Roll call showed all members present.

Prayer was offered by Chaplain Doug Armstrong.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, the Sergeant-at-Arms, Sarah Jane McDonald, escorted the Idaho State Police Honor Guard into the Senate Chambers to present and post the colors for the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Sergeant-at-Arms, Sarah Jane McDonald.

President Pro Tempore Winder provided a brief history of the Idaho State flag flown over the domes of the House and Senate Chambers during each session of the Legislature. He explained that the flags represent the spirit of our citizens and serve as a symbol of Idaho's sovereignty. They further serve notice to the State that the Legislature, the elected representatives of all the citizens of Idaho, is in session. The flags are raised when the Legislature convenes and will be retired when the Legislature adjourns *sine die*.

President Bedke presented the Idaho State flag to the Idaho State Police Honor Guard to be raised above the Senate Chamber to fly during the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature and the Idaho State Police Honor Guard exited the Chamber.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, the Senate Sergeant-at-Arms, Sarah Jane McDonald, escorted the Trail Wind Elementary School Honor Choir into the Senate Chambers for the purpose of singing "America the Beautiful" and "One Nation", directed by Mrs. Finch.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, the Senate advanced to the Tenth Order of Business.

Motions and Resolutions

On motion by Senator Anthon, seconded by Senator Wintrow, by voice vote the Rules of the Senate and Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives, as adopted by the First Regular Session of the Idaho Legislature, were adopted as the Rules of the Senate and Joint Rules of the

Senate and House of Representatives by the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Legislature of the State of Idaho.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, President Bedke appointed a committee consisting of Senator Ricks, Chairman, and Senator Rabe to escort the committee from the House of Representatives into the Senate Chamber. Representatives Yamamoto, Weber, and Mathias informed the Senate that the House is now organized and ready to conduct business.

The Senate committee was discharged.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, President Bedke appointed a committee consisting of Senator Harris, Chairman, and Senators Lent and Semmelroth to notify the Governor that the Senate is now organized and ready to conduct business.

The committee was excused.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, President Bedke appointed a committee consisting of Senator Burtenshaw, Chairman, and Senators Okuniewicz and Ruchti to notify the House of Representatives that the Senate is now organized and ready to conduct business.

The committee was excused.

The committee appointed to wait upon the Governor returned and reported that the Governor sent his best wishes to the Senate members.

The committee was discharged.

The committee appointed to wait upon the House of Representatives returned and reported that they had conveyed the message to the House and the House expressed their best wishes for a productive session.

The committee was discharged.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, the Senate returned to the Ninth Order of Business.

HCR 19 was filed for first reading.

On request by Senator Anthon, granted by unanimous consent, the Senate advanced to the Eleventh Order of Business.

Introduction, First Reading, and Reference of Bills, House Petitions, Resolutions, and Memorials

HCR 19, by Blanksma and Rubel, was introduced and read at length.

Moved by Senator Anthon, seconded by Senator Wintrow, that all rules of the Senate interfering with the immediate consideration of <u>HCR 19</u> be suspended. The question being, "Shall the rules be suspended?"

Roll call resulted as follows:

The Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance was offered by House Chaplain Tom Dougherty.

On request by Representative Blanksma, granted by unanimous consent, the Speaker appointed three committees to wait upon the Supreme Court Justices and Appellate Court Judges, the elected officials, and the Governor and escort them to the House Chamber.

The Speaker appointed Senators Lakey and Ward-Engleking, and Representatives Skaug and Gannon as the committee to wait upon and escort the Supreme Court Justices and Appellate Court Judges to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The Speaker appointed Senators Lee and Ruchti, and Representatives Manwaring and Necochea as the committee to wait upon and escort the elected officials to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The Speaker appointed Senators Anthon and Wintrow, and Representatives Blanksma and Rubel as the committee to wait upon and escort the Governor to the House Chamber.

The Speaker excused the committee.

The committees appointed by the Speaker returned and escorted the Supreme Court Justices, Appellate Court Judges, the elected officials, and the Governor into the House Chamber where they were presented to the Joint Session by the Speaker.

The Speaker introduced His Excellency, the Governor of the State of Idaho, Brad Little, and the following **State of the State and Budget Address** was delivered by the Governor:

Mr. Speaker, Mr. Pro Tem, Mr. President, honored legislators, my fellow constitutional officers, Mr. Chief Justice and members of the judiciary, my family, friends, and my fellow Idahoans.

The Constitution of the great State of Idaho requires me to report to you, our Legislature, on the condition of our state.

This is my sixth opportunity to address you, and I'm struck by how much has changed in six years. But, for all the change, I can confidently stand before you for the sixth straight year and say - the state of our state is strong, stronger than ever before.

What we're doing is working.

Over the past year, I have traveled 25,000 miles across the State of Idaho, at times with your First Lady, Teresa. Teresa, thank you for your love and support.

One of the best and most important parts of my job is visiting with parents, veterans, seniors, teachers, law enforcement officers, business leaders, faith leaders, farmers, and of course our young people.

Idaho is diverse but one quality about Idaho's people is consistent - they continue to fight to keep our great state a special place for this generation and the next.

That's always been my goal, also - never settle, keep improving.

Even though we're leading the country in so many ways, we can always do better because we want Idaho to be the place where we all can have the opportunity to thrive, where our children and grandchildren choose to stay, and for the ones who have left to choose to return.

The leaders in this room have helped Idaho surge ahead of the competition.

Of note:

We are the least regulated state.

We are one of the safest states in the union.

We rank first for income growth.

We have delivered more tax relief per capita than any other state.

Idaho is one of the most fiscally responsible states, and we're recognized for our ability to withstand any economic downturn.

We're number one for economic momentum.

We're a top ten state for best economy, rivaling Florida and Texas.

In fact, Florida, Texas, and Idaho are the top three best states for small businesses.

And on issues where it's important to take a stand, Idaho has led the charge.

Idaho was the first state to ban critical race theory in our schools. We're taking a stand that we should NOT divide our children.

We introduced a new history curriculum for Idaho schools, one that teaches students to appreciate and respect our country.

And we are a leader in education freedom. Idaho is a top ten state for charter schools, and I'm bringing a bill this session to cut more red tape to support charter schools while providing taxpayers the transparency they deserve. We get more bang for our buck as the number one state for return on investment in education. We offer parents resources to support their children's education outside the classroom. And Idaho came in first for best new open enrollment law because we expanded opportunities for parents to choose the public school that is best for their child regardless of their zip code.

I will continue to support a fair, responsible, transparent, and accountable approach to expanding school choice in Idaho - one that does not draw resources away from our public schools.

We also banned diversity statements in university hiring. Our academic freedom policies protect free speech on campus while barring hateful, dangerous threats against the Jewish people.

And we're pushing back on China. I banned Tik Tok in state government to protect our information from the Chinese government's sinister motives, and Idaho land cannot be sold to foreign governments that want to do us harm.

We successfully ended an illegal encampment on public property, right across the street from the People's House, a scene where drug use, sexual assault, violence, and destruction of property took place. We are showing Left Coast states how to stand up to activists who take advantage of the homeless and vulnerable.

I was also the first Governor to sign a bill defending integrity in women's sports, and we will keep up the fight.

All of these steps have been a collective effort between the executive and legislative branches, and I am proud to be a part of it

Folks, what we are doing in Idaho is WORKING.

You've heard me say it before and I'll say it again and again we are on a tremendous path, a powerful trajectory, and we need to keep it going.

We must continue to lead the nation in fiscal responsibility, tax relief, and strategic investments to keep up with record growth.

Idaho's record population growth and in-migration comes with both opportunities and challenges, and I get why people are flocking here from other places.

In fact, I can think of 3.7 billion reasons why people are coming here.

We are on pace to deliver \$3.7 billion in tax relief, and we're not done yet.

With the surplus eliminator passed last session, our budget this year includes up to \$150 million in new property tax relief, on top of the hundreds of millions in property tax relief we've already deployed to date.

People are coming here because what we are doing is WORKING.

Let me show you some of what we have gotten done together. TOGETHER.

Governor Little narration:

One of the basic roles of government is to ensure a safe, connected system of roads and bridges. The continued prosperity of our businesses, including our farmers, ranchers, and loggers in rural Idaho, depends on their ability to get their products to market.

Unwilling to put the time and safety of Idahoans - and the maintenance of our state's roads and bridges - at the whims of the feds, in Idaho, we have taken control of transportation.

Instead of looking to Washington, D.C., to solve our problems, we are funding known gaps with NO NEW TAXES, and providing long-term funding for long-term needs.

This means we are tackling projects that have been on the wait list for years.

Senate President Pro Tempore Chuck Winder narration:

I'm here to attest to the historic investment the Legislature has provided for our local and state system.

Transportation projects are needs, not merely wants.

Working with Governor Little, ITD, and each of you as members of the Legislature, we have met most of these needs without raising taxes.

Let's continue our good work while protecting our loved ones and helping Idaho's economy to grow.

Idaho is working, together.

Governor Little narration:

Water is the foundation of public health, economic prosperity, outdoor recreation, a strong agricultural sector, and Idahoans' overall quality of life.

Idaho must maintain our water sovereignty and not turn out like other western states in the Colorado River Basin, such as California, where the federal government stepped in to supersede the state's control of its water.

Since I took office, I have recommended and the Legislature has approved more than \$1 billion in additional funding for water-related infrastructure projects.

We've dedicated roughly half of that to improve drinking water and wastewater treatment systems at the local level so Idahoans have safe water to drink and use.

We put the other half of the \$1 billion to modernize water infrastructure statewide - much of which is a century old and in dire need of replacement or repair.

We've made a lot of progress but we still have work to do, and I appreciate all the partners who continually demonstrate that IDAHO, not the feds, can best determine the fate of our water.

There is perhaps no greater responsibility of the State of Idaho than providing a strong system of public schools for Idaho families.

Why?

Because it's one of the duties most plainly written in the Idaho Constitution.

As elected leaders, it is not just our constitutional obligation but our moral obligation as well to prioritize and strengthen public schools.

In 2019, I assembled a task force to provide recommendations on what the State of Idaho can do to better to meet the needs of our public schools.

In just five years, we have delivered.

We increased funding for literacy 500 percent because there is no better investment in a child than establishing early on the fundamentals of reading.

We also provided a record level of flexible funds so local schools can meet local needs.

And we made the teaching profession more competitive by increasing starting teacher pay. We brought Idaho up from the bottom 10 nationally five years ago to now the top 10 for starting teacher pay.

We increased pay for teachers at all levels of experience and boosted health insurance benefits so teachers and staff can keep more of their earnings in their pockets.

As state leaders, we cannot ignore this fact: the people of Idaho strongly support public schools.

We must continue to prioritize and improve public schools not just because the constitution requires it but because the people we serve demand it.

Beyond K through 12 education, we are also taking unprecedented steps to prepare our young people for a lifetime of prosperity.

The State of Idaho has always offered support for the careers that require a four-year university degree, but we've historically fallen short in providing equal support to other skilled workers, jobs like trucking, linemen, firefighters, welders, plumbers, and a host of other professions that make the world go 'round. These are good paying jobs that require specialized training.

Our new LAUNCH grants cover 80 percent of the cost, up to \$8,000, to enroll in an education or training program after high school that aligns with an in-demand career. There are hundreds of career paths to choose from.

We want IDAHO kids to STAY in Idaho and WORK in Idaho.

We don't want our employers to import workers from other places when we can train our own kids right here at home.

LAUNCH has been extremely popular so far, blowing away everyone's expectations. Many of these kids would never have considered going on to a training program after high school.

Let's hear from a few of them.

Eight students on camera sharing how they will use their LAUNCH grant.

Governor Little narration:

I am so darn proud of all these kids for taking the initiative to apply for LAUNCH. It is a real game changer for so many young Idahoans.

So, how is that Idaho is able to provide RECORD tax relief while making so many meaningful investments in our future?

Simple.

It's how we manage our budget.

We often talk about "kitchen table economics."

But what does that mean?

We live within our means, just like any Idaho family must.

We maintain a structurally balanced budget, meaning there aren't costs in our budget that we cannot sustain, and we pass budgets on time, not at the 11th hour like Congress, creating certainty, not instability.

We have ample money in reserves so we can weather any economic uncertainty.

We make investments where they count.

And we give back whatever we can to the taxpayers to keep families and businesses thriving.

It's that easy.

So easy, in fact, that it makes you wonder why Washington, D.C., can't figure it out!

Our hardworking Idaho Congressional Delegation persistently stands up for reining in federal spending and using Idaho as the example for the feds to follow.

U.S. Representative Russ Fulcher narration:

When I came to Washington, I quickly learned that Congress had a bad habit of "legislating by crisis," where critical work gets delayed, leading to 11th hour bills packed with unrelated policies.

It's not the way to do business, and I'll continue to fight to change the practice.

That's just one of many ways that Washington, D.C., needs to be more like Idaho.

Here's another: The United States carries nearly \$34 trillion in debt and has no meaningful monetary reserves.

But thanks to you all, Idaho balances its budget annually, with responsible levels of reserves in the event of an economic downturn.

Unbridled federal spending is crippling American families with high inflation and unsustainable energy prices.

But in Idaho, leaders are looking for and delivering tax relief, while sustainably meeting the needs of a growing state.

For these and other reasons, many of my congressional colleagues envy what I have in Idaho. I

I am so proud to represent this state and appreciate your commonsense approach to budgeting and governance.

Washington, D.C., can learn from what is RIGHT in Idaho. Idaho is winning!

Governor Little narration:

Russ is right. Idaho is setting the example not just for Washington, D.C., but every other state.

And one area where we shine is tax relief.

Idaho is in the top 10 for the lowest taxes in the nation.

We have the third lowest property taxes in the country, and we just deployed another \$300 million in relief to Idaho property owners last year.

No other state in the country has given more tax relief per capita than Idaho.

House Speaker Mike Moyle narration:

The historic tax relief we have championed in each of the past few years is helping thousands of Idaho families and small businesses across our state.

But crushing inflation and skyrocketing interest rates under the Biden administration are holding Idahoans back.

And the Idaho Legislature year after year stepped up to provide meaningful tax relief.

This is not our money. It's yours. And we need to understand that and remember it.

And it's because of this and other reasons such as our historic investments in education and roads, many people continue to move to Idaho to live the kind of lives that they used to be able to live in other parts of the country.

What we are doing in Idaho is working.

And we want your help to keep it that way.

Governor Little narration:

What Idaho is doing IS WORKING, and we're just getting started.

Before we get too far, I would like to congratulate the more than 12,500 students who applied for LAUNCH.

Lt. Governor Scott Bedke and I traveled the state extensively over the past year to visit with many of these students.

The interest in LAUNCH far exceeded everyone's expectations, and we're excited for these young Idahoans.

Looking ahead, we have a plan to keep Idaho strong - it is called IDAHO WORKS.

What we're doing is working and the results speak for themselves, but we must never get complacent.

IDAHO WORKS is all about taking what we know has contributed to our state's tremendous success and not just prioritizing its continuation but ramping up our efforts.

We will work to raise the bar even higher because it's what our citizens expect and it's what they deserve from their elected leaders.

But we must do so responsibly.

We all see the trend - the economy is returning to normal.

Idaho is still seeing revenue growth but at pre-pandemic levels.

That means we can't do it all.

This session should be about priorities.

We must invest in those matters that are most pressing for Idahoans.

And keeping up with the transportation needs of a growing state are among the most pressing for our people.

Other states think their transportation infrastructure has been "solved" by one-time federal funds.

Idahoans know, however, that we must take control of our own transportation needs. We cannot put the federal government in the driver's seat.

And we will not raise taxes or fees to clear out our transportation backlog.

Building off of what we've done in recent years, let's go big!

Our IDAHO WORKS plan proposes another \$50 million ongoing to bond for an additional \$800 million in new transportation infrastructure so we can save Idahoans their precious time on the road.

We'll put the \$800 million toward the highest priority, highest value projects that have been in the queue for way too long.

Our IDAHO WORKS plan also calls for the repair or replacement of the last one-third of dilapidated bridges throughout our state.

Nine hundred bridges in Idaho have been rated poor or predate the moon landing.

We have put \$400 million into this effort in the past few years, and it's time to buckle up and finish the job!

Let's continue to facilitate commerce with added transportation investments, especially in rural Idaho, and remember, this is property tax relief, too.

Let's prioritize the transportation projects that will benefit generations of Idahoans so we can keep Idahoans safe and enjoy more of what we love.

Speaking of infrastructure, we put \$1 billion to improve water quality and quantity in recent years, and our IDAHO WORKS plan also calls for the continued expansion of water infrastructure so we can ensure a stable water supply during both the good water years and the bad ones.

This is especially important now.

We have been blessed with "good" water years of late but we may be headed into prolonged drought again, and prudence dictates we prepare.

We had quite a scare this year when we discovered invasive quagga mussels in the Snake River. Quagga mussels clog pipes that deliver water for drinking, energy, agriculture, and recreation, debilitating our state's economy and costing taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars annually.

The team at the State Department of Agriculture put 15 years of preparation into action and deployed a treatment plan quickly and effectively to protect our water.

Idaho got done in six weeks what took other states six months to get done.

And we must finish the fight.

Our IDAHO WORKS plan continues our state's response to this highly destructive invasive species.

Our plan also further expands access to outdoor recreation because we know Idahoans' quality of life depends greatly on their ability to explore and unwind in our vast open spaces.

We all agree the safety and protection of our children is paramount.

Protecting our youth and communities from harm is all our responsibility, especially when it comes to the scourge of fentanyl.

In the past year, Idaho began a successful public education campaign that reached people in Idaho 60 million times in a few short months.

And now, teens and young adults are more aware of fentanyl. They're more concerned about their peers using it than ever before and, importantly, they are talking about it more with their friends.

As we march on, armed with better information about fentanyl, we've taken many other steps to reduce the supply and distribution of drugs on our streets.

Much of our fentanyl battle grew out of Operation Esto Perpetua, our crime-fighting crew that has helped us stay laser-focused on strategies to combat this deadly drug.

And now, it is time for us to expand its focus.

In the coming weeks, I will issue an executive order to formally establish Operation Esto Perpetua, and I am adding another directive for the group - to assess the threat of human trafficking and our open border.

We will work even harder to address the open border and its impacts because of the failure of the Biden-Harris administration to admit it's even a problem.

Human trafficking is modern day slavery. The cartel and other bad actors are taking advantage of our open border to manipulate and abuse the most vulnerable, including children.

To help curb human trafficking, my IDAHO WORKS plan calls for sending two more teams of Idaho State Police troopers to train and act as a force multiplier at our lawless southern border, as we did with fentanyl twice before.

Only now, the troopers will learn the best tactics to respond to those who smuggle and abuse vulnerable people.

They will come back to Idaho with better knowledge to stop these perpetrators in our state and, as they did before, our troopers will debrief and train their law enforcement colleagues around the state when they return.

Our children need our protection in all aspects of their lives, including their personal lives.

We know young people today face greater levels of distress and isolation than any other generation before them.

To help keep our children well, IDAHO WORKS doubles the funding for school advisors. These are the professionals on the front lines in talking to students about their futures as well as their current personal struggles.

IDAHO WORKS also proposes a new Statewide Student Behavioral Health Initiative for additional suicide prevention.

We know prevention measures work.

Here's an example from juvenile corrections - the progress we've made in standing up youth crisis centers and safe teen assessment centers around the state has contributed to a reassuring trend. Over the last five years, even with a growing population, the number of juveniles in state custody has dropped by half.

This goes to show that when we invest in prevention and intervention efforts to support every kid's success, we improve lives

And there's more we can do to protect our kids online.

The dominance of social media in the past decade is an obvious reason for the decline in youth mental health.

Social media is addicting. It creates a forum for cyberbullying. It replaces quality time with kids' friends and loved ones, and it makes them compare themselves to impossible, artificial standards for looks and lifestyles.

To that end, I am asking my partners in the Legislature to pass meaningful reforms this session - like the legislative bodies in Arkansas, Utah, and other states have done - to better protect our children from the harms of social media.

Of course, one subject has taken up the largest share of our attention - public education.

Together, we've improved teacher take home pay and boosted literacy.

The improvements are making a difference, but we are far from meeting our obligation to "maintain a general, uniform and thorough system of public, free common schools," as required by the Idaho Constitution.

One area in particular needs work - and that's school facilities.

We've all seen the pictures and videos of some Idaho schools that are neglected - crumbling, leaking, falling apart.

In one school I visited, raw sewage is seeping into a space under the cafeteria.

Folks, we can do better.

The can we're kicking is getting heavier and we're running out of road.

Let's make this priority number one.

My IDAHO WORKS plan proposes the largest investment EVER in school facility construction and our maintenance match - \$2 billion.

Not only will we make learning environments more productive for students, but we get a two-fer!

This \$2 billion investment in school facilities is \$2 billion in long term property tax relief.

Let me say that again - let's pass 2 billion in long-term property tax relief!

While other states are digging themselves into record deficits and grabbing another shovel, we can invest \$2 billion to modernize and improve school facilities in every district in every corner of the state while delivering another \$2 billion in property tax relief to Idaho citizens.

But we must do it right.

We must provide for both new facility construction and the maintenance needs for existing facilities.

We should not punish those that have stepped up and invested in their facilities locally nor should we disproportionately reward those communities that have chosen not to upkeep their school buildings. And we can't wait years or decades.

The cost of construction is skyrocketing, and the deferred maintenance backlog grows daily.

Let's also ensure we include ALL public schools - my proposal includes record funding for our charter school facilities, too.

Let's dedicate the \$2 billion in school facilities NOW to modernize school infrastructure and address unmet critical maintenance.

In my speech before you last year, I mentioned that one of my friends told me I used the word "historic" more than any other word to describe what we've accomplished.

It's true.

When we look back at what we've done over the past six years, I can't believe it was ever possible.

We made decisions that positioned our state to propel ahead in our economic performance. We strategically and thoughtfully deployed relief funds and we balanced the needs of our growing state with returning more money back to the people of Idaho than ever before.

And we did it all while passing a balanced budget every year.

As revenue normalizes from pandemic highs, our IDAHO WORKS plan continues fiscal prudence so that we're ready for any economic conditions that come our way.

IDAHO WORKS outlines the most fiscally conservative budget since the Great Recession.

It bolsters rainy-day funds to the max.

It leaves a surplus in both budgeted years for added cushion in case the economy slows.

More importantly, we are proposing to spend LESS this year than last - about 200 million fewer dollars to be exact.

Let me repeat that - my IDAHO WORKS budget proposed spending about \$200 million LESS this year than last year.

And, as I said earlier, we are on track to deliver even MORE property tax relief this year - up to \$150 million this year PLUS the \$2 billion for school facilities over the next decade.

If Idaho can do it, Washington, D.C., SHOULD do it.

To that end, I am signing on as a member of the Governors Debt Council for a Balanced Budget Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

The runaway freight train of federal spending has got to stop.

It's not right.

It's not what the founders envisioned for our great country.

The U.S. Constitution gives the states the power to propose a Balanced Budget Amendment, and in the coming weeks I will announce new steps we'll take to force Congress to live within the people's means.

Folks, what Idaho is doing is WORKING.

There's no need to change course.

But we must raise the bar and never rest on our laurels.

History may not remember all our names and faces but we have an opportunity while we're here to create a lasting legacy of good government.

I'd like to end by quoting one of my good friends and mentors.

Perhaps not known for his patience, he recounted his first week as a legislator in this chamber, in which he reportedly stood and said, "Mr. Speaker, let's get this show on the road."

That, of course, was Governor Phil Batt.

We lost Phil last year.

He was the epitome of a public servant.

His legacy is distinguished by his unrelenting human rights leadership, determined fiscal conservatism, and enduring love of Idaho.

So let me close with an ode to Governor Batt and say emphatically, "Let's get this show on the road."

Let's get to work for the people of Idaho.

Let's focus on the big things.

And let us all aspire to leave a legacy like Governor Batt - a legacy that will outlive us all.

God bless Idaho.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE A STUDY OF THE STATE OF IDAHO'S RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic occurred in Idaho in the years 2020, 2021, and 2022; and

WHEREAS, there have been over 500,000 suspected cases of COVID-19 in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, there have been over 5,000 deaths in Idaho reportedly attributed to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Idaho declared a state of emergency in Idaho in March of 2020; and

WHEREAS, numerous Idaho municipalities canceled scheduled events and restricted public gatherings; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Idaho issued a "stay at home order" for all "nonessential Idahoans"; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Idaho activated the National Guard in response to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Idaho ordered houses of worship to be closed; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's medical facilities reportedly reached record numbers of emergency room visits; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Idaho repeatedly renewed the declared state of emergency in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the mayor of Boise ordered all indoor dining and drinking to stop at all restaurants and bars; and

WHEREAS, Idahoans were arrested and cited in various municipalities around the state for mask mandate and social distancing violations; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho made available and accelerated the distribution of COVID-19 vaccines; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho received billions of federal dollars under the American Rescue Plan Act; and

WHEREAS, some major Idaho health care facilities ordered employees to be vaccinated against COVID-19 under penalty of forced employment termination; and

WHEREAS, all four of Idaho's major state-funded universities ordered students to wear face masks; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho department of health and welfare activated crisis standards of care so as to ration health care resources; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature passed a memorial to the United States Congress expressing disapproval of the proposed vaccine requirements under President Biden's administration; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho continues to encourage citizens to obtain the COVID-19 vaccines; and

WHEREAS, there is a rapidly growing increase in credible clinical and medical research data indicating the COVID-19 vaccines are not efficacious and are potentially dangerous; and

WHEREAS, mounting evidence is rapidly accumulating indicating the COVID-19 virus was not a lethal health threat to over 99% of people; and

WHEREAS, the state and local governments forced many small- and medium-size businesses to close; and

WHEREAS, many Idahoans suffered severe financial losses and business bankruptcies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to investigate the conduct and overall response of the government of the State of Idaho to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-eighth Idaho Legislature on whether the United States Constitution, the Constitution of the State of Idaho, or state statutes were violated or circumvented resulting in the infringement of the constitutional rights of the citizens of Idaho.

Richard Bevan into the Senate Chamber where he delivered the following **State of the Judiciary Address**:

I am honored to stand here before you for a fourth time as Chief Justice. And really, I don't stand here on my own. Also standing here are our 159 trial and appellate judges — including newly appointed Justice Cynthia K.C. Meyer, who I hope you all get a chance to meet. Welcome, Justice Meyer!

I also represent, as the face of the judiciary, our hundreds of court clerks, our various court administrators, law clerks, court reporters, court assistance officers and all the many others who help us to accomplish the important work of Idaho's Judicial Branch of government.

And I stand here on the foundation built by those who came before us — including our recently retired Justice John Stegner. I was honored to work closely with Justice Stegner for his years

on the Supreme Court, and I wish him the best in the next stage of his career.

A couple of months ago I spent an evening in Twin Falls sharing with an audience why I do what I do. These were everyday folks out on a Monday evening on a college campus, eager to learn. This represented the kind of opportunity I always enjoy as a judge — to help people see how Idaho's judges advance our grand civics experiment as part of Idaho's state government.

But there is a gap in the public's understanding, as I suspect you'd tell me of a gap in public understanding of the legislative branch and the executive. People are aware of courts, but they don't necessarily think of what courts mean. And they certainly don't think of what would happen without us.

What is our Judicial Branch? It is fairly simple: Courts provide a fair and peaceful way to resolve disputes, impartially and under an equal rule of law. The law comes from the people in the form of the state and federal constitutions. It comes from those of you in this room, in the form of the laws you write, as well as local ordinances and regulations. Judges apply this wide array of laws to family matters — like adoptions and divorces — to business disputes and property disagreements, to cases for personal injury as well as criminal proceedings. We resolve these cases based on this body of law, together with the facts developed through a trial or discovery process.

That last part is essential to the work we perform. John Adams said that the "very definition of a Republic is 'an Empire of Laws and not of men." Our branch is the embodiment of the American ideal that everyone answers to the law and answers equally. The rule of law is a fundamental cornerstone without which our society would flounder.

There are several ways to describe the rule of law. I have heard it put as the reason we will stop at a red light late in the evening, with no one around. Why do we stop? Because the rule of law is so entrenched in most of us that we don't give it a second thought. The rule of law doesn't mean that the police are in charge; it means that we all answer to the same laws.

The rule of law is visible when we pay our taxes on time or when divorced parents throughout this state shuttle their children across town to fulfill custody arrangements. The people who follow judges' orders in these cases may not agree with them. But they follow those orders anyway because they respect the laws and the courts that enforce them. As Dwight D. Eisenhower said, "[T]he rule of law does more than ensure freedom from high-handed action by rulers. It ensures justice between man and man however humble the one and however powerful the other." Really, the rule of law is the glue that keeps us all functioning as one, that helps us navigate life with our neighbors.

In the Judicial Branch, our patriotic purpose in coming to work each day is to build on the centuries of solid evidence that an independent court system is best equipped to impartially decide questions of law — and then equally apply the law "without sale, denial, delay, or prejudice," to quote Article I, Section 18 of the Idaho Constitution.

We have seen elsewhere in the world what happens if the rule of law is subverted. U.S. Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter once wrote that "[t]here can be no free society without law administered through an independent judiciary. If one man can be allowed to determine for himself what is law, every man can. That means first chaos, then tyranny."

Each year that I come here, it is to partner with you to uphold and sustain this rule of law. Truly, the fates of our public duties are tied together. If the rule of law falters in our courts, it also falters in this statehouse.

But nothing is simple these days, is it? The people whom we serve and the society in which we operate have become more fractured. People have forgotten the nature of the broad social contract that allowed us to form this state, this nation.

The issues that become high-profile wedges in our society have successfully distracted us from the many things we agree on. My hope, then, is to focus today on our joint obligation to maintain our rule of law.

It is an eventful time to work in the judiciary, for many reasons. Just the sheer volume of work can be a challenge to convey.

We've been frank with you in recent years about our case filing trends — both here and nationally, the overall trend is a small decline in civil cases. But we still handle more than 140,000 new court cases a year across one of the most geographically spread-out states in the Union. Those cases are often more complex, and they are drawing more attention — look, for example, at the national followings for some of our recent criminal proceedings.

Even everyday cases require more focus than before. In Idaho, we maintain audio recordings of all court hearings as part of the official court record — the record my colleagues and I rely on when reviewing a case on appeal. That audio is kept in a dedicated system devoted to this purpose. In 2023, that system received nearly 62,000 hours of court audio. That's a nearly 10% increase from the same time period four years before. While Idaho has gained judges in that time, we are also seeing more court filings involving arguments that require more courtroom time to resolve.

Our courts perform this work amid a backdrop of increased agitation toward government institutions. I spoke to you at length last year about the security threats our judges and court staff face. That situation has not improved.

Our courts in 2023 handled 60,000 newly filed criminal cases, 23,000 cases involving family law, 14,000 probate cases, 5,000 juvenile cases, plus those carried over from previous years. Many of these cases resolve quickly with little fanfare. Some become incredibly contentious. Underlying many of these cases are issues of mental health, substance abuse, homelessness, and neglect.

All it takes is one person making a bad choice in one of these situations for the unthinkable to occur. Thank goodness that we are not among states like Maryland or Wisconsin where judges or their family members were murdered in recent years, or Nevada where a judge was violently attacked in the courtroom just this month. But I still fear we are not far from that point.

Even so, we carry on undaunted. Enter one of our courts and you'll find a devoted workforce accomplishing feats I personally find incredible. Our judges must pivot from case to case and issue to issue while remaining fully present in each. Our clerks not only keep the whole system moving, they are our public face, helping users of the court system — and often managing interactions colored by those personal crises I just described.

Supporting these groups behind the scenes is another invaluable team. Here in Boise and across each of our judicial districts, Judicial Branch employees offer technological, financial

and other administrative support to all of our individual courts. Their work isn't always easy to see — but it would be obvious if they were missing. I am endlessly grateful for their own contributions to maintaining our rule of law.

By Constitution and statute, counties shoulder much of the burden of maintaining local courts. This constitutional partnership — done for budget savings in 1889 — is somewhat unique among courts nationwide. We take it seriously.

For example, we have relaunched a committee to provide elected clerks with more of a voice on court technology. As we work to better secure our digital systems, we are shaping our approach around the counties, acknowledging their unique processes and needs.

The bulk of our state-employed IT support is centralized in Boise while the counties themselves make their own arrangements for local IT. The counties' needs go beyond just the court system, of course. But starting in the last fiscal year, with your help, we placed an additional court-focused field technician in each judicial district to deploy new technology, solve technical issues and train both county and state employees who provide work for the courts. Feedback to this program across the board has been encouragingly positive and we are working to expand it — it's hard for a single tech to be both in Benewah and Boundary counties at the same time.

We also now offer a jury management system for counties. Again, managing jurors — summoning them, screening them, providing the information necessary for their work — largely happens at the county level. But through offering this state-funded system, we can provide jurors in any county that signs up with flexible, easy-to-use tools and timely information as they fulfill their own obligation to the rule of law: jury service.

We partner in other contexts — for example, to provide state agencies and even this Legislature with data needed to perform other work. Some of that data can be sensitive. Child protection cases, mental commitments, and even people's personal financial records require protection. Recently, we've worked to improve our data comprehension, both expanding the types and functionality of our reports and, in situations where law requires sensitive data be provided to an outside partner, creating a more secure way to deliver that data.

Our statewide IT team supports not only court operations, but also court users. That number encompasses about 2,900 people, including law enforcement and Idaho Department of Correction employees, who use our system daily to access court records they are entitled to as part of their jobs. Another example: our team helped the Nampa Police Department as that department migrated to using the statewide electronic ticketing system for electronic citations. Examples such as these show the courts' willingness to partner with others across government for public service. We look forward to continuing these partnerships in 2024.

As you've heard in previous years, so much of the fundamental work of the courts now involves computerized records and digital tools — and Idahoans expect that. In the same way that computers allow anyone to watch the full proceedings of this Legislature, both the public and our many court partners expect and rely on the conveniences of our modern times.

Videoconferencing in the courts has been invaluable in terms of the public's access to justice and our ability to quickly coordinate court proceedings and court management across this state. Court hearings of public interest may be livestreamed, allowing anyone to observe them. Administrative meetings

held over Zoom encourage statewide participation from court stakeholders. This improves the range of voices who are able to participate in determining how we operate while minimizing travel and related costs.

Electronic filing and digital court recordings create efficiencies for both our courts and those who use them. Right now, we are developing a new court records portal — offering access to public court documents right from your computer at home — without the need for a physical trip to a courthouse. This will increase transparency into the workings of our courts for the people of Idaho.

This brings me to my next topic — the sustainability of our systems.

Judicial Branch technology, including many of the employees who help maintain it, has primarily been supported through the Court Technology Fund. Established by this Legislature, that fund gets its revenue through legislatively established fees imposed in both criminal and civil court cases.

I understand the logic of such a self-funding approach, but in practice this model falls short. Court fine and fee receipts for the fund declined an average of 2.1% per year in the past five years. Meanwhile, overall technology costs rose an average of 7% each year — a cumulative 35%. This ongoing disparity in funding makes our current system unsustainable.

The courts have been thrifty stewards of this resource, leveraging fund reserves to support ongoing operations and deferring expenditures over the past several years. As you'll read in the annual report we provided you, we are below the national average in our spending per user on technology.

But as I explained last year, we have had to make tradeoffs. Last month we passed down to civil court filers a \$5 fee on electronic filing required by our software vendor. We hope that the benefits of having digital court documents sent to you and of filing from the comfort of one's home or office — without the need to run between county courthouses — balances the financial demand of the fee.

In speaking to you about these issues before, I have shared our efforts to build a sustainable future for our modern courts. As I promised last year, after extensive work with an independent consultant who evaluated our systems and staffing, I am pleased to present our solution based on their recommendation.

These steps are twofold. First, technology has substantially changed since we first implemented digital court records, giving us more options to host and secure our systems. The Judicial Branch has begun work to establish a statewide court computer network and to transition most services to a cloud-based network structure rather than traditional, local information hosting.

This move will alter both our costs and staffing needs throughout the state. And so, the second step will be a request to you to close the gap between our current technology funding and what the courts need for long-term success. I ask that you please give this funding your full support — it will make the difference in what services we can keep available to your constituents.

For these systems are not nice bonuses. They're not bells and whistles. They are what technologically running a third branch of government requires — and what the public expects from a modern court system.

This funding includes recognizing the burgeoning demands of cybersecurity — and what a time we live in for that. In just

the month of December, our systems blocked 209,000 attacks on our court websites and 57,000 critical and high-security threats to our network firewalls. They also turned aside 124,000 copies of spam emails and messages with malicious intent.

These figures are not unusual. They are the status quo. They are evidence of coordinated efforts calculated to disrupt American governments. In the Judicial Branch, we stay vigilant to prevent their success. But vigilance and protecting the people's records is not an inexpensive endeavor.

We come to you this year also hoping to renew the conversation about fair compensation for our judges. This is not just a conversation about pay, it's about retention and recruitment.

I just passed my 20th year as a judge. I'm among a handful of our active judges who have served that long or longer. But our average judge has been on the bench for much less time — roughly 7 ½ years — and our experienced judges are increasingly choosing alternate employment or retirement over staying in the judiciary.

A former magistrate judge gave a news interview last month about her departure from the bench that I feel is particularly illuminating. Judge Michelle Mallard gave exemplary service to the state of Idaho for 12 years.

Her comments in the interview reflect concerns we also hear from attorneys. For an experienced attorney in their prime, service as a judge comes with a significant financial sacrifice by way of a pay cut. And judges are never off the clock. A judge must limit friendships, and the job includes a growing amount of harassment and threats directed not just at the judge, but at her family and children.

Former Judge Mallard said her husband would sleep with a gun by their bed following certain cases. No one should have to do this as a result of public service. And it's not an environment conducive to recruiting the best and the brightest to serve as judges.

These concerns reflect even more notably on our district judges, where we especially see recruitment challenges. District judges handle felony criminal cases and high-value civil cases. In 2022, we averaged just five applicants for each of our district court openings, a number I previously described to you as "inadequate" and one which is almost a 50% decrease from just seven years ago.

Last year, that average dropped below five — and for openings in our First and Sixth Judicial Districts, only three attorneys applied, the minimum number the Idaho Judicial Council is now required to provide the Governor for his selection. Once again, with no disrespect to those who applied, this trend is heading in an alarming direction.

Idahoans deserve judges who are at the prime of their careers and at the top of their game. But we don't get there by making judicial service painful and undercompensated. At the very least, let's pay our judges a fairer wage, something that reflects the market value of their education and expertise.

For a full branch of government — one of only three branches — our full budget proposal still only touches a little more than 1% of the general fund. Thank you for giving it your consideration.

By necessity I must focus my remarks on the challenges before us. But make no mistake, Idaho has a strong and accomplished judiciary. Our work with treatment courts, restoring people to being productive members of society, continues to set national standards. This is deeply meaningful work for our branch. 2,800 people participated in Idaho treatment court programs in fiscal year 2023. Twenty-one drug-free babies were born to the participants — as a father and grandfather, that is a number that makes me proud.

The Judicial Branch worked this past year to improve our approach to domestic violence courts, which connect victims with advocacy and other services while holding offenders accountable. We maintained a focus on mediation — resolving custody disputes, producing criminal plea deals, and making more courtroom time for the truly intractable disputes that require a judge's in-court focus and management.

In November, courts across our state celebrated the many foster child adoptions that take place year-round in our courtrooms. Adoption hearings are among the most personally meaningful events our judges participate in. These are yet another reminder of the many ways our courts touch people's lives.

And again, in each of these situations we are, piece by piece, keeping the rule of law present in Idahoans' lives.

So, it is with a sense of optimism that I leave you today. Each year during these remarks, I have shared my strong belief that working together, our branches can truly improve life for the people of this state. The power to keep Idaho exceptional lies with us — the people our voters have entrusted with our most sacred government systems.

This is a unique state, a state I was born and raised in, a state where I have raised my five children, and a state where I have been proud to serve as a judge for two decades. I am proud of and respect all who labor in Idaho's judiciary. I thank you for working with us to keep it that way.

The President thanked Chief Justice Bevan for his remarks and Senator Lakey, Chairman, and Senators Toews, and Wintrow escorted Chief Justice Bevan from the Chamber, and the Committee was discharged.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the combined revenues of the largest sectors of the state's livestock industry exceeds 6.4 billion dollars, with an even larger overall economic impact throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, many of the supporting sectors and other crop commodities that are produced in the state go to serve the needs of the state's livestock industry; and WHEREAS, the need and availability of animal care professionals and veterinarian services remain a top concern for the animal agricultural industry in the state; and

WHEREAS, the lack of available livestock veterinary services in the state's most rural areas is also of significant concern; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho does not have a veterinarian school; and

WHEREAS, the state of Idaho already has an operating agreement with Washington State University to allow Idaho students to participate in its veterinary training program; and

WHEREAS, the state of Utah will soon open its new veterinary medicine school at Utah State University to start training students; and

WHEREAS, the University of Idaho, College of Agriculture and Life Sciences held a workgroup made up of industry representatives, university professionals, and state leaders to research the needs of the livestock industry in the state and the opportunities that the state might pursue to help address the needs for trained veterinarians in the state; and

WHEREAS, the possibility of pursuing an interstate veterinary training program with the state of Utah was one of the items identified by the workgroup as a possible consideration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we authorize the State Board of Education to investigate opportunities and commence preliminary conversations with the state of Utah to establish an operating agreement for Idaho students to participate in Utah's veterinary program similar to the existing program with Washington State University.

Any person entering a plea of guilty or being found guilty or convicted of violating any of the provisions of this title, or who otherwise may, in addition to any other penalty assessed by the court, have his hunting, fishing, or trapping privileges revoked for such period of time as may be determined by the court not to exceed three (3) years. Any person who otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of a citation in connection with any such offense, may shall, in addition to any other penalty assessed by the court, have his hunting, fishing, or trapping privileges revoked for such period of time as may be determined by the court not to exceed three (3)".

On page 3, in line 40, following "fines" insert: "or judgments of reimbursement or restitution"; and in line 42, following "permit." insert: "Lifetime licenses shall be suspended until all fines, reimbursements, and restitution are paid in full. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to violators on court-approved time payment plans that are not ninety (90) days or more in arrears."

AMENDMENT TO BILL

On page 3, following line 42, insert:

"SECTION 2. That Section 36-1404, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

36-1404. UNLAWFUL KILLING, POSSESSION OR WASTE OF WILD ANIMALS, BIRDS AND FISH – REIMBURSABLE DAMAGES – SCHEDULE – ASSESSMENT BY MAGISTRATES – INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS – DEFAULT JUDGMENTS – DISPOSITION OF MONEYS. (a) In addition to the penalties provided for violating any of the provisions of title 36, Idaho Code, any person who pleads guilty, is found guilty of or is convicted of the illegal killing or the illegal possession or illegal waste of game animals or birds or fish shall reimburse the state for each animal so killed or possessed or wasted as follows:

- 1. Elk, seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) per animal killed, possessed or wasted.
- 2. Caribou, bighorn sheep, mountain goat, grizzly bear and moose, one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) per animal killed, possessed or wasted.
- 3. Any other species of big game, four hundred dollars (\$400) per animal killed, possessed or wasted.
- 4. Wild turkey and swan, two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per bird killed, possessed or wasted.
- 5. Sturgeon, two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per fish killed, possessed or wasted.
- 6. Bull trout, anadromous salmon and steelhead, one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) per fish killed, possessed or wasted
- 7. Any other game bird, game fish or furbearer, fifty dollars (\$50.00) per animal killed, possessed or wasted.

Provided further, that any person who pleads guilty, is found guilty of, or is convicted of illegal killing, illegal possession or illegal waste of a trophy big game animal as defined in section 36-202(h), Idaho Code, shall reimburse the state for each animal so killed, possessed or wasted, as follows:

- 1. Trophy mule deer: two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 2. Trophy white-tailed deer: two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 3. Trophy elk: five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 4. Trophy bighorn sheep: ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;

- 5. Trophy moose: ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 6. Trophy mountain goat: ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 7. Trophy pronghorn antelope: two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted;
- 8. Trophy caribou: ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted:
- 9. Trophy grizzly bear: ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per animal killed, possessed or wasted.

For each additional animal of the same category killed, possessed or wasted during any twelve (12) month period, the amount to be reimbursed shall double from the amount for each animal previously illegally killed, possessed or wasted. For example, the reimbursable damages for three (3) elk illegally killed during a twelve (12) month period would be five thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$5,250), calculated as follows: seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) for the first elk; one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the second elk; and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the third elk. In the case of three (3) trophy elk illegally killed in a twelve (12) month period, the reimbursable damages would be thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) calculated as follows: five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the first elk, ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the second elk, and twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the third elk. Provided however, that wildlife possessing a fifty dollar (\$50.00) reimbursement value shall be figured at the same rate per each animal in violation, without compounding.

- (b) In every case of a plea of guilty, a finding of guilt or a conviction of unlawfully releasing any fish species into any public body of water in the state, the court before whom the plea of guilty, finding of guilt, or conviction is obtained shall enter judgment ordering the defendant to reimburse the state for the cost of the expenses, not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), incurred by the state to correct the damage caused by the unlawful release. For purposes of this subsection, "unlawfully releasing any fish species" means a release of any species of live fish, or live eggs thereof, in the state without the permission of the director of the department of fish and game; provided, that no permission is required when fish are being freed from a hook and released at the same time and place where caught or when crayfish are being released from a trap at the same time and place where caught.
- (c) In every case of a plea of guilty, a finding of guilt or a conviction, the court before whom such plea of guilty, finding of guilt or conviction is obtained shall enter judgment ordering the defendant to reimburse the state in a sum or sums as hereinbefore set forth including postjudgment interest. If two (2) or more defendants are convicted of the illegal taking, killing or the illegal possession or wasting of the game animal, bird or fish, such judgment shall be declared against them jointly and severally.
- (d) The judgment shall fix the manner and time of payment and may permit the defendant to pay the judgment in installments at such times and in such amounts as, in the opinion of the court, the defendant is able to pay. In no event shall any defendant be allowed more than two (2) years from the date judgment is entered to pay the judgment.
- (e) A defaulted judgment or any installment payment thereof may be collected by any means authorized for the enforcement of a judgment under the provisions of the Idaho Code
- (f) All courts ordering such judgments of reimbursement shall order such payments to be made to the department, which shall deposit them with the state treasurer, and the treasurer shall place them in the state fish and game account.

(g) The court shall retain jurisdiction over the case. If at any time the defendant is in arrears ninety (90) days or more, the court may shall revoke the defendant's hunting, fishing or trapping privileges until the defendant completes payment of the judgment."; and renumber the subsequent section accordingly.

SJM 102 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the federal government of the United States is vested with the responsibility and authority to establish terms of naturalization, to prevent illegal immigration, and to otherwise establish, regulate, and enforce the terms and conditions upon which aliens may enter the United States from foreign places and upon which they may remain in the United States, what activities aliens may engage in while present in the United States, terms of permanent residency, and the granting of citizenship, in addition to control of the United States border; and

WHEREAS, the Congress and President of the United States have failed to fulfill their constitutional responsibility as it pertains to immigration law and policy, have failed to provide a secure border, have failed to consistently and uniformly enforce existing immigration law, and have failed to provide a robust and efficient system for entry of guest workers to the United States capable of meeting the labor demands of United States businesses; and

WHEREAS, as a result of these failures of the federal government to prevent illegal immigration, tremendous challenges are placed upon state and local governments to provide for the general health and welfare of all persons within their jurisdictions, whether that relates to education, enforcement of state and local law, health care, highway safety, and more; and

WHEREAS, as a further result of these failures of the federal government to prevent illegal immigration, the security of the United States and of the several states, including Idaho, is threatened and harmed by the unavailability of lawful labor needed to harvest, process, and transport the domestic food supply, to extract mineral, gas, oil, and timber resources, to build homes, businesses and highways, and to provide other basic life necessities, the lack of which leads to increased dependence on foreign production and threatens our national security; and

WHEREAS, as a further result of these failures of the federal government to prevent illegal immigration, the security of the United States and of the several states, including Idaho, is threatened and harmed by unlawful entry to the United States of those who seek to cause us harm, human traffickers, and drug traffickers; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Homeland Security estimates that there are approximately 11.4 million people present in the United States without lawful status, and data from the Census of Agriculture indicates that approximately 2.4 million of them are employed in agriculture; and

WHEREAS, data indicates that in the year 2021 approximately 7.8 million unauthorized immigrants were working in the United States performing labor-intensive jobs in agriculture, construction, food processing, hospitality, and other industries that are critical to economic prosperity; and

WHEREAS, the United States is facing a tremendous labor shortage despite the contribution to the workforce from unauthorized immigrants, and current data suggests that there are 1.7 million more jobs available in the United States than there are unemployed workers; and

WHEREAS, it is incumbent upon the Congress and President of the United States to strengthen our national security and the security of the several states, including Idaho, by adopting targeted, common sense, business-focused, market-driven immigration reform, which at its core must include the following in concert:

- (1) An effective system of external and internal security at and within the borders of the United States that excludes from entry people who do not have lawful permission to enter the United States and that incorporates modern technology to prevent, deter, detect, and detain those who seek to enter the United States by unlawful means; and
- (2) An effective guest worker program that meets the labor needs and demands of year-round agriculture, construction, hospitality, food processing, manufacturing, technology, and other market sectors, and in particular allows cyclical worker visas of adequate length to meet the labor demands of Idaho agriculture and business; and
- (3) Not granting amnesty to those currently in the United States without legal status; and

WHEREAS, targeted immigration reform is of vital necessity to the citizens and businesses of the State of Idaho, and as such it is incumbent upon the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States to be outspoken and fervent leaders and continue to be advocates for immigration reform consistent with the principles set forth in this Joint Memorial.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Idaho Legislature requests and calls upon the President of the United States and the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States to take action with all deliberate speed to adopt and implement targeted immigration reform in a manner consistent with the principles set forth in this Joint Memorial.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States is requested and called upon to take action with all deliberate speed to advocate for and introduce federal legislation implementing targeted immigration reform in a manner consistent with the principles set forth in this Joint Memorial.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Joint Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the framers of the Constitution of the United States empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against future abuses of power by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, most of which are unfunded to a great extent; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has ceased to function under a proper interpretation of the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, it is the solemn duty of the state to protect the liberty of our people, particularly for the generations to come,

by proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States through a convention of the states under Article V of the Constitution of the United States for the purpose of restraining these and related abuses of power.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho hereby applies to Congress, under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States, for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government, and limit the terms of office for its officials and for members of Congress.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State of Idaho is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and Secretary of the United States Senate and to the Speaker and Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, and to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states, requesting their cooperation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject.

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND DECLARING SUPPORT FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF CLEAN AND SAFE NUCLEAR ADVANCED ENERGY TECHNOLOGIES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Idaho has a long history with nuclear energy research and is home of the first community powered by nuclear energy; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's legacy in nuclear power innovation has positioned the state and our communities to lead the world in achieving energy independence; and

WHEREAS, the development of advanced energy is a key component of long-term planning for Idaho communities that balances economic growth with responsible stewardship of natural resources; and

WHEREAS, it is vital to Idaho's future that our communities invest in long-term strategies for energy creation, as well as promote technological leadership and enhance national security; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature recognizes the newly created Idaho Advanced Energy Consortium (IAEC) and its regional commitment to advancing nuclear and clean energy with its related projects in Idaho and Wyoming; and

WHEREAS, IAEC seeks to be a technology innovation hub and lead the world in next-generation clean energy generation; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho National Laboratory, along with IAEC, is working with industry and world leaders to produce and support advanced energy technologies needed for a sustainable, safe, secure, and efficient energy future; and

WHEREAS, the development of advanced energy can support our rural communities through economic development and diversification efforts, infrastructure investment, and workforce training and development; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature supports efforts to improve safety, licensing, and regulation processes for nuclear reactors while deploying the next generation of advanced reactors to support an ever-increasing demand for clean, safe energy production; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature recommends that the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) utilize

decades of experience to streamline processes associated with licensing, siting, construction, and oversight of advanced nuclear reactor technologies while maintaining a high level of safety; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature supports efforts and policies that provide tools and resources to obtain or deliver affordable, reliable energy for our citizens, communities, businesses, and industries; and

WHEREAS, advanced energy is part of a diversified energy portfolio that eliminates energy dependence on foreign entities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislature declares that domestic energy production is a national security issue and supports advanced energy research, while also supporting reforms to the process for new research and reactor licensing. The Legislature urges all citizens to recognize the importance of advanced energy to the state and to national security, the economy, and the environment.

SJM 103 BY RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho recognizes the Columbia-Snake River and its tributaries are a multiuse system providing navigation, transportation, fish and wildlife habitat, recreation, hydropower generation, and irrigation to the citizens, municipalities, and industry of the Pacific Northwest; and

WHEREAS, the Columbia-Snake River System and its tributaries are a vital part of the state's economic well-being and the quality of life of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho asserts and confirms sovereign control over all water resources within the state; and

WHEREAS, the decline of anadromous fish is due to many factors, including increased predation, unfavorable ocean conditions, and harvest; and

WHEREAS, due to the efforts of the state, the Nez Perce Tribe, and Idaho water users in entering into the 2004 Snake River Water Rights Agreement, up to 487,000 acre feet of Idaho's water is used for flow augmentation for salmon and steelhead in the lower Snake and Columbia Rivers, with water being released through a willing buyer, willing seller arrangement. The 2004 agreement provides protections to Idaho in the form of a 30-year biological opinion; and

WHEREAS, agricultural and industrial applications of water have a legal priority within the state; and

WHEREAS, the Port of Lewiston, Idaho's only seaport, is part of the collective Columbia-Snake River System and is an asset to the state and to the inland Northwest region, providing global competitiveness and connectivity for regional products, economic development investment, and multimodal transportation; and

WHEREAS, the Columbia-Snake River System is a top wheat export gateway in the United States, with approximately ten percent of all United States wheat exports barged through the four dams on the Snake River and about fifty percent of all Idaho-grown wheat barged from Lewiston to Portland and then to export markets around the world; and

WHEREAS, barging is the most fuel-efficient, environmentally friendly mode of transportation; and

WHEREAS, hydropower is the most efficient, environmentally favorable form of electrical generation, with the combined lower four Snake River dams producing 1,000 megawatts of carbon-free, renewable energy annually and 3,000 megawatts for peak power emergencies and providing electricity to 22 rural Idaho utilities serving more than 140,000 Idahoans; and

WHEREAS, the recent agreement between the United States government and certain plaintiffs to the ongoing Columbia-Snake River litigation was developed without adequate Idaho stakeholder input; and

WHEREAS, the agreement attempts to create a pathway to removing the four lower Snake River dams, despite Congress having the sole authority to remove dams; and

WHEREAS, the Public Power Council's assessment of the proposed agreement shows major cost risk and uncertainty for Northwest communities and businesses with potentially significant rate increases of five to forty percent or more if the agreement is implemented; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Idaho opposes any actions to degrade the functionality, in whole or in part, to remove or breach any dams on the Columbia-Snake River System or its tributaries, or to take water from the state for anadromous fish enhancement efforts. Such actions would inflict on Idaho citizens a loss in economic and trade opportunities, a loss of recharge waters for the state's aquifers, a loss of navigation and transportation, an increase in electrical rates, a shortfall in power generation, a loss of recreational opportunities, and a threatened quality of life.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that Idaho opposes the removal or breaching of the dams on the Columbia-Snake River System and its tributaries, has sovereignty over its water resources, prohibits contributions of water from Idaho's reservoirs for flow augmentation except those expressly authorized by state law, contends that efforts for further recovery of anadromous fish must be science-based, and supports the maintenance and multiple-use benefits of the Columbia-Snake River System. Additionally, the Idaho Legislature recognizes and supports the international competitiveness, multimodal transportation, and economic development benefits provided by the Port of Lewiston.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

THAT A PERSON MAY BE ELECTED AS A MEMBER OF THE UNITED STATES HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND TO SET A LIMIT ON THE NUMBER OF TERMS THAT A PERSON MAY BE ELECTED AS A MEMBER OF THE UNITED STATES SENATE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Article V of the Constitution of the United States mandates that upon the "Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States" Congress shall "call a Convention for proposing Amendments"; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature deems an amendment to the Constitution of the United States setting a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States House of Representatives and setting a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States Senate is necessary for the good of the American people.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho hereby makes an application to Congress, as provided by Article V of the Constitution of the United States, to call a convention limited to proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to set a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States House of Representatives and to set a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and Secretary of the Senate of the United States; to the Speaker, Clerk, and Judiciary Committee Chairman of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States; to Idaho's congressional delegation; and to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states requesting their cooperation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this application shall be considered as covering the same subject matter as the applications from other states to Congress to call a convention to set a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected to the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States and the Senate of the United States and that this application shall be aggregated with same for the purpose of attaining the two-thirds of states necessary to require Congress to call a limited convention on this subject, but shall not be aggregated with any other applications on any other subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject.

SCR 115 BY JUDICIARY AND RULES COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND REQUESTING THAT CONGRESS EITHER PROPOSE A BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES FOR RATIFICATION OR CALL A CONVENTION FOR PROPOSING AMENDMENTS UNDER ARTICLE V OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES FOR THE PROPOSAL OF SUCH AN AMENDMENT.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has run up a debt so massive that it has endangered the United States government, the United States economy, United States national defense, and all 50 states; and

WHEREAS, America's founding fathers vested the states with the power to rein in the federal government via the authority to propose and ratify amendments to the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Article V of the Constitution of the United States mandates that upon the "Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States" Congress shall "call a convention for proposing amendments"; and

WHEREAS, historically when the states have come within one application of the two-thirds of the states, which is 34 out of the 50 states, necessary to call a convention to propose a specific amendment, Congress has acted to propose said amendment in order to prevent a convention from being called; and

WHEREAS, President Ronald Reagan advocated the use of a "thirty-three state strategy" to pressure Congress to propose a balanced budget amendment for ratification by the states; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature deems that an amendment to the Constitution of the United States that would require a balanced federal budget is necessary for the good of the American people.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Idaho Legislature requests that Congress prepare and submit to the several states for ratification an amendment to the Constitution of the United States requiring, in the absence of a national emergency, that the total of all federal outlays made by the Congress for any fiscal year may not exceed the total of all estimated federal revenues for that fiscal year, together with any related and appropriate fiscal restraints.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, if Congress has not submitted the above described amendment to the several states for ratification by December 31, 2025, the Idaho Legislature applies to Congress, under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States, for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States requiring that, in the absence of a national emergency, the total of all federal outlays made by the Congress for any fiscal year may not exceed the total of all estimated federal revenues for that fiscal year, together with any related and appropriate fiscal restraints.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and Secretary of the United States Senate, to the Speaker and Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, to Idaho's congressional delegation, and to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states to request their cooperation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject, or until December 31, 2032, whichever occurs earlier. It supersedes all previous applications by this legislature on the same subject.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, a republican form of government depends on an informed and engaged citizenry; and

WHEREAS, civics education equips students with the knowledge and skills to be capable of self-government at the local, state, and national level; and

WHEREAS, declining history and civics scores for students across the country are worrisome for the future of our republic; and

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for American history, social studies, and civics curriculum that fosters an understanding of American values and provides a factual history of our nation; and

WHEREAS, a strong social studies and civics curriculum offers valuable opportunities to integrate civic education and promote responsible American citizenship; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to ensure the state's standards and curriculum align with our Idaho values of embracing patriotism and pride about the success of this great country.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Idaho Department of Education, through its social standards review process and work promoting the adoption of high-quality, supplementary curriculum at the local level, is hereby encouraged to:

- 1. Promote the importance of the history of western civilization, civics education, and responsible citizenship within applicable social studies, government, and U.S. history courses. Such promotion includes but is not limited to highlighting the origin of the country and the founding principles within American government, including the U.S. Constitution, individual rights, the separation of powers, and federalism: and
- 2. Emphasize the importance of civil discourse and responsible participation in civic life, including voting, volunteering, and community service, along with the critical skill of thinking independently.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature acknowledges the vital role of civics education in preparing students to be informed, engaged, and responsible citizens and expresses its commitment to supporting the Idaho Department of Education in its efforts to enhance civics education opportunities for all Idaho students.

SJM 104 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has before it the Hearing Protection Act; and

WHEREAS, the Hearing Protection Act will reclassify suppressors to regulate them like a regular firearm; and

WHEREAS, the Act would benefit Idaho's recreational gun users and provide them better access to hearing protection equipment; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's Senator Jim Risch supports the Act and has commented that: "Idaho's sportsmen and women want to safely and legally enjoy recreational activities such as hunting and target shooting, but burdensome government regulations unfairly restrict access to suppressors. The Hearing Protection

Act will reclassify suppressors to allow Idaho's law-abiding gun owners to more easily protect their hearing and enjoy this pastime"; and

WHEREAS, Senator Mike Crapo has been the chief sponsor of the Hearing Protection Act since 2017 and Congressman Russ Fulcher is one of 52 original cosponsors of the Act in Congress; and

WHEREAS, suppressors are safety tools that reduce the sound of gunfire to a level that will not cause instant and permanent hearing loss. Suppressors enable more accurate marksmanship and allow shooting ranges to be better neighbors; and

WHEREAS, suppressor restrictions from the 1930s put the hearing health of gun owners at risk; and

WHEREAS, under current law, suppressors are regulated as heavily as machine guns under the prohibition-era National Firearms Act (NFA) of 1934. Any NFA firearm or suppressor carries a mandatory \$200 tax, for which a stamp is issued proving the payment of that tax once the application is approved. It is not uncommon to have to wait up to 270 days for the paperwork to be processed; and

WHEREAS, removing suppressors from the NFA would not pose a threat to public safety. It would reduce the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms' workload and allow the agency to direct more resources to reducing violent crime, rather than processing paperwork.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that we urge the United States Congress to pass the Hearing Protection Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

SR 101 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A SENATE RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE SENATE AND PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT OF RULE 3 OF THE RULES OF THE SENATE.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Senate deems it necessary and desirable that Rule 3 of the Rules of the Senate be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Senate, assembled in the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, that Rule 3 of the Rules of the Senate shall be amended to read as follows:

RULE 3

Organization. – (A) At the first meeting of the Senate at which a quorum shall be present, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore and a Secretary and shall adopt temporary rules which, unless otherwise specifically stated, shall be the permanent rules of the preceding session.

Seating. – (B) Following election of its leadership, the Senate shall be declared "at ease" and the Senators shall retire to the sides of the Senate and proceed to select their seats in the following manner:

- (1) The President Pro Tempore, Majority and Assistant Majority Leader, Minority and Assistant Minority Leader, and Majority and Minority Caucus Chairman shall first select their seats, in the order listed.
- (2) Former members of the Senate shall next select their seats and those with consecutive terms immediately prior to the present session shall have priority over those with the same or a greater number of nonconsecutive terms, and of those not having served immediately prior to the present session, priority shall be consistent with the total number of terms served in the Senate.

In the event two or more Senators, not having served a term immediately prior to the present session, shall have served an equal number of past terms, service in the House of Representatives shall be computed to determine priority as between them.

- (3) Former members of the House of Representatives shall next select their seats and those having served the greatest number of terms in the House of Representatives shall have priority.
- (4) The names of all remaining Senators shall be placed in a receptacle by the Secretary and by him withdrawn therefrom and as the name of each Senator is withdrawn, he shall proceed to the seat selected by him until the business of selecting seats shall be completed.
- (5) The seating arrangements set forth in the preceding paragraph shall be subject to the provision that the members of each party shall be seated as nearly as possible in adjacent seats, and in the event one party has a majority which requires seating a portion of its members on the side of the Chamber occupied by the minority, such majority party shall have the right to select as many seats as may be necessary to accommodate its membership on the side closest to the regular seats of the majority party, subject only to Paragraph B(1) of this rule and the minority party shall be required to make such seats available to the members of the majority party.
- (6) On and after December 1, 2024, prior substitution in either the House or Senate shall not count as time served for determining seniority.

Substitutes. - (C) A substitute shall exercise the powers and duties of a Senator while acting as a substitute, but the Senator shall retain the office.

CHAPTER 19 CRISIS RESPONSE FOR PERSONS WITH A NEUROCOGNITIVE DISORDER

56-1901. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the legislature that persons with a neurocognitive disorder who are in acute crisis due to an unidentified underlying medical condition can get the care they need and return home once the underlying medical condition is resolved. The legislature further intends that state agencies and community partners will collaborate to provide the most dignified care for persons with a neurocognitive disorder.

56-1902. GOVERNMENTAL LIABILITY. All provisions of chapter 9, title 6, Idaho Code, shall apply to any claim of tortious conduct on the part of a person action or refusing to act in conformance with this chapter.

56-1903. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Department" means the state department of health and welfare.
- (2) "Health care provider" means a person licensed, certified, or otherwise authorized by law to administer health care services in the ordinary course of business or practice of a profession, including a physician, physician assistant, and advanced practice registered nurse.
- (3) "Health care services" means services for the diagnosis, prevention, treatment, cure, or relief of a health condition, illness, injury, or disease.
- (4) "Hospital" means a medical hospital as defined in section 39-1301, Idaho Code, including freestanding emergency departments.
 - (5) "Likely to injure themselves or others" means:
 - (a) A substantial risk that serious physical harm will be inflicted by the person upon their own person, as evidenced by threats of suicide or threats to inflict serious physical harm on themselves;
 - (b) A substantial risk that serious physical harm will be inflicted by the person upon another as evidenced by behavior that has caused such harm or that places another person or persons in reasonable fear of sustaining such harm; or
 - (c) The person lacks insight into the need for treatment and is unable or unwilling to comply with treatment based on the person's medical history, clinical observation, or other clinical evidence, and if the person does not receive and comply with treatment, there is a substantial risk that the person will continue to physically, emotionally, or cognitively deteriorate to the point that the person will, in the reasonably near future, inflict serious physical harm on themselves or another person.
- (6) "Neurocognitive disorder" has the same meaning as provided in section 66-317(13), Idaho Code, except that for purposes of this chapter neurocognitive disorder does not include decreased mental function due to inappropriate use or abuse of substances or medications.
- (7) "Peace officer" means an employee of a law enforcement agency that is a part of or administered by the state or any political subdivision of the state and whose duties include and primarily consist of the prevention and detection of crime and the enforcement of penal, traffic, or highway laws of the state or any political subdivision of the state. Peace officer also means an employee of a police or law enforcement agency of a federally recognized Indian tribe who has satisfactorily completed the peace officer standards and training academy and

has been deputized by a sheriff of a county or a chief of police of a city of the state of Idaho.

(8) "Protective custody" means when a peace officer detains a person and takes such person to a hospital. The peace officer shall make every reasonable effort to protect the person's health and safety while the peace officer takes reasonable steps to protect the peace officer's safety. Protective custody under this section is not an arrest.

56-1904. PROTECTIVE CUSTODY WITHOUT HEARING.

(1) No person shall be taken into protective custody or detained as an alleged emergency patient for observation, diagnosis, evaluation, care or treatment of a neurocognitive disorder unless and until the court has ordered such apprehension and custody pursuant to section 56-1905, Idaho Code; provided, however, that a person may be taken into custody by a peace officer and placed in a hospital, or the person may be detained at a hospital at which the person presented or was brought to receive medical care, if the peace officer or a health care provider in such hospital has reason to believe that person has a neurocognitive disorder and the person is likely to injure themselves or others; provided, under no circumstances shall the person be detained in a nonmedical unit used for the detention of persons charged with or convicted of penal offenses. Whenever a person is taken into custody or detained pursuant to this section without a court

order, the evidence supporting the claim that the person with the

neurocognitive disorder is likely to injure themselves or others

must be presented to a duly authorized court within twenty-four

(24) hours from the time the person was placed in custody or

- (2) If the court finds there is reason to believe the person is likely to have a neurocognitive disorder and likely to injure themselves or others pursuant to subsection (1) of this section, the court shall issue a temporary protective placement custody order requiring the person to be held in a hospital and requiring an examination of the person by a health care provider in such hospital within twenty-four (24) hours of the entry of the order of the court. Under no circumstances shall the person be detained in a nonmedical unit used for the detention of persons charged with or convicted of penal offenses.
- (3) Where an examination is required pursuant to subsection (2) of this section, the health care provider in such hospital shall make findings and report to the court within twenty-four (24) hours of the examination.
- (4) If at any time after the person is placed in protective custody the health care provider in such hospital conducting the examination determines the person no longer meets criteria for protective custody, the person shall be deemed to be a voluntary patient and subject to release.
- (5) If the health care provider in such hospital finds, in an examination pursuant to this section, that the person is likely to have a neurocognitive disorder and is likely to injure themselves or others, the prosecuting attorney shall file, within twenty-four (24) hours of the examination of the person, a petition with the court requesting the person's continued protective placement pending review proceedings pursuant to section 56-1905, Idaho Code.
- (6) Upon the receipt of such a petition, the court shall order the person's detention to await hearing, which shall be within five (5) days, including Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays, of the protective placement order. If no petition is filed within twenty-four (24) hours of the examination described in subsection (5) of this section, the person shall be released from the protective placement.
- (7) Upon taking a person into custody, a good faith effort shall be made to provide notice to the person's legal guardian,

- parent, spouse, or adult next of kin of the person's physical whereabouts and the reasons for taking the person into custody.
- (8) Nothing in this section shall preclude a hospital from transferring a person who has been detained pursuant to this section to another hospital that is willing to accept the transferred person for purposes of observation, diagnosis, evaluation, care, or treatment.

56-1905. PROTECTIVE CUSTODY UPON COURT ORDER – JUDICIAL PROCEDURE. (1) Proceedings by a hospital for the involuntary care and treatment of persons likely to have a neurocognitive disorder who are in acute crisis due to an underlying medical condition may be commenced by the filing of a written application for emergency protective placement with a court of competent jurisdiction by a friend, relative, spouse, or guardian of the person, by a health care provider practicing in a hospital, by a prosecuting attorney or other public official of a municipality, county, or the state of Idaho, or by the director of any facility in which such person may be located.

- (2) The application for emergency protective placement shall state the name and last known address of the person; the name and address of the spouse, guardian, next of kin, or friend of the person; whether the person can be cared for privately in the event a hold is not ordered; whether the person is, at the time of the application, a voluntary patient; whether the person has applied for release; and a simple and precise statement of the facts showing that the person is likely to have a neurocognitive disorder and is either likely to injure themselves or others.
- (3) Any such application for emergency protective placement shall be accompanied by a certificate of a health care provider practicing in such hospital stating that a health care provider practicing in such hospital has personally examined the person within the last fourteen (14) days and is of the opinion that the person has a neurocognitive disorder and is likely to injure themselves or others and lacks capacity to make informed decisions about treatment or by a written statement by the applicant that the person has refused to submit to examination by a health care provider practicing in such hospital.
- (4) Upon receipt of an application for emergency protective placement, the court shall, within forty-eight (48) hours, order another health care provider practicing in such hospital to make a personal examination of the person, or if the person has not been examined, the court shall appoint two (2) health care providers practicing in such hospital to make individual personal examinations of the person and may order the person to submit to an immediate examination. If neither is a physician, the court shall order a physical examination of the person. The health care provider practicing in such hospital shall report to the court findings within the following seventy-two (72) hours as to the medical condition of the person and the need for custody, care, or treatment by a hospital. The reports shall be in the form of written certificates that shall be filed with the court. The court may terminate the proceedings and dismiss the application without taking any further action in the event the reports are to the effect that the person is not likely to injure themselves or others due to a neurocognitive disorder. If the proceedings are terminated, the person shall be released immediately.
- (5) If the health care provider practicing in such hospital certifies a belief that the person is likely to injure themselves or others due to a neurocognitive disorder, the judge shall issue an order authorizing any health officer, peace officer, or director of a facility to take the person to a hospital in the community in which the person is residing or to the nearest hospital to await the hearing, and for good cause, may authorize treatment during such period. Under no circumstances shall the person be detained

in a nonmedical unit used for the detention of individuals charged with or convicted of penal offenses.

- (6) Upon receipt of such application for emergency protective placement by the health care provider practicing in such hospital, the court shall appoint a time and place for a hearing not more than seven (7) days from the receipt of such certificates and thereupon give written notice of such time and place of such hearing, together with a copy of the application, the health care provider's certificates, and notice of the person's right to be represented by an attorney or, if indigent, to be represented by a court-appointed attorney to the applicant, and to the person and the person's spouse, guardian, next of kin, or friend. With the consent of the person and the person's attorney, the hearing may be held immediately. Upon motion of the petitioner, or upon motion of the person and the person's attorney, and for good cause shown, the court may continue the hearing up to an additional seven (7) days during which time, for good cause shown, the court may authorize treatment.
- (7) An opportunity to be represented by counsel shall be afforded to every person and, if neither the person nor others provide counsel, the court shall appoint counsel in accordance with chapter 8, title 19, Idaho Code, no later than the time the application for emergency protective placement is received by the court.
- (8) If the protective placement is commenced under this section, the hearing shall be held in a manner and at a suitable place not likely to have a harmful effect on the person's physical or mental health. Venue for the hearing shall be in the county of residence of the person or in the county where the person was found immediately prior to commencement of such proceedings.
- (9) In all proceedings under this section, any existing provision of the law prohibiting the disclosure of confidential communications between the person and the health care provider practicing in such hospital shall not apply and any health care provider practicing in such hospital who shall have examined the person shall be a competent witness to testify as to the person's condition.
- (10) The person, the applicant, and any other persons to whom notice is required to be given shall be afforded an opportunity to appear at the hearing to testify and to present and cross-examine witnesses. The person may, after consulting with the person's attorney, request to waive the person's presence at court. The court may waive the presence of the person if the mental or physical state of the person is such that the person's presence at the hearing would be detrimental to the person's health or would unduly disrupt the proceedings. A record of the proceedings shall be made as for other civil hearings. The hearing shall be conducted in as informal a manner as may be consistent with orderly procedure. The court shall receive all relevant and material evidence consistent with the rules of evidence.
- (11) If, upon completion of the hearing and consideration of the record, and after consideration of reasonable alternatives, the court finds by clear and convincing evidence that the person likely has a neurocognitive disorder and is likely to injure themselves or others, the court shall order the person to be placed under protective custody of a suitable medical hospital for observation, care, and treatment for an indeterminate period of time not to exceed seven (7) days.
- (12) The order of protective placement shall state whether the person lacks capacity to make informed decisions about treatment and the name and address of the person's attorney, spouse, guardian, adult next of kin, or friend.
- (13) If the person has no spouse or guardian and if the person has property that may not be cared for by the person while confined at a hospital, the court shall appoint a guardian ad

litem for the purpose of preserving the person's estate, pending further guardianship or conservatorship proceedings.

- 56-1906. DUTY TO REPORT INSTANCES OF EMERGENCY PROTECTIVE PLACEMENT. (1) Hospitals shall report all placements in which persons are placed in emergency protective placement pursuant to section 56-1904 or 56-1905, Idaho Code, or an involuntary hold pursuant to section 66-326 or 66-329, Idaho Code, but determined by a health care provider to likely have a neurocognitive disorder and not mental illness to the department every quarter. Reports shall be due to the department on the last day of the month immediately following the end of the quarter, with the first report due April 30, 2025.
- (2) Any and all patient information submitted as a part of a report required under this section shall be protected and de-identified according to state and federal privacy laws.
 - (3) The hospital shall report:
 - (a) The number of emergency protective placements that were placed at a hospital by a health care provider;
 - (b) The number of emergency protective placements that were placed at a hospital by a peace officer;
 - (c) The number of emergency protective placements that were made for persons determined to have an underlying medical reason for placement in the hospital who also had a neurocognitive disorder;
 - (d) The number of emergency protective placements that were made for persons who did not have a neurocognitive disorder;
 - (e) For emergency protective placements made for persons who did not have a medical reason for placement in the hospital other than a neurocognitive disorder, how many had a length of stay after the emergency protective placement ended at the hospital that was:
 - (i) Between zero (0) and five (5) days;
 - (ii) Between six (6) and ten (10) days;
 - (iii) Between eleven (11) and thirty (30) days;
 - (iv) Between thirty-one (31) and sixty (60) days;
 - (v) Between sixty-one (61) and ninety (90) days; and
 - (vi) More than ninety (90) days; and
 - (f) For emergency protective placements made for persons who had a medical reason for placement in the hospital other than a neurocognitive disorder, how many had a length of stay after the emergency protective placement ended at the hospital that was:
 - (i) Between zero (0) and five (5) days;
 - (ii) Between six (6) and ten (10) days;
 - (iii) Between eleven (11) and thirty (30) days;
 - (iv) Between thirty-one (31) and sixty (60) days;
 - (v) Between sixty-one (61) and ninety (90) days; and
 - (vi) More than ninety (90) days.
- (4) The department shall include a summary of all reports made pursuant to subsection (1) of this section in the annual report on Alzheimer's disease and related dementias as required in section 39-2701, Idaho Code.
- 56-1907. RESPONSIBILITY FOR COSTS OF PROTECTIVE CUSTODY AND CARE OF PATIENTS. (1) As used in this section:
 - (a) "Protective custody period" means a period that begins when a person is taken into custody pursuant to sections 56-1904 and 56-1905, Idaho Code, and ends when the patient is released from protective custody.
 - (b) "Routine medical care" includes care provided during the protective custody period that includes hospital costs, including routine board, room, and support services.

- (c) "Third-party applicant" means a person other than a patient who completes, signs, and files an application for medicaid on behalf of the patient. A third-party applicant may be an adult who is a member of the patient's family or household, the patient's authorized representative, or, if the patient is incapacitated, someone, including an agent of a facility, who is acting responsibly for the patient.
- (2) In instances where the person placed in protective custody is released with no underlying medical conditions in addition to the person's neurocognitive disorder having been identified, costs associated with the protective custody shall be the responsibility of the person placed in protective custody, subject to the department of health and welfare's determination of the person's ability to pay all or any part of such costs. The department shall:
 - (a) Use the state-approved fee determination form and sliding fee schedule described in rules promulgated by the department to determine the person's ability to pay;
 - (b) Inquire to determine if the person has insurance, including medical assistance provided under the state plan for medicaid as authorized by title XIX of the social security act, as amended; and
 - (c) Report its findings to the court.
- (3) The court may order a person to pay costs consistent with this section.
- (4) To the extent possible, the costs of routine medical care incurred during protective custody shall be assigned to a person's health insurance, including medical assistance provided under the state plan for medicaid as authorized by title XIX of the social security act, as amended. If a person may be eligible for medicaid but has not applied, a third-party applicant, including an agent at a hospital where a person is taken into custody or detained under this chapter, may submit a medicaid application to the department of health and welfare. The medical care provided while the person is in protective custody shall be presumed to be medically necessary for purposes of determining reimbursement for that care by third-party payers.
- (5) Remaining costs for routine medical care shall be apportioned as follows:
 - (a) The department of health and welfare shall pay providers at the rate established by medicaid or its managed care organization. If, based on the department of health and welfare's determination under subsection (2) of this section, the person is able to pay a portion of the medical costs, the person shall reimburse the department consistent with the department's sliding fee schedule; or
 - (b) Costs for routine medical care during the protective placement period shall be paid by the department of health and welfare, consistent with the process described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

SECTION 2. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full force and effect on and after October 1, 2024.".

- (d) In addition to the requirements of section 67-5270, Idaho Code, the challenging bidder shall also file a protest

bond in an amount equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the allocated budget for the construction of the public works capital improvements.

- (i) If the allocated budget was not included in the request for qualifications, the director shall set the value of the protest bond at a reasonable amount that does not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the anticipated capital expenditures to complete the public works improvements.
- (ii) If the challenge is successful, the protest bond will be returned to the challenging bidder within fourteen (14) days of the final decision having been made.
- (iii) If the challenge is not successful, a claim may be made against the protest bond by the public entity in an amount equal to the expenses incurred by the public entity because of the challenge. Such expenses must be documented and may include but are not limited to legal fees, court costs, escalated material prices, and other direct damages related to the challenge. The remainder of the bond shall be released after the claim has been satisfied."

I have the honor to advise you that I have signed on March 25, 2024 and am transmitting to the Secretary of State the following Senate Bill, to wit:

SENATE BILL 1283

within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 4:52 p.m. on March 19, 2024.

I support the merits of the legislation to ensure that temporary and seasonal employees are not inadvertently subject to benefits they would no longer qualify for in rare years where a crisis event causes them to work more than anticipated. Both the employer and the employee should not be subject to contributions in this instance. Senate Bill 1283 provides local soil and water conversation districts with additional flexibility to appropriately plan and prepare for the ongoing prevention and monitoring of invasive species.

Idaho Code 73-101 provides that no part of Idaho Code is retroactive unless expressly declared to be retroactive. Senate Bill 1283 contains this express declaration of emergency need to retroactively apply this legislative action. In this instance, due to the extremely unique nature of the battle against invasive species and the need for soil and water conservation districts to act, both in the past and in the future, the language in Senate Bill 1283, and only Senate Bill 1283, is appropriate.

SCR 134 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION AND SOCIAL JUSTICE IN IDAHO'S PUBLIC POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTIONS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho is committed to fostering a fair and nondiscriminatory environment in public postsecondary institutions where all citizens, including students and faculty, are treated equally; and

WHEREAS, the advancement of knowledge is the fundamental purpose of the public postsecondary education system, and such advancement requires the free exchange of views as well as the open discussion and debate of contested public policy issues from varying perspectives; and

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Idaho, and federal and state

laws afford broad protections against the disparate treatment of individuals, including students and faculty, in public postsecondary institutions; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) programs, initiatives, and related staff members have become more common nationwide; and

WHEREAS, DEI programs and initiatives generally seek non-neutral, preferential outcomes based on providing a benefit to individuals on the basis of race, color, ethnicity, national origin, disability, or religion; and

WHEREAS, together with DEI, social justice ideology has become more commonplace with respect to public postsecondary education across the nation; and

WHEREAS, proponents of social justice ideology advocate for a fair balance in the distribution of wealth, opportunities, and privileges within a society; and

WHEREAS, the use of DEI and social justice ideologies may influence hiring or employment practices, the promotion of differential treatment with respect to policies and procedures, the favoring of certain points of view within education and discourse, and training or instruction meant to promote DEI and social justice ideologies; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, public postsecondary educational institutions across the country have increased the number of non-instructional or administrative staff, particularly in DEI-related positions; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the hiring of DEI-related faculty, there are other costs associated with DEI requirements, including faculty time spent preparing and teaching such courses and time and tuition dollars that students spend on such material; and

WHEREAS, spending on DEI and social justice initiatives has, nationwide, taken away valuable resources that could have been committed to supporting more students' academic pursuits and improving education outcomes; and

WHEREAS, tuition for most public postsecondary educational institutions is already expensive and is cost-prohibitive for some students; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature is committed to the sound and prudent use of taxpayer dollars to provide for beneficial and cost-effective public postsecondary education; and

WHEREAS, the public has a right to know about activities that are funded by taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Legislature that Idaho's public postsecondary educational institutions teach the knowledge and skills that students need to be thoughtful and productive citizens without additional and unnecessary expense and bureaucracy; and

WHEREAS, it is also the intent of the Legislature that no state-appropriated funds are used to support diversity, equity, and inclusion, or social justice ideology as part of any student activities, clubs, events, or organizations on the campuses of Idaho's public postsecondary institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of the prevalence and impacts of diversity, equity, and inclusion and social justice ideology in Idaho's public postsecondary institutions, including any associated policies, procedures, staffing, and related costs. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage, or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-eighth Idaho Legislature.

I hereby advise you that I have signed on March 25, 2024 and am transmitting to the Secretary of State the following Senate Bill, to wit:

SENATE BILL 1380

within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 4:52 p.m. on March 19, 2024.

Maintaining public trust and confidence in government is of paramount importance, especially when the mission is serving the best interests of Idaho's most vulnerable children. I believe Senate Bill 1380, by creating an independent ombudsman's office, will further public confidence and help identify productive and innovative ideas by which Idaho can better support children and those serving critical roles in foster care and child protection.

I look forward to my administration implementing this bill and identifying possible amendments next year to ensure the ombudsman's office is most effective. Currently, I have two recommendations for the Legislature to consider:

First, to maximize the independence of the ombudsman's office, the Legislature should consider amending code to allow the ombudsman's office to have legal counsel different than that advising the department it is tasked with overseeing. Unless amended, the Office of the Attorney General will be statutorily obligated to represent both the ombudsman's office and the Department of Health and Welfare. Dual representation by the same legal office conflicts with the legislative mandate for independence and will impair the ombudsman's authority to "pursue all necessary action, including legal action, to protect the child's welfare and rights." This recommendation can be accomplished simply by adding the ombudsman's office to the list of self-governing agencies already enumerated in Idaho Code 67-1406(2).

Second, the Legislature should consider broadening the oversight functions of the ombudsman's office to other key executive functions, such as officials' compliance wit laws governing public records, open meetings, and ethics. Legal conflicts arise when one executive office attempts to investigate another for advice the former rendered to the latter. Such conflicts are proven to be counterproductive and expensive for Idaho's taxpayers. I believe the public trust in government is best maintained when the roes of general counsel and inspector general served by two distinct offices of state government.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND DENOUNCING RACISM AND HATE SPEECH.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, last week, while visiting Idaho, the University of Utah women's basketball team experienced an incident of racism that may have constituted, according to law enforcement, malicious harassment and disorderly conduct; and

WHEREAS, the Aryan Nations and other hate groups have existed in Idaho in the past; and

WHEREAS, the racist incident that the University of Utah women's basketball team experienced is not a protected speech issue; and

WHEREAS, for the same reason that one cannot yell "fire!" in a crowded theater, one cannot yell racial slurs at a group of young Black women while attempting to intimidate them; and

WHEREAS, yelling a racial slur in a manner meant to symbolize hatred towards a particular race at a person of such race while acting in a confrontational manner was likely to incite genuine fear in the victims of such speech; and

WHEREAS, inciting genuine fear in an attempt to intimidate a person jeopardizes such person's health and safety and is, therefore, not protected speech; and

WHEREAS, the racist incident involving the University of Utah women's basketball team reflects negatively on Idaho and is harmful to the state's reputation and interests; and

WHEREAS, to positively affect change, Idaho's leaders must do more than issue public statements denouncing racist acts after they occur; and WHEREAS, Idaho's citizens have a proud history of combating violence and hatred; and

WHEREAS, people of color who are citizens of Idaho or who visit Idaho do not always feel safe; and

WHEREAS, all people, regardless of race, deserve to feel safe in Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the Legislature hereby denounces acts of racism and commits to eradicating the conditions that allow racial animus and undue prejudice to persist in Idaho.

Report of the Committee of the Whole

Senator Lee, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported out <u>S 1296</u>, <u>H 603</u>, <u>H 710</u>, <u>H 670</u>, and <u>H 745</u>, without recommendation, amended as follows:

SENATE AMENDMENT TO S 1296

AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 11 through 39. Delete pages 2 and 3, and insert:

"SECTION 1. That Title 28, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a <u>NEW CHAPTER</u>, to be known and designated as Chapter 54, Title 28, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:

CHAPTER 54 DISTRIBUTED LEDGER TECHNOLOGY

28-5401. SHORT TITLE. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Distributed Ledger Technology Act."

28-5402. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT. The legislature finds that the use of distributed ledger technology provides substantial positive economic value for individuals, nonprofit organizations, corporations, cities, and states throughout the United States. However, distributed ledger technology has often faced difficulty with regulations at the state and local level. For these reasons, it is the intent of the legislature to protect the right of individuals and businesses to use distributed ledger technology and to create legal certainty for the distributed ledger technology industry.

28-5403. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Data center" means a use involving a building or premises in which the majority of the use is occupied by computers, telecommunications, or related equipment, including supporting equipment, where information is processed, transferred, and stored.
- (2) "Distributed ledger technology" means a peer-to-peer network of computers or computing devices that enable the operation and use of distributed databases for various purposes. Users hold private keys that are used to sign database entries. Nodes in the peer-to-peer network verify database entries through cryptographic proof conditions and record them in a public distributed ledger, without centralized human oversight according to rules established in an algorithmic protocol. Distributed ledger technology tokens are digital assets and can be used as a store of value and a currency.
- (3) "Distributed ledger technology node" means a computational device that contains a copy of a distributed ledger technology and that acts as a network communication hub, validates database entries, and relays information on a distributed ledger technology network.
- (4) "Distributed ledger technology verification" means the use of electricity or other energy source to power a computer or other computational device for the purpose of validating and securing a distributed ledger technology network, the generation of tokens, or both.
- (5) "Distributed ledger technology verification business" means a group of computers or other computational devices working at a single site that consume more than one (1) megawatt of energy on an average annual basis for the purpose of securing a distributed ledger technology network, verifying transactions on a distributed ledger technology network, operating a node on a distributed ledger technology network, or generating tokens on a distributed ledger technology network.
- (6) "Hardware cryptocurrency wallet" means a physical device capable of storing distributed ledger technology private and public keys offline.
- (7) "Private keys" means a part of an asymmetric cryptographic system that uses a pair of related one-way cryptographic keys to secure access to information recorded in a distributed ledger technology network that is privately held by individual network users.
- (8) "Public keys" means a part of an asymmetric cryptographic system that uses a pair of related one-way cryptographic keys to secure access to information recorded in a distributed ledger technology network that is generally viewable by all network users.
- 28-5404. RIGHT TO OPERATE DISTRIBUTED LEDGER TECHNOLOGY NODES. (1) A governing body of a city or county or any combination of such governing bodies shall not enact an ordinance, resolution, or rule that:

- (a) Imposes requirements on a distributed ledger technology verification business that are not also requirements for data centers in its area of jurisdiction;
- (b) Prevents a distributed ledger technology verification business from operating in an area zoned for industrial use;
 (c) Prevents home distributed ledger technology verification, node operation, or token generation at a private
- residence, except as related to existing noise ordinances; (d) Rezones an area in which a distributed ledger technology verification business is located without complying with applicable state law and local zoning ordinances; or
- (e) Rezones an area with the intent or effect of discriminating against a distributed ledger technology verification business.
- (2) A distributed ledger technology verification business may appeal a change in zoning of an area by a local government under any applicable state law or local zoning ordinance.
- (3) Any distributed ledger technology verification business operating on or before the effective date of this act may continue to operate regardless of any change in zoning or regulations as long as the business does not expand its operations.
- (4) A person that is engaged in home distributed ledger technology verification or that has a distributed ledger technology verification business shall not be considered a money transmitter under the Idaho money transmitters act, chapter 29, title 26, Idaho Code.
- 28-5405. RIGHT TO SELF-CUSTODY AND USE OF DISTRIBUTED LEDGER TECHNOLOGY TOKENS. A governing body of a city or county or any combination of such governing bodies shall not enact an ordinance, resolution, or rule that prohibits, restricts, or otherwise impairs the ability of an individual to use:
- (1) A software or hardware cryptocurrency wallet for self-custody of distributed ledger technology private or public keys; or
- (2) Distributed ledger technology tokens for the purchase of legal goods or services.
- 28-5406. TAXATION OF DISTRIBUTED LEDGER TECHNOLOGY TOKENS. (1) Distributed ledger technology tokens used as a method of payment shall not be subject to any additional tax, withholding, assessment, or charge by the state or a local government that is based solely on the use of distributed ledger technology tokens as the method of payment.
- (2) Nothing in this section prohibits the state or a local government from imposing or collecting a tax, withholding, assessment, or charge otherwise authorized pursuant to title 63, Idaho Code.
- 28-5407. RIGHT TO RUN DISTRIBUTED LEDGER TECHNOLOGY NODES. A governing body of a city or county or any combination of such governing bodies shall not enact an ordinance, resolution, or rule that prohibits, restricts, or otherwise impairs the ability of an individual to run a distributed ledger technology node.
- SECTION 2. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage and approval.".

CORRECTION TO TITLE

Although signing this bill, I will note there is an ongoing reduction of personnel costs from the Department of Health and Welfare's Service Integration and Developmental Disabilities programs. During the 2023 legislative session, the Legislature incorporated intent language within the department's budget restricting the transfer of personnel costs to other expense classes, which resulted in the department requesting fiscal year 2024 supplementals to make those transfers. Personnel surpluses are not created by programs with the intent of covering growing operating costs. Rather, they have historically been available due to difficulty in recruiting and retaining personnel due to labor market challenges.

While Senate Bill 1426 provides the one-time transfers of personnel costs to operating expenditures for these programs, the ongoing reduction of personnel funding starting in fiscal year 2025 will leave a hole in both programs' budgets. By doing so, the department will likely require a fiscal year 2025 supplemental appropriation to maintain its workforce and provide the essential services offered by the Developmental Disabilities and Service Integration programs.

I look forward to continuing to work with you next session to find a more adequate, long-term solution to address the department's ability to manage its operations responsibly.

Idaho is a state that proudly "backs the blue." Our commitment to public safety is a huge part of what makes Idaho an attractive place to live and raise a family, which is why funding critical ongoing needs at the Idaho State Police, such as body armor and bullets, with one-time funding causes me significant concern.

In 2019, the Legislature decided to gradually remove ISP from the Highway Distribution Account funded by fuel taxes. Fiscal Year 2025 is the final year ISP will be partially funded by fuel taxes. This dedicated funding source was historically used to support the ISP Patrol Division by providing salaries for troopers as well as repair and replacement needs for items such as vehicles, bulletproof vests, sidearms, and ammunition. Consequently, ISP's reliance on the General Fund for repair and replacement items has grown over the last four years and will continue to grow in the future

Two weeks ago, we were all reminded of ISP's indispensable statewide law enforcement mission. ISP coordinated efforts with federal, state, and local enforcement partners to peacefully end a deadly 36-hour manhunt that stretched the entire state.

An appropriation bill cannot be considered a maintenance of operations budget if it does not account for equipping troopers with essential items for their work. ISP's repair and replacement items that directly support troopers and investigators are not one-time expenses. They have predictable replacement schedules, and these essential items should be built into the base of ISP's budget. This appropriation runs contrary to previous commitments as ISP was eased off the Highway Distribution Account, and it is not structurally sound budgeting.
