

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Good oral health is a critical component of overall health. Without treatment, dental disease compromises overall health and leads to rapidly accelerating costs associated with more complicated interventions. However, most dental disease can be easily preventable through routine care. Idahoans often access emergency care for dental related issues in hospitals, raising the costs of healthcare for everyone.

In order to address rising healthcare costs and address preventable dental conditions before they become more serious, other states and countries allow trained mid-level providers to perform routine and preventative care under the supervision of a dentist. While improving dental health outcomes, such programs have also improved access to higher career paths as well as improved cultural care.

The Coeur d'Alene Tribe operates Marimn Health, a community health center and Indian health program in Plummer, Idaho. Marimn Health is open to the entire community and constantly seeks to improve community health outcomes through patient centered, team based approaches. Adding trained and licensed mid-level providers would fill a much needed service gap, allowing supervising dentists to focus on more complicated procedures while mid-level providers focus on routine and preventative procedures, thereby improving efficiencies and overall care.

This legislation authorizes the Idaho Board of Dentistry to license mid-level dental providers who would be called dental therapists, who have completed education and training requirements prescribed by the Board, to perform a scope of procedures as set forth by the Board, only under the supervision of licensed dentists in Idaho.
