government in order to enjoy the benefits of such validly existing easement rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and Congress take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of Agriculture to recognize valid easements existing prior to FLPMA on lands within the National Forest System without requiring citizens of the United States to sue the government in order to enjoy the benefits of such validly existing rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in recognition that the Secretary of Agriculture has not acted on applications submitted more than 20 years ago, the President and Congress are urged to take such action as necessary to extend the deadline for filing applications under FLPMA for an additional two years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and Congress are urged to take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of Agriculture to refrain from interfering with the use of any decreed water right by attempting under any federal law to attach conditions on any 1866 Mining Act or FLPMA easements crossing federal lands, especially in a manner that restricts or conditions in any way the use of water on private land as authorized by state law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, to the Secretary of Agriculture, and to the Secretary of the Interior.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the growth and abuse of federal regulatory authority threatens our constitutional liberties, including those guaranteed by the Bill of Rights in the First, Second, Fourth, and Fifth Amendments of our Constitution; and

WHEREAS, federal regulators must be more accountable to elected representatives of the people and not immune from such accountability; and

WHEREAS, the United States House of Representatives has passed the Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny (REINS) Act to require that Congress approve major new federal regulations before they can take effect; and

WHEREAS, even if enacted, a law may be repealed or waived by a future Congress and President; and

WHEREAS, an amendment to the United States Constitution does not require the President's approval and cannot be waived by a future Congress and President.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we hereby urge the United States Congress to vote to propose the Regulation Freedom Amendment to the United States Constitution as follows:

Whenever one quarter of the members of the United States House of Representatives or the United States Senate transmits to the President their written declaration of opposition to a proposed federal regulation, it shall require a majority vote of the House of Representatives and the Senate to adopt that regulation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

# SJM 103 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the United States and Canada have one of the largest trading relationships in the world. Canada is the United States' largest export market, valued at \$320 billion in goods and services, and the United States is Canada's largest export market, valued at \$308 billion in goods and services; and

WHEREAS, free, fair, open, and mutually beneficial trade between our two countries will continue to strengthen the economies of both countries; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, trade between the United States and Canada totaled over \$1.7 billion in goods and services every day, supporting nine million jobs in the United States and 2.1 million jobs in Canada; and

WHEREAS, in the more than 20 years since the United States, Canada, and Mexico entered into the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), North American trade has tripled from \$340 billion in 1993 to \$1.2 trillion in 2016; and

WHEREAS, on March 1, 2018, the United States announced tariffs on steel and aluminum, initially granting waivers to Canada and Mexico: and

WHEREAS, on June 30, 2018, the United States revoked the waivers, levying tariffs on both Canada and Mexico; and

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2018, Canada imposed retaliatory tariffs on United States products totaling \$12.8 billion, and on July 5, 2018, Mexico imposed retaliatory tariffs on United States products worth \$3 billion; and

WHEREAS, North American integration under NAFTA has helped to make the region more competitive in the world economy by providing highly integrated and valuable supply chains, common rules, and harmonized regulations that increase the speed and global competitiveness of our businesses, driving investment and imbedding value in each others' economic success, and providing jobs in North American communities that depend on efficient and effective supply chains; and

WHEREAS, Canada and Mexico are, respectively, the no. 1 and no. 3 export markets for United States agricultural products; and

WHEREAS, since NAFTA was signed in 1992, agricultural exports from the United States have increased from \$8.7 billion in 1992 to \$39 billion in 2017; and

WHEREAS, Canada was Idaho's largest trade partner in 2017, with total exports exceeding \$845 million and total imports exceeding \$1 billion; and

WHEREAS, Canada, Mexico, and the United States have, in signing the United States, Mexico, and Canada Agreement (USMCA), agreed to make targeted improvements to NAFTA that build on the enormously successful North American partnership and our shared competitiveness in the global marketplace.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we support the ratification of USMCA and urge Congress to ratify the agreement as soon as possible.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage President Trump's administration to renew its original waiver on steel and aluminum tariffs for Canada and Mexico.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we call on Canada and Mexico to remove retaliatory tariffs on all United States goods and services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

Notice that is given by first class mail must be mailed as soon as practicable following the contract or agreement to perform the work and at least seven (7) days prior to the entry onto the land unless the notice period is waived in writing by the landowner, occupant, or an agent thereof. Notice that is given by personal notice must be hand-delivered to the landowner or occupant or, if hand delivery cannot be accomplished, it may be posted in a conspicuous place where the landowner or occupant may reasonably be expected to see the notice. The notice shall give the professional land surveyor's name, address, telephone number, purpose, availability of the survey, and the presence of any temporary or permanent monuments or other markers to be established by the surveyor and left on the land. The surveyor or his agent or employee shall cooperate with the landowner, occupant, or agent thereof to avoid disruption of a business or agricultural operation.".

- $39\mbox{-}1202.$  DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this chapter:
  - (1) "Board" means the Idaho board of health and welfare.
- (2) "Child care" means that care, control, supervision or maintenance of children for twenty-four (24) hours a day which is provided as an alternative to parental care.
- (3) "Child" means an individual less than eighteen (18) years of age who is not enrolled in an institution of higher education.
- (4) "Children's agency" means a person who operates a business for the placement of children in foster homes or for adoption in a permanent home and who does not provide child care as part of that business. Children's agency does not include a licensed attorney or physician assisting or providing natural and adoptive parents with legal services or medical services necessary to initiate and complete adoptive placements.
- (5) "Children's camp" means a program of child care at a location away from the child's home which is primarily recreational and includes the overnight accommodation of the child and is not intended to provide treatment, therapy or rehabilitation for the child.
- "Children's institution" means a person who operates a residential facility for children not related to that person if that person is an individual, for the purpose of providing child care. Children's institutions include, but are not limited to, foster homes, maternity homes, children's therapeutic outdoor programs, or any facilities providing treatment, therapy or rehabilitation for children. Children's institutions do not include: (a) facilities which provide only daycare as defined in chapter 11, title 39, Idaho Code; (b) facilities and agencies including hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, and intermediate care facilities for people with intellectual disabilities licensed pursuant to chapter 13, title 39, Idaho Code; (c) day schools; (d) individuals acting in an advisory capacity, counseling a child in a religious context, and providing no child care associated with the advice; (e) the occasional or irregular care of a neighbor's, relative's or friend's child or children by a person not ordinarily engaged in child care.
- (7) "Children's residential care facility" means a children's institution, excluding:
  - (a) Foster homes;
  - (b) Residential schools;
  - (c) Children's camps; and
- (d) Temporary alcohol-drug abuse treatment facilities. No facility expressly excluded from the definition of a children's

No facility expressly excluded from the definition of a children's institution is included within the definition of a children's residential care facility.

- (8) "Children's therapeutic outdoor program" is a program which is designed to provide behavioral, substance abuse, or mental health services to minors in an outdoor setting. This does not include children's camps, church camps, or other outdoor programs primarily designed to be educational or recreational, such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H or sports camps.
- (9) "Continued care" means the ongoing placement of an individual in a foster home, children's residential care facility, or

- transitional living placement who reaches the age of eighteen (18) years but is less than twenty-one (21) years of age.
- (10) "Day school" means a public, private, parochial or secular facility offering an educational program in which the children leave the facility each day at the conclusion of the academic, vocational or school supervised activities.
- (11) "Department" means the state department of health and welfare.
- (12) "Director" means the director of the department of health and welfare.
- (13) "Foster care" means child care by a person not related to the child, in lieu of parental care, in a foster home.
- (14) "Foster home" means a home which accepts, for any period of time, with or without compensation, one (1) or more children who are not related to the foster parent as members of the household for the purpose of providing substitute parental care.
- (15) "Group care" means foster care of a number of children for whom child care in a family setting is not available or appropriate, in a dormitory or cottage type setting, characterized by activities and discipline of a more regimented and less formal nature than found in a family setting.
- (16) "Juvenile detention" is as defined in section 20-502(6), Idaho Code, of the juvenile corrections act.
- (17) "Juvenile detention center" means a facility established pursuant to sections 20-517 and 20-518, Idaho Code.
- (18) "Person" includes any individual, group of individuals, association, partnership, limited liability company or corporation.
- (19) "Placement" means finding a suitable licensed foster home or suitable adoptive home for a child and completing the arrangements for a child to be accepted into and adjusted to such home
- (20) "Relative" means a child's grandparent, great grandparent, aunt, great aunt, uncle, great uncle, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, first cousin, sibling and half-sibling.
- (21) "Representative" means an employee of the state department of health and welfare.
- (22) "Residential facility" means any facility where child care is provided, as defined in this section, and which provides day and night accommodation.
- (23) "Residential school" means a residential facility for children which:
  - (a) Provides a planned, scheduled, regular, academic or vocational school program for students in the elementary, middle or secondary grades as defined in section 33-1001, Idaho Code: and
  - (b) Provides services substantially comparable to those provided in nonresidential public schools where the primary purpose is the education and academic pursuits of the students; and
  - (c) Does not seek, receive or enroll students for treatment of such special needs as substance abuse, mental illness, emotional disturbance, developmental disability or intellectual disability; and
  - (d) Is not:
    - (i) A college or university; or
    - (ii) A children's camp as defined in this section; or
    - (iii) A public or private day school in which the children leave the facility each day at the conclusion of the academic, vocational and school supervised activities.
- (24) "Transitional living" means living arrangements and aftercare services for children, or as continued care, to gain experience living on their own in a supportive and supervised environment prior to emancipation.
- (25) "Temporary alcohol-drug abuse treatment facility" means a children's residential care facility specializing in providing programs of treatment for children whose primary

problem is alcohol or drug abuse, for children thirteen (13) through seventeen (17) years of age where the child will not spend more than four (4) months in a temporary alcohol-drug abuse treatment facility per calendar year, and meet the following requirements:

- (a) The child has a prescription from a medical doctor verifying the child's need for substance abuse disorder or alcohol treatment;
- (b) The child's parent, guardian, or other legal custodian has signed a consent for the child to obtain routine medical care, emergency medical and surgical care, and substance abuse disorder treatment for the child;
- (c) The program conducts criminal history background checks on all staff, volunteers, and others who have direct access to children; and
- (d) The program passes all zoning, electrical, plumbing, public health district, food safety and sanitation inspections for applicable residential businesses."

# SJM 104 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Mountain Home Air Force Base draws its water supply from the Mountain Home Aquifer. The aquifer is over-drafted by about 30,000 acre-feet annually and is declining approximately two feet per year; and

WHEREAS, there are water quality issues in some of the wells that the Mountain Home Air Force Base depends on for its water supply. Of the six main wells that are on the base, only two are safe sources of drinking water and four are contaminated. Of the four contaminated wells, one is high in nitrates and is used strictly for irrigation, and the other three are high in nitrates and perfluorinated compounds; and

WHEREAS, the state, in partnership with the United States Air Force is working on the Mountain Home Air Force Base Sustainable Water Supply Project. The purpose of the project is to provide a sustainable, long-term water supply for the base from the Snake River and to eliminate the base's reliance on the declining Mountain Home Aquifer; and

WHEREAS, the project consists of a pump station at C.J. Strike Reservoir and a 14.4 mile long pipeline to bring Snake River water to the base, as well as construction of a water treatment plant at the base; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the state will build, own, maintain, and operate the pipeline and the pumps and that the United States Air Force will build, operate, and maintain the water treatment plant, as well as anything downstream of the plant; and

WHEREAS, Mountain Home Air Force Base is one of the largest employers in Idaho. According to a 2016 study, the base is responsible for the direct employment of 4,686 personnel, supports an additional 190 jobs in local businesses that directly supply the base's operations, and is responsible for 2,127 jobs supported by the consumer spending of those who are directly and indirectly employed by the base; and

WHEREAS, Mountain Home Air Force Base has been estimated to support the employment of more than 10,500 individuals; and

WHEREAS, Mountain Home Air Force Base generates \$462 million in labor income; \$797 million in all forms of income including wages, salaries, interest, rent, and profit; and an output of goods and services valued at \$965 million; and

WHEREAS, a 2010 Economic Impact Analysis by the United States Air Force, assisted by Boise State University, shows that the estimated annual economic impact from the Mountain Home Air Force Base is approximately \$1.02 billion; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho and the Department of Commerce recognize that continued economic viability requires taking care of existing business before expanding economic development and attracting new business; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that there could be another round of Base Realignment and Closure in the near future; and

WHEREAS, Mountain Home Air Force Base has many strong attributes, such as great airspace, many clear weather days suitable for flying, and low possibility of encroachment around the base; and

WHEREAS, the uncertainty of a dependable water supply necessary for future operation is the only weakness that jeopardizes the future of Mountain Home Air Force Base.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we support the construction of a new pipeline to bring Snake River water to Mountain Home Air Force Base to ensure the long-term viability of the base.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Idaho Legislature urges the congressional delegation for the State of Idaho to take any further actions necessary to advance the pipeline project through additional congressional action to authorize construction and provide further Military Construction (MILCON) Funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

#### SJM 105 BY JUDICIARY AND RULES COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF UTAH AND TO THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF IDAHO.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho is committed to protecting and enhancing Bear Lake storage water supplies, maintaining its pristine water quality, and enhancing recreational and economic opportunities for Idaho's citizens and tourists who add to Idaho's economy; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake is a large freshwater lake straddling the border of Utah and Idaho with approximately half of the lake in each state, and it is the second largest natural freshwater lake by area in the State of Utah as well as in Idaho, second only to Lake Pend Oreille; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake has a surface area of 110 square miles, being approximately 20 miles long and 7 miles wide; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake is the oldest known continually "wet" lake in North America and one of the five oldest lakes in the world, being at least 250,000 years old; and

WHEREAS, international scientists study Bear Lake for clues to the climate and ecology of the region; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake has unique water chemistry, giving it the intense turquoise blue color for which it is known all over the world; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake has an extensive shoreline with areas of cobbled and sandy beaches that offer prime recreational opportunities; and

WHEREAS, in addition to having more endemic fish species, four found only in Bear Lake, than any other lake in the United States, Bear Lake is home to the largest and most genetically pure population of Bonneville cutthroat trout in existence, and the cutthroat trout is the state fish of Utah and Idaho; and

WHEREAS, since about 1912, the upper 21.65 feet of Bear Lake, approximately 1,400,000 acre-feet of water, has been used as a storage reservoir replenished from natural inflow sources and from diversions from the Bear River in Idaho made by PacifiCorp; and

WHEREAS, the storage reservoir in Bear Lake has been operated by PacifiCorp to supply irrigation water to approximately 150,000 acres of prime irrigated agriculture on family farms and ranches downstream in Utah and Idaho for over 100 years and will remain an essential irrigation water supply into the future; and

WHEREAS, the historic Bear Lake irrigation water supply is protected by many agreements among PacifiCorp, the states of Utah, Idaho, and Wyoming, the Bear River Water Users Association and its members, and Bear Lake Watch, each with individual and unique interests in Bear Lake; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the irrigation water supply, and aesthetic and recreation uses, PacifiCorp also operates Bear Lake for flood control, and water released and pumped from Bear Lake is used to generate 107 megawatts of electricity downstream on the Bear River; and

WHEREAS, at times when water is low or is released or pumped from Bear Lake, the exposed lake bed is vulnerable to nonnative vegetation invasion and degradation, which create hazards to navigation and impair recreational use for tens of thousands of visitors and thousands of homeowners; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake is a major recreation destination, with five Utah state park recreation areas and two Idaho state park recreation areas, the Bear Lake National Wildlife Refuge, private marinas, and Boy Scout camps; and

WHEREAS, Bear Lake is vital to local and regional economies in Utah and Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho is committed to work in collaboration with the State of Utah, PacifiCorp, irrigators, and local stakeholders to protect existing uses and plan for the future uses and enjoyment of Bear Lake.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we urge the states of Utah and Idaho to work together in seeking solutions to address challenges regarding Bear Lake, including recreation and economic development interests, water quality, invasive species, lake bed management and preservation, and enhancement of irrigation water storage and water supply functions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge the states of Utah and Idaho, in continued cooperation, to develop joint expectations for the continued health, beauty, and enjoyment of Bear Lake.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the states of Utah and Idaho, in continued cooperation, to develop opportunities for participation with stakeholders, to develop recommendations to protect and enhance existing beneficial uses, to maintain a healthy and sustainable lake, to encourage economic development, to protect irrigation water storage, to enhance recreation, and to preserve and protect Bear Lake for future generations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the Governor and Legislature of the State of Utah and to the Governor of the State of Idaho.

The director is vested with the exclusive authority to license bail agents and the authority to regulate the solicitation, negotiation and transaction of bail with retail consumers of bail bonds, provided however, that a court retains the authority to refuse to accept bail bonds from a surety or a bail agent pursuant to its inherent authority, pursuant to Idaho Code, or as provided by supreme court rules, guidelines or appellate decisions.
- (2) A bail agent is authorized to execute and countersign undertakings of bail, including bail bonds, in connection with any judicial proceedings in each of the judicial districts of the state. Any sheriff or clerk of the district court shall accept bail bonds only from a bail agent, unless otherwise ordered by the court pursuant to subsection (1) of this section.
- (3) In addition to the authority to revoke, suspend or refuse to issue a bail agent's license pursuant to section 41-1016, Idaho Code, the director shall suspend a license for a period not to exceed six (6) months, after mailing notice to the last known address of the bail agent but prior to a hearing, if such bail agent:
  - (a) Has been convicted or has entered a guilty plea to any felony or to a misdemeanor which evidences bad moral character evidencing theft, dishonesty, a lack of integrity and financial responsibility, or an unfitness and inability to provide acceptable service to the consuming public intimidation, threats, or violence; or
  - (b) Intentionally and fraudulently makes a false statement to a court in connection with a bail transaction.
- (4) In addition to the provisions of subsection (3) of this section, the director may also suspend a license for a period not to exceed six (6) months, after mailing notice to the last known address of the bail agent but prior to a hearing, for reasons set forth in the rules of the department.".

# SJM 106 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF CONGRESS, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, AND TO THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, approximately 63% of land in the State of Idaho is public land controlled by the United States, primarily by the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service, which makes the right to cross federal land for delivery of water rights to Idaho water users extremely important; and

WHEREAS, the law of the United States, since the 1866 Mining Act, has recognized that a water user in the arid West has the right to divert water from the rivers and streams across federal land for use on private property for, among other purposes, mining and agriculture. When the water user has a water right

appropriated under state law, the law provides that a water user needs no approval from the federal government for the diversion and beneficial use of the water on the user's private property; and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress passed the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA), as amended, in 1976, which explicitly recognizes and protects easements and rights existing on federal lands and recognizes under previous laws, such as the 1866 Mining Act, to deliver water appropriated under state law across federal land to private property; and

WHEREAS, Congress passed an amendment to FLPMA in 1986 known as the Colorado Ditch Bill Act, which explicitly directs the Secretary of Agriculture to issue a permanent easement for a water system involving reservoirs, canals, ditches, flumes, laterals, pipes, pipelines, tunnels, and other facilities and systems, for the impoundment, storage, transportation, and distribution of water traversing federal lands within the National Forest System when: (1) the water system is used for agricultural irrigation or livestock purposes; (2) the system that existed in 1976 has remained in operation; (3) any enlargement of the system after 1976 requires separate authorization; (4) the user has a valid state water right; and (5) the use involves some private land. The water users were to supply the Forest Service with evidence of the location of easements; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho has had a comprehensive method for recognizing the appropriation of waters of the state for beneficial use under the priority doctrine since before statehood; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho recognized in 1984 the need to adjudicate the water rights of this state and the Legislature directed the Department of Water Resources to initiate the Snake River Basin Adjudication (SRBA), as provided by Idaho law, to facilitate the effective management of the waters of the Snake River Basin and to engage in a comprehensive adjudication of all surface and ground water use in the basin; and

WHEREAS, the United States was a party to the SRBA, is bound by the decrees of the SRBA court, and must recognize the water rights of the Idaho water users as decreed by the SRBA court; and

WHEREAS, the SRBA issued more than 167,000 water rights and issued its final unified decree in 2014, in which the SRBA court decreed water rights with priority rights dating back, in some instances, to the 1860s; and

WHEREAS, Congress further directed that applications under the Colorado Ditch Bill Act by easement holders be submitted by the end of 1996 to assist the Secretary of Agriculture in issuing permanent easements; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of Agriculture has not issued or recognized many of these permanent easements, even though the water rights have been decreed by the SRBA court and the applications have been submitted as required by Congress more than 20 years ago; and

WHEREAS, certain interest groups are arguing that the secretary must take actions harmful to the pre-FLPMA easement holders because the secretary has not issued the mandated easements; and

WHEREAS, the vast majority of surface water rights in this state were decreed with priority dates that preceded the enactment of FLPMA in 1976, and those water uses are entitled to the right to cross federal lands to deliver their state water rights; and

WHEREAS, there are many Idaho water users, such as the members of the Salmon Headwaters Conservation Association, that properly complied with the easement requirements specified by the Colorado Ditch Bill Act to have their permanent easement recognized by the United States, but are now required to further expend resources on legal and administrative processes to defend

and protect their valid existing Idaho water rights and associated rights-of-way across federal land.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we urge the President of the United States and Congress to take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture to recognize valid easements existing pursuant to the 1866 Mining Act on lands under their respective administrations without requiring citizens of the United States to sue the government in order to enjoy the benefits of such validly existing easement rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and Congress take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of Agriculture to recognize valid easements existing prior to FLPMA on lands within the National Forest System without requiring citizens of the United States to sue the government in order to enjoy the benefits of such validly existing rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in recognition that the Secretary of Agriculture has not acted on applications submitted more than 20 years ago, the President and Congress are urged to take such action as necessary to extend the deadline for filing applications under FLPMA for an additional two years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and Congress are urged to take such action as necessary to require the Secretary of Agriculture to refrain from interfering with the use of any decreed water right by attempting under any federal law to attach conditions on any 1866 Mining Act or FLPMA easements crossing federal lands, especially in a manner that restricts or conditions in any way the use of water on private land as authorized by state law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, to the Secretary of Agriculture, and to the Secretary of the Interior.

The projects shall be evaluated by the Idaho transportation department and shall be chosen by the Idaho transportation board based on a policy that may include mitigation of traffic times, improvement to traffic flow and mitigation of traffic congestion.
- (3) There is hereby established in the state treasury the transportation expansion and congestion mitigation fund, to which shall be deposited:
  - (a) All moneys distributed pursuant to section 63-2520, Idaho Code;
  - (b) All mMoneys distributed pursuant to section 63-3638, Idaho Code; and
  - (c) Any other appropriated moneys for funding the transportation expansion and congestion mitigation program.
- (4) Interest earned on the investment of idle moneys in the transportation expansion and congestion mitigation program fund shall be paid to the fund. All moneys in the fund shall be used for the transportation expansion and congestion mitigation program.
- (5) The local highway technical assistance council, established in section 40-2401, Idaho Code, shall establish and maintain a bridge maintenance and replacement program to repair or replace local bridges. The program shall include a grant program for local highway jurisdictions. The bridge maintenance and replacement program fund established pursuant to subsection (6) of this section shall be administered by the local highway technical assistance council and shall be used to finance the bridge maintenance and replacement program.
- (6) There is hereby established in the state treasury the bridge maintenance and replacement program fund, to which shall be deposited:
  - (a) Moneys distributed pursuant to section 63-3638, Idaho Code, on and after July 1, 2020; and
  - (b) Any other appropriated moneys for funding the bridge maintenance and replacement program.
- (7) Interest earned on the investment of idle moneys in the bridge maintenance and replacement program fund shall be paid to the fund. All moneys in the fund shall be used for the bridge maintenance and replacement program."

## SCR 111 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF THE STATE'S METHODOLOGY FOR FUNDING PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Legislature is obligated pursuant to Section 1, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to establish and maintain a general, uniform, and thorough system of public schools; and

WHEREAS, such obligation includes providing students with a safe environment conducive to learning; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that a study and review of the state's methodology for funding public school construction and maintenance, in order to identify any inadequacies with the current funding methodology, would be beneficial to Idahoans and especially to Idaho students and educators.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of and make recommendations regarding the state's methodology for funding public school construction and maintenance. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage, or other expenses.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Services Office shall provide staff support to the committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND
AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO
APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE TO UNDERTAKE
A STUDY OF OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING AND
CERTIFICATION LAWS AND RULES IN IDAHO.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Occupational Licensing and Certification Laws Interim Committee was authorized by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature for the purpose of undertaking and completing a review of relevant reports submitted to the Governor's office pursuant to Executive Order No. 2017-06 (the "Licensing Freedom Act of 2017") and to examine the necessity of such laws and rules; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 2017-06 required the executive departments of the State of Idaho to submit results to the Governor's office by July 1, 2018, containing suggestions regarding occupational licensing requirements, including whether such requirements could be modified or eliminated; and

WHEREAS, the final results of Executive Order No. 2017-06 were not available until October 19, 2018, limiting the amount of time that the interim committee had to study such information; and

WHEREAS, the study of Idaho's occupational licensing and certification laws conducted by the interim committee identified necessary improvements to the law and recommendations for reform; and

WHEREAS, the work of the interim committee was instrumental in helping to bring forward legislation that would ease occupational licensing barriers for military members, veterans, and the spouses of such individuals; and

WHEREAS, issues related to occupational licensing and certification laws continue to arise and pose challenges, opportunities, and concerns for the future of Idaho and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, Governor Little issued Executive Order No. 2019-01 (the "Licensing Freedom Act of 2019"), further identifying as legislative priorities the addition of sunset and sunrise provisions in occupational licensing and certification laws; and

WHEREAS, further interim committee review of licensing and certification laws is deemed necessary, including but not limited to review and assessment of the final results of Executive Order No. 2017-06, the addition of sunrise and sunset provisions to occupational licensing and certification laws, and the review of occupational licensing and certification laws in general in order to determine, as applicable, how the Legislature may be able to ease occupational licensing barriers while still protecting the public health and safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to continue the efforts to undertake and complete a review of licensing and certification laws in Idaho, including the final results of Executive Order No. 2017-06, the necessity of occupational licensing laws and rules in Idaho, and the priorities identified in the Licensing Freedom Act of 2019, including sunset and sunrise provisions. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-sixth Idaho Legislature.

For those pathways that are able to be delivered entirely online, there shall be a presumption that they shall receive the same funding as for traditional career technical education pathways; however, actual funding shall be based upon actual approved costs, not to exceed the cost of delivering these pathways in a traditional setting.";

in line 24, delete "(4)" and insert: "(45)"; and in line 35, delete "(5)" and insert: "(56)".

## AMENDMENT TO SECTION 6

On page 8, delete lines 36 and 37, and insert: "activities or services. In order to be eligible for career technical education essential components funding, virtual schools may be required to offer some face-to-face instruction in order to meet industry standards, licensing requirements, work-based learning requirements, or other requirements set forth by the board."

WHEREAS, the expiration of temporary rules would occasion additional expense to state agencies in readopting and republishing temporary rules needed to conduct state business; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that it is in the public interest to adopt this resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that all temporary rules adopted by state agencies pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act and submitted to the Legislature at the Legislature's request through the Office of the Administrative

Rules Coordinator for review during the 2019 legislative session, be, and the same are approved, with the exception of the following enumerated temporary rules:

IDAPA 25.01.01, the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board, concerning Rules of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board, adopted as temporary rules under Docket Number 25-0101-1802, the entire rulemaking docket.

IDAPA 29.01.03, the Idaho Potato Commission, concerning Rules Governing Nominations for Appointment as a Commissioner to the Idaho Potato Commission, adopted as temporary rules under Docket Number 29-0103-1802, the entire rulemaking docket.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a temporary rule or partial temporary rule approved by this concurrent resolution shall remain in effect until it expires by its own terms or by operation of law or until it is replaced by a final rule, but in no event shall a temporary rule remain in effect beyond the conclusion of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature unless it is further extended by adoption of a concurrent resolution by both houses of the Legislature. # SCR 114 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND APPROVING ADMINISTRATIVE RULES THAT IMPOSE A FEE OR CHARGE, WITH EXCEPTIONS, AND REJECTING CERTAIN AGENCY RULE DOCKETS THAT ARE NOT APPROVED.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Legislature pursuant to Section 67-5224, Idaho Code, must approve certain administrative rules that impose a fee or charge by adoption of a concurrent resolution before the rules become effective; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature is vested with authority to reject executive agency rules under the provisions of Section 67-5291, Idaho Code, in the event that the Legislature finds that the rules are not consistent with legislative intent; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the Legislature that certain Rules of the Bureau of Occupational Licenses governing Rules of the Barber and Cosmetology Services Licensing Board are not consistent with legislative intent; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the Legislature that certain Rules of the Department of Parks and Recreation governing Rules Governing the Administration of Temporary Permits on Lands Owned by the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation are not consistent with legislative intent; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that it is in the public interest to adopt this resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that all pending administrative rules or portions of pending

administrative rules adopted by state agencies pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act during the prior calendar year, and submitted through the Office of the Administrative Rules Coordinator to the Legislature for review during the 2019 legislative session, which impose a fee or charge, be, and the same are approved, with the exception of the following enumerated pending fee rules:

IDAPA 24.28.01, Rules of the Bureau of Occupational Licenses, Rules of the Barber and Cosmetology Services Licensing Board, Section 851., Subsections 05., 06., and 07., only, adopted as pending fee rules under Docket Number 24-2801-1802.

IDAPA 26.01.10, Rules of the Department of Parks and Recreation, Rules Governing the Administration of Temporary Permits on Lands Owned by the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, adopted as pending fee rules under Docket Number 26-0110-1701, the entire rulemaking docket.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that IDAPA 24.28.01, Rules of the Bureau of Occupational Licenses, Rules of the Barber and Cosmetology Services Licensing Board, Section 851., Subsections 05., 06., and 07., only, adopted as pending fee rules under Docket Number 24-2801-1802, and IDAPA 26.01.10, Rules of the Department of Parks and Recreation, Rules Governing the Administration of Temporary Permits on Lands Owned by the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, adopted as pending fee rules under Docket Number 26-0110-1701, the entire rulemaking docket, are hereby rejected and not approved, and thereby pursuant to Section 67-5291 and Section 67-5224, Idaho Code, are declared null, void, and of no force and effect

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that rule provisions imposing fees or charges that were not submitted through the Office of Rules Coordinator for legislative review or that otherwise are not included and approved in this concurrent resolution shall be null, void, and of no force and effect unless approved by adoption of a separate concurrent resolution by both houses of the Legislature as provided in Section 67-5224, Idaho Code.

# SCR 115 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE TO STUDY ISSUES RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate authorized in 2018 a legislative interim study committee to study campaign finance issues and to make recommendations to the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the study committee proposed campaign finance reform recommendations to the Legislature during the 2019 legislative session; and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the study committee that numerous issues remain to be studied including, but not limited to, the modernization and simplification of the sunshine laws relating to campaign finance disclosures by candidates, lobbyists, and political committees, technology requirements for a single database to be operated through the Secretary of State's website, and increasing the transparency of the campaign process in Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to continue and complete a two-year study of issues relating to campaign finance reform. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage, or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature and to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-sixth Idaho Legislature.

- (5) The district court may grant a petition and issue an order establishing reasonable visitation rights if the court finds that such visitation is in the best interests of the child.
- (6) In cases where both parents have custodial time with the child, the district court shall award visitation only during the scheduled custody time of the parent to whom the petitioner is a parent or grandparent, as defined in this chapter.
- (7) The district court may award reasonable attorney fees to the parent when the court finds that the petition was brought or pursued unreasonably, frivolously, or without foundation.
- (8) The district court shall make findings of fact and conclusions of law in support of visitation awards made under this chapter.";

Charter schools offer many benefits to Idaho families, particularly greater choice in education. When public charter schools (PCS) were created in Idaho in 1998, the expectation was these schools would be laboratories for innovation in student achievement and successful learning - a model that schools across Idaho would be able to learn from.

With the increased flexibility of this new certificate, there is a clear expectation that there be more evidence of charter school innovation and, most importantly, that these innovative approaches in teaching and learning will have a positive impact for all Idaho's public schools. Our traditional public schools serve the vast majority of Idaho kids and represent our constitutional obligation for a free, thorough, and uniform system of education across Idaho.

Additionally, the school leaders we choose do matter. Authorizing this alternative certificate for PCS administrators presupposes this question: If more expanded, non-traditional leadership options are good enough for charters and their boards to consider, why cannot public school districts and their boards consider this same kind of option for public schools?

Finally, I have listened closely to those concerned about the consequences of this bill and I will be closely watching its impacts.

## SCR 116 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND REQUESTING THAT THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE DIRECT THE OFFICE OF PERFORMANCE EVALUATIONS TO MANAGE AN INDEPENDENT EVALUATION REGARDING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A COUNTYWIDE HIGHWAY DISTRICT SYSTEM AND THE ROLE OF THE LOCAL HIGHWAY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE COUNCIL.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Idaho Code currently provides for the administration of local highways by counties, cities, voter-approved countywide highway districts, and highway districts comprising areas smaller than the boundary of a single county; and

WHEREAS, Idaho has nearly three hundred unique local highway jurisdictions, including cities, counties, and highway districts; and

WHEREAS, some Idaho counties have no highway districts, while others contain several small highway districts within their boundaries: and

WHEREAS, several of Idaho's highway districts were formed over one hundred years ago; and

WHEREAS, many components of Idaho's current system of secondary highway administration may have evolved over time; and

WHEREAS, technology has advanced considerably since the development of Idaho's system of secondary highway administration; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's weather, terrain, and remote regions present unique challenges that must be addressed; and

WHEREAS, the majority of highway miles and bridges in Idaho are administered by local highway jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC) was established under Chapter 24, Title 40, Idaho Code, by the Idaho Legislature in 1994; and

WHEREAS, the mission of LHTAC is to help Idaho's local highway jurisdictions utilize the available resources for maintenance and construction of Idaho's local highway system in the most efficient and effective manner possible; and

WHEREAS, LHTAC has been granted the authority to act for local jurisdictions, including the execution of contracts and the expenditure of funds; and

WHEREAS, LHTAC has administered state transportation funds, including Strategic Initiatives Program funds, to local highway jurisdictions through grant programs; and

WHEREAS, through its role as a resource for local highway jurisdictions, LHTAC has collected and published data regarding Idaho's local highway system; and

WHEREAS, according to a 2014 study by LHTAC, the local transportation system has 33,276 miles of roadways with 13% in fair condition and 27% in poor condition; and

WHEREAS, according to 2019 data collected by LHTAC, Idaho's local highway system contains 2,417 bridges, 857 of which are at least fifty years old, 362 of which are load posted or closed, and 181 of which are in poor condition; and

WHEREAS, repair, replacement, and construction of local highway infrastructure is critical to public safety; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's transportation funding shortfall complicates the repair, replacement, and construction of highway infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature desires to learn more about the efficiencies that could be gained through implementation of a countywide approach to local highway administration; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature further desires to learn more about LHTAC, its current role with respect to the local highway system, how LHTAC may be best utilized in the future, and whether, and to what extent, the implementation of a countywide highway system would enhance or minimize LHTAC's role as a resource for such countywide jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature has the responsibility to ensure that all resources of the State of Idaho are expended as efficiently as possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee is requested to direct the Office of Performance Evaluations to manage an independent evaluation of efficiencies that could be obtained through implementation of a countywide approach to local highway administration throughout Idaho, including analysis of

LHTAC's role. Such evaluation shall be conducted by a qualified out-of-state consultant or consultants without current contractual relationships with any Idaho political subdivisions, local highway jurisdictions, the Idaho Transportation Department, LHTAC, or any consultant or contractor who works for or with any of the aforementioned individuals or entities. The evaluation shall, at a minimum, address the following:

- (1) Whether cost-efficiencies and enhancements to public safety could be gained through implementation of a countywide approach to secondary highway administration, including the consolidation of local highway jurisdictions;
- (2) Whether Idaho's transportation system would benefit from or suffer any adverse consequences as a result of a countywide approach to local highway administration;
- (3) Whether, on balance, the benefits that could be obtained through implementation of a countywide approach to secondary highway administration, including the consolidation of local highway districts into single countywide highway districts, would outweigh any adverse effects; and
- (4) LHTAC's current role with respect to local highway administration and whether, and to what extent, the implementation of a countywide highway system should enhance or minimize LHTAC's role.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the independent evaluation shall appropriately address Idaho's unique weather, terrain, size, and many remote regions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee is requested to direct the Office of Performance Evaluations to develop and submit a report to the Legislature regarding the findings of the evaluation no later than the First Regular Session of the Sixty-sixth Idaho Legislature. At the conclusion of the consultant's work, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee is requested to submit the completed results of the independent evaluation to the Legislature. The results so reported are to include action-item recommendations upon which the Legislature can act to improve local highway administration.

#### S 1107

Within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 2:05 p.m. on March 20, 2019.

In my State of the State address, I spoke about utilizing all budgeting mechanisms that "ensure our state remains fiscally sound over the long-term." One key component of making sure we remain fiscally sound in state government is maintaining accurate fiscal notes for legislation.

In the statement of purpose for S 1107, there is a sunset provision in section 33-1004 which allows school districts and public charter schools to receive salary-based apportionment based on adjusted mid-term support units, if the best 28-week units are at least 3-percent greater than mid-term support units. According to the most recent State Department of Education's calculations, that sunset would save the state approximately \$1.94 million, which is based on 19 support units at \$102,100 for each support unit in the next fiscal year.

S 1107 would remove the sunset. So, it stands to reason that eliminating this sunset will affect the general fund by a similar amount. This was not reflected in the fiscal note for S 1107.

Within the time prescribed by the law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 2:05 p.m. on March 20, 2019.

We have tremendous difficulty filling positions at the Idaho Department of Correction (IDOC) during boom economic times and rapid turnover among probation officers. It will be hard to fill the 17 positions – 10 probation officers and seven support staff – authorized in this bill because these positions will have to be advertised as ending in one year. It will be especially difficult to fill the 10 probation officer vacancies because those positions require some POST training. The new, one-time probation officers will finish their training with little more than half of a year left of the one-time appropriation. Ironically, because of the frequent turnover in these positions, IDOC will probably be able to manage this year with this one-time appropriation. But structuring the appropriation in this manner is not helpful to the personnel issues IDOC is facing.

My hope is that next year the legislature will make these 17 positions permanent as we work together to solve personnel issues at IDOC.

AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 7 through 41, and insert:

"SECTION 1. That Section 50-2905A, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

50-2905A. **ELECTION NECESSARY FOR EXPENDITURES** ON **CERTAIN** PROJECTS. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, on and after July 1, 2016 the effective date of this act, it shall be unlawful for an urban renewal agency to expend revenue collected under this chapter on project costs when either the amount of revenue collected under this chapter, or the amount of revenue collected under this chapter plus any other public funds, not including federal funds or federal funds administered by a public body, contributes to fifty-one percent (51%) or more of the total project cost and the project is for construction of a municipal building that will not be subject to property taxation or a multipurpose sports stadium complex, or the remodel of such a building or complex, with a total project cost exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) unless such construction project is first approved in an election by sixty percent (60%) of the participating qualified electors residing within the borders of the qualified municipality. An election pursuant to this section shall be in accordance with the provisions of chapter 1, title 34, Idaho Code. The total project cost described in this subsection shall not include the cost of any infrastructure or belowground improvements including, but not limited to, water, sewer, storm drainage, electrical, natural gas, telecommunication, or other similar systems and lines, streets, roads, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, walkways, parking facilities, or unoccupied auxiliary structures. This section shall not be construed to require an election regarding bonds issued prior to the effective date of this act.

- (2) For purposes of this section, the following terms shall have the following meanings:
  - (a) "Multipurpose sports stadium complex" means a place or venue for indoor or outdoor sports, concerts, or other events that contains a field or other playing surface or area

- either partly or completely surrounded by a tiered structure designed to allow spectators to stand or sit and view the event:
- (b) "Municipal building" means only an administrative building, city hall, library, courthouse, public safety or law enforcement buildings, other judicial buildings, fire stations, jails, and detention facilities that are not subject to property taxation whether they are, or are intended to be, owned or operated by or leased to a public body for the public's benefit;
- (bc) "Project costs" shall have the same meaning as provided in section 50-2903(14), Idaho Code;
- (d) "Public body" shall have the same meaning as provided in section 50-2018(3), Idaho Code;
- (e) "Public funds" shall mean the funds collected or received by a public body but shall not include grants or donations from private entities or individuals to the public body."

# SCR 117 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING THE EFFECTS OF MEDICAID ELIGIBILITY EXPANSION ON EXISTING PROGRAMS THAT SERVE MEDICALLY INDIGENT INDIVIDUALS AND REGARDING RELATED ISSUES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2018, the Idaho electorate passed Proposition 2, expanding eligibility for Medicaid to persons with a modified adjusted gross income at or below 133% of the federal poverty level; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that Medicaid eligibility expansion will reduce or eliminate the need for existing programs that serve medically indigent individuals, including the county medically indigent program and the catastrophic health care costs program; and

WHEREAS, federal financial participation for Medicaid eligibility expansion is set at 90%, with the state providing the remainder of the funds needed for expansion; and

WHEREAS, funds currently reserved for the county medically indigent program and the catastrophic health care costs program have been identified as a potential source of funding for Medicaid eligibility expansion; and

WHEREAS, a study is necessary to determine:

- (1) The impacts of Medicaid eligibility expansion on existing programs that serve medically indigent individuals;
- (2) Options to reduce, phase out, or eliminate the county medically indigent program and the catastrophic health care costs program;
- (3) The savings to each county and the state from reduction or elimination of each program;
- (4) An equitable means to assess each county for its share of state funding for Medicaid eligibility expansion; and
- (5) An effective means for the state to collect Medicaid eligibility expansion assessments from the counties.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study and to make recommendations regarding the effects of Medicaid eligibility expansion on existing programs that serve medically indigent individuals and regarding related issues identified in this resolution. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council shall appoint, as a nonvoting member of the committee, a person representing the Idaho Association of Counties.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that other nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs. Nonlegislative members of the committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage, or other expenses.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fifth Idaho Legislature.

#### Report of the Committee of the Whole

Senator Vick, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported out <u>H 122</u>, without recommendation, amended as follows:

#### **SENATE AMENDMENT TO H 122**

AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 18 through 39. On page 2, delete lines 1 through 14, and insert:

"22-1702. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. (1) It is the policy of this state to allow and encourage the research and production of hemp in Idaho. The legislature finds that the Cannabis sativa L. plant used for the production of hemp is separate and distinct from the forms of cannabis used to produce

marijuana. The federal agriculture improvement act of 2018, P.L. 115-334, has eliminated barriers at the federal level to hemp research and development. It is the policy of this state to immediately regulate the interstate transport of hemp. It is also the policy of this state that, through the negotiated rulemaking process, the director shall develop and submit by a date certain a state plan to the secretary of agriculture that allows for the production of hemp in Idaho to the greatest extent allowed in compliance with the agriculture improvement act of 2018.

(2) Hemp is used in products such as building materials, cordage, fiber, food, floor coverings, fuel, paint, animal feed, paper, particle board, plastics, seed meal, cosmetics, seed, and yarn. The university of Idaho, in fulfillment of its land grant mission, leads the nation in many areas of agricultural research and is encouraged to research and study this burgeoning field. Hemp has the potential to be an alternate crop in Idaho's thriving agricultural economy. A growing hemp industry also has the potential to create jobs in production, processing, and research, and Idahoans will benefit from numerous consumer products made from hemp.

#### 22-1703. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Chief law enforcement officer" means the director of the Idaho state police.
- (2) "Director" means the director of the Idaho state department of agriculture.
- (3) "Hemp" means the plant Cannabis sativa L. and any part of that plant, including the seeds thereof and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than three-tenths of one percent (0.3%) on a dry weight basis, as defined in the federal agriculture improvement act of 2018. It does not include any approved cannabidiol drugs listed on schedule V in section 37-2713, Idaho Code
- (4) "Person" means any individual, partnership, corporation, association, grower, farm, or any other business unit.
- 22-1704. INTERSTATE TRANSPORT. (1) No person shall move, convey, or transport hemp through the state without a permit issued by the director based on documentation from the equivalent foreign state authorizing body in compliance with the agriculture improvement act of 2018. Hemp is exempted from the provisions of chapter 27, title 37, Idaho Code, for the purpose of interstate transport when being moved, conveyed, or transported pursuant to a permit and in compliance with the agriculture improvement act of 2018.
- (2) The director shall expeditiously promulgate rules, in consultation with the chief law enforcement officer, regulating the transport of hemp through the state. The director may assess fees for permits created in this chapter and civil penalties for violations of this chapter or any rules promulgated under this chapter.
- (3) Any person transporting hemp through the state has the duty to keep and furnish upon request by the director or a peace officer any permits required by this chapter.
- (4) Any hemp transported through the state must be free of pests as defined in chapter 20, title 22, Idaho Code.
- (5) The chief law enforcement officer may establish check stations at ports of entry or other locations as established by rule as necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter.
- (6) No person shall proceed past or travel through any established check station at a port of entry or other location as

established by rule during hours of operations when required by rule to stop for inspection while transporting hemp.

- (7) The director or the chief law enforcement officer may issue hold orders to take prompt regulatory action on hemp transported through the state when either reasonably believes hemp is transported in violation of this chapter or the federal agriculture improvement act of 2018 or any rules promulgated thereunder. The hold order shall contain contact information, the reason for the hold order, and the conditions for release.
- (8) It shall be the duty of all peace officers within the state, as defined by section 19-5101(d), Idaho Code, to enforce the provisions of this chapter by making a complaint or citation as described in section 19-3901, Idaho Code.
- (9) A peace officer may inspect any vehicle transporting hemp presented at a check station at a port of entry or other location as established by rule or during lawful traffic enforcement contacts and collect reasonably sized samples selected by the peace officer for testing.
- (10) If a peace officer has probable cause to believe that a person is transporting hemp without permits required in this chapter, the peace officer may seize and impound the hemp, provided however, if permits that were valid at the time of seizure and impoundment are subsequently furnished, the peace officer shall immediately release the hemp.
- (11) Except when hemp is transported through this state in compliance with the permits required in this section, nothing in this section shall inhibit or restrict any peace officer from enforcing to the fullest extent the laws of this state prohibiting marijuana as provided in chapter 27, title 37, Idaho Code.
- 22-1705. STATE PLAN. (1) The director shall prepare a plan through negotiated rulemaking and submit the plan to the secretary of agriculture by November 1, 2019, or immediately upon the date after which the United States department of agriculture is ready to accept state plans, whichever is later. The plan shall be created through the negotiated rulemaking process, in consultation with the governor and the chief law enforcement officer of the state, and shall allow for the research and production of hemp in Idaho to the greatest extent allowed under federal law.
- (2) As part of the state plan, the director, in consultation with the governor and the chief law enforcement officer of the state, shall prepare by rule and submit to the secretary of agriculture a corrective action plan consistent with the federal agriculture improvement act of 2018.
- (3) If approved by the secretary of agriculture, the state plan and the corrective action plan will not take effect until enacted in Idaho Code.
- 22-1706. HEMP DEVELOPMENT FUND. There shall be established in the dedicated fund in the state treasury the hemp development fund to which shall be credited the revenues derived from fees and penalties collected as authorized by this chapter and the rules promulgated under this chapter. Moneys in the fund shall be used solely for carrying out the provisions of this chapter. The director is charged with the administration of moneys appropriated from the fund unless otherwise provided by law. All interest or other income accruing from moneys deposited to the fund shall be redeposited and accrue to the fund.
- 22-1707. EXCEPTIONS. Hemp shall not be subject to inspection or indemnification pursuant to chapter 51, title 22, Idaho Code, or chapter 2 or 5, title 69, Idaho Code.".

#### AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 2, delete lines 15 through 47. Delete pages 3 through 15, and insert:

"SECTION 2. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage and approval.".

#### CORRECTION TO TITLE

On page 1, delete lines 3 through 9, and insert: "CHAPTER 17, TITLE 22, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE FOR THE HEMP RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ACT, TO PROVIDE A SHORT TITLE, TO PROVIDE LEGISLATIVE INTENT, TO DEFINE TERMS, TO PROVIDE FOR INTERSTATE TRANSPORT, TO PROVIDE FOR A STATE PLAN, TO PROVIDE FOR THE HEMP DEVELOPMENT FUND, AND TO PROVIDE EXCEPTIONS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY."

- (b) A person is exempt from the provisions of paragraph (a) of this subsection if the person is:
  - (i) Under the age of nineteen (19) years;
  - (ii) Over the age of fifty-nine (59) years;
  - (iii) Physically or intellectually unfit for employment;
  - (iv) Pregnant;
  - (v) A parent or caretaker who is the primary caregiver of a dependent child under the age of eighteen (18) years, as determined by the department;
  - (vi) A parent or caretaker personally providing care for a person with serious medical conditions or with a disability, as determined by the department;
  - (vii) Applying for or receiving unemployment compensation and complying with work requirements that are part of the federal-state unemployment insurance program;
  - (viii) Applying for social security disability benefits, until such time eligibility is determined;
  - (ix) Participating in a drug addiction or alcohol treatment and rehabilitation program, as determined by the department; or
  - (x) An American Indian or Alaska native who is eligible for services through the Indian health service or through a tribal health program pursuant to the Indian self-determination and education assistance act and the Indian health care improvement act.
- (c) A person who fails to comply with paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be subject to a copayment on covered medicaid services to the maximum extent permissible for a

- period of six (6) months or until the person complies with paragraph (a) of this subsection, whichever is earlier.
- (d) Compliance reporting required for persons subject to paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be consistent with compliance reporting requirements for persons participating in a SNAP workfare program.
- (e) The department shall implement the waiver described in this subsection as soon as possible once federal approval has been obtained.

  - (d) The elimination of duplicative practices that result in unnecessary utilization and costs.
  - (e) Contracts based on gain sharing, risk-sharing or a capitated basis.
  - (f) Medical home development with focus on populations with chronic disease using a tiered case management fee.
- (3) The department shall seek federal approval or a waiver to require that a medicaid participant who has a medical home as required in section 56-255(5)(b), Idaho Code, and who seeks family planning services or supplies from a provider outside the participant's medical home, must have a referral to such outside provider. The provisions of this subsection shall apply to medicaid participants upon such approval or the granting of such a waiver."

within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 11:10 a.m. on March 28, 2019.

I agree with the spirit of this bill - that we have a moral obligation to support public education and to ensure every dollar spent on education is used effectively. I also believe we have a moral obligation to protect the financial stability and soundness of all public institutions, especially public education institutions.

In my consideration of this bill, I had concerns that the bill may implicate Idaho's constitutional prohibition on long term indebtedness found in Article III, Section 8. I chose to approve this bill because I concluded that the obligation of the state to appropriate funds in the case of a default is not mandatory, is at most a potential liability, and can only occur if funds are available in that year, the legislature appropriates such funds, and the Governor approves that appropriation.

I will be closely watching and expect to see the mechanisms within this bill strictly followed. I expect the Idaho Housing and Finance Association (IHFA) to rigorously enforce the high standards for qualifying into the public charter schools facilities program. IHFA must also strictly oversee the requirement that public charter schools approved and participating in this program deposit and maintain a minimum of twelve months of principal interest payments in a restricted debt service account held by the bondholder or trustee.

All involved must also closely monitor the public charter school facilities program fund, which serves as another backstop in this process. The treasurer will have the ability and the obligation to ensure public charter schools within this program are properly depositing their required fees into this fund.

Further, additional analysis and law may be required, and consultation with the State Department of Education, to ensure

the intercept provision is consistent with current state fiscal practices.

Please be advised that if each of these mechanisms are not strictly followed, I will not support any additional appropriations from the state into the public charter school facilities fund.

#### § 1159, as amended

within the time limited by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 4:35 p.m. on April 2, 2019.

I reluctantly vetoed S 1159 and plan to veto H 296 because I question the constitutional sufficiency of the bills and the unintended consequences of their passage. The bills invite legal challenges that likely will result in the Idaho initiative process being determined by the liberal Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals - the same Circuit that recently decided Idaho should pay for gender reassignment surgery for a transgender inmate serving time for molesting a child. We need to do all we can to control the rules of our initiative process.

I have lived in rural Idaho my whole life. I appreciate and support our Legislature seeking ways to ensure the rights of all Idahoans - not just those in urban areas - have a voice in Idaho's initiative process. Just because you live in a rural area does not mean your view should be ignored.

Although S 1159 and its companion, H 296, attempt to give rural Idahoans a greater voice in the initiative process, I believe these bills could give a lone federal judge the only voice in defining our initiative process. I cannot in good conscience let that happen.

I agree with the goals and the vision of S 1159 and H 296. Idaho cannot become like California and other states that have adopted liberal initiative rules that result in excessive regulation and often conflicting laws. I also agree with many legislators that as technology and communications accelerate initiative efforts, we should prudently assure we do not have an initiative process that hamstrings and replaces our representative system of government.

I appreciate the enormous outpouring of opinion from both sides of this issue. I have done the best I can to listen to my fellow Idahoans - those vocal and those generally quiet.

I look forward to working with the Idaho Legislature to more closely examine these issues moving forward.

I appreciate the Idaho Legislature's innovative approach to expanding Medicaid to individuals under 138 percent of the federal poverty level while pursuing options that enable working Idahoans on private insurance to choose their healthcare and remain on private coverage. I value the success of Your Health Idaho and believe our citizens deserve the choice to access private insurance. The negotiations with the federal government will be challenging, but I have confidence in my directors of the Department of Health and Welfare and the Department of Insurance and their ability to work with our federal partners and pursue the waiver required to implement this approach.

I also strongly support the goal to incentivize unemployed and underemployed individuals to engage in work training opportunities to build financial stability. We must encourage self-sufficiency among those receiving public assistance. However, I have concerns regarding the work and training reporting requirements in this bill. Similar requirements have resulted in costly lawsuits and were recently struck down in federal courts.

As I said in my State of the State and Budget address, we need "spring in our safety net" so that Idahoans have pathways out of poverty; employment is a critical component of that. Unfortunately, this bill fails to utilize our existing work and training program, which focuses on outcomes to help individuals find employment, complete training programs, and enroll in education programs to increase employment and enhance wages. Utilization of the program also would streamline more efficient and accurate reporting. Additionally, the reporting activities required in this bill risk eligibility sanctions associated with reporting errors and result in an unnecessary administrative burden that requires the same reporting for individuals who are working.

I am troubled the fiscal impact does not accurately represent the increased administrative costs associated with the work reporting activities. In the future, I strongly urge the Legislature to evaluate the work requirement set forth in this bill and ensure it is the most effective and efficient way to connect Idahoans to employment opportunities while providing access to healthcare.

I strongly encourage the Legislature to revisit the key tenets of this bill in the interim and early next session to address these issues.
