VISION


Victim services should be accessible and sustainable throughout the State while promoting, advocating for and encouraging resiliency and empowerment of victims.

INCREASED SERVICE DEMAND

Demand for Victim Services in Idaho is Increasing

Victim services providers are reporting...


- Increased incidents of child abuse
- Highest number of sexual assaults since 2009
- Increased demand/services for intimate partner violence
- Greater severity of injuries and more lethality
- Longer wait times for services
 - Counseling
 - Housing greater demand for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and affordable long-term housing





2021 VOCA FIX PUBLIC LAW 117-27 117TH CONGRESS


VOCA Fix to Sustain the Crime Victims Fund Act of 2021: Signed into Law July 22, 2021

34 U.S.C. 20101

Amended Section 1402

- Directs federal criminal settlements from non-prosecution and deferred prosecution agreements into the Crime Victims Fund
 - The effect is expected to be an increase in VOCA Awards to States beginning with the VOCA 2022 Award (which will be spent by Idaho in SFY25)
 - The amount of the increase is not yet known and is tied to criminal prosecutions for federal crimes and resulting funds from convictions or agreements
- Provides ability to issue no cost extensions on VOCA awards, making VOCA awards potentially available one year longer
- Waiver of 20% match requirement for duration of the pandemic (States do not have match requirements, only subrecipients/funded programs)



STATE GUIDANCE

- **I.C.** § 67-3533: Legislative intent for Idaho's use of ARPA funds
 - a) Does not duplicate other federal funds
 - b) One-time, does not create ongoing obligations
- **I.C.** § **39-5201**: Declaration of legislative policy to "provide funding throughout the state for aiding victims of domestic violence and other crimes"

FEDERAL TREASURY FINAL GUIDANCE

- a) 31 CFR 35.6(b)(7): Nonprofits. Assistance to nonprofit organizations, including grants
- b) 31 CFR 35.6(b)(12): Disproportionately impacted populations and communities such as:
 - a) 31 CFR 35.6(b)(12)(i)(C): Community violence intervention programs
 - b) 31 CFR 35.6(b)(12)(ii): Programs that address housing insecurity
- c) 31 CFR 35.6(b)(1)(xviii): Mental health treatment, and other behavioral health services
