CONVENED: Chairman Thayn called the meeting of the Senate Education Committee (Committee) to order at 3:00 p.m.

GUBERNATORIAL Committee Consideration of the Gubernatorial Reappointment of Brian **REAPPOINTMENT:** Scigliano, of Boise, ID, to the Idaho Public Charter School Administration, for a term commencing May 12, 2020, and expiring May 12, 2024.

- PRESENTATION: Dr. Bert Glandon, President, College of Western Idaho; Dr. Rick MacLennan, President, North Idaho College; Dr. Rick Aman, President, College of Eastern Idaho; and Dr. Dean Fisher, President, College of Southern Idaho, gave a joint presentation to the Committee concerning the community colleges of Idaho (see Attachment 1).
- **DISCUSSION:** Chairman Thayn asked how the teachers felt about transitioning to online learning. The consensus was that the faculty and staff stepped up in a big way to help students succeed during the COVID 19 pandemic. Vice Chairman Crabtree asked how dual enrollment credit students were impacting community colleges. Dr. Aman said the general education credits being taken in high school are helping students to accelerate through college. Vice Chairman Crabtree asked how dual enrollment is financially impacting the colleges. Dr. Fisher said that high school students can take college credit classes in high school at \$75 a unit versus \$139 a credit when enrolled in college. Chairman Thayn asked if the cost differential was being applied to other full time college students so there wasn't a budget shortfall. Dr. Aman said students taking college credits in high school with high school teachers are not costing the colleges the salaries of college instructors, so they are breaking even. Senator Woodward asked if the colleges were tracking time to completion for those using dual credits. Dr. Fisher said they are tracking this data in several ways but had no data to share at this time. Senator Cook asked if the colleges were reaching out to local businesses to ensure that courses being offered met their needs. Dr. MacLennan said workforce development was ongoing with businesses in all of the communities. All career and technical education (CTE) groups have advisory committees and they are always fine-tuning what business and industry need, and offer the courses appropriately. Dr. Glandon said they are also offering short-course training that addresses the needs of businesses in the community.
