On page 1 of the printed bill, in line 20, delete "its agent" and insert: "third-party service. "A third-party service" means a

and insert: "third-party service. "A third-party service" means a service that has entered into a contract with a health care provider to provide patient records on behalf of a health care provider"; delete lines 21 through 24, and insert:

"(2) Upon the request of a patient, patient's attorney, legal representative, or third-party service authorized to receive records, a health care provider, health care facility, or third-party service shall provide medical records and may charge reasonable fees pursuant to this section or other applicable law, whichever is less. Such reasonable fees shall not exceed those provided in this subsection.";

in line 27, delete "flat" and insert: "search"; in line 28, delete "Fifty-three cents (53)" and insert: "Sixty cents (60)"; in line 29, delete "thirty-two cents (32)" and insert: "thirty-six cents (36)"; in line 32, delete "; or" and insert: "; and"; in line 33, delete "sending" and insert: "postage to mail"; in line 37, delete "flat" and insert: "search"; in line 38, delete "Twenty-seven cents (27)" and insert: "Thirty cents (30)"; and in line 39, delete "sixteen cents (16)" and insert: "eighteen cents (18)".

On page 2, in line 1, delete "sending" and insert: "postage to mail"; in line 2, delete "or" and insert: "and"; in line 7, delete "one hundred fifty dollars (\$150)" and insert: "one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175)"; in line 10, following "provider" insert: ", health care facility, or third-party service"; delete lines 12 and 13, and insert: "by a patient, former patient, patient's attorney, legal representative, or third-party service authorized to receive records, for a qualified claim or appeal for"; in line 23, delete "and"; following line 23, insert:

"(b) Be delivered in the electronic medium customarily used by the health care provider, the health care facility, or the health care provider's third-party service or in a universally readable image, such as portable document format, if the patient or the patient's attorney, legal representative, or a third-party service authorized to receive the records requests the record be delivered in an electronic medium; and";

in line 24, delete "(b)" and insert: "(c)"; and following line 24, insert:

"(5) A health care provider shall be exempt from the provisions of this section as long as the health care provider has less than fifty (50) employees, is independently owned, is not associated with a hospital system or health care system, and does not contract with a third-party service to provide medical records.

(6) When a health care provider is governed by the standards for privacy of individually identifiable health information, the fees allowed shall be the lesser of those allowed pursuant to 45 CFR 164.524(c)(4) or the provisions of this section.".

On page 1, delete lines 5 and 6, and insert: "A TERM, TO PROVIDE EXCEPTIONS, AND TO PROVIDE REQUIREMENTS FOR FULFILLMENT; AND DECLARING AN".

## SENATE AMENDMENT TO H 398 AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, in line 14, following "act" insert: "that would expand coverage to any additional individuals or class of individuals or would increase any cost to the state".

## SENATE AMENDMENT TO H 708

AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 20 through 25, and insert:

"(2) Except as expressly authorized by the legislature through the enactment of general laws or pursuant to subsection (4) of this section, the state shall not file or cause to be filed on its behalf articles of incorporation for any corporation that is provided for in subsection (1) of this section. If any articles of incorporation are filed by the state or on its behalf without the authorization of the legislature as required pursuant to this subsection, the secretary of state shall not accept such articles of incorporation. In no instance shall the state constitute the voting majority of the board of directors or members of a corporation or its subsidiary. For purposes of"; and delete line 30, and insert:

"(3) The state shall not file or cause to be filed on its behalf articles of incorporation for a corporation to carry out a".

On page 1, delete line 3, and insert: "VIDE CERTAIN PROHIBITIONS ON THE FILING OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION BY THE".

## SENATE AMENDMENT TO H 586 AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 12 through 14, and insert: "possessing, or transporting antlers or horns shed from deer, elk, moose, or pronghorn in this state shall be required to first procure a license entitling the nonresident to hunt big game as provided in chapter 4, title 36, Idaho Code. No license shall be required for a nonresident under twelve (12) years of age who is accompanied by a nonresident who is licensed in compliance with the provisions of this section or by a resident.".

I have the honor to advise you that I have signed on March 21, 2024 and am transmitting to the Secretary of State the following Senate Bill, to wit:

## **SENATE BILL 1329**

within the time prescribed by the law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 8:04 a.m. on March 15, 2024.

The mental health of Idaho's adolescents is of utmost importance to me. I urge all stakeholders to closely monitor any negative consequences this legislation has on our youth accessing the behavioral health supports they need. In the event this bill creates any unintended barriers for adolescent behavioral health care, I expect amendments will be made to address the issue accordingly.

Additionally, I am concerned the passage of this legislation without the express repeal of potentially conflicting sections of code will create confusion for medical professionals and complicate their ability to deliver necessary care to all Idahoans and protect patients' confidential information. I urge my colleagues in the Legislature to communicate with the health providers and endeavor to provide necessary clarity during the next legislative session as to the full scope of the policy and law in this bill.
