Chairman Crane called the meeting to order at 9:04 AM.

Chairman Crane welcomed the Committee members and introduced the page Trew Lammers.

Chairman Crane assigned proofreaders for the committee; Rep. Allgood and Green.

Chairman Crane explained the rules of committee and how this would affect various individuals and groups.

- **RS 29972C1: Rep. Young** presented **RS 29972C1** and discussed how this proposed legislation clarifies existing Idaho Code. It would ensure all post-election audits would be conducted as a hand count.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 29972C1. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30007: Rep. Raybould** presented **RS 30007** and discussed how this proposed legislation would make changes to House Rules 6, 8, 10, and 17. Within House Rule 6 it would update how many "personal" bills could be created by an individual legislator. She further explained how the title of "personal" bill would be changed to informational bills and would remain in the Office of the Chief Clerk. This legislation would clarify any references to informational bills within House Rules 8, 10, and 17.

In response to Committee questions, **Rep. Raybould** explained how **RS 30007** would not change the process by which legislators create bills. The change to House Rules would encourage bills to be put through the legislative process. She clarified the proposed changes to House Rule 17 and how informational bills could not be called up from Committee and would remain at the Chief Clerk's desk.

ORIGINAL MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to introduce RS 30007 and recommended it be sent directly to the second reading calendar with changes on page 1 line 26 from two to three.

SUBSTITUTE Rep. Scott made a substitute motion to introduce **RS 30007** and send to the 2nd reading calendar with changes on page 1 striking lines 26-27.

AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Rep. Gannon made an amended substitute motion to introduce RS 30007 and recommended it be sent directly to the second reading calendar with changes on page 2 changing lines 24-25 to read "this provision can only be used one time per bill per session".

RS 29978: Rep. Skaug presented **RS 29978** and explained how this proposed legislation would amend the No Public Funds for Abortion Act. He clarified this proposed legislation would not limit discussion regarding abortion within classrooms. However, it would prevent tax dollars from going to sanctuary cities or cities who refuse to enforce laws regarding illegal abortions. If a city or county were to issue proclamations or similar actions in contradiction with state law or statutes, sales and use of tax revenues would be withheld.

In response to Committee questions, **Rep. Skaug** explained how this proposed legislation interacts with previous federal court decisions. He clarified how this proposed legislation does not imply the criminalization of ectopic pregnancies. He further explained under what circumstances money would be withheld from different entities.

- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to introduce RS 29978. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **ADJOURN:** There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting adjourned at 9:11 AM.

Chairman Crane called the meeting to order at 9:00 am.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from January 10, 2023, and January 11, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30017: Rep. Barbieri** explained that **RS 30017** is specifically designed to alleviate some of the abuses experienced last year. **RS 30017** will eliminate the ability to introduce a personal bill except by committees.
- ORIGINAL Rep. Holtzclaw made a motion to introduce RS 30017 and recommended it be sent directly to the second reading calendar.
- SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Rep. Scott made a substitute motion to introduce RS 30017. Rep. Scott requested a roll call vote. Substitute motion carried by a vote of 8 AYE, 4 NAY, and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Rep. Crane (13), Rep. Young, Rep. Barbieri, Rep. Scott, Rep. Andrus, Rep. Skaug, Rep. Allgood and Rep. Green (Lesmeister). Voting in opposition to the motion: Rep. Palmer, Rep. Holtzclaw, Rep. Alfieri, and Rep. Crane (12). Rep. Gannon was absent/excused.
- H 1: Rep. Young presented H 1 and explained this will codify what has been the practice so postelection audit procedures are clear moving forward. She clarified all postelection audits in the 2022 election were counted by hand and there is currently no time line for audits.

Phil McGrane, Secretary of State, testified **in support of H 1.** He expressed his appreciation to **Rep. Young** for working with their office. Secretary McGrane confirmed all of the audits were hand counts in every location, affirming the current practice of **H 1.** He informed the committee the timing of the audits is before the official canvas. Secretary McGrane went into detail regarding the movement of ballots during the recounts. The movement of ballots involves the county sheriff and depending on the county and the size of the jurisdiction, the sheriff may store them in an evidence locker or change out the locks in the clerk's office and the ballots will remain there. The sheriff is in sole custody and a deputy is present during the recount. If a discrepancy appears in the audit, there is discretion for the Secretary of State to perform additional audits. The time window to challenge an election does not begin until after the results have been reported to the canvas board.

MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion to send H 1 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Young will sponsor the bill on the floor.

ADJOURN: There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 9:33 a.m.

Chairman Crane called the meeting to order at 9:00 am.

H 2: Rep. Skaug presented H 2 and explained this bill provides for the withholding of sales and use tax revenues from local government entities that defy state law regarding abortion. The prior Attorney General's office advised this bill could be brought forward this session. There are some technical corrections in this bill, such as, regarding openly discussing abortion in the classroom. H 2, provides for the withholding of sales and use tax to any entity that defies the criminal statute. If city councils create a policy to allow abortions, they have 180 days to correct the policy.

Tammy Payne, Right to Life of Idaho, and Legislative District 23, testified **in support** of **H 2.** Ms. Payne stated the corrections are needed and municipalities should not be exempt from following the law.

Delbert Chapel, Legislative District 13, testified **in support** of **H 2.** Mr. Chapel stated Idaho's abortion laws should be followed by all citizens in Idaho.

Cindy Thorngren, Legislative District 21, spoke **in opposition** for **H 2.** Ms. Thorngren expressed her desire to let cities and counties set their own priorities for their citizens.

Christian Welp, Roman Catholic Diocese of Boise, testified **in support** of **H 2**. Mr. Welp stated abortion is illegal in the state of Idaho and, therefore, any public figure who knowingly refuses to enforce this law should be held accountable. **H 2** takes the appropriate measures to ensure abortion laws are followed and prosecuted, if need be in Idaho.

Blaine Conzatti, President of the Idaho Family Policy Center spoke **in support** for **H 2**. Mr. Conzatti applauded **Rep. Skaug** for sponsoring **H 2**. He stated when sanctuary cities or counties willingly defy the legislature, it sows anarchy into the system of government. Mr. Conzatti indicated that 70% of Idaho voters likely support the heartbeat law and a similar number support the trigger law. This legislation holds cities and counties accountable to the law in Idaho.

Shawn Witham, Legislative District 10, was registered to testify via telephone, however, due to technical difficulties this was not possible.

Rep. Skaug concluded the discussion on **H 2** and thanked all who testified either in support or in opposition. He said this body has a duty to sanction lawlessness and warned of the consequences. He further explained that this bill does not criminalize anyone, in any way, that wasn't already criminalized. The city will pay the penalty, not the individual, and a willful standard must be shown so a bookkeeper performing their responsibilities would not be included. The penalty for not enforcing this law is indicated in Section 18-5702, Idaho Code. Any public officer or public employee who knowingly violates the law will be in violation of Section 18-5701, Idaho Code for the misuse of public moneys.

- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to send H 2 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Gannon and Rep. Lesmeister requested they be recorded as voting NAY. Rep. Skaug will sponsor the bill on the floor.

- **RS 30026: Rep. Alfieri** presented **RS 30026** and explained existing law prohibited the use of private money by local governments but did not prevent the state from using private funds. **RS 30026** prohibits the State of Idaho from using private money to administer an election. Rep. Alfieri added there were many concerns during last year's and the previous year's elections, for instance, there was concern the use of private money would influence elections by providing drop boxes.
- MOTION: Rep. Gannon made a motion to introduce RS 30026. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30061: Rep. Monks** presented **RS 30061** and stated **RS 30061** prohibits state agencies from donating to, or sponsoring non-governmental events unless it is required by law or without prior written permission of the Governor's office. Anyone found to be in violation to this legislation would be subject to the penalties found in Section 18-5701(10), Idaho Code. He further explained membership fees are not included and, as far as he is aware, there are no standing permissions that exist among government agencies. If an agency would like to donate to an event, they must ask permission from the Governor prior to the event. The governor's staff brought up circumstances when it would be appropriate to grant permission, such as, The Department of Labor may want to sponsor a job fair. Anything outside of an agency's purview would be inappropriate for that agency to sponsor.
- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to introduce RS 30061. Motion carried with a voice vote.
- **ADJOURN:** There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 9:16 A.M.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from January 17, 2023, January 18, 2023 and January 19, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30080: Rep. Lambert** explained **RS 30080** removes student IDs as a valid form of identification at the polls because there is some concern that students from Washington are using their Idaho student IDs to vote and they are also voting in Washington. Rep. Lambert stated she would have more information for the committee regarding how students would continue to be able to vote. There was some discussion surrounding the requirement that individuals residing in Idaho have 30 days to change their drivers' licenses to an Idaho license. **Rep. Crane(12)** stated it is possible for students to attend an Idaho school online, live in Washington, but vote in Idaho. **Rep. Gannon** read Article 6, Section 5 of the Idaho Constitution that allows for students attending school in Idaho to vote in Idaho elections.
- MOTION: Rep. Young made a motion to introduce RS 30080. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30144: Rep. Barbieri** stated the purpose of **RS 30144** is to eliminate the 20th legislative day deadline for Personal Bills and prevent a logjam within the Legislative Services Office (LSO). Rep. Barbieri further explained a Personal Bill will not appear in a committee, however, it will receive a bill number and citizens will be able to find it on the website. The Personal Bill will reside in the Chief Clerk's office and thus eliminate the need for a chairman to make a decision whether or not to bring it out of committee. The first concurrent resolution of the session is a Personal Bill to allow for the State of the State address in joint session and that process will remain unchanged. This RS is a reaction to some situations that arose during the 2022 session that some members felt was an abuse of the rules while others felt was a violation of ethics. **Chairman Crane (13)** indicated the Senate is also examining their process of Personal Bills. Rep. Barbieri will address how the disposal of bills will be handled at the bill's hearing.
- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to introduce RS 30144. Motion carried by voice vote.

Vice Chair Young called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M.

- RS 30175: Rep. Monks presented RS 30175 and reviewed the history of this legislation, explaining RS 30175 is essentially H 708 from the 2022 Legislative Session. H 708 passed the House of Representatives and stalled in the Senate last year. On April 7, 2021, Governor Little issued an Executive Order. RS 30175 codifies and expands the Executive Order by adding that individuals will not be required to provide proof of a COVID vaccination to receive services from the State of Idaho, enter a public building or receive employment with a few exceptions. Rep. Monks indicated a couple of those exceptions may be if your job requires you to travel to others states and those states require a vaccination, or if your job requires you to enter a private residence and the homeowner requires a vaccination. RS 30175 does not cover other vaccinations, however, the emergency use authorization section should cover issues that may come up in the future. There are several details in this legislation that Rep. Monks will address in the bill's hearing such as including other vaccinations and whether an elected official is an employee of the state.
- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to introduce RS 30175. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30087: Rep. Boyle** presented **RS 30087**, a Memorial regarding Greater Idaho. For many years, Eastern Oregon residents have been unhappy with their state. Eleven counties in Oregon would like to move the Idaho-Oregon border and become a part of Idaho. For this to happen, both state legislatures need to agree to move the border. Rep. Boyle relayed some of the advantages to Idaho would be 380,000 more citizens, which would result in another congressional seat and, according to a study on economics performed by Claremont Institute, Idaho would receive \$170 million in additional tax dollars, not including tax dollars from businesses.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 30087. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30079: Rep. Blanksma**, presented **RS 30079** to eliminate the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee (JLOC) and reassign oversight of the Office of Performance Evaluation to the Legislative Council. **Rep. Gannon** expressed his concerns that eliminating JLOC, which is a bipartisan committee, would result in the reduction of transparency and checks and balances which have been in code since 1993.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (13) made a motion to introduce RS 30079. Motion carried by voice vote.

Senator Nichols added this legislation also protects the inherent right citizens have to sustain themselves by growing food on their own property, including property contained within a homeowner's association. It is important to note residents will need to comply with all local and county ordinances. Senator Nichols shared property owners may not dedicate more than 60% of their backyard to food production.
- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to introduce RS 30104. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30009C1: Rep. Alfieri** presented **RS 30009C1**. He stated absentee ballots are a very important part of the voting process in this republic, however, with the increased use of absentee ballots, the potential of voter fraud has also increased. The cleaning of voter rolls has become a problem. Six percent of the population moves every year and it becomes difficult to mail ballots to the correct address. **RS 30009C1** sets very specific parameters to when citizens may vote via absentee ballot. It is important to protect the veracity of elections.

Rep. Alfieri clarified a long-term illness or hospitalization is a reason to receive an absentee ballot and the elector will not be required to share details but simply use a check box. If an individual commits fraud, there is existing code to address the punishment. Rep. Alfieri will provide the committee with more details regarding what early voting opportunities exist in the counties and how much time is needed to request an absentee ballot. Rep. Alfieri acknowledged Idaho does not have specific, firm evidence of voter fraud but there are indications.

- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to introduce RS 30009C1. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **ADJOURN:** There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 9:32 A.M.

- **RS 30185: Rep. Scott** presented **RS 30185**, a proposed House Concurrent Resolution reaffirming the importance of the Electoral College and highlighting the dangers of the popular vote.
- MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion to introduce RS 30185. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30210: Rep. Scott** presented **RS 30210**. Rep. Scott stated **RS 30210** amends the duties of the Idaho State Controller to account for and store agreements entered into by state officers and agencies of the three branches of government. Rep. Scott shared this will include interstate compacts.
- MOTION: Rep. Gannon made a motion to introduce RS 30210. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30171: Rep. Ehardt** presented **RS 30171**, legislation proposing to amend sections of Idaho Code related to human trafficking by adding definitions related to the illegal trafficking of minors to procure a criminal abortion.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to introduce RS 30171. Motion carried by voice vote.
- H 68: Rep. Blanksma presented H 68, legislation eliminating the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee (JLOC) and replacing it with the Legislative Council. JLOC is an appointed committee and the Legislative Council is elected by the members of each body. Rep. Blanksma stated the minority is disproportionately represented on JLOC, while the Legislative Council is far more reflective of our state. H 68 streamlines the evaluation process by giving oversight of the Office of Performance Evaluation (OPE) to the Legislative Council. Currently, JLOC appoints the Director of OPE with 75 percent of the vote. H 68 would require a simple majority of the vote to appoint the director because it is reflective of the standard practice in the legislature.

Sam Sandmire, Kayla Dodson, Crystal Ivie, Kendal Shaber, Diane Schwarz, Michael McGrane and Susan King all testified in opposition to H 68 because the current system is working well and producing non-partisanship reports and data. They appreciate how JLOC is a bipartisan committee and is working well with OPE. **Christine Pisani**, Executive Director of the Idaho Council on Developmental Disabilities, testified **in opposition** to **H 68**. Ms. Pisani stated the structure and function of JLOC has performed an exemplary role of reviewing and selecting diverse study proposals dealing with difficult issues. Seniors and citizens with developmental disabilities have benefited by studies completed by OPE. The transparency the state is afforded by maintaining the current structure of JLOC overseeing and assigning projects to OPE provides the integrity the public relies on. In response to committee questions, Ms. Pisani stated she understands that the OPE will change under the Legislative Council by looking at financial and program aspects as well as agreements entered into by state agencies.

Rakesh Mohan, Director of the Office of Performance Evaluation, was invited to answer questions by **Rep. Gannon**. Mr. Mohan gave a general outline how JLOC selects the projects OPE is assigned and clarified the entire selection process is conducted in a public meeting.

Rep. Blanksma was recognized to close testimony on **H 68**. Rep. Blanksma clarified **H 68** is not about OPE and the process remains the same. She continued to clarify that according to state code, OPE is not allowed to perform studies. OPE will continue to be tasked to perform audits and performance evaluations of state agencies.

- **MOTION: Rep. Allgood** made a motioned to approve the minutes from February 1, 2023, and February 2, 2023. **Motion carried by voice vote.**
- MOTION: Vice Chair Young made a motion to approve the minutes from February 6, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- H 11: Rep. Alfieri presented H 11, legislation prohibiting the state from using private moneys to administer elections. There is existing law prohibiting private moneys in local elections but there is not a law prohibiting the state.

Phil McGrane, Secretary of State, testified **in support** of **H 11**. In 2020 there was private grant money used by 49 states. There are existing laws preventing local elections from using private grant money but there is not law preventing the Secretary of State from using private money. Mr. McGrane stated it is the proper role of government to fund elections.

- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to send H 11 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Alfieri will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **H 58: Rep.** Alfieri presented **H 58**, legislation eliminating the school bond and levy election dates in March and August and consolidating those elections in May and November. This change will increase voter turn out for bonds and levies because the turn out for elections in May and November are much higher than turnout in March or August.

Dr. Jeff Dillon, Superintendent, Wilder School District, testified **in opposition** of **H 58** because education budgets from the state are set in March and the time frame to have contract negotiations and district budgets completed is not adequate to present a levy or bond on the May ballot. Dr. Dillon also indicated school district ballot measures get lost in the narrative of the ballot in November. In response to committee questions, Dr. Dillon stated there are occasions when the budget timing could be adjusted. He also noted Wilder School District gets a much higher percentage of voters participating in August because of their transparency to the voters.

Quinn Perry, Idaho School Boards Association, testified **in opposition** stating school districts and the legislature must work together to find solutions and **H 58** removes the tools schools have to operate without providing solutions. Ms. Perry stated her organization desires a higher voter turnout and also a conversation with all stakeholders. She shared bonds and levies are at the bottom of the ballot and are often overlooked. School districts have several time line limitations that make it difficult to use the May election date. Ms. Perry indicated presenting bonds and levies are the least favorite responsibility districts need to perform, but despite that, they continue to go above and beyond to inform their communities of election dates. They also use those dates to receive feedback from patrons and then rework plans to take proposals back to the voters.

Teresa Rae, School Board Trustee for Boundary School District, and **Brigham Cook**, Ririe School Board Chairman testified **in opposition**, stating May is too early to run a levy because their budget and contact negotiations are not completed in time. School districts need all four dates to do what is best for schools.

Ron Nate, Idaho Freedom Foundation, testified **in support** of **H 58** and cited his county's voter turn out is much higher in November and May when compared to March or August election dates. Mr. Nate stated it is more efficient to have fewer elections because it consolidates costs. It is also frustrating to have an election every three months. He proposed a possible compromise to hold a bond or levy election every four years in conjunction with the presidential primary in March.

Terry Jones, School Board Trustee for Emmett School District and Payette River Regional Technical Academy. Mr. Jones' testimony regarding **H 58** was neutral. He stated unfunded mandates and building maintenance make it necessary for his school districts' to present a levy and bond suppliers counsel his district to run their bonds and levies in March for optimal success and to never use the November date. Mr. Jones also shared his perspective as a property owner, saying he wants the best and efficient use of funds and school districts don't work hard enough to educate the public. In response to committee questions, Mr. Jones stated counselors, psychologists, special education teachers, para-professionals, nurses, teaching instructors are mandated, however, none are funded by the state.

Eric Hasselstrom, County Commissioner, Lewis County, testified **in opposition** to **H 58**, and stated there is no reason to have the election dates in March and August. Mr. Hasselstrom remarked Lewis County has a population of 3,500 and can not afford the cost of having elections in March and August.

Russell Hendricks, Idaho Farm Bureau Federation testified **in support** of **H 58** stating farmers and ranchers pay for levies and bonds on their personal residences and again on their agricultural land. Bonds and levies can increase their taxes by several thousand dollars. Mr. Hendricks indicated the legislature has done an excellent job funding K-12 education by increasing funding by 42% over the last three years and after the special session, increased funding \$330 million. Mr. Hendricks indicated their hope is for the state to properly fund education so levies and bonds are no longer needed and **H 58** is a great initial step to move to a new paradigm regarding how to fund schools.

Darcy Lammers and **Darren Taber** testified **in support** of **H 58**, stating school districts can improve communicating their needs to the voters and elections dates in March and August are not needed.

Rep. Alfieri presented closing testimony on **H 58** and stated school funding is a critical issue that needs addressed, however that is a separate issue. Rep. Alfieri remarked legislators need to understand who they serve and they serve the public, and if they believe that, they must engage them in the best manner possible. Holding elections in March or August when only 2 - 3% of the public turns out, is not serving the public.

- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to send H 58 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Alfieri will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **ADJOURN:** There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 10:13 A.M.

Mr. McGrane stated Idaho elections are secure, and rampant fraud does not exist in Idaho because we are diligent and put safeguards in place, however, we should continue to strengthen our safeguards. Mr. McGrane remarked residents need access to free IDs that meet the same standard as a government issued ID.

Amy Dundon, ACLU of Idaho, testified **in opposition**, stating there could be serious implications to the constitutional right to vote if **H 54** passed.

Rep. Lambert, presented closing testimony and stated the use of student IDs, as a source of identification at the polls, is not a secure form of identification and the possibility of fraud should be eliminated as much as possible.

MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion HOLD H 54 in committee. Motion carried by voice vote.

Mr. Mark Simmons, former Speaker of the House in Oregon, presented **HJM 1**, and stated members of the Greater Idaho organization want to see the kind of laws that reflect, self-reliance, faith, family, and hard work, the things Idaho is based on, in Oregon, however, there is a huge cultural divide between Western and Eastern Oregon and which is making it impossible to enact those laws. The Greater Idaho organization was formed as a solution to the problems they see in Oregon threatening their farms, ranches and businesses. Responding to committee questions, Mr. Simmons gave a broad overview of what the process to move state borders would entail. The border change would include 11 counties in Oregon who have voted close to 70% in favor of the change.

Michael Oswald, Jason Green, Matthew Jensen and John Lawson testified in support of HJM 1, stating the residents of Eastern Oregon share the same values as Idaho and discussions should be able to begin.

William Howell, Greater Idaho, testified **in support** of **HJM 1**. Mr. Howell owns a seed business and farm land in Union County and stated liberal drug laws, the releasing of criminals, poor public education, and unfair taxes and regulations have made his life difficult. He also shared Oregon has left them without a voice and has become repressive and dictatorial.

Matt McCaw, spokesperson for Greater Idaho, indicated the movement has broad, wide support. Greater Idaho had polling done in Idaho and found a strong majority of residents desired to move the border. The proposed change to the border would result in 63% of Oregon's land mass and 9% (400,000 residents) of Oregon's population moving into Idaho's border. Greater Idaho does not want to be a burden to Idaho but to make Idaho stronger.

Rep. Ehardt presented closing testimony on **HJM 1**, stating, initial polling among Oregon and Idaho residents was extremely positive despite not having much information regarding the border change. **HJM 1** authorizes a conversation that should take place.

- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to send HJM 1 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Gannon requested to be recorded as voting NAY. Reps. Ehardt and Boyle will sponsor the bill on the floor.

Idaho is spending more than \$7 million each year in membership fees, dues and subscriptions. Rep. Scott stated H 91 will give the legislature additional oversight. **Julie Hart**, Association of Idaho Cities, testified **in opposition** to **H 91** stating, the Association of Cities provides guidance and training to mayors and councilmen, most of whom are part-time and working for small cities. Ms. Hart explained **H 91** would prevent this essential training from happening.

Rep. Scott presented closing testimony clarifying **H 91** does not include cities or counties and this legislation will prompt agencies to closely examine their subscriptions and memberships.

Phil McGrane, Secretary of State, testified **in support** of **H 138**, stating Idaho has spent almost \$5 million on the March Presidential Primary Election and the anticipated turn out to these elections has not been what they anticipated but seems to have resulted in a decrease in voter turn out for the May Primary Election date .

- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send H 138 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Manwaring will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **RS 30143: Rep. Alfieri** presented **RS 30143**, proposed legislation which is an extensive update of Idaho's Unclaimed Property law. Rep. Alfieri stated the last rewrite was completed in 1983 and the significant changes include the addition of, loyalty, gift, and store value cards, and virtual currency. Another notable change is shortening the time period from 5 years to 3 years to classify property abandoned. The Treasurer's current volume of unclaimed property is \$228 million.

H 75: Rep. Alfieri presented H 75, legislation tightening the requirements of absentee ballots and returning to their original use and intent. Rep. Alfieri stated H 75 is an attempt to prevent the type of fraud that exists in others states using absentee ballots.

UNANIMOUS
CONSENT
REQUEST:Chairman Crane (13) made an unanimous consent request to allow Phil McGrane,
Secretary of State, to testify at this point because of Mr. McGrane's schedule.
There being no objection, the request was granted.

Phil McGrane, Secretary of State, testified **in opposition** to **H 75**, stating, there is not wide-spread voter fraud because of absentee voting in Idaho and there are procedures in place to catch any fraud. Mr. McGrane remarked absentee voting is an important tool for voters to use and some precincts only vote via absentee because their rural location makes having a central polling location impossible.

Rep. Kingsley presented **H 75**, and shared a personal experience he had with a pre-filled absentee ballot request which arrived at his home for his child who had not lived there for six years. Rep. Kingsley indicated the use of absentee ballots is growing and his belief it is the intention to move Idaho towards voting via mail exclusively.

Kendal Shaber, League of Women Voters of Idaho, testified **in opposition** to **H 75**, stating existing law allows for all residents to vote absentee and by changing who can qualify to receive an absentee ballot, some citizens who may need to vote via absentee, will not be able to.

Macee Utlecht, Sam Sandmire, Ken Harris, Andrea Wilson, Kayla Dodson, Tamera Dittenber, Kathy Dawes, Norma Staaf, and Alicia Abbott, testified in opposition to H 75, stating voting should be easier, not harder and by removing the ability to vote absentee, it is denying citizens the convenience and accessibility of having a choice. They also spoke to the existing procedures in place to catch any fraud, should it exist, and how the absentee ballot process allows them to have more time to research and consider their votes carefully.

Tim O'Donnell, Jackie Davidson and Lyle Johnstone testified **in support** of **H 75**, stating the more we encourage absentee voting, the more opportunities for fraud and requested Idaho not sacrifice secure elections for convenience.

Lupe Wissel, AARP Idaho, testified in opposition to H 75, stating because of health reasons, many citizens feel more comfortable voting via absentee ballot and H 75 places restrictions on a citizen's right to vote.

Kathy Ackerman, Idaho County Clerk, and Idaho Association of County Clerks' Legislative Committee, testified **in opposition** of **H 75**, stating some type of verification will very likely be required in the future and it will be an undue burden on the county clerks. Ms. Ackerman also shared it puts the county clerks on the front line of angry voters again and clarified clerks are in favor of restricting third parties from sending out pre-filled absentee ballot requests. She remarked she is against the Routing Slip (RS) going directly to the floor and not allowing testimony.

Rebecca Funk testified **in opposition** to **H 75** and asked the committee to take other steps to secure voting, such as ballot harvesting, identification and requesting ballots per election instead of per year.

Alicia Abbott testified in opposition to H 75 because of concerns regarding the need to vote absentee due to being a caregiver and the lack of clarity of how a medical need would be verified.

Reps. Alfieri and Kingsley presented closing testimony on H 75, stating allowances have been made in **RS 30376** for everyone that may need an absentee ballot and it is every citizen's duty to study, research and vote.

- MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to HOLD H 75 in committee. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30376: Rep. Alfieri** presented **RS 30376**, proposed legislation addressing absentee ballot requirements and allowing for residents who may have seasonal residences outside of Idaho. Rep. Alfieri clarified **RS 30376** also expands the list of citizens qualified to receive absentee ballots.
- **MOTION: Rep. Barbieri** made a motion to introduce **RS 30376** and recommended it be sent directly to the Second Reading Calendar.

Vice Chairman Young called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from February 20, 2023 and February 21, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30427: Rep. Shepherd** presented **RS 30427**, proposed legislation assuring spectators to any Idaho school sporting event are guaranteed the option to use cash as a payment for entry.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to introduce RS 30427. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30415C1: Rep. Necochea** presented **RS 30415C1**, proposed legislation prohibiting the Executive Branch and county commissioners from disseminating electioneering messages via the State Tax Commission and property tax correspondence.
- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to introduce RS 30415C1. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30303C2:** Sen. Hart presented **RS 30303C2**, a proposed Joint Memorial requesting Congress to limit the jurisdiction of the lower federal courts from hearing the cases that relate to state legislative authority to pass laws regarding abortion. Those cases would then be heard in the state courts, which would be in accordance with the findings of the Supreme Court as expressed in the Dobbs Decision.
- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to introduce RS 30303C2. Motion carried by voice vote.
- H 29: Reps. Gannon and Crane (12) presented H 29, legislation placing a six month pause between serving in the Legislature and when a former legislator may register as a lobbyist. Rep. Crane requested H 29 be held in committee.
- RS: 30398: Reps. Gannon and Crane (12) presented RS 30398, proposed legislation prohibiting a Legislator, Executive Branch employee or a state official from registering to be a lobbyist for a period of six months after termination of service. Individuals would be able to be employed by employers who lobby, however, they would not be able to register as a lobbyist. Rep. Gannon stated several exemptions are provided in RS 30398 such as, working for a state agency. In response to committee questions, Rep. Gannon indicated an increasing number of legislators are working as registered lobbyists and, while there is nothing wrong with that, perception is important and the public needs to know, their elected officials are primarily working to represent them.

MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to HOLD H 29 in committee. Motion carried by voice vote.

Rep. Palmer asked for a point of order regarding public testimony on **H 29**.

Cindy Thorngren testified **in support** of **H 29** and stated **H 29** allows Legislators to show a sincerity to the public. Ms. Thorngren remarked elected officials should not use their office to increase their bottom line.

- MOTION: Rep. Green made a motion to return RS 30398 to sponsor. Motion carried by voice vote. Reps Crane (13), Young, and Crane (12) requested to be recorded as voting NAY.

- **RS 30435C1: Rep. Sauter** presented **RS 30435C1**, proposed legislation to ensure voters are not solicited at public polling places by changing the distance from 100 feet to 300 feet for campaigning materials. Rep. Sauter stated the definitions of polling places' boundaries vary among county clerks. Some measure from the front door while others may measure from the parking lots.
- MOTION: Rep. Scott requested a roll call vote. Rep. Allgood made a motion to introduce RS 30435C1.

MOTION:Rep. Scott made a motion to return RS 30435C1 to the sponsor. Substitute

- **RS 30404:** Blaine Conzatti presented **RS 30404**, proposed legislation creating a duty of care for promoters, organizers and performers of sexual exhibitions to take reasonable steps to restrict the access of minors. Mr. Conzatti stated **RS 30404** also prohibits the use of public facilities and assets for such events, however, these events can still take place on private property as long as promoters take reasonable steps to restrict access to children.

Chairman Crane (13) put the committee at ease at 9:26 A.M.

Chairman Crane (13) resumed the meeting at 9:27 A.M.

MOTION: Rep. Young made a motion to introduce RS 30404 with the following changes: On Page 1, Lines 30, 37 and 40, strike "n accompanying" and on Page 2, strike "n accompany." Motion carried by voice vote.

- H 197: Rep. Barbieri presented H 197, legislation amending how the Legislature addresses the Administrative Rules Review process. Rep. Barbieri stated H 197 allows a committee to reject a rule an Administrative Rule and allows the Administrative Rule to remain in the committee. It is important the Legislature handles Administrative Rules in the same way they handle laws. Rep. Barbieri expressed H 197 will reduce the number of Administrative Rules the Legislature is required to review every year.
- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send H 197 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Barbieri will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 190: Rep. Ehardt and Julie Ellsworth, Idaho State Treasurer, presented H 190, legislation prohibiting banks and credit unions, designated by the Idaho State Treasurer, as depositories for public monies, do not boycott vital industries to Idaho using Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) criteria. Rep. Ehardt stated depositories must meet existing certification requirements and H 190 adds another requirement to those certifications. Ms. Ellsworth, stated ESG standards are subjective and grant companies undue influence on public policy. Ms. Ellsworth clarified there are opportunities for banks and credit unions to receive exemptions and there is a 60 day appeals process before the depository status is removed.

Andy Snook, General Council and Fair Hearings Division, Attorney General's office, stood in response to committee questions and clarified Page 3, Line 7, "limit commercial relations" is borrowed from existing law and will guard against a partial boycott.

Jonathan Oppenheimer, Idaho Conservation League, testified **in opposition** of **H 190**, stating **H 190** will expand the State Treasurer's oversight responsibilities and includes banks doing business outside of Idaho. Mr. Oppenheimer remarked this legislation will be an undue burden on the private sector and prevent lending institutions from properly evaluating all risks.

Braden Jensen, testified **in support** of **H 190**. Mr. Jensen stated **H 190** will ensure banks and credit unions do not boycott industries, including agriculture. Farm Bureau participated in stake holder meetings and **H 190** establishes clear policy protecting agriculture and natural resource industries. Mr. Jensen also commented there are reasonable exceptions included in the bill.

Dave Taylor, Idaho Rifle and Pistol Association, testified **in support** of **H 190**, stating they strongly oppose any effort to affect the firearms industry.

Rep. Ehardt presented closing testimony, stating, ESG and boycotting is real and it is affecting industries in Idaho.

- MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion to send H 190 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Green requested to be recorded as voting NAY. Rep. Ehardt will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **H 189:** Julie Ellsworth, Idaho State Treasurer, presented **H 189**, legislation prohibiting public contracts with companies that are boycotting certain industries. Ms. Ellsworth stated **H 189** provides a definition of a public contract and there is an exemption provision which allows for public input in a way it is easily accessible and maintained in the public record.

Andy Snook, General Council and Fair Hearings Division, Attorney General's office, stood in response to committee questions clarifying the definition of a contract as defined in the Idaho Procurement Act.

Jonathan Oppenheimer, Idaho Conservation League, testified **in opposition** to **H 189**, stating this is misguided action against ESG and will result in destabilizing financial and bond markets, and increase borrowing costs. Mr. Oppenheimer remarked, ESG is good risk management and needs to be addressed at the federal level, not the state level.

Alex LaBeau, Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, testified **in opposition** to **H 189**, stating it is dangerous and unworkable legislation. Mr. LaBeau commented **H 189** creates a new set of burdensome regulations and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) requires industries to participate in ESG. He also shared similar legislation has cost the State of Texas significant money.

Braden Jensen, Idaho Farm Bureau Federation, testified **in support** of **H 189**, stating it establishes a clear policy if private companies would like to do business with the state. Mr. Jensen commented **H 189** provides a transparent process and does not tell businesses how to do their business but tells them they will not do business with the State of Idaho.

Dave Taylor, Idaho Rifle and Pistol Association, testified **in support** of **H 189** and is against weaponizing financial institutions against gun owners.

Julie Ellsworth, Idaho State Treasurer, presented closing testimony, stating **H 189** is not the Texas law. Texas did not have exemption provisions, but **H 189** does have those provisions. She also clarified the SEC has not passed a rule implementing an ESG standard.

Andy Snook, General Council and Fair Hearings Division, Attorney General's office, stood in response to committee questions to clarify if an employee unknowingly enters into a contract with a company in violation with **H 189**, the employee/company would have a conflict with state law and the contract would not be able to continue, however, a contracted employee is only required to receive written verification from the company.

MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send **H 189** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

H 191: Rep. Monks presented H 191, legislation setting a level playing field for companies and individuals desiring to do business with the State of Idaho. Rep. Monks stated contract awards will be based on criteria the state establishes when asking for the bid.

Jonathan Oppenheimer, Idaho Conservation League, testified **in opposition** to **H 191**, stating he has fewer concerns with **H 191** than the previous bills presented, however, some of the language could preclude the rejection of a contract with a band of felons who may be bidding on a contract.

Braden Jensen, testified **in support** of **H 191** for the same reasons he stated earlier in the hearing.

Rep. Monks presented closing testimony, clarifying, no contract should be awarded based on environment, social or government standards.

- MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to send H 191 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Reps. Gannon and Green requested to be recorded as voting NAY. Rep. Monks will sponsor the bill on the floor.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from February 23, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30354: Rep. Hawkins** presented **RS 30354**, proposed legislation clarifying foreign nationals may not vote in any election.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 30354. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30370: Rep. Hill** presented **RS 30370**, proposed legislation preventing credit card companies from assigning an unique merchant category code to firearm retailers in Idaho. There will be allowances for financial institutions to disclose this protected financial information if authorization or a subpoena is provided.
- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to introduce RS 30370. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30476: Rep. Ehardt** presented **RS 30476**, proposed legislation prohibiting anyone from trafficking a minor for a criminal abortion with the intent of concealing the crime from the minor's parents and authorizes the Attorney General to prosecute at their discretion.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to introduce RS 30476. Motion carried by voice vote.

Chairman Crane (13) put the committee at ease at 9:10 A.M.

Chairman Crane (13) reconvened the meeting at 9:14 A.M.

UNANIMOUS Chairman Crane (13) made an unanimous consent request to adjust the agenda. CONSENT There being no objection, consent was granted. REQUEST:

- **RS 30471: Rep. Pickett** presented **RS 30471**, proposed legislation allowing any elected school district trustee to finish their term even if there is a boundary change in the trustee's zone which puts their current residence in a different zone.
- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to introduce RS 30471. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **H 180: Rep. Ehardt** presented **H 180**, legislation allowing the Idaho State Treasurer to hold a portion of state funds in gold and silver. Rep. Ehardt stated the Treasurer would only be able to use idle monies for this purpose. The Treasurer has been involved in this legislation and recognizes this could be another tool available to her.

Ron Nate, Idaho Freedom Foundation, testified **in support** of **H 180**, stating he has been teaching economics for 25 years and silver and gold would be a tool to mitigate the effects of inflation. The Treasurer has three options to put idle monies to use and **H 180** offers the only non-paper option. Mr. Nate remarked Idaho has two qualified depositories to store gold and silver.

Bob Coleman, Idaho Armored Vaults and Profits Plus Capital Management, testified **in support** of **H 180**, stating Idaho needs this bill because it allows the State Treasurer a choice. Mr. Coleman remarked there will be a volatility in price, however, metals are a strategic long term investment. In response to committee questions, Mr. Coleman gave a brief overview of the logistics involved in purchasing, storing and transporting metals.

Senator Hart presented closing testimony on **H 180**, stating he has been working with the Treasurer and the state has \$10 billion in idle funds that could possibly be stored in metals and **H 180** allows the only non-paper option.

- MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send H 180 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Ehardt will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 182: Rep. Ehardt presented H 182, legislation also known as "Coach Kennedy's Law", protects a citizen's right to pray at a public school. Rep. Ehardt stated the "Lemon Test" was overturned by the Supreme Court on June 27, 2022, ending over 50 years of preventing a citizen's right to expression of religion. She shared Coach Kennedy's story and how the "Lemon Test" was overturned.

Pastor Mark Thornton, testified **in support** of **H 182**, stating he serves as chaplain for the BSU football team and leads the team in prayer before, during and after games. Pastor Thornton shared a story regarding how an out of state organization requested he be removed from his position because they felt it was abusive to ask players to pray. Pastor Thornton remarked prayer should always be appropriate.

- MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send H 182 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Crane (13) and Rep. Ehardt will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 173: Reps. Boyle and Hill presented H 173, legislation preventing foreign governments from purchasing Idaho agricultural land, mineral and water rights, and mining claims. Rep. Boyle stated forestry/timber land is not included in the definition of agricultural land in Idaho and if any government currently owns land, mineral or water rights or mining claims, this bill will not change their ownership. Rep. Hill remarked Idaho has many valuable minerals and all countries are included in this legislation because governments will use other countries to purchase assets.
- ORIGINAL Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to send H 173 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

Bob Naerebout, Idaho Dairymens Association, testified **in support** of **H 173** stating, he believes in a free market system, however, it does not mean citizens can compete with treasuries of foreign governments. Mr. Naerebout remarked 70% of the milk processed in Idaho is processed by foreign owned companies.

MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to send **H 173** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

MOTION Rep. Scott asked an unanimous consent request to withdraw her motion to send H 173 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. There being no objection, the request was granted.

Chairman Young called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M.

UNANIMOUS Chairman Young made an unanimous consent request to adjust the order of the agenda. There being no objection, the request was granted. REQUEST:

- **RS 30392: Rep. Skaug** presented **RS 30392**, a proposed House Concurrent Resolution, reaffirming Idaho's relationship with Taiwan. Rep. Skaug stated Taiwan needs our agricultural products and Idaho needs their computer chips.
- MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to introduce RS 30392 and recommend it be sent directly to the Second Reading Calendar with the following changes: on Page 1, Line 31, Change "2021" to "2022", and change "first" to "second", on Line 32, change "fifth" to "sixth", and on Line 34, change "\$2.3" to "\$3.15". Motion carried by voice vote.
- H 171: Rep. Alfieri presented H 171, legislation adjusting the term of office of School District Trustees from four years to two years and requiring candidates to declare their political affiliation status or unaffiliated status. Rep. Alfieri stated the public needs to know the candidate's philosophy so they will know how they approach the job and by shortening their terms, Rep. Alfieri believes it will reduce tensions between the public and School District Trustees.

Quinn Perry, Idaho State School Boards Association, testified **in opposition** of **H 171** because trustee's responsibilities are so wide ranging, it takes two years for trustees to understand their duties and responsibilities. Ms. Perry stated changing the board so often will disrupt the operation of school districts including student outcomes and since their terms begin in the middle of the school year and to avoid disruption to students, they will need staggered terms to avoid a complete turn over of the board.

Dale Layne, Idaho Rural Schools Association and Idaho Association of School Administrators, and **Brett Plummer**, Challis School Board Chairman, testified **in opposition** of **H 171**, stating it's difficult to find patrons willing to run for the school board. There is a cost to running an election and funding those elections and campaigns is difficult. They also commented this legislation opens the potential of having a complete turnover of the school board and, therefore, the lack of consistency will also lead to superintendents and teaching staff leaving and could affect student achievement.

	Karen Pyron , Vice Chair, Butte County School Board, and Region 7 Chairman, testified in opposition of H 171 stating, there is not a need to declare political party because boards work for students. Ms. Pyron remarked there is a steep learning curve for a trustee and not having staggering terms could lead to a complete turnover and, therefore, will not be in the best interest of students.
	Amaia Clayton, Idaho League of Women Voters, testified in opposition of H 171, stating there is no reason to declare party affiliation and would not benefit students.
	Rep. Alfieri presented closing testimony, stating candidates are more than capable to learn the job, training is provided and the opportunity to speak with previous trustees is available. He remarked if there is a complete turnover of the board, there is a reason, and that leads to an essential aspect in the bill of accountability to the public.
MOTION:	Rep. Skaug made a motion HOLD H 171 in committee subject to the call of the Chair.
SUBSTITUTE MOTION:	Rep. Scott made a substitute motion to send H 171 to the floor without recommendation.
	There was discussion among the committee and the sponsor to work on adding staggering terms to the legislation.

They remarked they do tailor their performances to specific audiences and everyone's opinion on what is offensive differs from person to person. Nina Beesley, Nicole Trakel, Heather Greenman and Joseph Greenman, testified in support of H 231, stating sexual exhibitions are not appropriate for children. They remarked having these types of events in city parks are a violation of their civil liberties.

Amy Dundon, ACLU of Idaho, testified **in opposition** of **H 231**, stating this legislation violates the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Ms. Dundon remarked **H 231** contains vague language and promotes false and harmful stereotypes which will produce more hatred and violence against LGBTQ community.

Kacie Hoch testified **in opposition** of **H 231**, stating the vague definitions included in the legislation and the way it is written will harm the LGBTQ community. Ms. Hoch also remarked community standards vary widely among individuals.

Blaine Conzatti, presented closing testimony on **H 231** stating, only obscene sexual conduct, dances, gestures and accessories are prohibited. Mr. Conzatti remarked the U.S. Supreme Court has been clear that community standards are not subjective. He also clarified **H 231** does not ban sexual exhibitions, it is simply saying minors can not be in attendance.

- MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion to HOLD H 231 in committee. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30534:** Blaine Conzatti presented **RS 30534**, proposed legislation to correct a clerical error in **H 231**.

- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to send H 240 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Picket will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 273: Rep. Andrus presented H 273, legislation giving citizens another option to address their rising property taxes by allowing them the ability to use the referendum process to address local budgets.

Kelley Packer, Association of Idaho Cities, testified **in opposition** of **H 273**, stating cities hold multiple meetings a year, publish two notices and hold a budget hearing to inform residents and address their concerns. Ms. Packer stated this legislation does not address several items and is not needed.

Russ Hendricks, Idaho Farm Bureau Federation, testified **in support** of **H 273** stating a new and different approach is needed to address property taxes. Mr. Hendricks stated this legislation levels the playing field by empowering taxpayers to use the referendum process at the local level when needed and will lead to greater collaboration between residents and their local government.

Seth Grigg, Idaho Association of Counties, testified **in opposition** of **H 273**. Mr. Grigg cited a court case that ruled it is not lawful to apply the referendum process to the county budget. The referendum process is given to citizens to address laws. The budget process is not law and, therefore, it is not appropriate to apply to the county budget process.

Michael Hon testified **in support** of **H 273**, stating citizens have very little control over taxes and this legislation adds a tool for citizens to use when disputing and challenging budgets.

Rep. Andrus presented closing testimony on **H 273**, stating this legislation allows the referendum process to be statutorily provided for, thereby making it a legal process to challenge budgets.

MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send **H 273** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Barbieri** stated statutorily empowering tax payers to leverage their concerns is powerful. **Rep. Skaug** remarked the state's budget should be looked at as closely as counties' and cities' budgets because the state's budget is increasing at a faster rate. **Rep. Young** clarified the state only has a few options available to address property taxes and this legislation empowers residents.

In opposition of the motion, **Rep. Allgood** expressed his concern that emergency services will be affected if budgets are reduced and indicated the shift between commercial and residential property tax needs to be addressed.

- **RS 30567: Rep. Crane (12)** presented **RS 30567**, proposed legislation closing a legal loophole to give law enforcement and prosecutors the necessary changes to existing Idaho Code to prosecute human sex trafficking.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 30567 with the following changes: On Page 2, Line 22, after "shall" insert, "deliver a report to the germane committees of the Idaho Legislature". On Page 2, Line 5, after "parts" insert "of another person". On Page 2, Line 31, remove "on and after July 1, 2023" and replace with "thirty days following signature of the Governor". Motion carried by voice vote.

Vice Chairman Young turned the gavel over to Chairman Crane (13).

- **RS 30465: Rep. Hill** presented **RS 30465**, proposed legislation prohibiting Idaho entities from entering into certain contracts with companies owned or operated by the People's Republic of China.
- MOTION: Rep. Alfieri made a motion to introduce RS 30465. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **H 221: Rep. Necochea** presented **H 221**, legislation prohibiting the Executive branch and county commissioners from disseminating electioneering messages via the State Tax Commission and property tax correspondence.
- MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send H 221 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Necochea will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **SJR 101aa:** Sen. Okuniewicz presented SJR 101AA, a Joint Resolution requiring signatures from 6% of registered voters from every legislative district in Idaho in order to put an initiative on a ballot. If passed by the Legislature, the Joint Resolution will be placed on the November 2024 General Election ballot.

Matthew Dane; Hollie Conde, Conservation Voters for Idaho; Scott Tate; Elizabeth Noonan; Dr. Graham Wetherley; Kayla Dodson; Yvonne Sandmire; Tracy Olson; Bonnie Shuster; Jonathan Oppenheimer, Idaho Conservation League; Bron Roberts; Jody Brostrom; Kathy Clees; Melanie Edwards; Sheri Hughes; Karen Hansen and Nicholas Miller testified in opposition of SJR 101aa, stating this legislation is taking away the voice of the people by making it impossible to gather enough signatures to put a referendum or initiative on the ballot.

Luke Mayville, Reclaim Idaho, testified in opposition of SJR 101aa, stating the referendum process is different from the initiative process and it's important to understand the differences. Mr. Mayville remarked this legislation eliminates the citizen's right to the referendum process and it's wrong to ask citizens to give up their rights. Mr. Mayville reminded committee members of the Idaho Supreme Court's ruling regarding the prior changes the Legislature attempted to make to the initiative process. Responding to questions from the committee, Mr. Mayville stated he believes if SJR 101aa is put on the ballot, it will be defeated by a large margin in all 44 counties.

Tina Hilding testified **in opposition** of **SJR 101aa**, stating this legislation is taking away the voice of the people by making it impossible to gather enough signatures to put a referendum or initiative on the ballot.

Chairman Crane (13) turned the gavel over to Vice Chairman Young.

Kenneth Burchell testified **in opposition** of **SJR 101aa**, stating this legislation is taking away the voice of the people by making it impossible to gather enough signatures to put a referendum or initiative on the ballot and citizens from rural areas are not being deprived from the initiative process.

Vice Chairman Young turned the gavel over to Chairman Crane (13).

Louise Brannon and **Heather Stout**, testified **in opposition** of **SR 101aa**, stating this legislation is taking away the voice of the people by making it impossible to gather enough signatures to put a referendum or initiative on the ballot and the existing initiative requirements are extremely difficult.

Sen. Okuniewicz presented closing testimony on **SJR101aa** stating, the US Constitution reigns supreme, and as a result, the state does not have the authority to take the freedoms of speech or religion away from citizens. Sen. Okuniewicz clarified the referendum/initiative process does not exist in a majority of states and the current Attorney General and the prior Attorney General reviewed this resolution and verified it is likely to withstand legal challenges.

MOTION: Rep. Holtzclaw made a motion to HOLD SJR 101aa subject to the call of the chair. Motion carried by voice vote.

ADJOURN: There being no further business before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 10:33 A.M.

- **H 293: Rep. Alfieri** presented **H 293**, legislation establishing members of the State Board of Education be elected by zones. Rep. Alfieri stated approximately half of the state's budget is spent by this board and it is not demographically representative of the entire state.

In opposition of the motion, **Rep. Gannon** expressed his concerns of changing the board to partisan and elected positions, could result in special interest groups being involved and also more money to influence voters. **Rep. Green** stated she concurs with Rep. Gannon's opinions regarding a partisan election and she believes representation needs may be met using alternative methods.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Alfieri** stated it has been over 20 years since Kootenai County was represented on this board and 20 years since Canyon County was represented.

Ron Nate testified **in opposition** to **S 1047**, stating this legislation is a very specific carve out to allow a particular business be issued a liquor license. Mr. Nate remarked there should not be laws written so specific they only apply to individuals but instead, laws should be broader to include more citizens.

Brody Aston presented closing testimony on **S 1047**, stating this legislation was limited to resort cities, since their population varies greatly because of visitors.

MOTION: Rep. Scott made a motion to send S 1047 to the floor with no recommendation.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Green** stated this legislation would provide an economic value to these communities and may lead to refurbishing historical buildings in some of our smaller communities. Rep. Green also acknowledged the way the licensing structure stands is a disservice to our communities. **Reps.** Holtzclaw, Scott, Alfieri and Gannon remarked there is a problem with licenses which should be examined more closely and not just a carve out for very specific individuals.

In opposition of the motion, **Rep. Andrus** stated simply owning a business in historic a building does not mean they should be able to have a liquor license. **Rep. Young** remarked this legislation is too specific and the license should be obtained through the regular process.

Chairman Crane (13) called the meeting to order at 8:00 A.M.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve minutes from March 14, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- H 314: Rep. Crane (12), Senator Cindy Carlson and Blaine Conzatti, Idaho Family Policy Center, presented H 314. Rep. Crane (12) stated H 314 requires public schools and community libraries take reasonable steps to prevent minors from harmful, obscene material. Rep. Crane (12) clarified this legislation uses common law and the employee is not held liable, however, the library board of trustees or the school board is held liable.

Senator Cindy Carlson stated library literary works, or books of scientific value are not prohibited. Sen. Carlson remarked schools are a constitutional institution and students should be protected while in our care and reasonable steps should be taken to keep obscene material from students. Sen. Carlson clarified what obscene material does to a child's mind and the long-term effects.

Blaine Conzatti, Idaho Family Policy Center, stated this legislation establishes a duty of care and is defensible in a court of law because it uses the Miller Test. Mr. Conzatti remarked 30 cities in Idaho have at least one library that makes this type of obscene material available to children. Responding to committee questions, Mr. Conzatti stated lawsuits would be filed against public entities and follows the tort claim process which allows for a conversation to occur between the parties.

Chandler Hadraba testified **in support** of **H 314** and displayed material he obtained from the Meridian library and the Hustler store in Boise, in order to demonstrate their similarities and the differences in the steps he took to obtain the material.

Lance McGrath, Idaho Library Association, testified in opposition of H 314, stating librarians care about children and they do not provide material harmful to minors. Mr. McGrath clarified libraries follow board approved selection policies to ensure quality materials are included in the collection and his association believes parents have a responsibility to guide their children's use of libraries. Responding to committee questions, Mr. McGrath stated his association believes this should be a local issue and libraries do not contain obscene material. Libraries use the Miller Test to analyze literature in order to determine if it meets standards. Mr. McGrath remarked libraries are public institutions and serve all needs within their communities and that is why they have segregated areas such as children, young adult and adult sections.

Rep. Hill testified **in support** of **H 314**, stating he consulted with Emmett and Eagle Library Trustees and they felt this legislation will not impose a significant burden to libraries and the penalties are fair.

Erin Kennedy, Intellectual Freedom Chair, Idaho Library Association, testified **in opposition** of **H 314**, stating libraries do not provide obscene materials and libraries offer materials featuring a wide range of views and ideas to meet the needs of the public. Ms. Kennedy clarified in order to consider the literary work as a whole, all the materials in libraries pass the Miller Test and it is not up to the librarian or the Legislature to decide what children should or should not read.

Conrad Woodall, Parents Rights in Education, testified **in support** of **H 314**, stating pornography is harmful and should never have a place in sex education.

Patrick Riceci, Boise Public Library Association, testified **in opposition** of **H 314**, stating this is a parental control issue and Idaho allows parental control regarding several controversial issues.

Michael Hon, testified **in support** of **H 314**, stating taxpayers have been requesting library trustees remove obscene material but trustees and librarians state there are no obscene materials, even though documentation was provided to the contrary. Mr. Hon remarked he was told by the library to monitor his children in the library to avoid them seeing material he did not approve of.

Molly Nota, testified **in opposition** of **H 314**, stating she has worked in public libraries for almost a decade and trusts librarians, library trustees and school boards to build great library collections. Ms. Nota remarked this legislation takes away liberty from parents to determine what their children read and a lot of empathy can be found in books to make a child feel less alone.

Ron Nate, Idaho Freedom Foundation, testified **in support** of **H 314**, stating based on the testimony he has heard today, he is even more concerned because librarians don't believe the material is harmful. Mr. Nate remarked librarians are entrusted to be good community members and assist parents to protect children and he considers the penalty is not great enough.

Chris Parri, Idaho Education Association, testified in opposition of H 314

Rebecca Lemmons, Boise Public Library Trustee, testified **in opposition** of **H 314**, stating this legislation is based on subjectivity and there are policies and procedures in place to select materials for a library. Ms. Lemmons remarked, if an individual doesn't like a book, they don't need to check it out.

Nina Beesley testified **in support** of **H 314**, citing the protections established for citizens in the US Constitution and Idaho's Constitution and the Legislature has a responsibility to ensure those protections. Ms. Beesley remarked Kootenai County has done nothing to prevent obscene materials from being distributed.

Bonnie Shuster testified **in opposition** of **H 314**, stating this legislation is a reward for parents to not pay attention to what their children are reading. Ms. Shuster remarked the cost to the library will be great and damages and fees will ultimately be born by taxpayers.

Rep. Crane (12) presented closing testimony, stating existing law has been incorporated into the bill and many of the previous concerns have been addressed. Rep. Crane remarked he met with librarians and feedback was received from librarians and others, however, librarians do not agree with the penalty included in **H 314**.

MOTION: Rep. Holtzclaw made a motion to send **H 314** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Holtzclaw** stated he views this legislation as a protection bill for children. **Rep. Alfieri** stated the lack of community action is why this bill exists.

In opposition of the motion, **Rep. Green** stated several of the issues addressed in **H 314** currently exist in statute and she has some concerns regarding the definitions included in the legislation. Rep. Green expressed librarians do a good job to restrict access to minors and she fears this may entice more threats against librarians. **Rep. Gannon** disagrees with the penalties included in this legislation and believes, in order to avoid legal fees, a grievance process should be included.

SUBSTITUTE Rep. Gannon made a substitute motion to send **H 314** to General Orders. **MOTION:**

ROLL CALLRoll call vote was requested.Substitute Motion failed by a vote of 2 AYE andVOTE ON11 NAY. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Gannon and Green. Voting inSUBSTITUTEopposition to the motion: Reps. Crane (13), Young, Palmer, Barbieri, Holtzclaw,MOTION:Scott, Andrus, Skaug, Alfieri, Allgood and Crane (12).

ROLL CALLRoll call vote was requested. Original Motion carried by a vote of 11 AYE and 2VOTE ONNAY. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Crane (13), Young, Palmer, Barbieri,ORIGINALHoltzclaw, Scott, Andrus, Skaug, Alfieri, Allgood and Crane (12). Voting in
opposition to the motion: Reps. Gannon and Green.

S 1120: Sen. Guthrie presented **S 1120**, legislation to regulate liquor-by-the-drink licenses. Sen. Guthrie stated, Idaho uses the "quota system" to regulate the density of this type of liquor license to adhere to the principals in the Idaho Constitution. Sen. Guthrie gave an overview of the problems unintentionally created by the current system, such as a speculative market for licenses, resulting in a \$750 license becoming worth \$250K - \$350K. Sen. Guthrie stated this legislation will end the speculative opportunity for licenses issued after July 1, 2023, because the transfer option will no longer be available. Since license holders may have a significant investment in their license, **S 1120** will allow the owner to sell their license one time and thereafter, those licenses will also become non-transferable.

Matt Baker testified **in opposition** of **S 1120**, stating as a business owner and developer in Eagle, he has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars acquiring liquor licenses for business development and this legislation will severely harm existing license holders economically.

Roger Batt, FARE Idaho, testified **in opposition** of **S 1120**, stating their members view this legislation negatively because it would be significantly harming their businesses. Mr. Batt stated they agree with this legislation except for a small portion and would like to offer an amendment to **S 1120**. Mr. Batt remarked there has not been enough studies completed to determine what the ramifications will be.

Jeremy Pisca's, Hagadon Corporation and Idaho Beer and Wine Distributors Association, testimony was neutral. Mr. Pisca testified the quota system is not evil, alcohol should be regulated and connecting licenses to a city's population make sense. Mr. Pisca remarked the unfortunate by-product of the existing license process has been the speculative market with some permits selling for as high as \$500K.

Sen. Guthrie presented closing testimony on **S 1120**, stating a liquor license is not an asset and courts have ruled licenses may be removed at any time. Sen. Guthrie remarked most banks do not recognize a liquor license as an asset. Responding to committee questions, Sen. Guthrie stated by eliminating the leases, it will make more licenses available to small businesses and additional reform needs to take place.

MOTION: Rep. Barbieri made a motion to send **S 1120** to General Orders.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Barbieri** stated a portion of the problem is because the state has treated these licenses as an asset and it is necessary to add an amendment to allow the property owners additional time to work through the leases. **Rep. Gannon** stated government set up this program and the Legislature has the responsibility to clean up the process, but to also be fair to the current license holders.

In opposition to the motion, **Rep. Green** stated this problem needs to be addressed now and not in 20 years as the amendment suggests.

SUBSTITUTERep. Young made a substitute motion to send S 1120 to the floor with a DO PASSMOTION:recommendation.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Young** stated now is the time to make changes to the liquor licensing laws and waiting 20 years will only continue to worsen the problem.

VOTE ONChairman Crane (13) called for a vote on the Substitute Motion to send S 1120 to
the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep.MOTION:Manwaring will sponsor the bill on the floor.

Chairman Crane (13) called the meeting to order at 8:02 A.M.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from March 15, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **RS 30709: Rep. Mickelson** presented **RS 30709**, proposed legislation stating the Attorney General must issue statutorily required opinions within three business days during the legislative session and within five business days when the Legislature is not in session. Responding to committee questions, Rep. Mickelson stated she had not spoken to the Attorney General's office regarding this proposed legislation, however, adding a time line to when opinions should be issued is reasonable and because the prior Attorney General regularly issued opinions, there should not be additional costs to the Attorney General's office.
- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to introduce RS 30709.

SUBSTITUTERep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 30709 with the following changes: on
Page 1, Line 39, change "three" to "ten" and change "(3)" to "(10)".

AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to return RS 30709 to sponsor.

In opposition to both the Substitute Motion and the Amended Substitute Motion, **Rep. Green** stated ten days is too late and three days is too tight but would like to see opinions in a timely manner. Rep. Green remarked it appears the opinions being issued are selective and everyone should be equal in receiving opinions. **Rep. Young** stated she is disturbed by the narrative being discussed regarding the Attorney General and, if she is supportive to the motion to print **RS 30709**, it is to allow the Attorney General to defend himself.

In support of the Amended Substitute Motion, **Rep. Barbieri** clarified statute does not say the Attorney General gives opinions on pending legislation, rather, he gives opinions on the Legislature's processes and offices. Rep. Barbieri remarked the separation of powers is paramount and the Legislature should have their own attorney, so when they receive an opinion, it is from the Legislative Branch. When the Attorney General issues an opinion on pending legislation he disagrees with, it becomes very difficult for the Attorney General to defend the legislation in court.

Responding to committee questions, **Rep. Barbieri** gave examples of when it is proper for the Legislature to ask for an opinion from the Attorney General and stated the Legislature is abdicating their responsibility to the Executive Branch when they rely on them to advise on pending legislation.

ROLL CALLRep. Scott requested a roll call vote. Amended Substitute Motion carried by a
vote of 7 AYE and 6 NAY. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Palmer, Barbieri,
Scott, Andrus, Skaug, Alfieri and Crane (12). Voting in opposition to the
motion: Reps. Crane (13), Young, Holtzclaw, Allgood, Gannon and Green.

RS 30696: Rep. Boyle presented **RS 30696**, proposed legislation prohibiting local governments from enacting any ordinance or policy limiting or prohibiting law enforcement from complying with federal immigration law.

MOTION:

- MOTION: Rep. Andrus made a motion to introduce RS 30696. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **H 125: Rep. Mitchell** presented **H 125**, legislation to give county clerks additional time between the withdrawal of candidates and the time to send out absentee ballots.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to send H 125 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Mitchell will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 126: Rep. Mitchell and Phil McGrane, Secretary of State, presented H 126, legislation clarifying and creating uniformity in voter registration requirements. Rep. Mitchell provided examples when there is confusion regarding residency and identification at the polls. This legislation also provides a free identification card because H 126 removes the use of student identification. Phil McGrane stated, currently there are two different standards of photo identification, one to register to vote and one for identification to vote and those differences present problems to poll workers. Mr. McGrane remarked the free identification component is very important to this legislation.

Sam Sandmire, testified **in opposition** to **H 126**, stating volunteers would need to verify residency and this legislation will make their duties extremely difficult.

Chairman Crane (13) put the committee at ease at 8:56 A.M.

Chairman Crane (13) reconvened the meeting at 9:09 A.M.

MOTION: Rep. Young made a motion to send H 126 to General Orders. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Mitchell will sponsor the bill on the floor.

UNANIMOUS Chairman Crane (13) made an unanimous consent request to adjust the agenda by moving H 137 on the agenda. There being no objection, the request was granted. REQUEST:

H 137: Rep. Alfieri presented **H 137**, legislation removing the ability to complete an affidavit in lieu of showing personal identification at the polls.

David Dalby testified **in support** of **H 137**, stating he has worked as a poll worker and became aware of loop holes in the voter identification laws.

Sam Sandmire testified **in opposition** of **H 137**, stating citizens forget their identification and the ability to complete an affidavit makes it possible for them to vote. The penalties for completing an affidavit are severe enough to prevent fraud.

Rep. Alfieri presented closing testimony, stating the Secretary of State is fully supporting this legislation.

MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send **H 137** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

In opposition of the motion, **Rep. Gannon** reviewed the penalties of falsely signing an affidavit and stated those penalties and the current processes are working well.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Young** stated the free identification card was not available when the affidavit process was initiated.

- VOTE ON Chairman Crane (13) called for a vote on the motion to send H 137 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Alfieri will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 294: Rep. Hill presented H 294, legislation preventing an Idaho public entity from entering into certain contracts with companies owned or operated by the People's Republic of China. Rep. Hill stated the Chinese government is a threat to our nation's security and they are placing surveillance technology in their products. Rep. Hill remarked there is not a penalty clause in H 294.
- MOTION: Rep. Holtzclaw made a motion to send H 294 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Hill will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **H 295: Rep. Hill** presented **H 295**, legislation prohibiting credit card companies from assigning a unique credit card code to firearm and ammunition sales in Idaho. Rep. Hill stated companies are tracking firearm sales and it is a Second Amendment violation.
- **MOTION: Rep. Young** made a motion to send **H 295** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

Aoibheann Cline, testified **in support** of **H 295**, stating the anti-gun groups are loudly pushing on the private sector to track the sales of guns, in the hope of preventing mass shootings and this legislation supports our Second Amendment right.

Nathan Guy, testified **in support** of **H 295**, stating he is an owner of a gun store and his transaction rates are higher than other retailers using credit card purchases. Mr. Guy remarked his customers are expressing their concerns regarding using brick and mortar stores to purchase firearms because of the tracking of their purchases.

Hal Scoggins, GoWest Credit Union Association, testified **in opposition** of **H 295**, stating his association is supportive of Second Amendment rights, however, this legislation would create difficulties for Credit Unions to maintain that data and encourages amendments on the bill to remove penalties for doing what they are required to do by federal regulations.

Trent Wright, Idaho Bankers Association, testified **in opposition** of **H 295**, stating his association would support a recommendation to send **H 295** to General Orders. Mr. Wright remarked his association supports the Second Amendment and doesn't like codes directed at gun owners and sales.

Rep. Hill presented closing testimony, stating he is not concerned about the banks and will side with the National Rifle Association. Rep. Hill remarked he is not interested in sending this legislation to General Orders.

Responding to committee questions, **Ms. Cline** reviewed the tiered penalties contained in **H 295** and explained why they are necessary.

VOTE ON Chairman Crane (13) called for a vote on the motion to send H 295 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Hill will sponsor the bill on the floor.

ADJOURN: There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 10:06 A.M.

- **RS 30721: Rep. Mitchell** presented **RS 30721**, proposed legislation clarifying and creating uniformity in voter registration requirements. Rep. Mitchell stated out of state identifications have been removed as acceptable identification documents.
- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to introduce RS 30721 and have it sent directly to the Second Reading Calendar. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Mitchell will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **RS 30724: Rep. Crane (12)** presented **RS 30724**, proposed legislation closing a legal gap to give law enforcement and prosecutors the necessary changes to existing Idaho Code in order to prosecute human sex trafficking in Idaho.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to introduce RS 30724 and have it sent directly to the Second Reading Calendar. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Crane (12) will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **RS 30723: Rep. Blanksma** presented **RS 30723**, proposed legislation to refine the Trigger Law and change the affirmative defense structure of the law into an objective standard. Rep. Blanksma remarked there is an update to the definitions and title and there is an exception provided to treat a physical condition of a woman, which if left untreated would be life-threatening.
- MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to introduce RS 30723. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **H 174: Rep. Boyle** presented **H 174**, legislation clarifying agency policies and guidance shall not have the force and effect of law.

David Lehman, Agriculture Aviation Association, testified **in support** of **H 174**, stating this legislation forces an action to remove penalties currently serving as guidance in policy and places them in rules.

MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send H 174 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Boyle will sponsor the bill on the floor.

Chairman Crane (13) put the committee at ease at 8:12 A.M.

Chairman Crane (13) reconvened the meeting at 8:25 A.M.

H 338: Rep. Boyle presented **H 338**, legislation prohibiting local governments from enacting any ordinance or policy limiting or prohibiting law enforcement from complying with federal immigration law.

- MOTION: Rep. Crane (12) made a motion to send H 338 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Boyle will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- H 279: Rep. Sauter presented H 279, legislation eliminating electioneering messages within 40 feet from property lines and ensuring voters may enter polling places without encumbrance and from being approached by individuals with electioneering messages.

Chris Troupis, testified **in opposition** of **H 279**, stating he believes this legislation violates the First, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments of the US Constitution, and therefore, may cost the state legal expenses. Mr. Troupis remarked some reasonable time, manner and place restrictions may be put in place, however, restrictions can not be imposed regarding signs on private property.

Dorothy Moon, testified **in opposition**, of **H 279**, stating several examples of a polling place in Custer County which would pose problems if this legislation is passed. Ms. Moon remarked no one is aware of where the boundary lines are and may need to hire a company to mark them.

Phil McGrane, Secretary of State of Idaho, testified **in support** of **H 279**, stating every election his office receives complaints regarding electioneering messages, exit polling, and petition signature gathering at polling places. Mr. McGrane remarked there is existing code, however, it needs clarifying.

Rep. Sauter presented closing testimony, stating signs on private property are allowed in this legislation and the Legislature has a duty to provide citizens safe passage to and from the polling place.

MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to send **H 279** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

In opposition to the motion, **Rep. Young** stated there is a problem with the definition of electioneering in this legislation. **Rep. Alfieri** stated enforcement is difficult and this legislation complicates enforcement by requiring the County Clerk to know where the property lines are. **Rep. Scott** remarked the polling place is sacred but there is confusion in this bill and it is not ready.

- ROLL CALLRoll call vote was requested. Motion failed by a tie vote of 6 AYE and 6 NAY andVOTE ON1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Crane (13), Palmer,MOTION:Holtzclaw, Allgood, Crane (12), and Green. Voting in opposition to the motion:

S 1127: Sen. Cook presented **S 1127**, legislation designating the Oryctodromeus (Ory) as the State Dinosaur of Idaho. Sen. Cook remarked this dinosaur has only been found in Idaho and was discovered in Bonneville County. Sen. Cook stated this legislation was brought to him by Fourth Graders in Eastern Idaho and these students have used their handwriting skills and knowledge in English and Science to prepare this legislation. This legislation is important to Fourth Graders and they are important to our future.

Jedidiah Wheeler, Harper Lehman, Elliot Bybee, Ephraim Mund, Sophie Tobera and Levi Herway, testified in support of S 1127, all Fourth Grade students focusing on Idaho History this year. These students did a wonderful job educating the committee on the Oryctodromeus Dinosaur. They shared it is unlike any other dinosaur because it was a great mother who worked hard to keep her family safe by burrowing holes to hide in. The dinosaur was the size of a Golden Retriever and was fast running.

Dr. L.J. Krumenacker, Palentologist and Teacher, testified **in support** of **S 1127**, stating it has been his experience most individuals' first love in science began with an interest in dinosaurs which eventually led them to other careers.

- MOTION: Rep. Gannon made a motion to send S 1127 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Horman will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **SJR 101aa:** Kolby Reddish, Legislative Staff Offices Legal Counsel, stood to respond to committee questions and gave a history regarding constitutional amendments and when they may be required.

- **S 1194: Sen. Anthon** presented **S 1194**, legislation allowing cities three years from the time they acquire a liquor license to the time they are required to use it. Sen. Anthon stated **S 1194** also allows historic theatres to be compliant with liquor license requirements if the theatre sells alcohol at least twice a year.
- MOTION: Rep. Skaug made a motion to send S 1194 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Reps. Scott and Alfieri requested to be recorded as voting NAY. Rep. Handy will sponsor the bill on the floor.
- **S 1173aa: Rep. Boyle** presented **S 1173aa**, legislation protecting the right of a person to declare or show that they possess a firearm to reasonably defend and protect themselves.

Dianna David, Lynne Schneider, Marsha Bravo, Tara Adams, Nicole Brown and Alice Arambarri, testified **in opposition** of **S 1173aa**, stating current law is sufficient and this legislation adds confusion to the current law. They remarked communication should be used more as a de-escalation tool instead of firearms.

David Taylor, Idaho State Rifle and Pistol Association, testified **in support** of **S 1173aa**, stating the appearance of a firearm may be used to de-escalate situations and this legislation also protects an individual's Second Amendment rights.

Christy Zito, Second Amendment Alliance, testified **in opposition** of **S 1173aa**, stating her organization is in full support of the intent of this legislation, however, they believe more research needs to be done for clarification purposes.

Aoibheann Cline, National Rifle Association, testified **in support** of **S 1173aa**, stating this legislation provides needed clarification and is a de-escalation tool. Responding to committee questions, Ms. Cline stated she has not been contacted by other interested organizations to make any amendments and much research has gone into **S 1173aa**.

Rep. Boyle presented closing testimony on **S 1173aa**, stating **Sen. Lakey** is very knowledgeable on this topic and has been very involved in this legislation. Responding to committee questions, Rep. Boyle stated law enforcement agencies and prosecutors are neutral on this legislation.

MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send **S 1173aa** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

- ROLL CALL VOTE: Roll call vote was requested. Motion carried by a vote of 10 AYE, 2 NAY and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. In opposition to the motion, **Rep. Gannon** stated this proposed legislation will not fix the serious problems existing among OB-GYN providers in Idaho and will give any doctor serious concerns when contemplating whether to practice medicine in Idaho. **Rep. Green** expressed her disappointment in this proposed legislation and stated it does nothing to address concerns pertaining to hospitals or the health of the mother.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Young** stated this proposed legislation defines pregnancy and clarifies the court's ruling on the state's current abortion law for the public and doctors. **Rep. Alfieri** stated there is some clarification contained in the proposed legislation and it is worthy of a discussion.

Chairman Crane (13) called the meeting to order at 1:00 P.M.

- MOTION: Rep. Allgood made a motion to approve the minutes from March 21, 2023, March 22, 2023 and March 27, 2023. Motion carried by voice vote.
- **H 374: Rep. Blanksma** presented **H 374**, legislation clarifying Idaho's abortion law by including the definition of an abortion, removing the affirmative defense language and adds language regarding the reporting standard on rape and incest.

Dr. John Werdel, Medical Director, St. Luke's Women's Health Care Services, testified **in support** of **H 374** stating, he can only express lukewarm support of **H 374** and it provides a small step forward to providing safe care for citizens. Dr. Werdel remarked there are many medical professionals impacted by the current abortion law and they are frightened at the prospect of providing care to pregnant patients. Dr. Werdel commented further by adding, that while this legislation is a step to improving the law, it does not go far enough to reassure physicians and stabilize the workforce.

Kenneth McClure, Idaho Medical Association, testified **in support** of **H 374**, however, his association is supporting this legislation reluctantly because they believe there is more good that can be done. Mr. McClure remarked their view is to examine the health and life of the mother versus the health and life of the fetus and the unfortunate fact is sometimes a choice must be made between the two. Mr. McClure stated the removal of the affirmative defense puts doctors in a much better position and they will continue to participate in conversations to improve this legislation. Responding to committee questions, Mr. McClure stated his organization was not at the table to negotiate the language in **H 374**.

Dr. Megan Kasper testified **in support** of **H 374**, stating this legislation is a step in the right direction to provide health care providers more clarity.

Kayla Dodson, testified **in opposition** of **H 374**, stating this legislation is confusing and may have dangerous consequences for patients. Ms. Dodson remarked criminal consequences should be removed and exceptions for women's health and incest and rape conditions should be included.

Cindy Thorngren, Southwest Idaho National Organization For Women, testified **in opposition**, of **H 374**, stating legislation is needed to allow a woman an abortion to save her life and protect her ability to have additional children.

Jennifer Beazer testified **in opposition** of **H 374**, stating she works in rare diseases and is a member of a genetics team examining genetic conditions affecting pregnancy outcomes and those genetic compositions are endless. Ms. Beazer remarked a patient should decide if it is healthy for them to carry a non-viable pregnancy and the life of the mother and baby should be valued equally.

Dr. Emily Corrigan, OB-GYN, testified **in support** of **H 374**, stating she has seen multiple patients who have been searching for doctors to treat them because many doctors are fearful of and confused by the current law. Dr. Corrigan remarked multiple doctors are leaving the state because of the current abortion law and doctors are trained to determine what the best options are for their patients. Dr. Corrigan agreed there is still work to be done regarding Idaho's abortion laws.

David Ripley, Idaho Chooses Life, testified **in support**, of **H 374**, stating this legislation is a pro-life bill, it clarifies the initial intent of the legislature and is an improvement to the current law. Mr. Ripley remarked it was always the intent that life-threatening conditions be included in current law and this legislation provides that clarification. Mr. Ripley affirmed the value of the pre-born child is not meant to demean the value of the mother's life. If possible, Mr. Ripley would clarify that language at a future date.

MOTION: Rep. Palmer made a motion to send **H 374** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

In support of the motion, **Rep. Palmer** stated if other items need to be added, that's another bill for another day but testimonies have been heard in support of the legislation before them today.

Ken McClure clarified he was kept informed of this legislation but was not included to every negotiation. Mr. McClure stated he was able to give input during the drafting process.

Rep. Blanksma presented closing testimony of **H 374**, stating the language included in this legislation is a cumulation of topics everyone involved in the drafting of **H 374** could agree on.

SUBSTITUTE Rep. Gannon made a substitute motion to send **H 374** to General Orders.

MOTION:

In support of the substitute motion, **Rep. Gannon** stated after hearing the testimonies, it is apparent there are several items that could be added to this legislation and he would like to see some of the language of **H 342** added to **H 374**. **Rep. Green** stated this legislation needs to protect a mother's future health and fertility and these decisions should only be between the patient and their doctor.

In opposition to the substitute motion, **Rep. Crane (12)** thanked everyone for their work on this legislation and he will be supporting the original motion. **Rep. Young** stated the individuals who worked on this legislation wanted the life of the mother and the life of the baby protected and attempted to create language to provide guidelines to make those difficult decisions but more work needs to be done. **Chairman Crane (13)** stated this is not the bill he wanted and it has been easy to say someone is pro-life but now the work begins. Chairman Crane (13) remarked a "post-Roe" decision is a much different discussion and this legislation is a first step in the right direction.

Chairman Crane (13) called the meeting to order at 9:30 A.M.

S 1186: Rep. Manwaring presented **S 1186**, legislation consolidating the March Presidential Primary with the May Primary Election date and clarifying the purpose of a Primary Election. Rep. Manwaring stated this legislation is a trailer bill to **H 138**, which has passed both bodies. Rep. Manwaring remarked this legislation provides the filing requirements and certification process from the Secretary of State to the state chair of each political party. In response to committee questions, Rep. Manwaring stated he has not consulted with the Central Committees regarding this change to the election date.

Dorothy Moon, Chairman, Idaho Republican Party, testified **in opposition** of **S 1186**, stating the primary stakeholder, the Idaho Republican Party, was not consulted regarding this legislation. Ms. Moon remarked they would like to move the Presidential Primary to February to draw more attention to Idaho.

Maria Nate, Idaho Republican Committee Secretary, testified **in opposition** of **S 1186**, stating the Idaho Republican Party did not receive an opportunity to provide input on this legislation.

Ron Nate and **Rod Beck**, testified **in opposition** of **S 1186** and provided a brief history of the caucus and primary systems in Idaho and stated this is a party decision.

Phil McGrane, Idaho Secretary of State, testified in support of S 1186 and reminded the committee S 1186 is simply a trailer bill to H 138 which has passed both legislative bodies by a large margin and uses language currently in statute to clarify the entire process. Responding to committee questions, Mr. McGrane stated he and Chairman Moon discussed H 138 and Chairman Moon expressed her desire to move the Republican Presidential Primary to February, however, funding was not appropriated for the Presidential Primary election.

Rep. Manwaring, presented closing testimony and reiterated what **S 1186** does and reminded the committee the political parties will be opted out unless they inform the Secretary of State that they would like to participate in the May Primary. Rep. Manwaring stated the Legislature has done a lot of work this session consolidating elections by removing the option of a March election date and this legislation continues the consolidation work.

Chairman Crane (13) stated S 1186 died for lack of a motion.

ADJOURN: There being no further business before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 10:00 A.M.
